

School Board Tempers Cool:

PLAZA, SCHOOL LAND SWAP VOTE ON MAR. 16

HICKSVILLE -- The Board of Education has set Saturday, Mar 16, for a referendum of the school district voters on a variety of questions including the transfer of property with Stackler & Frank, builders and owners of Mid Island Shopping Plaza, for property in the vicinity of Burns Ave School. While a large group of spectators turned out for the Board meeting last Monday, there was none of the spark, sizzle and frayed tempers in evidence the previous week when two trustees left the session.

The Board holds its regular monthly meeting next Monday night, Jan 28 at 8:30 PM in the High School Faculty Cafeteria.

The latest extension of the agreement with Stackler & Frank giving them permission to use a segment of school property for a right of way from John St into the Plaza parking field, due to expire this past week on Tuesday, was renewed for another period. It now expires Thursday, Feb 21, at which time the final extension may be granted to the date of the referendum. Feb 21 was set as the date for working out technical details of the transfer with S & F which will be submitted

to voter approval on Mar 16.

The Board adopted a motion naming the Building and Grounds Committee, headed by Arthur Elrich, to negotiate with and recommend realty appraisers to the Board.

It was estimated appraisers could determine the value of the land S & F wants in a matter of a couple of weeks.

Also tentatively scheduled for consideration by the voters on Mar 16 are the matters of bus transportation appropriation needed for the balance of the school year, election of a library trustees to fill the vacancy caused by expiration of the term of Mrs Joseph J. Ulmer, and purchase of a small bus for physically handicapped children.

The Board went into Executive Session at 11:10 PM and reconvened at 12:12 AM when a motion was adopted providing for appointment of an assistant director of Adult Education at a salary of \$1200 per year, the post to be filled by Jan 24.

During the meeting it was reported by Asst. Superintendent Donald F. Abt that the additions to the elementary schools are scheduled to receive students on Feb 11.

School Board Repeats Rotary Gives Zone Change Objection \$50 to Relief

OYSTER BAY -- When the Town Board holds a public hearing next Tuesday morning, Jan 29, upon the change of zone application of Mary Staryk it will be greeted with opposition in the form of petitions from residents of the North West section of Hicksville as well as a resolution of the Hicksville School Board.

The School Board on Jan 7, 1955, went on record against down-zoning of Fairway Farms property. The application was subsequently withdrawn. In a new application, up for hearing next Tuesday, Mrs. Staryk seeks a change from Residential D to Industrial I for her property at Burns Ave and Nevada St.

The School Board on Monday of this week resolved to again forward its opposition "to limit the hazard to children and to insure their safety which might be affected adversely by the introduction of traffic resulting from industrial use."

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Community Honors Veteran Educator

GARDEN CITY --- The community of Hicksville will honor Mabel R. Farley at a testimonial dinner-dance at the Garden City Hotel, here, tonight (Thurs). Thirty-five tables have been reserved by more than 350 friends of the guest of honor who has served in the community for nearly 50 years as an educator.

The dinner will begin at about 7:30 PM. During the brief formal program, County Clerk Ernest F. Franke will be toastmaster. There will be an address by Henry G. Eusemann, chairman of the testimonial committee, and presentation of a gift by Morris Rochman.

The Rev. Edward H. Stammel of Trinity Lutheran Church will give the invocation.

Music for the evening will be provided by Paul Drake and his orchestra.

Miss Farley, who retired last August as Principal of the Hicksville High School upon her election to the Board of Education, was born in Pennsylvania, one of 11 children of Jacob and Mary (nee Brown) Farley. Her first teaching jobs were in Pennsylvania, her second at Hicksville.

When she first came to the community the faculty consisted of 11 members. All of the high school and eighth grade pupils were seated in one room. The entire school system was housed in the Nicholas St School building. Today there are ten public school buildings and a student enrollment of almost 11,000.

She was honored with a testimonial dinner by a group of Hicksville High School graduates in 1940 and was the guest of honor at a testimonial dinner tendered by the Hicksville Lions Club in 1952.

Honored by NYU

Outstanding honors have been conferred upon her in the field of education. In 1933 she was the only woman among 17 persons to win the Meritorious Service Award of New York University Alumni. The bronze medallion bears the inscription "to one who through good deeds has served alma mater." In the citation which accompanied the award is written, "Mabel Farley, ever a loyal and active alumna, has brought the School of Education to the favorable attention of education in New York State through her active member-

Szendy Introduces 2 Of His 'Colleagues'

Two of my colleagues on the School Board—perhaps I should not call them colleagues—have recently cooperated in the flagrant power grab which places them in a position to control not only the School Board but also the functions of the school system. Then, feeling success in that endeavor, or the potential of success, they tried to take over the right of the taxpayers to determine who their elected officials should be by attempting to force my resignation, first by harassment and then by outright demand.

No charges worthy of a moment's consideration have been made against me, and none exist. On the other hand, the actions of both of these gentlemen appear to have been at times against the public interest.

