Approve Elementary School Bus

Younger Students To Ride

HICKSVILLE—Transportation of elementary school students—public and parochial—living within the school district, was approved Monday night as 307 voted yes and 228 voted no. There were 536 votes cast between 8:30 p. m. and 12 midnight. A parallel proposal to transport high school students was rejected with 198 voting yes and 296 no.

Henry C. Brengel, president of the school board, had no comment to make when the results were announced at 12:25 Tuesday morning, except to remark that the proposition had been carried.

Start Next Term?

How soon bus service will begin is a question which will be answered only after the school board has held a meeting and begun the process of following out the mandate given at the special meeting. However, unofficially it was being predicted today that service will probably not get started until after the first of the year—possibly coinciding with the new school term.

While the proposition approved authorizes expenditure of \$40,000 for transportation, it is not expected the cost for the balance of (continued on page 14)

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Press Wireless Requests Variance For Additional Poles and Antenna

OYSTER BAY—Press Wireless Inc., of Cantiague Road, Hicksville, has filed an application with the Zoning Appeals Board here for a variance to permit installation of additional antennas on both sides of Cantiague Road. The application will be reviewed at a public hearing here in Town Hall on Thursday night, Oct. 20, starting at 7:30 o'clock.

The radio transmitter station which beams tens of thousands of words daily to South America, Europe, Moscow, London and other world capitals, will soon be the scene of additional facilities for the training of US Air Force radiomen. The application for variance to permit the erection of necessary poles on its Hicksville acreage is supported and endorsed by Lt. Col. V. E. Morphy, USAF, Asst. Adj. Gen.

The present operations of Press Wireless, operating under a series of variances granted over a period of years, is currently under fire by some of its neighbors who petitioned the town board last May to shut down the station. Petitions now on file with the town board charge that the radio station is operating in "violation of town zoning regulations."

Registration Tomorrow and Friday Nights for Adult Education Classes

HICKSVILLE—Registration will take place tomorrow and Friday nights between 7 and 9 o'clock at the high school for the Adult Education Program being offered by the Board of Education. Elery Bean of W. Marie St. has been named educational director of the program.

Classes will get underway a week from Monday, during the week of October 24. Twenty-eight courses are being offered in the announcement of the program by the school board, and others will be organized if 12 or more persons register.

Take Non-Residents

The courses will not be limited to local school district residents. However, where the demand is great and facilities are limited, priority will go to district No. 17 residents. A fee of \$2 will be charged at registration in each course except Americanism.

Burns Ave School Site Value Set

HICKSVILLE—The school district has been awarded \$20,111.50 as the price for about 10 Acres on Burns Ave., the so-called "Albrecht Parcel," as the site for a proposed grade school. Purchase of the property at a cost not to exceed \$35,000 was authorized by the voters 11 months ago.

The School Board through its attorney, Charles Stoll, is making application for confirmation of the report of the Condemnation Commissioners. The owners have the right to appeal the final judgment.

"The Board will recall," Stoll reported, "that before condemnation proceedings were instituted, the demand was for not less than \$3,500 per acre, which, on the acreage in question would have made the price \$35,000."

There are 9.6643 acres in the parcel on the east side of Burns Ave. The School District appraisal submitted in the condemnation was \$12,566 and the owner's appraisal was \$32,033.

The district does not have the funds on hand for this purchase, but the expenditure has been authorized. At the same time as the Albrecht Parcel authorization, the voters approved purchase of 21.43 acres on Newbridge Road. The final price there was \$64,290, which was available in district funds. Title was taken to the Berggold property last February.

Bethpage Park Hearing Oct. 19

BETHPAGE—Creation of a park and parking district for this community, following the school district boundaries, will be the subject of a Town Board Public Hearing at the new firehouse on Broadway next Wednesday night.

The Town proposes to raise \$30,000 by taxation, one half of which would be contributed by the township, to provide Bethpage with public auto parking facilities.

The town board will also hold a hearing next Monday night at Syosset School upon formation of a district there.

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Town Buys 17½ Acres For Highway Garage

LOCUST GROVE—The Town of Oyster Bay has purchased 17½ acres of industrially-zoned property here adjoining the incinerator plant, it was disclosed yesterday by Supervisor Harry Tappan. The Town Board plans to put the property to immediate use as the site of a new garage to house the town highway department equipment and incinerator plant machinery and equipment.

The tract, which was purchased for \$21,760, has a frontage of 595 feet on Miller Road and a side frontage of 869 feet on a concrete road leading into the incinerator, according to Tappan. The tract was part of a nursery and was formerly owned by Martin Vilette and Leon Lenoir.

Drawing Plans
Plans for the construction of a new town highway garage to replace a temporary rented structure on Duffy Ave., Hicksville, are now being drawn, preparatory to a call for bids. The building will face Miller Road.

The Town Board has engaged the services of Henry W. Taylor, consulting engineer, to study the town's growing refuse disposal problems, the incinerator site with proposed additional buildings and report in full detail to the board.

Among the points to be covered by Taylor in his study are these:

Study present and prospective populations and their distribution in the township.

