

District Superintendent Charges: Feverish New Construction Projects Fail to Solve High School Problem

RR Crossings Throttling Community Development

HICKSVILLE—Rail Road grade crossings are throttling the economic growth of Hicksville forcing shoppers to go out of the community, multiplying traffic congestion and hampering fire fighters on emergency calls, it was found this week.

Morning commuters are endangering their lives by crawling under long passenger trains which block crossings. Fire fighting apparatus has been delayed precious minutes waiting for gates to rise. Some north-south motorists are actually detouring around Hicksville to avoid the long jam-ups as the result of closed crossings. These are among the facts marshalled by the Herald this week.

The situation in this community is particularly bad, it was found, because elimination of the Broadway and Jerusalem Ave., crossings could not be accomplished easily without including in the same plan the close-by Marie St., Nicholas St., Old Country Rd. and Woodbury Rd. crossings. All are close together, and any plan to raise or lower the tracks would require some distance for approaches and a change of grade, affecting the other crossings needed.

State Lacks Funds

The elimination of grade crossings here currently has the attention of the Civic and Community Assoc. which has been quietly corresponding with state authorities. Lawrence A. Roman, president, has discovered that Hicksville is in about 50th position on a State list of crossings to be eliminated. Lack of state appropriations for such work rather than LIRR responsibility is delaying the entire program.

Letters have been addressed to State Senator William S. Hults, Jr., of Port Washington and As-

Checks Going to 3,603; Clubs Total \$298,680

HICKSVILLE—Christmas Club checks totaling \$298,680 are being distributed to 3,603 members by the two local banks, it was learned yesterday. Amount of the checks shows an increase of \$57,245 over last year.

The Bank of Hicksville is issuing \$114,000 to 1,200 members, which is an increase over the \$95,000 and 1,000 members of last year. The Long Island National Bank of Hicksville is issuing \$184,680.50 to 2,403 members, an increase over the \$146,441.50 and 1,924 members in 1948.

MINEOLA—Several mid-Island school districts are now "feverishly constructing new buildings," equalling or exceeding constitutional debt limits, to house elementary children and still not solving the coming high school facility problem, according to John W. Chisholm, district school superintendent.

The need for high school facilities is going to become much more critical within the next few years, Chisholm informed the Herald, "with the peak coming at about the end of the oncoming decade (1960)."

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ELECTION ECHOES:

Town GOP Majority Increases to 72 Pct.

Republicans in the Town of Oyster Bay's 37 election districts increased their party majority last week to win honors as the banner GOP township in Nassau County.

While Hempstead Town's GOP majority slipped from 73.6 to 69 per cent and North Hempstead from 71 to 67.5 per cent, Oyster Bay gave Harry Tappen 72 per cent of the total vote this year as compared with a 1947 percentage of 70.5.

The increase was a personal achievement for Congressman Leonard W. Hall, town GOP leader, who praised the untiring efforts of the party workers in the election districts of the township. Countywide, J. Russel Sprague received 65.4 per cent of the total vote.

Restaurant Owner Falls Into Cesspool

HICKSVILLE—Daniel Allen of Burns Ave. was credited with saving the life of Carl Widmaier, Thursday, when the owner of Carl's Restaurant at 128 Bway fell into an uncovered cesspool in the rear of his restaurant.

Widmaier suffered cuts on his legs and arms, an ear injury and other hurts. The accident occurred while James Allen and his staff was cleaning out the cesspool and Widmaier failed to notice the cover had been removed.

Daniel Allen lowered a ladder and descended to help the victim, who had sunk below the surface with only an arm showing.

Hicksville, Bethpage and the rest of the mid-Island section was again well represented at Rothmann's East Norwich Inn on Election night to get the returns, far outnumbering the other areas of the township.

If Judge Joe Lebkuecher was a superstitious man he would have spent some sleepless nights prior to Election Day. As it was, he ran second highest on the township ticket, polling just three votes less than Harry Tappen who led the town slate as Supervisor.

In the county GOP leaflet of the candidates his name was spelled correctly under the picture but "Lebkuecher" in the text. In the next printing, after he called attention to the error, it was spelled "Lebkuecher" in both places. Then in the HERALD it somehow got fouled up and came out in print: "Lebkuecher." And to top it all off, he was a candidate for the No. 13 position on the ballot!

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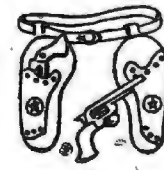

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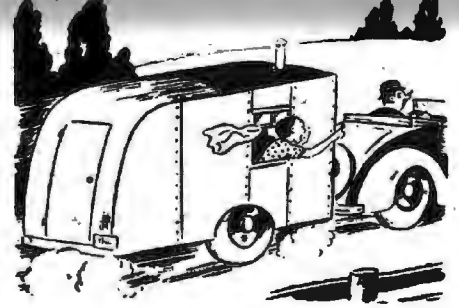

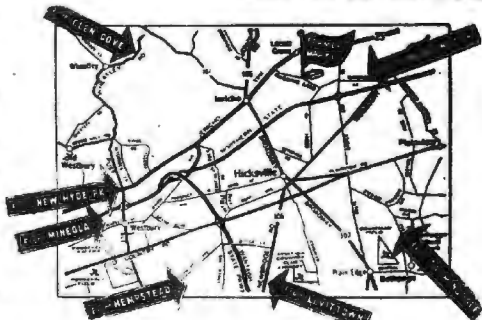

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The Sportlight

By HOWARD FINNEGAN

If you stop to figure the complexities of what happens and why in football you can quickly lose your way so at all times we try and follow a realistic course in our observations.

