## 333 MORE REGISTER: School Buses Go to Vote Monday

HICKSVILLE—The question of transporting students who live less than two miles from local schools will be decided next Monday night, Oct. 10, when a special meeting of qualified voters is held in the high school at Second St. and Jerusalem Ave., starting at 8 o'clock. There are 1,144 persons registered to vote on two questions.

## Registration for November Elections Starts Saturday at Local Polling Places

MINEOLA—The first of two registration days for the general election on Nov. 8 of town, county and state officials will take place this Saturday, Oct. 8, between 7 a.m. and 10 p.m. at local election district polling places.

Communities of the mid-Island section are non-personal registration areas which means that voters are not required to register personally for each general elec-

tion. However, the many new residents of the area may find it advisable to make sure they are registered by applying at the polling places.

A second registration day for the mid-Island area will take place on Saturday, Oct. 15, between 1 and 10 p.m.

## 19th Election District In New Polling Place

HICKSVILLE — After more than a decade of being located in the Legion Clubhouse, the polling place for the 19th Election District has been changed to the showroom of Wass Motor Sales at Broadway and Old Country Rd.

OYSTER BAY—The Town Board will hold a public hearing in Nicholas St. School, Hicksville, the middle of October for the purpose of considering the purchase of land and improving it for additional Hicksville parking fields.

The hearing is set for Tuesday night, October 18, starting at 7:30 o'clock. The notice of the hearing, published in the Herald today as a legal advertisement, says it is proposed to acquire land and improve it at a cost not to exceed \$50,000, "one half of which amount is to be contributed by the town."

A public hearing has also been called by the Town Board for the following night, Wednesday, Oct. 19, at Bethpage School, upon the creation of a Park and Parking District for Bethpage. The estimated cost under consideration there is \$30,000.

The news was expected to be greeted with joy by various Hicksville organizations which have been aggressively campaigning for more off-street parking facilities. The Business Men's Association this week began rounding up petitions, asking for more parking fields, which have been collecting store customer signatures for the past two weeks. In recent weeks the Civic Association and Lions Club have also voiced demands to the town board for more marking fields, supporting the stand taken by the Hicksville Citizen's Advisory Parking Committee, of which Rev. Howard Rogers is chairman.

In Bethpage, the Kiwanis Club has been in the fore in seeking the establishment of parking facilities for the community. The meeting there will be a preliminary step, creating a special taxing district, which was inaugurated for the Township at Hicksville two years ago.

Councilman Frank Chlursky asked for comment regarding plans for increasing Hicksville's parking facilities, told the Herald the Town Board has no definite ideas regarding potential local sites but rather will be guided by the opinions and comments expressed at the hearing on Oct. 18. ## Ask Island Trees Name for Branch

ISLAND TREES—With a branch of the Hicksville Post Office due to open here shortly on Hempstead Tpke., renewed efforts were being made to retain the historic name of "Island Trees" for the area and the branch office. These developments are taking place:

1.—The branch office will open probably within a matter of weeks, first limited to distribution of parcels. Until fully fixtured, stamp and money order sales will continue at Hicksville.

2.—The branch will be called "Levittown" according to County Democratic Leader Rose Carreani, based upon a letter from Washington.

3.—Residents of the Miller Homes section who have named their civic group "Island Trees" (continued on page 12)

Three hundred and thirty-three persons registered last Saturday, many of them residents of the newer home sections of the district. Previously 811 were qualified.

Leaflets were being distributed this week by the Board of Education explaining how to mark the ballots next Monday. The substance of the instructions are printed on page 3 of the Herald.

