HICKSVILLE — Santa Claus is coming to Hicksville on Saturday morning, Dec. 3, and the Business Men's Association Inc. is making plans to welcome him with a parade and great celebration starting at 10 o'clock. PLAINVIEW — A special meeting of the qualified voters of Plainview School District to vote upon the question of merger of their district with Hicksville will be held here on Friday night, December 16. However, a special meeting will first take place on Friday night, December 2, to "further discuss the question and consider costs of proposed local building sites and construction of a local elementary school."

The twin decision was made last Friday night at a special district meeting. William Schwarz, School Board president, at the opening of the session described the meeting as a roundtable discussion. He reported upon conversations and meetings with Dr. E. H. LeBaron, Hicksville school superintendent, and John W. Chisholm, district superintendent. Chisholm was present at the meeting.

At Saturation Point

"We feel," Schwarz reported for the Board, "that we cannot go along as we have been. We have no facilities to educate children who are moving in right now. Our school has reached the saturation point."

He explained Hicksville can accommodate 15 more Plainview pupils in East Street School before being obliged to open a new classroom. Seventy-three Plainview students are now in Hicksville schools. The first pupil from the new Briar Park homes, he added, was expected to report for school last Monday and before June, 1950 there will be another 45 children in the district.

"The people of this district have been very lax," Schwarz continued, "in providing educational facilities. We've got to do something. We can not hope things will get better."

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No Adult Courses Wednesday Night

HICKSVILLE—No adult education courses will be given tonight (Wednesday) at the high school because of the Thanksgiving holiday, it was announced yesterday by Elery Bean, director.

A full enrollment of students for the second sessions in automobile driving has been obtained, Bean added, with 48 registered for the new series of courses. The first series also numbered 48 students, mostly women.

NEW YORK — A nine million dollar anti-trust suit against the Owens-Corning Fiberglas Corp. of Toledo has been brought by Glasfloss Corp. of Stratford, Conn. The action was filed in Federal Court, here. Glasfloss has a manufacturing plant on New South Road, Hicksville.

PSC Gets Broadway Bus Franchise Plea

HEMPSTEAD — Application has been made by the Levittown Bus Corp. for a franchise to operate bus service along South Broadway, Hicksville, from the Rail Road station south to the Miller Homes section at Island Trees, it was learned last night.

Almost 1,200 persons in Hicksville and Island Trees have signed petitions to the Public Service Commission asking for such service. In addition, most local civic organizations have gone on record in favor of such a schedule which would serve hundreds of new homes as well as industries along the route, including Glasfloss and Grumman's.

Crossing Gates Delay Firemen

HICKSVILLE—A fire truck was delayed at the E. Main St. grade crossing of the LIRR eight minutes last Wednesday evening until the gates were raised to permit motor vehicles to pass, it was claimed this week. The truck was en route to a grass fire on Bethpage Rd. and has just rolled out of the firehouse when the gates went down.

An official of the fire department, remonstrating with the crossing watchman, pointed out the serious consequences which may have resulted if the alarm had been more serious. Badly needed fire apparatus and fire fighters could have been prevented from reaching the scene at a time when their services are needed most, he said.

Experience has shown that the action taken by vamps during the first few minutes after a fire starts may well determine the extent of the damage.

The Mid-Island Herald pointed out last week that blockading of crossings in Hicksville by the passage of trains and trains standing near the depot has increasingly snarled traffic and is menacing life and property.

Police Inspector Louis Schneider, speaking at the Civic and Community Assoc. meeting Wednesday night, pointed out that it is against the law for a crossing to be blockaded by a train for more than five minutes.

Contests Loom For Dec. 6 Vote

Contests for special district commissioners in Hicksville, Bethpage, Plainview, and other mid-Island communities are in the offing for Tuesday night, Dec. 6. All qualified resident voters may vote for Fire Commissioners, but only resident property owners may cast ballots for Water Commissioners.

Voting hours in most cases are between 7 and 10 o'clock in the evening at the local firehouse (or school) in Plainview for water officials, and candidates must file petitions, signed by 25 qualified voters, about a week prior to the election to obtain a place on the printed ballot.

Hicksville Contest

Vincent W. Braun, Sr., incumbent finishing a three-year term, is a candidate for reelection as a fire commissioner of Hicksville District. The present chairman of the board, he is an ex-chief of the department.

