## May Enlarge Bethpage Parking Tax Area to Fire District Boundaries

**BETHPAGE**—Another public hearing of Oyster Bay Town Board will be held here "in three weeks" upon the proposed formation of a Park and Parking District embracing the fire rather than the school district, Supervisor

or Harry Tappen promised at the initial session held here last week. A district embracing the fire district area in Oyster Bay Township rather than the limited School District area was requested at the hearing.

### Commuters vs. Shoppers

Some doubt as to the need for public off-street parking facilities here was expressed at the hearing by a few of those who spoke. The majority appeared to feel there is a need for some parking to accommodate commuters and leave the business streets open to shoppers.

Scheduled for 7:30 the meeting did not get underway until 8 o'clock due to the slow arrival of residents interested. Six men were present as the Supervisor began the session but others drifted in to make a sizable audience by the time the meeting adjourned 40 minutes later.

Tappen explained that it is proposed to spend \$30,000 for local parking fields and field improvements one half to be contributed by the town. The balance of \$15,000 would be raised by local tax and paid off, as required by law, in two years. For the school dis-

## Lawyers Argue Defense Needs Before Board As Press Wireless Makes Plea

**OYSTER BAY**—Residents of Cantigue Rd. were out in force to object to further expansion of Press Wireless Inc. radio transmission facilities in Hicksville, Thursday night, and were nearly outnumbered by representatives of the communications organization. After hearing pros and cons for nearly two hours, the Zoning Appeals Board reserved decision.

Alfred G. Greany, secretary and general counsel of Press Wireless Inc., carried the bulk of the argument for the application. He took a half hour to present his case, citing national defense and the need of the Air Force for the extra facilities.

Anthony Foreman, attorney for Isaac Penner, challenged the national defense requirements, asserting the government has the right of condemnation and could "take over" if necessary. Since the application for use of the property is "contingent upon a

proper lease and monetary consideration," he charged it is strictly a commercial arrangement.

The radio concern, he asserted, is now "creeping out like an octopus with one non-conforming use upon another."

Greany answered that the Air Force chose not to use its power of condemnation.

Other residents cited interference with their radios, telephones and television from present transmission. An FCC report clearing PW of responsibility for TV interference was introduced. Rich-

# Move to Question Town Board About Airpark in Court

**JAMAICA**—The Hicksville Airpark through its attorney is attempting to bring the entire Oyster Bay Town Board into court next week for examination as "adverse parties," a preliminary to another round in the litigation concerning the flying field. A motion for an order directing the town officials to appear in court on Nov. 1 will be argued tomorrow (Thursday) in Queens County Courthouse, here.

Notice of the motion was served

Friday upon Theodore V. Summers of Syosset, town attorney. It seeks to compel Supervisor Harry Tappen, Summers, Town Clerk Leslie C. Disbrow, and the four Town Councilmen to appear in Nassau Supreme Court, Mineola, on Nov. 1 for examination before trial. Twenty-one matters are listed for questioning including the validity of the Town Zone Ordinance of 1929 and all amendments.

Disclosing the latest development in the legal controversy which has become more and more involved in the past couple of years, George V. Spohrer, Airpark owner, said he had been notified that the town is going ahead with its action in court to force demolition of the buildings and closing the airfield. This action was started last April and is now on the calendar for November trial. Spohrer has since filed a counterclaim against the township for damages amounting to \$400,000.

## Town, RR to Confer Plaza Parking

OYSTER BAY — A conference with Long Island Rail Road officials to speed improvement of Hicksville's Rail Road Plaza as a public parking field is being arranged by Town officials. It was disclosed this week by Supervisor Harry Tappen. Town improvement of the area for commuter and shopper parking was urged by the Citizen's Advisory Parking Committee last week.

"Dedication of this property to the town is underway and progressing as rapidly as possible," Councilman Frank Chlumsky stated yesterday. He said that David E. Smucker, LIRR general manager, wrote the town on Sept. 29

that the RR is willing to go thru with the plan.

