Construction of Million-Dollar Bethpage School to Take Year

BETHPAGE—The new million dollar school for this community is expected to be completed about January, 1951. Ground breaking ceremonies for the structure took place on Saturday afternoon be-

fore a small group of residents and local officials.

Contracts for the new building which total \$1,084,534, have been signed and work begun. The contracts are: Joseph Bisceglia of Harrison, general construction, \$833,788; Johnson Heating Co., of New York, heating and ventilation, \$124,575; C. F. Mentzinger's Sons, Inc., of Elmhurst, plumbing, \$54,748; and Meeker Electric Co. of Hempstead, electrical, \$71,423.

Howard T. Hogan, school district attorney, was master of ceremonies at the ground breaking. Frederick Kramer, board president, was the principal speaker and posed with a steam shovel for the photographers.

Declaring the project, "one of the greatest things ever accomplished in our community," Hogan said that credit should go "to you who have supported and encouraged the board to bring to Bethpage one of the best schools in the county, one which is desperately needed for this growing community."

School Board members, clergy, commissioners and organization leaders were introduced. Pastor Strength gave the invocation.

He is a member of St. Ignatius Holy Name Society and a church usher. He is also program chairman and a former director of the Hicksville Civic and Community Assoc.

A commissioner for a five-year term will be elected on Dec. 6 at the firehouse. Braun, chairman of the fire board, is completing his third year as a commissioner, having been elected to fill out an unexpired term.

Drive-In Theatre Obtains Variance

OYSTER BAY — A drive-in theatre and refreshment center in Bethpage was approved by the meeting Thursday night in the Zoning Board of Appeals at a Justice Courtroom. The drive-in theatre will be built by M. Levin and S. Lerner of 255-43 75th Ave., Floral Park. It will be located on the south side of Hempstead Turnpike about 1,600 feet east of Stewart Ave., Bethpage.

The Zoning Board of Appeals also approved a request made by Metz Homes, Inc., of Bethpage for a variance to conduct a retail lumber yard in connection with the present storage and wood-working shop on Stewart Ave.

Barn Dance Saturday At Masonic Temple

PLAINVIEW—A film on the free activities available at the N. Y. State Agriculture School in Farmingdale will be shown at a meeting of the Plainview Civic Assoc. this Tuesday night, Nov. 15, at the Manetto Hill School.

HICKSVILLE—The Library Trustees are prepared to accept the offer of the Duerk House on Jerusalem Ave. at Second Street for \$35,000, provided the qualified voters of the district give their approval at a referendum to be called before the end of December.

The decision was made by the trustees at a special meeting, Monday night, as a direct result of the eviction notice served upon the library by the Board of Education setting a deadline of Jan. 1st. As was reported exclusively in the Herald last week, School Board urgently needs the space occupied by the Library in Nicholas School for classrooms to take care of increased pupil enrollment.

The home of Mrs. Franklin L. Duerk on the east side of Jerusalem Ave. is a large brick structure. It was originally offered by the owner for \$42,000 and has since, through meetings with the Library Board, been brought down. The \$35,000 figure was the last offer. Meanwhile, the Board during the past six months or more has looked diligently at other dwellings and building available and has apparently decided the Duerk house best fits its needs.

Joseph Heim, president of the Library Board, said this week a letter has gone to Mrs. Duerk stating the Board is willing to accept her offer if the voters approve. A petition will have to be made to the School Board to call a special district meeting for a vote on the proposal, plus the estimated cost of moving and maintenance. The Library Trustees hope the meeting can be called "at the earliest possible date."

Plainview To Discuss Merger

PLAINVIEW—Discussion, not voting, upon merger of Plainview School District with Hicksville and purchase of new school sites will be the topics at a special meeting of the Plainview District set for Friday night, Nov. 18, at 8:30 in Manetto Hill School.

The announcement was made this week by District Clerk Charles Voorhies for the school board. The meeting is being called "pursuant to motion on records of School District 19." At the annual meeting in May it was moved that a special meeting be called for the purpose of discussing fully merger of Plainview and Hicksville Districts and/or obtain local sites for additional school facilities.

Just as the meeting date was set, the first families began to move into Plainview Country Homes, one of the large scale house developments in the west end of the school district.