We extend a concession to the theory of inspirational achievement — but far from the number of times that it is advanced.

For the most part we lightly skip over all but the cold hard facts.

We believe in the code that if you play hard and correctly you will win and if you don't, you lose.

We follow that line of thinking but for one exception.

We cannot study the history of football relation between Great Neck and Hicksville High without yielding the point that some other element has been on hand when the Orange and Black has met the Orange and Blue.

Call it a jinx, fate or what you will, but it is something.

The past eight years have been the best in the gridiron history of H. H. S. and since Great Neck hasn't been around to play the perennial spoiler we cannot look with delight upon renewal of a series between the schools, interesting as it may prove to be.

When the Comets take the field Saturday they will be facing a school which has already won 14 of 16 decisions over the locals. Ten times Hicksville was shutout. The Neckers hold an offensive total of 278 points to the local school's 85. In the late twenties Great Neck rally wrecked havoc upon Hicksville.

In 1927 it was a loss to Great Neck which ruined an unbeaten season for Hicksville. In 1928 the same story was repeated. And in '29 a 19-15 victory for Great Neck blocked Hicksville's third straight bid for an unbeaten season.

The Orange and Black was favored to dump the Neckers numerous times after that but it wasn't until 1936 — after eleven successive defeats — that the trick was finally turned.

The 1949 form chart calls for Hicksville to be a 21-point favorite on its home grounds, Saturday.

Since the Comets made our selection of them over Garden City look good we will take them 20-7 but the "jinx" makes us hesitate.

Comets Defeat Trojans For Fourth Year, 12-6

GARDEN CITY—The Comets of Hicksville alapped down the Trojans of Garden City for the fourth successive year here, Saturday, and scored their first victory of the 1949 season as diminutive Dick Scott paced them to a 12-6 triumph on the Hampton Street field.

Hicksville punched over two touchdowns in the second period to take a 4-0 lead in the series, with the school which long evaded football contact with it.

Scott, breaking fast and darting through the City secondary, was the principal figure in Hicksville's 60-yard march to its first score.

The Orange moved 60 yards in exactly seven running plays with Scott battering over from the three for a 6-0 lead.

66-Yard Run

Scott came right back later in the period to assure the Comets third victory on the loser's home grounds, when he broke loose for a 66-yard run to the Trojan one.

LINDEN, N. J.—Showing new-found power on the ground and through the air, Hicksville Field Club defeated Linden A. C. on the New Jersey team's home gridiron Sunday afternoon. The Black and White were victors by a three touchdown margin, 18-0, avenging an early season defeat at the hands of the Linden Club.

Coach Dommy Sabatella was able to field two complete offensive units for the first time this year, and the result was most encouraging to the local fans who made the bus excursion to the Garden State.

The backfield of Jerry Calandrillo at quarterback, Ben Ardito at wingback, Richie Robertson at fullback and Carl Holland at left half proved equally at home advancing on the ground or through the air.

George Karman, quarterback; Ed Stetz, fullback; Bill Garbarino, wingback, and Tom Schaller at left half, made up the other unit that looked to advantage on the attack.

Unorthodox Score

In fact, it was the Calandrillo-Ardito, Holland-Robertson quartette that started the fireworks in the second quarter, although the score came in an unorthodox manner. With Holland running for substantial gains and Robertson passing and running and with Ardito helping the cause with the best blocking of the season thus far, the Black and White had kept the ball well in Linden territory the greater part of the first and second periods.

With the ball in the New Jersey team's possession, the Linden offense ran a play around the right end. As the Maroon and Gray passed the line of scrimmage, Ben Ardito picked the ball out of his arm and dashed fifty-five yards for the score. Rich Robertson failed to convert on an attempted line plunge.

Hicksville continued its attack in the third quarter, with Robertson throwing several passes for substantial gains, and Sid Rigby dashing for several long gains on deep reverses. It was not until the final period, however, that the Black and White scored again.  School District when he stated, "Listen carefully to all discussion on this subject before taking sides. Listen to those people who have shown previous interest and have some educational background—your local school trustees, principals, district superintendents, representatives of the State Education Department. Pay less attention to half-cocked small time politicians or local sharpshooters who want to sound off."
 "This is sound advice," Chisholm continued; "however, it would appear that Mr. Strauber is not willing to set an example for others to follow. If I understand Mr. Strauber correctly, he is wholly ignorant of the meaning of the term or else he is trying to confuse the people of your community with the terms 'consolidation and centralization.' Consolidation is a term used where two school districts are joined together—centralizations is a term used where many school districts, usually more than six, are joined together. In either case, whether it is consolidation or centralization, it should only be brought about by a majority vote of the people of the school district affected. There is no additional state aid for a consolidation; there is for centralization."
 "Mr. Strauber, along with some

others, tried to force me, as district superintendent of schools, to consolidate the Bethpage and Island Trees School Districts without first having a vote of the people of the two districts to determine their wishes in the matter. He even carried the matter to the Commissioner of Education in Albany.