The actual improvement of the field, including removal of trees and fixing the surfacing will be in charge against the Hicksville Park and Parking District. The plan is expected to double the capacity of the field.

It is expected that dedication would require that Arthur Ferro and David Steinert offices and the taxi office naturally remain where

they are. Tappen said he is also making a renewed appeal to the county to permit use of the John Street "Island" for commuter parking also.

Petitions containing more than 615 signatures of Hicksville shoppers were presented by the BMA at the parking hearing held last week, demanding that the town act without delay to provide additional off-street facilities.

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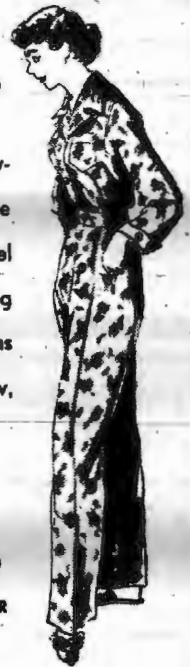
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## Bethpage Woman Leads Polio Campaign

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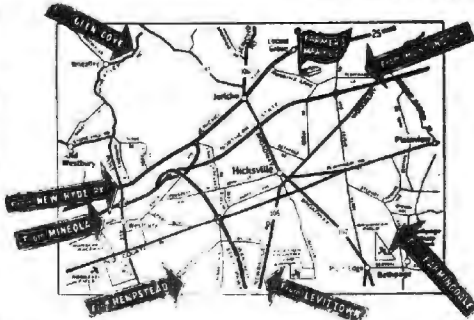
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# WSCS Assists Church Bldg. Fund

The new Hicksville Methodist Church now under construction on Old Country Rd. at Nelson Ave. was in no small way financially assisted by the efforts of the Women's Society for Christian Service, the mother group of the women's clubs in the church. It is a fine example of the material assistance a woman's club may render to its church affiliate. An equally fine example of the type of woman who directs such organizations is Mrs. Benson Daines, who has been president of the WSCS for the past two years.

Mrs. Daines has been active in the WSCS since it was organized eight years ago. The organization today serves in place of the Women's Foreign Missionary Society and the Ladies' Aid Society of former years. Directing the club activities is not new to Mrs. Daines, for she also served as president of the Wesley Circle of the church. The former Augusta Thormann, she was born in Springfield, Jamaica, L. I., but attended Hicksville schools. ### Enjoys Clubwork

Mrs. Daines believes that clubwork is one of the niceties of living in a small town. "I do enjoy the extra activities clubwork affords, besides the meetings, such as our bazaars, dinners and the like," she said. "I fully appreciate the cooperation and friendly spirit of the members in working together for the good of all," she said in discussing the hard working members of her various committees.

The WSCS has been working for several years toward the new church building fund. Mrs. John Leckie recently handed out dollar

bills to the ladies for the second consecutive year. They will devise means of increasing the single dollar bill and report on their efforts at the June birthday party.

Last year 34 single dollar bills from the WSCS treasury were distributed among the ladies and a total of \$290.70 was returned at the June birthday party. Some of the methods used to multiply the dollars included the sale of home made pies, candy, paper flowers, bread, teas and card parties were held and the ladies sold their knitted, crocheted and tatting work. One lady worked overtime at her job and gave the money to the fund. Each time she indulged in a luxury, another member gave the equivalent to the fund. Pictures of the new church were offered by one lady and others held pyrex dish sales and luncheons.

Some of the ladies just gave cash while others gave up their movie money, made Scotch shortbread for sale, collected blue premium stamps, and one did her mother's laundry. Mrs. Daines sharpened scissors and saws last

year, but this year plans to continue to sew dainty aprons and pot holders. She has already completed 100 this year.