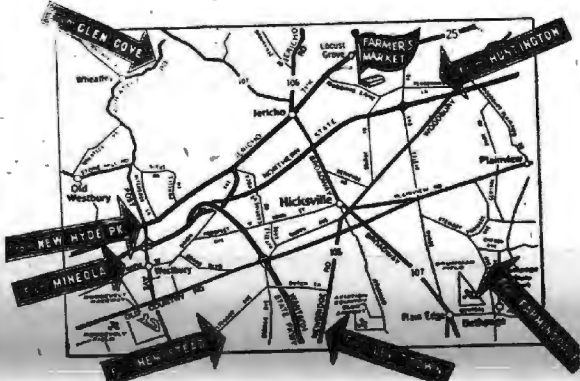

## Levitt Asks Newbridge Rd. Zone Change For New Shopping Centre in Hicksville

OYSTER BAY—Rezoning of a tract of land on the east side of Newbridge Road, Hicksville, within the Town of Oyster Bay, from residential "D" to Business "H" will be the subject of a public hearing before the town board next Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock. The area estimated at 14 acres is planned as another "Village Green" or shopping centre for Levitt houses to be built in the township and Hicksville during 1950.

The application for the zone change has been made by the County Community Corp. The proposed area starts at a point 100 feet north of the township line and has a frontage of 140 feet on Newbridge Road. It is expected to include a swimming pool.

## Town Debt-Free in 2 Years, Tappen Reveals

OYSTER BAY—The Township will be free and clear of indebtedness in 1951 as final payments are made upon bond issues for the Town Hall and the Town Incinerator plant at Locust Grove, it was disclosed yesterday by Supervisor Harry Tappen.

There are two more payments of \$11,000 each to be made in 1950 and 1951 upon the town hall and two \$5,000 payments on the incinerator.

The Town of Oyster Bay today enjoys a financial rating of A, a

fact which reflects savings for taxpayers of every special district of the township, the Supervisor explained. He cited the recent Massapequa Water District bond issue which was sold with a very low interest rate of 1.75 per cent because of the firm financial standing of the township.

The town, he continued, has \$1,100,000 invested in United States Bonds which bring a substantial return of 1.25 per cent. This year these bonds will earn for the town \$13,750.

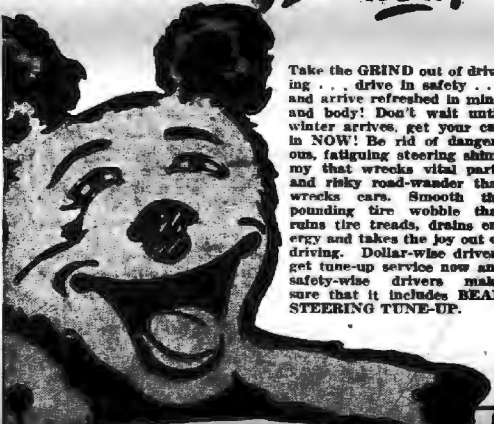

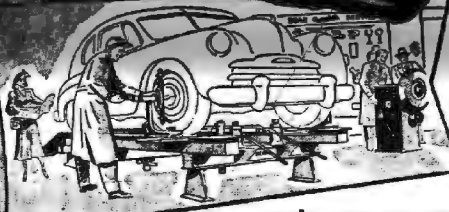

**HICKSVILLE**—Open house for parents and teachers of Nicholai St. School was held Thursday night at the school by the Parent-Teacher Assoc. The foyer was decorated with a display of flowers and vegetables made by Nicholai School 4H Club pupils. The parents visited the classes and were given an opportunity to meet their child's teacher and the classroom mother.

Mrs. Evelyn Corabie, president, conducted the short business meeting and welcomed the parents and teachers to the first meeting of the semester.

**Education at Home**  
 James Walters, principal, and members of the P-TA program committee presented the 1949-50 theme, "The Child's Emotional, Physical and Recreation Needs." "Education begins at home," he said. "Many habits and attitudes which become a part of us are formed in the pre-school years."

"The kindergarten accepts each child as he is and helps him to adjust to the school group. Kindergarten is one of the foundations in the child's development and education. Kindergarten teachers and the home confer as often as is necessary," he added.

Mr. Walters said that normal children are much alike in the way they develop, but that no two children are alike in the rate of development and growth.

"Some walk earlier than others, some talk earlier and more, some

get their first teeth early, some late," he explained. "This same rate of development holds true in school work. Parents and teachers need to know and understand this individual growth."

He asserted the child needs encouragement for he can't be made to grow, but the growth can be encouraged by good physical and emotional care.

"The child will grow in some measure whatever care is given him, but he may not become all he should unless he receives good care and encouragement," Mr. Walters pointed out.

