Koutensky Chairman Of Clearing House

The Nassau County Clearing House Assoc., Inc., has a membership of 47 Commercial Banks and plans are being made for greater activity by the Association on behalf of its member banks.

Banks Keeping Pace
Assuming office as chairman of the Clearing House, Koutensky recalled that banking in the county for 1949 closed on a high note. Substantial gains in capital funds and heavy increases in deposits during the past year "showed that the banks of the county were stepping along in stride with the rapid growth of the county in its industrial and residential expansion."

Koutensky, cashier of the L. I. National Bank for more than 25 years, has long been active in civic and fraternal affairs in his home community and in the county. For more than 10 years he was president of the Hicksville Business (continued on page 13)

Post Office Asks Lease Extension

HICKSVILLE — The Post Office Department has asked for an extension of its current lease upon premises on Herzog Place which expires the end of next month, it was learned this week. Hopes for construction of a Federal Post Office Bldg. in the community were thus boosted as a result since a short term lease extension would indicate the authorities are seriously planning to build here soon.

The Post Office is now completing a five-year lease on the premises next to the L. I. National Bank. The owners have told the postal people they would consider an extension, at a higher rate than the present lease, because "we can't put the post office out on the street, even though we urgently need the space to handle increased banking business," William E. Koutensky told the Herald.

Parking District Set For Bethpage

BETHPAGE — A park and parking district for this community has been created, it was learned this week. Robert Glasser appeared before the town board last Tuesday to ask if the district had been formed and was advised by Supervisor Harry Tappen that the district was in effect. Its boundaries follow the five district, excluding the area outside the town of Oyster Bay.

Town Board Changes Meeting to Jan. 31

OYSTER BAY — The next regular town board meeting will be held on Tuesday, Jan. 31, instead of Feb. 7. The normal meeting date falls upon a date when the State Association of Towns is holding its annual conference upstate.

HICKSVILLE — Commuters who park their cars on streets in the vicinity of the depot, some of them three and four blocks from the station, are not willing to pay for the privilege of parking in a private field nearer the train tracks, it was established this week.

Only two out of 175 commuters polled during the week indicated a willingness to pay a nominal fee of \$2.00 a month (50c a week) to park on Duffy Ave. within steps of the station. Both who replied are residents of the Levitt development at Island Trees.

Surveyed By Mail
The survey was made by Keystone Glass Mfg. Co. Inc. of 100 Duffy Ave. The concern has its plant and a tract which could park upwards of 200 cars on the north side of Duffy Ave. Postal cards were inserted under the windshield wipers of 175 autos, most of them parked three and four blocks up Newbridge Rd. and vicinity, at about 5 o'clock in the evening.

New Postmaster For Bethpage

BETHPAGE — James Klingelhofer, World War II veteran, is the acting postmaster here since the retirement of Harry Stolz on Jan. 15. Klingelhofer is a butcher with a shop on Broadway. He makes his home with his English wife and two children at 15 Revere Street.

Stolz had 19 years service as postmaster. He served from 1914 to 1918 and again from 1934 to 1950. He had passed the retirement age of 60. His successor served overseas 42 months during the recent war.

The local office has had considerable growth, keeping pace with the population gain in a decade from 2400 to 5200 residents and still growing. Paul Semett is assistant postmaster. There are two clerks and three carriers. A fourth carrier will be added in about a month.

Property Sales Continue Active

MINEOLA — Sales of property in the mid-Island area continues active with transfer of title for both large and small parcels recently recorded in the County Clerk's office, here.

Bethpage Transactions
The Mariou Realty Corp. of 168-48 Hillside Ave., Jamaica, has purchased from William H. Wicks an irregular parcel of land about 740 by 919 feet on the west side of Hicksville - Massapequa Rd., Bethpage, adjoining the Zerrner property. Revenue stamps of \$31.90 were attached to the deed, indicating a seller's value of about \$50,000.

Mets Homeas-Inc. has sold to Thomas L. Cahel of 50 Hilton Ave., Bethpage, a parcel about 250 by 349 feet on the east side of Hilton Ave., about 100 feet south of Bethpage Tpk. The revenue stamps totaled \$49.50.

Hicksville Purchases
Levitt's County Community Corp. continues active buying. It has purchased a plot 1,246 feet by 673 feet on the east side of Wantagh State Parkway Extension, 131 feet north of Hempstead Ave. LIRR in Syosset, being an in-

(Dutch Lane). Revenue stamps totaled \$36.85 (including a seller's equity of \$1.10 per 1,000 of value). It also bought from Blamoor Realty Corp. a plot 735 feet by 2,358 feet on Old Country Rd. at the Norbrook Estates property. Revenue stamps amounted to \$166.55.