Water Position Remains Vacant

HICKSVILLE—Selection of a commissioner of the water district to fill the vacancy on the three-man board caused by the death last week of Laurence W. Bevan is up to the other two commissioners, it was learned yesterday. Chairman Harry Borley said no decision has been made as yet. Charles E. Colthurst is the other member.

It is understood that if the Board does not appoint a member to fill out the unexpired term within 30 days then the Town Board will designate a commissioner.

Half Hour Buses Run To Hempstead

HEMPSTEAD—Regular half-hourly bus service between Hicksville and this community was started at 6 o'clock Monday morning by the Hempstead Bus Corp., according to Harry Bickmeyer, company official.

The new line runs back and forth along Newbridge Rd. from Hicksville Rail Road station, tying in with other Hempstead bus lines at the Hempstead Turnpike. The Public Service Commission has given approval for the route on a trial basis until next April 30.

Daily service will be half-hourly between 6 o'clock in the morning and 12 midnight. Sunday and holiday service is hourly, between 7 a. m. and 12 midnight.

Fare for the run from Hicksville to Hempstead Turnpike will be 10 cents, from Hicksville to Hempstead 25 cents one way and 50 cents round trip.

The Hempstead bus will make a loop in Hicksville, along West Marie St., Broadway, Herzog Place and out again on Newbridge. A tentative stop has been designated at the northwest corner of Newbridge and Jerusalem Ave. (at Sutter Monument works). Meadowbrook Hospital is a stop on the new run.

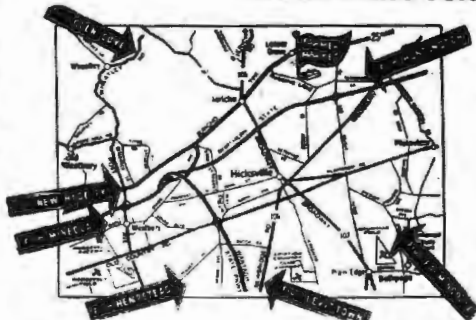
What-Not Shop Is Now Open

2 New Business Zones Sought in Hicksville

OYSTER BAY — Public hearings upon two new Hicksville zone change applications from residential to business zone will take place next Tuesday morning at the Town Hall starting at 10 o'clock. The town board recently granted two other business zone section applications in Hicksville area.

A hearing upon the plea of Charles and Joseph Klein for establishment of a business district along the west side of Jerusalem

Avenue extending nearly a half mile south of 10th St., was started last week and adjourned until next Tuesday.

May-Build Theatre

At the first session on the Klein request it was brought out that no definite plans for construction of stores or businesses on this former farm land have been drawn, although it was suggested that a moving picture might be among the structures planned. It is reported that Levitt and Sons, who plan to build several hundred houses immediately south and west of the area in question, plan to oppose the application.

Also scheduled for next Tuesday morning is a hearing on the business zone requested by John A. and Anna M. Lebkuecher for the north side of Old Country Rd. This is a tract of 1.855 acres with a frontage of 382 feet on Old Country Rd. It is across the street from the section where a business zone for Norbrook Homes was asked and rejected.

North Bethpage Change

Now officially changed to business zones is the property at the corner of South Oyster Bay Rd. and Stewart Ave. in North Bethpage. This application was made more than six months ago and action was delayed pending the construction of more homes in the area by the Ritel Realty Co., Inc.

The town board has also granted the application for a business zone on the east side of Newbridge Rd. just north of the township boundary line, in Hicksville, requested by Levitt and Sons under the name of County Community Corp. It covers 11 acres.

Capt. D. Samuelson of the Salvation Army was guest speaker at the meeting in the Rainbow last Wednesday night. He traced the growth of the Army since 1865. Organized in England, it came to New York about 70 years ago. During the past score of years it has branched out into suburban areas.

The Army has 27,000 full-time officers, 5,000 of whom are in this country. It has three million members.

Home Bureau Work Interesting

The Hicksville Branch of Home Bureau, with its elaborate courses in homemaking continues its 28-year policy of instructive and productive sessions now under the chairmanship of Mrs. Theodore Schwarting. When planning the month's program, Mrs. Schwarting and her committee schedule so many interesting courses with competent instructors that about 35 of the approximate 65 branch membership attended each of the weekly sessions.

