Neighbors Protest Spreading Sandpits

HICKSVILLE — Petitions to the Town Board protesting any further expansion of sandpit excavations in the west end of the community, particularly along the Long Island Rail Road at Duffy Ave. and Charlotte Ave. are being circulated this week, the Mid Island Herald learned last night. Residents of the Hicksville Park section off Duffy Ave. are aroused by reports that extension of present pits is contemplated.

Quote Town Policy

The petitions cite the town policy on topsoil and sand pits, adopted in 1945, which states in part that it is the town "policy to provide the proper use of land to prevent all manner of excavations which create pits, holes or hollows in the earth, leaving it in a hazardous or dangerous state."

Last week it was reported that the Town Board had petitioned the Supreme Court at Mineola to shut down a sandpit in operation in Old Bethpage, claiming violations of the town ordinance.

The local petitions comment "it is our considered opinion, based upon observation, that the present sand pit operations in Hicksville may be contrary to the intent, purpose and specifications of the town ordinance and we urge your board to use every means at its command to force compliance with the ordinance without delay."

The objectors, who are said to number most of the 105 families in Hicksville Park as well as residents of Underhill Ave., Duffy Ave. and vicinity, believe the present pits should be enclosed with a fence, and immediately refilled as the ordinance requires.

Civics Take Action

The Civic and Community Association is also interested in the sandpit question and has in recent months corresponded with the Town Board regarding the ordinance regulating such excavations.

Vote on Merger To Direct Trustees

PLAINVIEW — Notice was served upon qualified voters of Plainview School District this week that a proposition will be submitted to them on Friday night, Dec. 16, at Manno Hill School, on merger with Hicksville School District.

The question to be offered asks: "Shall the Board of Trustees of Common School District No. 19 . . . be empowered to negotiate merger with Hicksville School District No. 17 . . . subject to approval of the District Superintendent and the Department of Education of the State of New York?"

The meeting will be held at 8 o'clock in the evening of Dec. 16 and the question is offered pursuant to section 2006 of the State Education Law.

Details of the proposition were presented at another discussion meeting on Plainview's future educational facilities held last Friday night at Manno Hill School. Trustee John G. Harben opened the meeting in the absence of Board President William Schwartz. Anthony Ocker, Jr., was elected meeting chairman.

The small audience heard John W. Chisholm, district superintendent, again repeat the belief that construction of a local school building before merger with Hicksville District might be desirable. E. H. LeBaron, Hicksville superintendent of schools, was also present but spoke off the record and only as an observer.

Also present were a Mr. Carey of Sewanhaka Central School District Board and a Mr. Whelan of Franklin Square Board. Carey appeared to favor the idea of neighborhood schools within a larger central district.

Unsealed Cards Require 2 Cents

And to this they add, the favorite plea — MAIL EARLY and avoid the last minute rush.



To the Editor: I have just finished reading your column "In Our Opinion" regarding youth programs requiring adult aid, in the Nov. 28 issue of the Herald.

This is also one of my pet projects and pet peeves. I am a Girl Scout leader and know from bitter experience just how tough it is to get adults to assist with finances, transportation and to volunteer time. This is one of the reasons why so many girls eager to join Scouts drop out after a year. One leader, with an assistant in many cases, cannot possibly carry out an active program for 30 girls—act as advisor, chauffeur, banker, teacher, playmate and companion.

There are many girls who are on a waiting list to join scouting—they will never become Scouts—unless more adults give time to this worthy group.

The same situation exists in all communities. Why don't more

adults wake up and take an active part in ALL youth programs instead of making suggestions from "the front porches of their own homes."

I hope sincerely that your article will bring out more adult volunteers for the Police Boys Club, the Girl Scouts and the Boy Scouts.

Their days are crowded schedules of caring for their homes and small children, yet the extra time and energy they devoted to helping others through club activities they consider recreation.