For example: Did you know that (1) "The aim and object of Communism is always the same—complete control over the human mind and body, asleep and awake, in sickness and in health, from birth to death. That is why Communism marks religion Enemy No. 1, for religion in some form is always a basic influence in the life and thinking of people. (2) You cannot be a communist and believe in God. You cannot believe in God and have a pedecable life under communism. (3) In all their plans and actions, the Communists mark down religion as Enemy No. 1. Where they dominate they attack it head on. Where they do not dominate, they try to deceive and to corrupt from within just as they do in government, in education, in labor unions, and throughout a nation's life in general."

We all agree that Communism in America is becoming a very serious menace today and something none of us should just sit idly by and do nothing about. From time to time I will bring you other highlights on this subject.

Getting back to the lighter aspect of things, I would like to mention that from where I sit at meetings, I get a pretty good chance to look over the guys present, hear their jokes, stories, etc., and believe me, I'm convinced that Hollywood couldn't furnish a better cast for either a minstrel or some other show. 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# South Side Makes 40, Comets Bow

HICKSVILLE—Hicksville High's long smothering desire to snap South Side's phenomenal unbeaten streak was five minutes from reality here, Saturday, but the cyclone which couldn't be suppressed by 39 previous gridiron opponents, whipped up a 58-yard drive in the fading minutes and produced a 12-7 victory.

Jerry Schwartz hammered over from the Hicksville one to enable the Rockville Centre School to pass the self-admitted crisis in its five year unbeaten streak before 600 emotionally strained fans.

He had combined with Walt McKeon to move the ball the required 52 yards in exactly 12 running plays. His winning plunge bent the contesting Hicksville line on the third try.

Two minutes and 45 playing seconds later the Siders, battered but elated, trotted off the field for the 40th straight time without having suffered a defeat.

Hicksville Bid Strong  
The Orange and Black made a determined bid to upset the visitors and in the end hoped that a second period pass from Elias Stets to Pete Zeiher for a vital extra point would stand up for a 7-6 win.

The Stets to Zeiher pass came after George Cheslock had slammed over for the one to cap a 75-yard Hicksville touchdown drive. Cheslock did most of the ground gaining, but left-handed pass from Zeiher to Ray Guckenberger gained 21 yards and set the ball on the four.

Protecting a 6-0 lead South Side was charged with interference on fourth down and Hicksville was given four cracks from the one. Cheslock made it on the third.

South Side scored on a two yard plunge by McKeon after coming

After the interception the Red and Blue rolled to the Hicksville 17 before being held for downs. By then the fourth quarter was underway and after three unsuccessful tries at the line Hicksville punted to the winners 48.

From there, poised, and showing not the slightest hint of panic, South Side started its journey to victory. In it Hicksville had one great chance to hurl the challenge back, but with McKeon trapped on the O&B 30 five would-be Comet tacklers missed him and he ran for a first down on the five.

The schedule maker of the VFW Football Conference can be given little credit for imagination in arranging for the Hicksville Field Club and the Glen Cove A. A. to end their season's business together fully five weeks before the campaign comes to a halt.

It stands in bold letters that the Black and White must beat the Covers tonight or the remainder of the season will be very hollow indeed.

The reasoning by which it is possible for the championship to be all but decided so early in the season is incomprehensible. If it is decided, attendance will suffer all down the line as league teams play out the schedule.

It is the Hicksville-Glen Cove feud which has kept semi-pro football alive in Nassau, and it seems silly to pick the tomato before it is ripe.

Ed Coleman and his Rockville Centre gang almost upset the Glen Cove apperant Sunday, but George Fowler crawled away from the clutching Siders in the last minute and the 19-12 victory put Ziggy Nedwick's troupe in the position where it could nail down the title tonight.

There have been times in this season when the Field Club felt that a certain game had to be won or for all intents and purposes the season would be over.

Not before has this thought rung the bell of truth more clearly than it does now.