As an extension service of Cornell University, Home Bureau offers classes in the latest developments on home making methods as devised by the University's home economic department. Many of the lessons, from the revision of old handicrafts to the newest method of upholstering a chair are conducted by instructors from Cornell. Other classes are directed by members who have been trained at County Home Bureau headquarters in Mineola.

Leader for 3 Years

Mrs. Schwarting became active in Home Bureau work about 10 years ago and has served as its leader for the past three years. Formerly of Elmhurst, she is the mother of two grown children. She and her husband have been residents of Hicksville for 22 years and make their home at 16 Flower Street. She attends the local Trinity Lutheran Church and is an active member of the Fire Department Ladies' Auxiliary and the local Eastern Star chapter.

As chairman of the Hicksville Branch, Mrs. Schwarting is responsible for the hard working yet socially pleasant Home Bureau meetings that have attracted members not only from this community but also from Farmingdale, Oyster Bay, Syosset and Westbury. Aside from her duties of conducting the business activities of the branch, Mrs. Schwarting

teaches some of the classes such as the woolen dress class which she will start this month. She has also taught rayon dresses, plaid dresses and leather gloves with hand stitching.

Some of the lessons involve special skills such as the upholstering class, which will be taught this winter by Mrs. E. Irving Jesser—braided rugs, hooked rugs and refinishing of furniture. Other Home Bureau projects include plastic handbags, shell jewelry, silver bracelets, chair caning, rush bottom chairs, block printing, weaving, stenciling, dresses, millinery, slip covers, making hassocks from coffee tins, foot stools, re-covering of lamp shades and many other relative to better home making.

About four times a year the ladies have a lesson in bread and roll making with Mrs. Edward Korbman, food leader, as the instructor. Last year luncheons for the overweight, the underweight and the normal person were included in the program. The food session this year will be a tea to

be held on Nov. 29 with instructions on how to serve tea and prepare fancy sandwiches and cookies.

Citizenship Program

A citizenship committee headed by Mrs. Charles Baumgardner keeps the members informed on the current civic matters. She reminds them of forthcoming elections in the community and township and reviews the list of candidates in elections.

Mrs. Clinton Wilbur, home management leader, plans classes on easier ways of doing housework. Her classes last year included the cleaning of carpets in which the ladies made their own cleaning fluid, care of oak floors and the selection of carpets and rugs for their quality and durability.

"All the little exchanges of ideas through the Home Bureau meetings makes a world of difference in taking care of your home," Mrs. Wilbur said.

Achievements Day is usually held some time in May, at which time the public is invited to view an amazing assortment of handwork and crafts that have been completed during the year. The ladies also take time out from their projects for social affairs such as the boat ride up the Hudson River last summer and a day at Belmont Park.

Organized in 1921

The local branch of Home Bureau was organized on Jan. 7, 1921, when a small group of women met at the home of Mrs. F. N. Tallafiero to pool their talents, ideas and friendship. Mrs. Tallafiero was elected the first chairman, Mrs. Summers was the secretary and Mrs. William Kielmann was the treasurer.

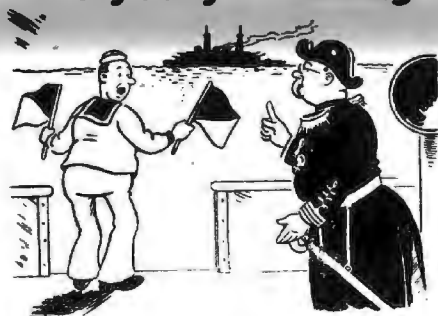

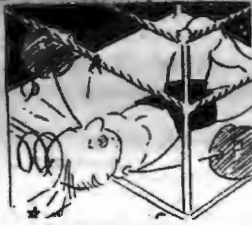

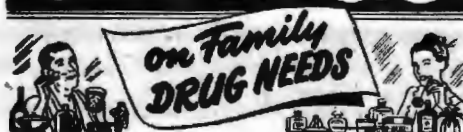

HICKSVILLE—Right halfback Peter Zeiber intercepted a pass thrown by Farmingdale's Al Giordano in the opening seconds of the final period here, Saturday, and streaked down the sideline 48 yards for a touchdown that salvaged a 7-7 tie for Hicksville in its luckless 1949 gridiron campaign.