Mrs. Sauser is the mother of a four-year-old son and a 16-months-old daughter. She is the wife of Myron Sauser of Sauser's Hardware Store in Hicksville. Her husband is vice-president of the Lions Club and a director-elect of the Business Men's Association. They make their home at 147 Old Country Rd., Hicksville.

Explains Purpose

"The Auxiliary is dedicated to the promotion of the best interests and welfare of the membership," Mrs. Sauser explained. "We extend a helping hand to our own people in this country and throughout the world."

Mrs. Sauser first joined the Auxiliary about five years ago. She is also a member of the Levittown B'Nai B'rith. Before coming to Hicksville, she lived in Brooklyn, where she was active in child welfare work as a member of the Community Day Nursery for poor children.

The Auxiliary was organized about 25 years ago by the late Hannah Weiss with Mrs. A. Katz

as the first president. Rabbi Irving Grossman today conducts the services at the Temple on East Barclay Street, which was first dedicated in 1919.

A Sunday School for the pre-school children from 4 to 6 years was recently set up at the Temple under the auspices of the Ladies' Auxiliary. Another recent undertaking by the Auxiliary was remodeling of the kitchen in the Temple. The ladies also pooled their resources with the men of the congregation to repaint the Temple, carpet the floors and put new drapes at the windows.

Several S.O.S. drives for old clothing and canned foods have been conducted by the Auxiliary in recent years with great success. The ladies would solicit the clothing and food from the entire community and then pack and ship the articles for distribution among the needy in Europe. The United Jewish Appeal is always support-

ed financially by the Auxiliary as well as the small local fund drives held in the community throughout the year.

Means of replenishing the treasury are combined with social affairs for the entire community such as the annual card party, the art exhibit which was held last spring, the square dance held this fall, and small cake sales. The annual Chanukah for all the children of the local Temple is being arranged by the auxiliary for some time this month.

Of the approximate 70 members in the club, about 40 ladies attend each of the first Tuesday night of the month meetings. Mrs. Sauser attributes the good attendance to the interesting meetings that are planned by Mrs. Frances Feirstein, program chairman, and her committee. A guest speaker, an informative film, or a program of entertainment is usually scheduled in conjunction with the business meetings. A pleasant social hour with coffee and dessert adds to the type of informal meetings the ladies enjoy.

Membership is open to any Jewish woman over 18 years of age. Mrs. Dorothy Braun and Mrs. Ernest Traidman are the membership chairmen. All Jewish women of Hicksville are cordially invited by Mrs. Sauser to join in the work and fun of this active woman's club.

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
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


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Field Club Closes Season With Loss

HIGH SCHOOL ASSEMBLY PROGRAMS: Fire Prevention, Trampoline Thrills

HICKSVILLE—I walked into the high school auditorium and saw such a conglomeration of equipment that I didn't know what to look at first, last Friday morning. Then, over at one corner of the stage, I saw Fire Chief E. W. Williams, who gives the demonstration.

What I saw on the stage was a group of models, among which were a high school, house, factory, fire alarm boxes and other equipment. I was looking forward to a good show and I was not disappointed.

We had the usual ceremonies, after which the program started. The speaker first told of some of his experiences in his travels throughout the country. After this he showed how short circuits cause many fires. Chief Williams' next demonstration was on the danger of celluloid and its many by-products. He used children's toys, umbrella handles, etc., to prove his point. After this he did some magic tricks, using cards and two rabbits which he gave to two girls in the audience. He demonstrated how dangerous dust can be by creating an explosion with it in the model of the factory.

He did several experiments to show how dangerous it is not to use lightning rods on a house. He also lit up several fluorescent tubes, using his body as a conductor.

Burns Down School
To conclude the show he used

the high school model to show how quickly the fire department responds to an alarm. As the people were leaving the assembly, it was surprising to hear how many were never going to do "this" or "that" again.

I helped the Chief pack his equipment after the show, as he had another show in Boston that same night. It gave me the chance to ask some questions.

He said: "This was originally my hobby and so was magic, so I combined them and came to work for the United Mutual Fire Insurance Co., which sponsors this act."