The knowledge that this is the last chance stand will sharpen Hicksville. Dom Sabatella has rigged his defenses brilliantly in the past for the Covers and has always had his club up for them. It won't be any different this time.

As they say in the trade, the Covers have been aching for a bruise, and if they can watch Jim Fantry for the full sixty minutes we think the Black and White gridders can inflict it this evening.

And because it will have to be big when it comes, we take Hicksville 28-13.

Consolidation of Hicksville softball in the hope of bringing about a better representation for the community has been announced by Bernie McGunnigle.

The manager of the Hicksville Loyals, who won the ASA Nassau County and Metropolitan championship as well as the Rockville Centre Night League back in 1948, has merged his club with the Botto Bros. Club.

Botto's won the 1949 Nassau County ASA championship and both teams were regarded as powers during the past campaign.

The new team will be sponsored by the Hicksville store and will retain the name of Botto Brothers.

McGunnigle will manage the club, which is expected to enter a major softball loop and put the mid-Island community into the big time.

The club has no towering ambitions, but if the talent available here in Hicksville is marshalled into one unit a healthy and respectable record could be achieved.

Only twice in its 25-year interscholastic gridiron history has Hicksville High lost by a 12-7 score.

Twenty-five years from now both will be remembered as particularly bitter defeats for the Orange and Black.

After absorbing six straight defeats by garnish scores back in 1939, Hicksville went to the home field of its ancient rival, Westbury, and with four minutes left in the contest led the powerful crew of Tom Fitzgerald by 7-6 score.

However, with fourth down and a foot to go on its own 35 the Orange and Black took the greatest gamble in its history and lost. A surprise pass intended to keep possession and hold on to the finish was picked off by Chip Cannon and he ran it to the Hicksville end zone for the winning T.D.

Last Saturday a Comet team which hadn't won a game in the Silver Anniversary campaign of its school, had a one point lead with which to beat a South Side team that had a streak of 39 defeatless games to protect, but fate turned her finger to a 7-12 score again and another historic Hicksville bid was denied.

The loss was a crushing blow to the Comets and they will find it hard to lift themselves for their clash with Westbury this Saturday.

The Green Wave has won three and lost only one. Westbury rates a good favorite over the Comets, but after three games against hardened opponents they could prevail.

Hicksville 14, Westbury 12

Manager E. I. Jessor of the Hicksville Field Club protested by telegram to VFW Football Conference Secretary John DeVanso late Sunday that his club was dissatisfied with the assignment of officials for tonight's (Wednesday) game at Glen Cove.

The officials in question were Robert Quinlan, referee; Walter McLaughlin, umpire; Talio Filardo, field judge, and Howard Westlake, head linesman. Jessor not only protests their assignment for the Glen Cove game but announced that his club was displeased with the manner in which the quartet handled the Field Club game with Hempstead on Oct. 23rd.

A county daily quoted Jessor Monday as saying that "There was some doubt that the Hicksville team would be on the field at game time Wednesday if the club's protest is not considered."

In previous years when the Glen Cove A. A.

was playing independent half the quartet officiated at many of the Cover home games. Field Club members and fans have long complained about the officiating in Glen Cove City Park Stadium.

For Quinlan, Filardo and Westlake the assignment was the third straight one which involved a Hicksville game. The trio had the Hicksville-Valley Stream game a week before the Hempstead battle which the Black and White won 13-6.

Westlake was one of the three officials who handled the South Side-Hicksville High game, Saturday.

At a meeting Monday night, the VFW Conference agreed to switch the umpiring assignment for tonight's game. The League acted favorably on the protest and Glen Cove agreed to the change of the umpire.

The Airpark was originally given permission to operate on 35 acres along Robbins Lane by the Zoning Appeals Board of the town. As neighboring property owners brought court action to cancel the variance, a second hearing was held and permission was again granted. The matter was taken through all the courts to the highest in the state, reversing the Appeals Board.