Determine the best future method of dispatching refuse to the town plant and other refuse disposal plants.

Study improved methods of handling materials into and out of the existing incinerator, looking toward "better sanitary and working conditions, more economical operation and improved efficiency."

Study present disposal methods for residue, the maintenance and operation of the residue pit and elimination of "certain conditions now existing therein."

"The first step in any municipal construction," Supervisor Tappan noted, "is to have prepared a comprehensive plan. Mr. Taylor is a recognized and highly regarded consultant in incineration problems." The study will cost \$2500.

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
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MEET THE LADIES:

The Sportlight

By HOWARD FINNEGAN

It came as a great surprise to us that one County daily reported 3,500 fans attended the Hicksville Field Club-Glen Cove AA game last Sunday.

It is probably viewed as of little importance by the reporter in question that he over-estimated the actual paid attendance by some 2,300.

It added a certain amount of color to his story and therein was perhaps of value to him.

However, here in Hicksville, where the number of persons in the stands has sometimes been regarded with more concern than the outcome of the games, it is a serious matter and merits discussion.

In the actual reporting of the game elsewhere in the Herald, you can find Sunday's attendance listed as 1,150. That figure wasn't arrived at quickly. None are. All are carefully considered before being allowed to be set in type.

One reason is a genuine desire to be as accurate as possible. Another is a desire to be fair to the officials of the Field Club who give their time and energy so that a football team in the community is possible.

The knowledge of how attendance figures can get out of hand is not unknown to us.

Just as sure as the Yankees are champions of the baseball world, when the Black and White tabulates its receipts and disbursements for the season next December, someone is going to look back and howl that over 3,000 fans were at the Glen Cove game. The more considerate will claim at least 2,000.

A simple lesson in arithmetic might be in order. At the most, the stands at the High School field cannot hold over 1,500 people. That is a high figure. And to be realized, every available inch would have to be occupied.

If you are really interested in attendance, some afternoon when you are waiting for the game to start, just count the top row of people and multiply by the number of rows deep. The result will surprise you.

As for those who stand along the sidelines, caution must be used, for they move with the ball and may be counted twice over.

The number of people in the stands is no personal concern of ours other than that we like to see the efforts of the players rewarded and supported as fully as possible.

However, we do feel that the lack of understanding in the attendance matter has, by and large, done more harm to Hicksville football than it has done good.



Glen Cove Wins 13-7, on Late Score

HICKSVILLE—An inspired Field Club eleven blunted the razor sharp offense of the Glen Cove AA for three periods and ten minutes here, Sunday, but one slashing 80-yard drive, five minutes before the end, cut away a 7-0 Hicksville lead and gained a thrilling 13-7 win for the Covers.

Victory in this violent battle secured the top rung of the VFW Conference race for the visitors and sent 1,150 fans home shaking their heads at the power Ziggy Nedwick's outfit can command whenever its position as the top team combine in Nassau is in jeopardy.

Fowler Makes Run
Aside from a third quarter 42-yard touchdown dash by the great George Fowler, which failed to tie the score because the placement attempt was fumbled, Hicksville's gallant and ever-pressing defense restrained the brilliant Cover backs and made fullback Tom Schaller's 13-yard second period TD run look good enough for victory.

But with the clock showing just five minutes remaining, Glen Cove launched one last drive and Hicksville, which had previously checked all surges with two pass interceptions, two recovered fumbles, two intercepted laterals and a furious goal line stand, was powerless to stop it.

Going wide to the left sideline, halfback Jim Fantry took a long lateral pass from Fowler and romped to the Hicksville 27 before he was knocked out of bounds. Two plays later Johnny Cekala stormed over left tackle to the 12 and Len Spellman then hit the right side for five yards, cut back towards the middle, and crashed into the end zone.

Fowler added the point from placement and that was the game.

For Hicksville, which last defeated Glen Cove 14-8 on the same grounds back in 1947, it was a sad story. The first half was much the better for the fighting Black and White, but the failure to get only one touchdown when it had the Covers dizzy cost the decision.

Hicksville lost out on the Glen Cove 19 in the first period, but went 61 yards in the second period to score. The passing of Ed Stetz—he completed to Bill Garbarino for 11 yards, Al Petry for 10, and Sid Rigby for 11—sparked the drive.

His toss to Rigby set the ball on the Glen Cove 13 from where Schaller skirted wide around the right end for the score. Sid Rigby went over standing for the extra point on a reverse play and the home team led 7-0.

Newcomer Richie Robertson passed twice to Al Petry after that and moved Hicksville to the Glen Cove 19, but with a first down at hand, a fooling lateral

was intercepted and the pressure was off the visitors.

skipped nicely around the left end for a 20-yard gain, but a Schaller pass was immediately intercepted.

Offense Stopped
In the second half the Hicksville attack lacked the cleverness and variation of the first. Injuries to Ed Stetz and Ben Ardito hurt the B&W considerably and their absence was noticeable. Failure to connect with a pass ruined the effectiveness of the attack.

The running load was placed on Robertson's shoulders and he carried 13 times for 26 yards in an exhausting effort.

