6th Graders Half Mile from Schools To Ride Next Term, Board Decides

HICKSVILLE—Tentative specifications for bus contracts in the school district to transport public and parochial pupils from the kindergarten through the sixth grade are being prepared today. The Board of Education last Wednesday night decided on the K-6 group transportation and also fixed the nearest bus stop at not less than a half mile from school.

Would Carry 714

According to statistics prepared by Superintendent E. H. Lennon, there are 714 students in the K-6 group who live a half mile

or more from their school. East St. has 139, Nicholai 250 and St. Ignatius 325. There are 444 pupils living three-fourths of a mile or more from school and 248 living a mile or more.

Upon instruction of the Board, LeBarron is meeting this week with three different bus operators to prepare specifications in general. These will be subject to Board review before advertising for bids starts. It was indicated at the meeting that bus service may not start until the second-half year term.

The decision upon transportation of K-6 pupils was carried unanimously upon motion by Lawrence Eisenhauser, seconded by Lawrence McCaffrey. After some discussion about the nearest pick-up point, the half mile decision was made upon motion by McCaffrey, seconded by Edna Sutton. President Henry Brengel voted in the affirmative while Eisenhauser, who wanted the radius set at three-quarters of a mile, voted no. Dr. Charles Masek did not vote on the distance question.

Behrman Heads Branch Post Office; Washington Gets Bids For Lease

HICKSVILLE—Changes in the personnel of the Post Office became effective this week as the Levittown Branch was officially opened on Hempstead Tpke., Monday morning. For the present the office will be limited to use by carriers and for parcel delivery.

William E. Behrman, who was one of the first three mail carriers of the office when service began in 1926, has become superintendent of the new branch office. He was formerly Assistant Postmaster here.

Lawrence A. Small has been named Assistant Postmaster to fill the vacancy caused by the transfer of Behrman. William Stachley continues to hold the position of superintendent of mails.

Postmaster Gets Bids

Postmaster William G. Mollitor speaking at the Civic and Community Assoc. meeting in the firehouse, Thursday night, revealed

that the various bids for new Hicksville post office quarters have been forwarded to Washington for action. He said he has no idea where the office will be located, but added "we'll have a nice building when we get it." It will contain 4500 square feet of floor space, although he had asked for 10,000 feet.

During the past two years the number of postal employees here has increased from 18 to 73. Forty have now been moved out to the Levittown Branch.

Among those vitally concerned with the speedy removal of the Hicksville Post Office to new quarters is the Long Island National Bank.

The bank is arranging to expand its facilities to handle its increased volume of business, according to a statement made by Cashier William E. Kautensky to the Herald this week. "We will

have additional space adjacent to the bank as soon as the Post Office vacates the premises," he said. "We trust our patrons will be patient, as we are very anxious to (continued on page 16)

Set New Bethpage Parking Hearing

BETHPAGE—Oyster Bay Town Board will hold a second public hearing at the firehouse auditorium here on creation of a parking district and expenditure of \$30,000 for public parking facilities. The new hearing is set for Thursday night, Nov. 17, at 8 o'clock, according to Supervisor Harry Tappen.

Following the suggestion made at a previous local hearing, the town board is proposing a district embracing the entire fire district excluding the area in the Town of Hempstead. One half of the cost would be contributed by the town from its invested surplus. The larger area extends south to Hempstead Tpke. and beyond.

311 Adults Taking Evening Courses

HICKSVILLE—There are now 311 students enrolled in the Adult Education Program of the school district sponsored by the Board of Education, according to Elery H. Bean, director. Twenty-two classes are being held in 19 sub-

HICKSVILLE—The Free Public Library must vacate one of the two classrooms it occupies in Nicholai St. School by Jan. 1, the Board of Education decided this week. With student enrollment increasing steadily—day by day, in fact, it was reported—another room in the building is needed almost at once for an additional 5th grade.

The School Board has voted to write the Library Trustees and ask them for a reply as to their removal plans by Dec. 15 so the Board can prepare it for the next term. If no answer is received by Dec. 15, the School Board is prepared to make its own selection of the two rooms. At the meeting last Wednesday, the Board authorized the purchase of 30 desks for a new classroom in Nicholai.