A mortgage of \$472,500 was included in the sale of property on the east side of Bloomingdale Rd. near Mulberry St. from the Glassfloss Corp. to Tilo Roofing Co., Inc. of Stratford, Conn. Another mortgage of the same amount, \$472,500 was involved in the sale by Glassfloss to Tilo of land at the regular plot about 190 by 261 feet.

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MINNEOLA—Suggestions which will aid the police in apprehending and prosecuting criminals as well as assisting in the recovery of lost or stolen property were made for Herald readers this week by the Nassau County Police Dept.
 "Newspapers daily print accounts of private homes and places of business which have been burglarized and property stolen," according to Stuyvesant A. Pinnell, chief of detectives.

"Records continually show reports of lost property. Most of this is never recovered, generally due to the fact that accurate descriptions indicating numbers and other marks of identification are not immediately available to the police.
 "We earnestly request that you compile a complete descriptive list of valued property in your home. Serial numbers of typewriters, radios, instruments and other such property should be noted, with the names of manufacturers.
 "Place a secret mark on every article for positive identification."

HICKSVILLE — The Free Public Library expects to be located in its own home at the corner of Jerusalem Ave. and Second St. by early summer, it was learned this week. At the special district meeting, last Wednesday night, voters approved the appropriation of \$40,000.

Joseph Heim, president of the Library Board, said it is expected Mr. and Mrs. Franklin Duerk will vacate their home within the next few months. There were 404 votes cast at the special meeting in the high school with 272 in favor of the proposition and 130 opposed. There were 2 blank ballots. While there had been predictions in some quarters that a "record vote" would materialize, the Herald had forecast a vote of not more than 300. The Herald prediction was made before the final registration date when an additional 150 voters qualified. There were a total of nearly 1300 voters registered.

William J. Botto was elected chairman of the meeting after it was officially opened by School Board Chairman Henry C. Brengel. Polls were voted closed at 11 p. m. and the decision was made known by the tellers 12 minutes later. Voting was heavy during the first hour after the meeting started at 8 o'clock.

State Rejects Demand For Lee Ave. Signal

MINEOLA—Hopes for installation of a trip signal light at the intersection of South B'way and Lee Ave. in Hicksville vanished this week as Deputy Chief Inspector Louis W. Schneider of the Nassau County Police disclosed the latest decision of the State Public Works Dept.

"As a result of a survey made of traffic conditions at Lee Ave. on Broadway, Hicksville, we find there is no necessity for the installation of a signal at this location," the State reported to Schneider and he in turn relayed the information to the Civic Assoc. "On the basis of the accident experience at this intersection, which is very favorable, we find there have been a total of seven accidents in the past five years, none of which could have been prevented by the presence of a signal.

"We recognize," the report continues, "that it is inconvenient for persons entering Broadway from Lee Ave. during short periods in the morning and evening rush hours. This inconvenience in itself does not justify the installation of a signal."

The Civic Assoc. at the request of residents in Frank Homes had sought to obtain a signal which would be activated by movement of traffic out of Lee Ave. into South Broadway.

Republicans Hold Ratio in Township

MINEOLA—Republican enrollment in the Town of Oyster Bay is six times as great as Democratic party membership, the Board of Elections disclosed recently. In the Levitt development of Island Trees, consisting of 13 election districts in the Town of Hempstead, the ratio is about 2 to 1 Republican over Democrats.

For Oyster Bay districts there are 14,921 Republicans, 2,430 Democrats, 24 ALP, 41 Liberal and 1,317 blank, out of a total of 18,900 voters.

The Levitt section and vicinity has 3,099 Republicans and 1,855 Democrats. There are 85 American Labor and 61 Liberal.

Frankly, this is a challenge. For the past three months we have heard quite a bit about what should be done to improve community softball programs.

Hottest proposal is to install lights on the athletic grounds at the high school and run the project under them.

Those who are for the lights can advance many an argument for them and are quick to point out how much superior a league run under them would be and compare their rosey outlook with the admitted problems that have arisen in the twi-light leagues that have been conducted in this village in the past.

This heartfelt interest in developing community softball starts us.

Most everyone likes to compete in the action but few take a hand in solving the complex problems of league operation.

We would be astonished if lights were installed for night softball play this summer. We don't see how they could be realized before 1951—which leaves us one question.

If there is such a genuine interest in softball recreation under lights will there be as much for another twi-light league this summer?

To us the only problem lighting would really eliminate would be the time element. And conducting games without fear of darkness falling could be mighty important too.

But as for the actual operation we have our doubts. The same considerations that must be faced when the game is played in the light of day will merit thought when it is conducted at night.

Uppermost is the requirement that some persons contribute time to see that all goes smoothly. The obtaining of proper equipment five nights every week is a burdening responsibility for two or even three persons to undertake.

