

OYSTER BAY - The Fown Board plans to receive bids next month upon the construction of a modern pavilion for Tobay on the Atlantic Ocean, it was disclosed yesterday by Supervisor Harry

Philip L. Goodwin, Syosset resi dent, is architect for the building which will multiply the enjoyment of the town's oceanfront bathing beach, east of Jones Beach State Park, for the township's 60,000 residents.