Hearing Here Tuesday On New Well for Levitt

JAMAICA — A public hearing will be held at Hicksville Court house next Tuesday morning, November 29, at 11 o'clock, upon the application of Hicksville Water District for an additional source of water supply, it was announced here by the N. Y. State Water Power and Control Commission.

The application concerns a new well, the first of three proposed to serve the Levitt development when it crosses the Oyster Bay Township line and enters Hicksville Water District next year. Persons who wish to object to the application must file written objections with the Power and Control Commission here not later than Saturday, Nov. 26.

The proposed well, which would become the fifth in the Hicksville Water District system, is planned for construction on the east side of Jerusalem Avenue about opposite Dante City. The entire cost of the well of 7,500 to 8,000 gallons per minute capacity with a half-million gallon storage tank would be borne by Levitt, according to a spokesman for the Hicksville District.

It is expected the new well and two others planned for a later date would be integrated into the Hicksville Water District system.

Mrs. Fred Baumeister, president of the auxiliary, recalls with pride the auxiliary's debut in parading and looks forward to many more parades at tournaments with the firemen next year. Such assistance to the department is made from proceeds of the annual card parties. During the past year several parties have

"Each member most willingly either bakes a cake or donates a piece of her handiwork for the sale, besides giving her time to work the night of the card party," Mrs. Baumeister said. "They're a wonderful group and deserve a lot of individual credit for all that we accomplish during the year."

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
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
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


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Miss Raffaella Funaro Becomes Bride Of Alex DeMarco; To Make Home Here



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

the secondary education of our children . . . and it will be a long time before Plainview can afford a high school."

John G. Herbes, another board member asserted "there are over 100 empty houses in the district right now which will be occupied by February 1."

One Site Withdrawn

Anthony Ocker Jr. was elected chairman of the special meeting. He reported that the Building Site Committee had information on two possible school locations but that one had since been withdrawn. Richard Bergman, owner of one site, confirmed this. No costs were stated.

It was forecast at the meeting that a large building development is being considered for the west side of South Oyster Bay Road in the Hicksville District. Further, that Hicksville is planning its educational future with an anticipated 3,700 Levitt houses and other developments and may soon have to refuse additional Plainview pupils.

George Ohrtmann offered the motion to hold a vote on December 16 so that final expression of district opinion could be obtained. After some discussion, the motion was carried.

In Our Opinion:

Youth Programs Require Adult Aid

AROUND THIS TIME of year the subject of a "Youth Centre" usually works its way into the news columns. Young people, desiring a place they can call their own and develop their own individual brands of fun and enjoyment, are inclined to beef about the absence of such facilities.

And some adults, who are perhaps a little over fond of complaining but short in performance, also get into the picture and say "why don't you start something in the paper to provide our town with a youth centre?"

Our favorite answer is to the effect that we like the youth centre idea as much as anyone else but don't believe it is practical. We point out that Hicksville — and every other town — is shorthanded when it comes to finding adults willing to assist any program beyond the front porch of their own home.

And we have concrete evidence of just how scarce such support can be in the case of the Hicksville Police Boys Club. Harold Manaske Sr., president of the sponsoring adult group for the PBC, is getting to be a discouraged man. At the moment the PBC is trying to raise funds

to finance a basketball league for local boys 10 to 18 years of age. Actually, the PBC is interested in boys from 10 to 18, but a recent survey showed that 80 per cent of the interested Hicksville youngsters fall in the 10 to 18 age group.

In an effort to raise money, the PBC has been peddling chances on a couple of bicycles. Returns have thus far been disappointing.

The prizes will be awarded at a public drawing on November 20 which is just about a week off. If you want to help this program and at the same time get the opportunity to win a fine bicycle for your son or daughter (for Christmas, maybe!) we have books at the HERALD office.

But so much for the financial support. It is in the field of volunteering time and effort that the picture gets black indeed. The same experience is encountered by almost every other youth organization in this community — Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, etc., all need adult leaders and advisors.

So we ask you: How can it be possible to provide and maintain a Youth Centre — which would be a new kind of endeavor yet would in some respects duplicate the programs of already established groups — if the present organizations are unable to whip up enough support, physically and financially?