Another problem is that of umpiring. Many have taken a hand at this phase but one and all have announced a definite reluctance to undertake the task again. Most make their refusal final.

By daylight or moonlight, the fever which waxes hot in the local softball campaigns is more than most can stand.

We have had considerable to do with the softball leagues which have operated in Hicksville for the past three years. We admit to their shortcomings as quickly as we do to their good points and through them all we have found only one thing to be consistent, and that is getting a softball league going—and keeping it going—is a one-man job.

Now that there is so much campaigning for softball we would like to see some evidence of good faith.

This corner would appreciate any suggestions on how to improve the operation of a softball league in Hicksville and is open to the offer by any person or persons who are willing to devote a little time to seeing that one is run even more successfully in 1950.

From time to time we shall report back to our readers and inform them just how genuine the movement to develop softball in Hicksville really is.

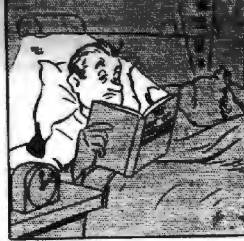

IN OUR OPINION:

Make Way Folks, Levitt's Coming

THERE IS NO POINT to worrying any more whether Levitt & Sons is going to take over Hicksville. The daily newspapers on Sunday and Monday told the grim story—where Levitt builds, they call it Levittown.

We're ashamed of our contemporaries on the Big City papers, who might be expected to be more accurate in their writing, for their handling of the story that Levitt has acquired some 1200 acres for the construction during 1950 of 3,000 (so said the New York Times) to 6,000 (said the Herald-Tribune) dwellings.

The stories which got a big play in the Sunday real estate sections followed a hand-out pattern: "The new acreage will allow for the ENLARGEMENT of the Levittown community in a north-easterly direction and will extend for the first time into the township of Oyster Bay." No mention of Hicksville, although the crossing of the township line means entrance into a community which has been known as Hicksville for over 100 years.

We can excuse the big city boys for not knowing any better, even though they must have some maps in their offices. But lo and behold, look what happened on Monday! The Review-Star, which certainly knows better, having been in business in Nassau for years and years, preached the same line and added: "When the new construction is completed, Levittown will be the largest unincorporated community in New York State."

And the disgraceful spectacle staged by Newsday took the cake, as we fully expected it would: "Some of the 30 farms included in the purchase belonged to families whose lineage goes back to pre-Revolutionary days when land was awarded to colonists by the English crown. Several of the farm

houses date from the Civil War." Sounds terrific, but it just isn't so, as most junior high school pupils know.

The announcement that Levitt & Sons has acquired the vast acreage in Hicksville got a big play. But readers of the Mid-Island Herald got the first, published account of what was coming in our August 24 issue. In fact, one reader asked us yesterday if the current report is AN ADDITIONAL couple of thousand houses being added to our previously published report. Nope, it's the same story, only a little late.

We feel it is necessary to repeat that we greatly admire Levitt & Sons for a terrific job of providing tidy little home units. But at the same time we must object, protest, denounce the smooth pattern being pushed which may cost Hicksville its identity. We'd take the same position if Hicksville, for example, tried to gobble up Plainville.

If you follow the loose description given to the area earmarked by the daily newspapers as "Levittown," nearly a quarter of Hicksville is now in the Levitt colony, including E. A. Esslinger of West Ave. The dailies said the land is "bounded by Old Country Rd. on the north, Jerusalem Ave. on the east." We mention Mr. Esslinger because he was in the fore, about 25 years ago when an effort to change the name of Hicksville was tried unsuccessfully. He was definitely in the ranks of the "keep Hicksville" group and probably has not changed his opinion.

But perhaps we're splitting hairs. Using Old Country Rd. and Jerusalem Ave. for boundaries is pretty general and encompasses a lot of Hicksville homes. However, it does add up that Dante City (Alexander and Dante Avenues) off Jerusalem Ave. and just north of the Aviation Country Club has been "liberated" from Hicksville. Incidentally, rumor has it that the flying field will soon disappear in favor of more Levitt houses.

We'll conclude by citing two viewpoints on this topic. First the comment, by letter, of a woman who has been a Hicksville resident in a new home development for three months: "I am in heartiest agreement with your editorial sentiments (upon the encroachment of Mr. Levitt on Hicksville), but what can be done about the situation?"

And second the comment, also by letter, of another woman, who was born in Hicksville: "These questions (about loss of community identity to Levitt) are not being raised for the purpose of being provincial. If there is to be anything gained by extension of community area, then let us consider it. However, if plans or accidental occurrences might lead this area to have to supply parking facilities, tax resources and storage centre for a larger, difficult-to-assimilate area, then let us know it now and do something about it."

Sometime has suggested, half in jest a simple solution: change Nassau to Levitt County and be done with it.