Joseph Cawley, the first to suggest that I quit, attempted to defeat the wishes of the majority of the voters, expressed in referendum approving the portable-type classrooms, by unproven and unsubstantiated allegations of "illegality" and by other devices meant, such as visits to the bonding attorneys to persuade them not to give their approval to the bond issue. Now, Mr. Cawley knew full well that the bond issue had been approved by majority vote; that the voting machines were available for inspection and were subsequently checked and the tallies found correct; and that the registration books and other papers were available to him for inspection and were subsequently checked by his associates in the allegations, and nothing tangible found amiss.

Also, that if there were any grounds for claiming significant irregularity an appeal should have been made to the Commissioner of Education. No such appeal was

made and seemingly none was ever contemplated. Nevertheless, the air was full of charges of illegality, and Mr. Cawley's charges of "illegality" were publicly made and recorded on tape.

"Illegal" means contrary to law; nothing contrary to law had been done. Mr. Cawley's allegations, unsubstantiated and unproven, and his previous attempts to defeat implementation of the vote, can be deemed not in the public interest. Incidentally, in spite of Mr. Cawley's allegations and attempted persuasion, the bonding attorneys approved the bond issue and by legal opinion expressed their acceptance of the referendum.

In charge for the School Board at the two schools where the vote was questioned, Fork Lane and Woodland, were Arthur L. Erlich and Robert D. P. Eaton. I have always thought it significant that neither was at his post in the school assigned to him, as is customary, when the polls closed. Erlich, with Eaton in tow or vice versa, arrived at the Fork Lane School after the doors had been locked.

Robert D. P. Eaton, the second to propose that I resign, did so seemingly to distract attention from questions that were being put to him regarding his attempts as described in last week's HERALD, to keep Prose and York Streets, adjacent to the Burns Ave. School, open for access to and egress from the Mid-Island Shopping Plaza.

Although he and the other members of the now-ruling quarter must know that the account given was accurate in every respect, Eaton issued a blanket denial. Again, the record of his proposals is on the tape, and one can now understand why he voted for inaction of tape recordings if he

Open Letter to Our School Board

To Hicksville Board of Education
 Hicksville, N.Y.
 My Dear Board Members:

Whether we believe it or not, the universe and all that is in it, including humans, are governed by law, which must be obeyed. Let us consider for a moment what would be the result, if only one heavenly body went off its course for even a fraction? Everything would soon be a conflagration and chaos would result. What happens when we ignore the law of eating and drinking? It soon is the end of us.

Now, therefore, law, rules and regulations are made for the orderly procedure of business and the general conduct of mankind. When we aspire or seek a certain office, we pledge ourselves to uphold these laws entrusted to us by the people who believed that we would uphold them.

I find in Mr. Kent's letter to the Mid Island HERALD, Jan. 10, where he admits "the law does provide transportation out of district up to 'eight miles' and this district has by vote of their Trustees seen fit to extend the distance to 12 miles. The motion was initiated by a previous board under a motion by Joseph F. Cawley, trustee, who should be commended for his action in this connection."

Friends, it is my belief, that we have a lawmaking body, and laws which are enacted, should, I repeat, SHOULD be upheld, es-

pecially by people whom we entrusted them to. Individual members are NOT the board and must not exercise such right until by vote of all members.

I, therefore, in the public interest, would like to ask the School Board by what power can they change the LAW, individually or collectively, unless the public, by whose grace they hold office, bestow such a power upon them. If 8 miles is the law, then that stands and cannot be changed by the whim of anyone or a group.

I note that among items the question of tape recorder was to be passed upon on Jan. 14. I trust that you will receive my recommendation in the impartial spirit in which it is presented. The recorder was acquired at considerable cost to the public, but in my opinion it is worth it since it accurately records all favorable and unfavorable expressions and is valuable in protecting the truth. I am sure that you will all vote in favor of its continuance, since nobody has anything to hide.

Schools and its functions have claimed a major part of my interest and activity during my 37 years residence in Hicksville. Our public schools always have been administered as non political and non-partisan.

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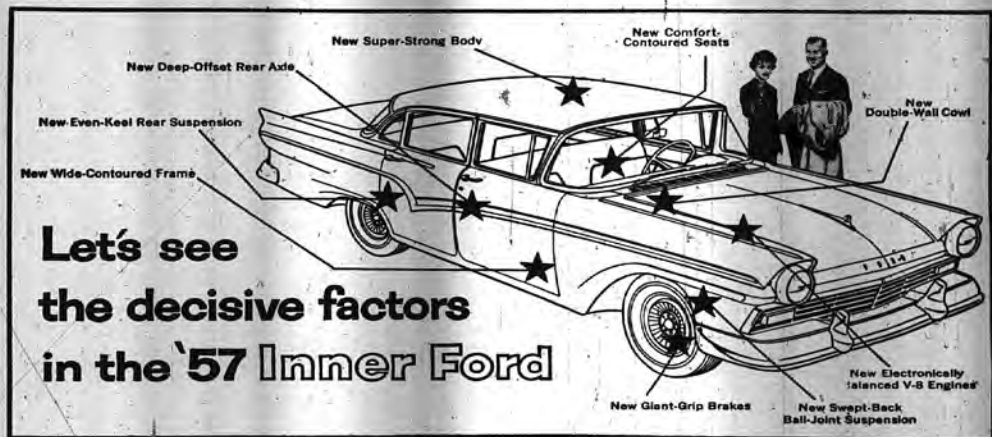