The principal believes that each child needs opportunities to reach ahead to take the next step and the proper amount of stimulation at the right time. He cautioned parents about pushing the child ahead too soon, and expecting too much of him before he is ready as the child will become discouraged.

**Must Feel Interest**  
 "Each child needs to feel that the adults about him are interested in him and like him. He will grow best if his home and school provide the environment and warmth and acceptance in which he can feel he belongs and that he is liked and needed," Mr. Walters concluded.

Dr. E. H. LaBarron, superintendent of schools, spoke briefly on the physical needs of the child. He introduced Miss Eva Proper, school nurse temporarily replacing

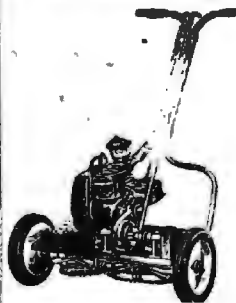

# You Should Vote Monday Night

THERE ARE 1,144 persons qualified, but if more than 800 vote on the Hicksville School District transportation questions next Monday night, Oct. 10, at the high school, we will be vastly surprised. Every person who is registered should get out and vote on this far reaching proposal. Because there has been some misunderstanding and confusion about the questions to be answered, the Board of Education has put out its own leaflet. As explained by Board President Henry C. Brengel, the leaflet was prepared "solely for the purpose of insuring that each voter will register an effective vote in accordance with his opinion and insuring that the result of the election will be a true expression of the collective will of the qualified voters of the district."

We hope that every qualified voter will be on hand when the meeting is called to order at 8 o'clock Monday night in the high school auditorium. Experience has shown, however, that many will dash in to vote and rush out again. Before the voting starts, anyone interested will have the opportunity of asking questions relative to the propositions. Then, before the voting starts, the time for closing the doors of the auditorium will be set. All present inside the building at that time will be permitted to cast their ballot.

The meeting on Monday is important because it marks an innovation for the district. In the past transportation of students within Hicksville school district has been limited to those living more than two miles from schools and to crippled children.

The present question has come up because there are now many younger students living a mile or so from the schools. Concern for the safety of these children, on route back and forth, has prompted parents to petition the board and request transportation.

The Charles Wagner American Legion Post has found merit in the proposal and is on record in favor of such transportation.

There are two distinct questions. One takes care of elementary school students and the other, high school students. Each question is separate and distinct. In the case of elementary pupils it is worth noting that approval of such service will probably include Parochial as well as Public School students.

The Board, after several special meetings and full study of the question, has estimated that

\$40,000 will cover the cost on each question. That amount is based upon transportation for a full term and must be regarded as a maximum estimate. Only receipt of competitive bids will fix the actual cost of the service, and it might be expected that the final cost could be somewhat under \$40,000 in each case. There can be no guarantee of this, however.

The practical application of the service, if either proposition is given majority approval, will be at the discretion of the Board of Education. It will be the Board's responsibility to fix actual bus stop points, establish schedules, etc.

The reader may infer from the foregoing that the Herald believes in the need for transportation facilities within the district. The qualified voters will make known their opinion on Monday night.

## This You WANT to See

FRANKLY WE HAD been rather lukewarm about the Nassau County Golden Anniversary Industrial Exposition at Roosevelt Field, which opens this Saturday. Tuesday, Oct. 11, is Industry Day and Nassau Government Day on Wednesday, Columbus Day, concludes the Exposition.

## Looking Back Two Years

LAST SATURDAY was the second anniversary of the day when the Levitt development at Island Trees first began to house veterans and their families. Three hundred families arrived in the first group. By the end of this year it is expected there will be 10,000 occupied dwellings.

Looking back only a little further to November, 1944, we find published material we wrote: "Abraham Levitt of Levitt & Sons declared in a newspaper interview, 'We own vast tracts of land for six or seven hundred dwellings on ample plots of land.' The Island Trees development, he pointed out, will be a complete community with business and recreational facilities."

By this time next year we expect to find several hundred Levitt houses in Hicksville proper. The best estimate from an authoritative source this week puts Levitt plans at 3600 dwellings in Hicksville school district.

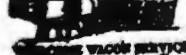