He has been doing the show for about two years and hopes to continue with the act. He likes the type of work and has entertained over 200,000 persons with his act. He had just returned from a five-week tour in Pennsylvania.

The Trampolines Stars

We had with us for assembly on Nov. 29, the famous Trampoline Stars, who performed for us. They first demonstrated simple stunts which we could do on the mat. These included handstands, cartwheels, rolls, handspins, etc.

One of the men did a stunt which one of his friends calls a "Democratic exercise," because it was done in the following manner: the performer gets on his arms with his body out behind his head and then kicks his feet up over his head several times. Next they demonstrated the first easy uses of the trampoline, using front

drops, back, knee, and keen and arm drops.

Next they did a routine using all of the stunts which they had shown us. After this they told how trampolining is used by many professional divers to keep in shape. One of the men did a swan dive, jackknife, and other types. After this came the part of the show that they said they liked best.

This was volunteer audience participation, which everybody enjoyed very much. The volunteers were boys from the audience. Finally there was a question period. One of the audience asked for a triple somersault and it was done. This is not even done in the National AAU. This concluded the show.

After the show I interviewed them before they went in to the showers. Mr. Steinmetz has been with his partner for about 11 weeks. He likes the work he is doing. It first started as a hobby and then he became a demonstrator for the company manufacturing trampolines. He first started doing this professionally in 1945. His partner, Mr. Cress, started in 1937, but does not like this work too much. He says he may drop out in 1951. He has won over 100 awards for his stunts. He has been in show business and worked at fairs and with a vaudeville troupe.

IN OUR OPINION: Library Necessary To Community

IN A MATTER OF WEEKS the voters of Hicksville School District will be asked to express their opinion, by ballot, upon the question of buying a house on Jerusalem Ave., corner of Second Street, to house the Public Library. This will be the third time in recent years that an effort has been made to provide our fine library with adequate quarters.

The first time was the living war memorial project which never reached an actual determination . . . and some of those who beat their jaws off talking against that project are now regretfully wishing they had remained silent.

The second time was the rather elaborate \$175,000 proposition to erect a building at the corner of Jerusalem Ave. and Cherry St. The voters apparently decided they could not afford it.

Now we have a reasonable proposition, about which not too much has been said, either for or against. But this time we have a vastly different situation before us. We are confronted with the necessity of providing quarters for the library or (1) renting space, or (2) putting the books in storage and closing up shop for a while.

The Library has been in Nicholas St. School since it was first established. For many years it was located in a second story room in the east wing. Then it was brought down to the street level and the area allowed was doubled.

But meanwhile the community has grown rapidly in size and in student population. Space in Nicholas or any district school building is now urgently needed for its designed purpose—to educate our children.

The situation is critical. Is a library necessary? Adults may say, "Oh, I never have time to read the newspaper, no less a book." But what about the children, the young people and those who have the time for and interest in education?

Gladys Jenkin, member of the high school faculty, while on her vacation in Vermont, last summer, wrote us a few lines which seem especially appropriate at this time. She quoted from "Three Thousand Years of Educational Wisdom," edited by Robert Ulrich.

"The highest welfare, safety and power of a city consists in able, learned, wise, upright, cultivated citizens who can secure, preserve and utilize every treasure and advantage," wrote Martin Luther. "Thus, in all the world, even among the heathen, schoolmasters and teachers have been found necessary where a nation was to be elevated. Finally . . . to see such schools established, no cost nor pains should be spared to procure good libraries in suitable buildings . . . For if a knowledge of every kind of learning is to be preserved, it must be embodied in books. This should be done, not only that our spiritual and civil leaders may have something to read and study, but also that good books may not be lost, and that the arts and languages be preserved."

And to this Miss Jenkin adds: "It does seem that if the German people in 1483-1546, which represents the time Luther lived, were so library conscious, and realized that schools could not live unless adequate libraries were maintained, we in 1949 should do all in our power to give to the young people and adults in Hicksville, a library they could use to make living richer and more intelligent."