After Glen Cove scored on Fowler's 42-yard gallop in the third stanza, Hicksville had a chance to score when Jack Campbell picked off a Spellman pass and returned it to the Cove 20, but Robertson was short 2 yards after three cracks and a pass failed.

The run that sent Glen Cove on its way to victory was not the only sensational play for Fantry. Early in the fourth period, on the identical play, he ran from his own 10 to the Hicksville 4 before the swift Robertson overtook him from behind and hauled him down.

Center Jack Campbell and end Tom Hennerty then threw Fowler for a 17 yard loss as he was attempting to pass. On fourth down Fowler attempted a field goal

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from the 28, but it was wide. The 7-6 Hicksville lead then stood a good chance of holding up until the last minute bids came along.

"We do not wish to stop the wheels of progress in our community, but neither do we want them over our little ones. Please help us keep our little ones safe from some dreadful accident," the Underhill Ave. families plead.

Worry for Children

"These are comparatively new houses on Underhill Ave and the majority of us have two or more children, some of these in the toddling infant stage. We are conscientious parents, aware of the many dangers associated with our children playing on the sidewalks. Therefore, we have rigidly enforced their staying out of the street. Yet we all feel one day a heedless youngster will wander out in front of one of these fast-moving, heavily loaded trucks, an occurrence necessitating a sudden stop. We also realize this cannot be done when these trucks are fully loaded or otherwise, due to their extreme weight.

"We are all new home owners," the petition continues. "Our purpose in locating here, to avoid the heavy traffic of the communities

we left. Albo to enjoy the quiet, peaceful surroundings we were coming into. However, we are easily disillusioned parents when as early as seven o'clock every morning, these noisy cement mixers start grinding through our streets, continually, back and forth until late in the evening. They wake our children napping in their carriages and their constant presence on the street has imbued our mothers with a constant nervousness and worry regarding the older children merely playing in front of their homes.

"Were there construction of any kind going on at either end of Underhill Ave. we could readily see the necessity for the use of the street by these trucks. But there is none of any kind going on."

Dora C. Hiller of 76 Underhill Ave. last week presented the petition to Councilman Frank Chumsky in behalf of her neighbors. The residents also claim that the transmix trucks also tear off tree limbs in their passage and knock away concrete siding and curbing at ends of the block.

Levitt Advance to Bring Problems

BY NOW MOST EVERYONE has heard that Levitt & Sons have mighty big plans involving Hicksville during 1950. What Levitt does in Hicksville is going to concern every individual in the community.

Yesterday the Oyster Bay Town Board held a public hearing upon an application for a business zone on the east side of Newbridge Road. We went to Oyster Bay last Friday to look at the Levitt plans for this tract and found that the site is just North of the Oyster Bay-Hempstead Township boundary and across the street from the Hicksville Water Works pumping station. The plan indicates a set-up duplicating the North Village Green in the original Levitt development at Island Trees.

The area involves 11,722 acres between the houses now built up to the town line (Flamingo Road) and Dwyer's. It runs east some 500 feet. It will consist of three curving roads, wide enough to provide parking. Three buildings, each 125 feet by 47 feet, are shown and also a swimming pool with a well and pump station.

AS FOR THE FUTURE, we understand that Levitt has acquired all the land bounded by the State Parkway Extension on the west, Old Country Road on the north and town line on the south. The east boundary is hazy, since the area embraces all the farm land on both sides of Newbridge Road.

Jerusalem Ave. and west side of South Broadway. It is a vast tract of land and the best estimate is that some 3500 houses will be built, most of them in Hicksville School, Fire, Water, Parking and other improvement districts.

We won't recognize our community by this time next year.

New vs Old Residents

THE HERALD notes with some concern the growing feeling between the so-called "old-timers" and "new-comers" in our community. This feeling was pretty evident at the school meeting in Hicksville, Monday night. While the voting was taking place we overheard some folks remark, as they left the school building, "those new comers are going to swamp this proposition tonight and we are going to have to take it"—that from a man who has lived in Hicksville most of his life; or "those oldtimers are trying to hold back the town, put it back where it was 300 years ago"—that from a six-month resident in a new home development.

Everyone is a newcomer at some point in his life. But how long he remains a "newcomer" depends upon the individual. We know people who have lived in Hicksville three or four years who regard themselves as "old timers." And we know some who have made their homes in Hicksville for 20 or 30 years who still regard themselves as "new-comers."

It really is a matter of personal opinion. Where a person lives determines nothing. There are people living in bland new home developments who just moved in from the other side of the same town—having practically been born in the community. There are some new residents who come from as "far away" as Freeport or Merrick or Bethpage.

What we are concerned about is this loose rejection of anything proposed by a newer resident and the general feeling of new residents that anyone who was here before them is "agin" improvements and progress.

This is a wonderful community—the best in the nation. The community is the people, and people are people everywhere. As humans we all have certain failings and weaknesses. What is needed is more tolerance on both sides— if there are sides. If you got here before the fellow down the street, be a little patient—listen to his story and try to give him a helping hand. If you just moved in, be a little patient—Rome wasn't built in a day.
