The ques-tion submitted asked if the three-man school board be empowered to negotiate a merger of their district with Hicksville. The vote took place after a series of discussions of the topic held in recent months. Henry Froehlich was elected chairman of the special meeting held in Mannetto Hills School.

# **Holiday Mailing Breaks Records**

HICKSVILLE—The Post Of-fice here is laboring this week-under the heaviest burden since it was etsablished in 1855. All previous records for the numi of letters and parcels handled are expected to topple before the end of the week, according to Post-master William G. Mollitor.

On Monday morning the mail train brought in 504 sacks of parcels and 42 pouches of mail, an all time high. The regular staff of about 80 clerks, carriers and drivers, has been increased with another 50 special employees in an effort to keep up with the flood.





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