Subsequently the Town Board granted a zone change from residential to industrial and flying and commercial activities have continued there since.

Spoehner commented last night: "In spite of the more than 100 petitions in the hands of the town board, and resolutions of the Hicksville Business Men's Assoc. and Hicksville Civic Assoc. asking the town not to spend its funds upon further litigation to oust the airpark, the town persists in this court action to put me out."

Spoehner's attorney is Arthur L. Newman.

tract area this would amount to a 7 cent tax each year. Enlargement of the area to include the fire district which has a higher assessed value would spread the burden and reduce the rate. The fire district includes Millpage, part of Plainedge School District and some of the Miller-Homes.

George Seitz suggested the larger area. Henry Strauber proposed the use of the area in back of the new firehouse for shopper parking. Ray Werhane wanted to know if a survey of the need had been made and Robert Glasser said he made such study, stressing the need of eliminating commuters from the business area.

James Amendola felt there is no immediate need for parking field and commented that \$4000 an acre for land would be "high." Supervisor Tappen reminded him that the town can condemn property for such purposes.

Jack Strong said that a builder had told him he would build a \$75,000 store structure in the community "if we had parking fields." A strong plea for parking fields was also made by Paul Dana.

**Washington Selects Levittown**

**WASHINGTON**—A branch of the Hickville Post Office, known as "Levittown," has been established as of the first of October and so named after an "exhaustive investigation," it was disclosed this week by V. C. Burke, First Assistant Postmaster General.

"Any change in the name of this branch is considered to be inadvisable," Burke informed the Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc. this week. The Assoc. holds a regular meeting tomorrow (Thursday) night at Hicksville firehouse.

**Claims Majority View**

"Before the name was selected for this branch, an exhaustive investigation was made by the Department and it was disclosed that a majority of the patrons of this branch, preferred the name, Levittown and it was accordingly established under that name," Burke added.

The Hicksville Civics had sent the Post Office Department a resolution favoring the name of "Island Trees" rather than "Levittown." The Civics plea was made Sept. 23. It called attention to

the fact that the branch office on Hempstead Tpk., which is not as yet open for business, will serve "a greater area than the limits of the Levitt development including Miller Homes. The people of the area have expressed their desire to see the historic name of Island Trees preserved and have named their Civic Association, "Island Trees."

Included with the plea was a copy of the latest Esso road map which marks the area as "Island Trees" and shows no location as

Levittown. Meanwhile, Congressman W. Kingsland Macy notified the Hicksville Civics that "the Department has reversed the decision on this station (name) once, already, after Inspectors had, presumably canvassed the majority of the residents in the area to be served."

The Hicksville group wrote Macy that the name Island Trees seems more appropriate for the branch office since it is most descriptive of the area in question

**Town Plans Modern Bathing Pavilions For Tobay and North Shore Beaches**

**OYSTER BAY**—The Town Board plans to receive bids next month upon the construction of a modern pavilion for Tobay on the Atlantic Ocean, it was disclosed yesterday by Supervisor Harry Tappen.

Philip L. Goodwin, Syosset resident, is architect for the building which will multiply the enjoyment of the town's oceanfront bathing beach, east of Jones Beach State Park, for the township's 60,000 residents. A similar structure for the North Shore is being planned by the Town Fathers with a tentative location midway between Oak Neck and Stehli Beaches on the Long Island Sound at Bayville.

The Tobay Pavilion will be built on high ground near the State Parkway and directly on the line with the underpass which connects with a 1,000 car parking field, Tappen explained. Walks will be provided from the underpass to the pavilion and around the building to the public toilets and to the beach.

The central portion of the building will be of brick construction. The structure will provide 288 lockers for men and 288 lockers for women. In the central block will be located a refreshment stand and facilities for rental of umbrellas, chairs and bathing suits.

Provision is made for future expansion, Tappen stated, looking ahead five or 10 years, to provide additional lockers.