At the beginning of the current term, the Library Board was advised that the space it now occupies would be needed for classes to meet increased enrollments. There are now 391 pupils registered in Nicholai, 41 in the 5th grade.

The rally Friday night will climax the election campaign in the township. Congressman Leonard W. Hall, town Republican leader, will also be present.

Enrollment Gains

While the Democrats have made the feeblest stab at running for township office in a decade, GOP leaders are directing all efforts at insuring a representative vote. Committeemen in the 37 town election districts, including a new one in Syosset, are spurred on by increased enrollments to get out the vote. There are 34,297 persons registered for this election in the Township compared with 32,080 in 1947 and 32,435 in 1946.

The local ballot gives the voter 22 positions to fill. There are eight proposed State Amendments. Probably the most controversial is No. 5 relating to civil service appointment of veterans. It is opposed by ex-service organizations.

Voter qualifications, besides citizenship and 21 years of age, include state residence one year, county residence 4 months and election district 90 days preceding next Tuesday.

School Building Costs Multiple

HICKSVILLE School construction costs today are three or four times above the 1936 level it was reported (this week by school board members who attended the convention of State School Boards of Education in Syracuse last week. 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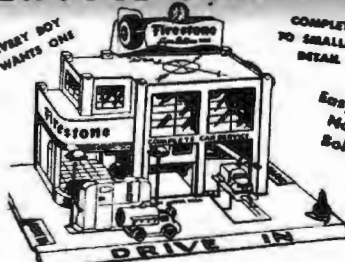
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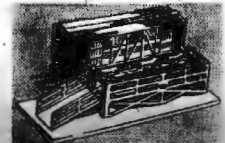

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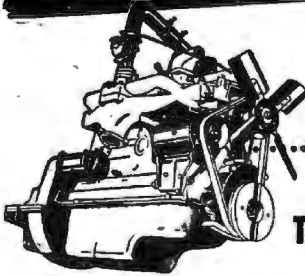

Hicksville fans will remember the fine halftime show Freeport put on here in Hicksville three years ago when it gave the delightful interpretation of "I'm Forever Blowing Bubbles" and "The Bells of St. Mary's."

All in all the program should afford a number of highlights as well as assist a deserving cause.

Since our predictions of late have been as sour as a crate of lemons, we might just as well go right on filling the lemonade pitcher by taking the North Shore in VFW production by a 14-7 score. Broken down, we take Glen Cove over Hempstead 14-0, Rockville Centre over Hicksville 7-0, and tab Valley Stream and Mineola for a 0-0 draw.

The Conference test between Rockville Centre and Hicksville, which was rained out Sunday, is expected to be re-scheduled for Thanksgiving Day. And present indications are that the site will be switched from Allen Field to the local high school gridiron.

We are not in accord with the postponing of semi-pro football games since it is a breach of faith with even the few fans who wanted to turn out regardless of the rain, but from the Hicksville standpoint it was a welcome rest.

Still licking the wounds of a 25-0 defeat at the hands of Glen Cove, the Black and White wasn't in the mood for another bruising game right off the bat. With the passing of time those who weren't interested Sunday will work themselves into a proper frame of mind again.

Howie Baumann has his boys rolling and it is best that a clash with them was put off until another day.

Hicksville High fell 15 yards short of tying and possibly beating its arch rival, Westbury, Saturday.

This weak Farmingdale, which takes no greater pleasure than to beat Hicksville in any game, comes to Comets' home field and the Orange and Black losing streak has a good chance of reaching five before it is broken seven days hence at the expense of a weak Garden City squad.

The Dalers aren't having a good season, but a win over Hicksville could make it so. They have put up some good scraps against superior foes and will fight all the more in this traditional struggle.

If Hicksville can snap out of its present attitude, the O&B would have little trouble in rolling to a three touchdown victory. The Comets are consoling themselves with the idea that the breaks aren't coming their way.

It is undeniable that things haven't gone too well for them, but they seem to forget that the team that makes the breaks gets them.

The Decision Tuesday Is Simple