Thus by the sudden bolt which sent Zeiber scampering, and two big assists later in the game, did the Orange and Black spall the plans of the Dalers for a triumph over their traditional rivals.

Without a victory in four previous starts, Hicksville was at least contented at the end of the wide open game, but for the Dalers, who have been kicked around right handily in this 16-year series, it was a bitter finish.

The first tie in the series was not enough for the Dalers, who were out to whip Hicksville for ruining their unbeaten, untied and unscored upon record late last season, as well as the 11 defeats they have already suffered at the hands of the Orange.

In the end it was their own great effort and the speed of the clock which held them short of their goal.

Dalers Score, Seconds Left.

Farmingdale scored late in the first half, when Giordano passed 31 yards to Ronnie Hoffman in the Hicksville end zone. After the passing Daler quarterback booted the extra point, there was only time for the kickoff.

The Daler score came as unexpectedly as Hicksville's.

Late in the second period Paul Dana intercepted a pass from Dick Scott on the Hicksville 36. In five plays Giordano engineered the visitors to the one, but guard Matthew Tringali recovered a fumble to check the advance. Hicksville plunged three times, and on fourth down Zeiber, who kicked splendidly all afternoon, punted to the Daler 46.

After the runback to the local 46, the Comets were penalized for roughing. That placed the ball on the 31 and Giordano let loose his scoring pass from there.

Hicksville had only one threat in the first half and that was set up by a Zeiber punt which rolled dead on the Daler two. The visitors kicked out to the 33 and Elias Stetz immediately passed to Zeiber, who ran 16 yards to the 49. There, however, Stetz looked for yardage in two plays attempting to pass, and the chance was wasted.

Elias Stetz Stars

In the second half, Stetz did some fancy stepping and did well in the running role forced on him with the departure from school of George Cheslock. Along with the accurate passing he did, he easily ranked as the outstanding player for the Orange.

He took the second half kickoff on his own 5 and raced it back to the Hicksville 46. From there he sparked the Comets on their only sustained drive of the day.

Two of his passes were taken by Ted Schwarting for a gain of 14 yards, and after Dick Scott gained 5 yards Stetz tore over right tackle for a 13-yard gain. Three plunges picked up 7 yards and on fourth down Stetz although nailed by three tacklers, sped Schwarting again, and threw to him for a 6 yard gain.

Bill Ellinger returned the punt from the 20 to the 43 and in 11 plays the Dalers drove to Hicksville 3. Time ran out at that point and the 400-odd fans were left to collect their shattered nerves.

In Our Opinion:

Let's Get a Big Enough Post Office

POSTMASTER MOLLITOR, speaking at the Hicksville Civic meeting last week, said bids for new post office rental proposals are now in Washington. The bids are based upon 4000 square feet of floor space, although he feels 10,000 feet would be more logical.

We can agree with the Postmaster that 4000 square feet may prove woefully inadequate, if not right away, then in the immediate future. We understand that quarters are to be leased for five or possibly ten years. Certainly more than 4000 feet will be needed before such a lease runs out.

We don't know the dimensions of the present inadequate space on Herzog Place, but it would appear to be about 3000 square feet, considering the fact that two stores are utilized. In addition, the old Kasten store at Newbridge Rd. and Marie St. is used exclusively for parcel post sorting and routing and that floor area must be added to the available working space.

Reading our contemporaries during the week, we find Manhattan has started operations in a new building with 10,500 square feet and that Baldwin has a new building under construction with 5,000 square feet.

Washington has been rather slow to appreciate what is happening on Long Island, particularly in the mid-island area, regarding increased population. We sincerely hope those entrusted with the

decision as to Hicksville's office for the next five or ten years will give us a big enough building.

Lee Ave Had Other Names

LEE AVENUE in Hicksville during the past year has become a major community street with hundreds of dwellings along its path. It was not always so and it wasn't always known as Lee Avenue.

A lot and block map, dated 1935, in the Oyster Bay Town Highway Department office shows Lee Avenue, but also gives in parenthesis the name of Bowery Lane. Not shown is another name for Lee Avenue, recognized by oldtimers and amusing to newer residents—Jacks Lane.

The origin of any of the three titles is probably forgotten.