Recommended Centralization
 "The State Education Department and I had recommended the centralization of several districts in the Bethpage-Farmingdale area because it offered the most in the way of additional state aid and economies to the people of the area. The people never got a chance to vote upon it. Now the people in each of the districts involved are feverishly constructing new buildings that are equaling or exceeding their constitutional debt limits to house their elementary children and their main or big problem of providing proper housing and instructional facilities for high school children are still to be solved."
 A special meeting of the Plainview School District is scheduled for this Friday night, Nov. 18, at Mannetto Hills School to discuss the proposed merger of Plainview with Hicksville School District.

 Assemblyman David S. Hill, Jr., of Glen Cove, local state legislator in Albany, by the Civic president asking assistance in getting the program moving.

But while the elimination of the Hicksville grade crossings appears no nearer than it was in 1941—eight years ago—when the local program was included in legislation enacted listing crossings scheduled for elimination, there does appear to be a workable plan which could give some badly needed immediate and partial relief.

Offer Practical Plan
 It has been suggested that the platforms of the railroad passenger station here be extended in length west from Jerusalem Ave. This would probably require shifting the location of the Railway Express and freight offices further west also.

The present platform length was developed when eight-car and smaller trains were common. Today trains average 10 to 12 cars, putting two or more cars across Jerusalem Ave. crossing on every city-bound passenger train. City-bound trains stand at the depot for longer periods of time today (blocking the crossings) because of the heavy volume of outgoing mail, parcel post and Express shipments which must be loaded. If the loading position was off the crossing, the delay in auto

In Our Opinion:

RR Grade Crossings Real Menace

ELIMINATION OF RR crossings in Hicksville is not a new topic for the community. We like this story Charles Voigt tells about his father and a high executive of the LIRR, who stood near the Bank of Hicksville and discussed the relative merits of raising the tracks or lowering them below surface level. **THAT CONVERSATION TOOK PLACE ABOUT 40 YEARS AGO!**

But whether you believe the tracks should be lowered in a sort of open air or covered subway or should be raised on a trestle structure, you will agree that Hicksville can no longer tolerate the present snarled-up traffic and menace to public safety which results every time a train passes through town.

We have no facts to bear out this point, but it does seem there are today more daily trains—freight and passenger—going through Hicksville than ever before. Thus, the crossing gates are lowered more often during a day—resulting in longer periods during which very effective blockades are erected on such major north-south traffic arteries as Broadway and Jerusalem Ave.

The State Laws of 1941 provide a definite program for elimination of grade crossings out of money appropriated by the Legislature. The Public Service Commission is directed to move along this program, but is not allowed to order preparation of plans for elimination work unless the estimated cost of the projects is within the balance of money available for the work. In other words, it is up to the State Legislature to appropriate more millions for this program.

Incidentally, the law also states that not more

than 15 per cent of the cost can be charged against the RR for railroad benefits.

At this point written appeals to Senator William Hults of Port Washington, Assemblyman David S. Hill, Jr., of Glen Cove and Gov. Thomas E. Dewey would give the State of New York an understanding that we want some action on our problem before many more years roll around. The State Legislature will convene at Albany in January and among other things prepare the budget.

Meanwhile, a little active interest by the Town of Oyster Bay would not be out of order. Hicksville is the only community in the township now confronted with a very serious grade crossing problem.

Just consider for a moment: Jerusalem Avenue will soon be completed. As a modern four-lane highway it will become one of the most important mid-island area north-to-south traffic arteries. And merging with Jerusalem, just before the grade crossing, is Newbridge Ed. which is a State Highway. Then only a block to the east we have Broadway, another north-to-south State Highway.

It takes little imagination to visualize the way auto movement on these three roads, all clustering into one, is going to increase in the next few years. At the present time, when the crossing gates are down, traffic lines up along Broadway south to Nicholas St. within a matter of moments and along Jerusalem Ave. for two blocks south. Just wait a few months and you will find the traffic jammed up (on the south) to Old Country Ed. and beyond.

Now picture an ambulance, a police car or a fire truck trying to reach the north side of the trucks at such a moment. The picture is very distressing. While emergency vehicles wait for traffic to roll again, a person can die, a house can burn to the ground, a criminal can escape.

We have much more to say on the subject. This is only a starter. If you have any ideas or suggestions, pass them along.

But now the election is well behind us and it appears that we may have the pleasure of looking upon your unsmiling likeness for many, many more weeks and months unless you and your associates clean up our community.

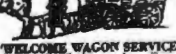
