The news was expected to be greeted with joy by various Hicksville organizations which have been. aggressively campaigning for more off-street parking facilities. The Business Men's Association this week began rounding up petitions, asking for more parking fields, which have been collecting store customer signatures for the past two weeks. In recent weeks the Civic Association and Lions Club have also voiced demands to the town board for more marking fields, supporting the stand taken by the Hicksville Citizen's Adviory Parkng Committee, of which Rev. Howard Rogers is chairman.

In Bethpage, the Kiwanis Club has been in the fore in seeking the establishment of parking facilities for the community. The meeting there will be a preliminary step, creating a special taxing district, which was inaugurated for the Township at Hicksville was inaugurated two years ago.

Councilman Frank Chlumsky asked for comment regarding plans for increasing Hicksville's parking facilities, told the Herald the Town Board has no definite ideas regarding potential local sites but rather will be guided by the opinions and comments ex-pressed at the hearing on Oct. 18. 

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

Education at Home

James Walters, principal, and members of the P-TA program committee presented the 1949-50 theme, "The Child's Emotional, Physical and Recreation Needs." "Education begins at home," he said. "Many habits and" attitudes which become a part of us are formed in the pre-school years.

"The kindergarten accepts each child as he is and helps him to adjust to the school group. Kin-dergarten is one of the founda-tions in the child's development and education. Kindergarten teachers and the home confer as often as is necessary," he added.

Mr. Walters said that normal children are much alike in the way they develop, but that no two children are alike in the rate of development and growth.
"Some walk earlier than others,

some talk earlier and more, some

rate of development holds true in school work. Parents and teachers need to know and understand this individual growth."

He asserted the child needs en-couragement for he can't be made to grow, but the growth can be encouraged by good physical and emotional care.

"The child will grow in some measure whatever care is given him, but he may not become all he should unless he receives good care and encouragement," Walters pointed out.

The principal believes that each child needs opportunities to reach ahead to take the next step and the proper amount of stimulation at the right time. He cautioned parents about pushing the child ahead too soon, and expecting too much of him before he is ready as the child will become discouraged.
Must Feel Interest

"Each child needs to feel that the adults about him are interested in him and like him. He will grow best if his home and school the environment and warmth and acceptance in which he can feel he belongs and that he is liked and needed," Mr. Walters concluded.

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

In Our Opinion:

You Should Vote Monday Night

THERE ARE 1,144 persons qualified, but if more than 800 vote on the Eicksville School District transportation questions next Monday night, Oct. 10, at the high school, we will be vastly surprised.

10, at the high school, we will be vastly marprised.

Bivery person who is registered should get out and vote on this far reaching proposal. Because there has been some misunderstanding and confusion about the questions to be answered, the Board of Education has put out its own leaflet. As explained by Board President Henry C. Brengel, the leaflet was prepared "solely for the purpose of insuring that each votar will register an effective vote in accordance with his opinion and insuring that the result of the election will be a true expression of the collective will of the qualified voters of the district."

We hope that every qualified voter will be on hand when the meeting is called to order at 8 o'clook Monday night in the high school auditorium. Experience has shown, however, that many will deah in to vote and rush out again. Before the voting starts, anyone interested will have the opportunity of asking questions relative to the propositions. Then, before the voting starts, the time for closing the doors of the auditorium will be set. All present inside the building at that time will be permitted to cost their ballot.

The meeting on Monday is important because it marks as innovation for the district. In the past transportation or students within Hickswille school district has been limited to those living more than two miles from schools and to erupted children.

The present question has come up because there are now many younger students living a mile or so from the schools. Concern for the safety of these children, as route back and forth, has promoted parents to getition the board and request transportation.

The Charles Wagner American Legion Post has found merit in the proposal and is on record in favor of such transportation.

There are two distinct questions. One takes care of elementary school students and the other, high school students. Each question is separate and distinct. In the case of elementary pupils it is worth noting that approval of such service will probably include Parochial as well as Public School students.

The Board, after several special meetings and full study of the question, has estimated that

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\$40,000 will cover the cost on each question. That amount is based upon transportation for a full term and must be regarded as a maximum estimate. Only receipt of competitive bids will fix the actual cost of the service, and it might be expected that the final cost could be somewhat under \$40,000 in each case. There can be no guarantee of this, however.

The practical application of the service, if either proposition is given majority appproval, will be at the discretion of the Board of Education. It will be the Board's responsibility to fix actual bus stop points, establish schedules, etc.

The reader may infer from the foregoing that the Herald believes in the need for transportation facilities within the district. The qualified voters will make known their opinion on Monday night.
