# LITTLE LEAGUE EXPECTS 5000

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**HICKSVILLE**---More than 5000 boys are eligible to register for Little League Baseball in three community divisions. The first of two registration dates will take place this Saturday, Feb. 2. The Babe Ruth League will also have a registration day the same date. Every boy must enroll in order to play.

Little League players must be 8 years old before Aug. 1 and not past 12 years of age by the same date.

**NATIONAL LEAGUE:** Boys register Saturday, Feb. 2 and Sunday, Feb. 10 at Levittown Hall 10 AM to 2 PM. Area is bounded by LIRR on north, Parkway on west, west side of Jerusalem Ave.

**INTERNATIONAL LEAGUE:** Boys enroll Saturday, Feb. 2 and Feb. 9 at the Junior High School on Jerusalem Ave.

10 AM to 2 PM. Area is bounded by Woodbury Rd. on north, South Oyster Bay Rd. on east and Jerusalem Ave. on West.

**AMERICAN LEAGUE:** Boys enroll Saturday, Feb. 2 and 9, at both Burns Ave. and Woodland Ave. Schools, 9 AM to 12 noon. Area is bounded by LIRR and Woodbury Rd. on south. This league will require a \$2 membership fee per family, payable at registration.

**BABE RUTH LEAGUE:** Boys 13 to 15 will enroll at Levittown Hall on Saturday, Feb. 2 or Sunday, Feb. 10, 10 AM to 2 PM. Hicksville International Babe Ruth League has joined the community wide league. Babe Ruth plans to field 14 teams this season.

## GLASS ON SCHOOL LUNCH ROLLS CAUSES CONCERN

**HICKSVILLE**---The Board of Education, Monday night, abruptly cancelled the contract of Messing Bakeries, following an executive session during which the incident of finding particles of glass in packages of frankfurter rolls was apparently discussed. There was no discussion during the open session regarding details of the incident.

Parents of students in the school district received letters from school principals, by way of their children, Tuesday. Letters pointed out that "examination of packages of frankfurter rolls subsequent to the 12:15 lunch period at Burns Ave. school on Monday revealed the possibility of some glass on in or on the rolls which had been delivered to the district in sealed packages. If your child manifests any abnormal reactions, consult your physician and notify the Superintendent's office immediately."

It was learned by the HERALD that 66 fourth graders at Burns Ave. School may have been subjected to the danger of eating some glass. As of a late hour yesterday (Wed) morning, School authorities said none of these children had apparently suffered ill effects.

Efforts by the HERALD to obtain a comment from Messing Bakeries were unsuccessful. By way of a secretary, the message was given by a company official that the matter was under investigation.

School authorities complement parents and all involved for the calm and efficient way in which the episode was handled.

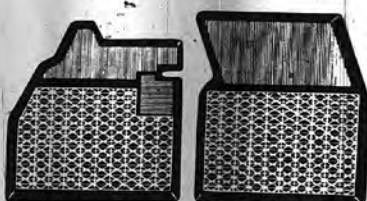

# Weekly Press Takes a Bow

THE MEADOW BROOK NATIONAL BANK held a luncheon at Guy Lombardo's East Point House in Freeport, Friday, to which were invited the representatives of 26 weekly newspapers published in the communities where the Meadow Brook has local offices.

The Bank has some important news to announce. It was important for the weekly newspapers, such as the HERALD, and it was important to all local retailers and other advertisers.

You may recall that last year the bank offered, thru advertisements in the HERALD and other papers, a pair of tickets to the Show Boat performance at the Jones Beach Marine Theatre to new depositors. The Bank was now ready to announce the results of that campaign in terms of advertising draw or results.

This news, for the guests at the affair, was exciting and thrilling. It was revealed that not only did the weekly papers draw business for the bank, but also---and this is most significant---the amount of the new accounts received by the Bank thru this campaign was almost the same for daily newspapers and weekly papers. Incidentally, other media (such as radio) produced only an insignificant return in both new accounts and amount of accounts.

Considering the cost of using the mass media (such as daily papers) as against the weekly press, the weekly community papers did a tremendous job. It did the kind of job which every weekly paper knows his paper can produce but which he sometimes finds difficult to convey to advertisers.

August B. Weller, president of the Meadow Brook, spoke at the luncheon and recalled for the guests how his Bank began to grow and expand back in the tough times of 1933-34. He spoke of the first advertisements run by him in the South Shore News, then published in Merrick where the bank had its first small office. His story had a special personal interest for us because we began our newspaper career as editor of the South Shore News published by Edward R. Redmond who also owned a paper in Hicksville and had his plant here.

Mr. Weller talked about the amazing job those first ads in the South Shore News produced for the Bank. His son, Don, is now public relations officer of Meadow Brook and he made the presentation of the results of the Show Boat promotion and the role played by the weekly community press. It was announced the Bank plans to duplicate its program in cooperation with the Jones Beach Stadium this summer.

Another participant in the luncheon was Guy Lombardo who disclosed that he will bring Show Boat back to Jones Beach this summer with some revisions in the show. The opening of the season is June 25. He pointed out that July last summer was the wettest July in 32 years and while 440,000 saw the show in 1956, many were disappointed due to unfavorable weather forced cancellations.

# Class Pin Date Remains Secret

The following is the complete text of the remarks by Henry G. Eisemann, principal speaker at the Mabel R. Farley Testimonial Dinner-Dance on Jan. 24:

May I depart from the usual custom of acknowledging distinguished guests on the dais and say--Good evening to all--all friends of Mabel Farley.

We gather again to do honor to an educator who has served our community well and I was deeply moved at being selected chairman of this testimonial.

When we recall that Miss Farley has given so many years of her life to Hicksville, it is fitting that we give expression to our appreciation. Hicksville has always recognized meritorious service and this evening we follow in the pattern appropriate to a home-loving community.

### Not An Easy Lot

To the average person on the outside, the life of an educator appears to be an easy one. Five days a week, short hours, many vacations, and other attractions. But in truth an educator's lot is not an easy one. There is no role for success that works unless you work for success.

Behind the scenes, things are decidedly different. It has always been a mystery to me how our educators withstand the daily strain and accomplish such excellent results. We are ever thankful that so many of our young people willingly undertake to educate and train themselves to follow an exalted profession which, unfortunately, has not always been accorded the recognition it has always deserved.

It is needless for me to say that education is the backbone of America, and to this end, Hicksville is certainly doing its share. Many of the high standards set in Hicksville and much of the good that has been accomplished in our public school system can be traced to the guiding hand of Miss Farley. Her years of service and devotion to duty were particularly recognized after her retirement, when she was reelected to represent us on our Board of Education.

When Miss Farley first came to join the Hicksville School system, I was completing my studies in our high school which then offered only a limited curriculum and there then was only a handful of students. At that time, Broadway was lined with trees and there today you see sidewalks, there were only dirt paths.

### Wears Class Pin

In fact, Miss Farley, in your honor I am tonight wearing my class pin. Now don't be alarmed. Don't be frightened, the date is inscribed on the back of the pin. No one will be permitted to see the date. We certainly don't want to divulge our secret.

I am fully in accord with the movement which is gaining momentum to name one of the schools of higher learning the Mabel R. Farley School.

Our community has expanded beyond all expectations, and today, we have about as many school

buildings, as we had high school students when Miss Farley first took up her duties. As the School System expanded, Mabel Farley grew in stature, establishing a record that will be extremely difficult to equal. The reason is a simple one. The fact that so few people reach the top is because no one successful method has yet been devised by which a person may sit down and slide uphill. Mabel Farley is no exception. She never shirked any of her responsibilities.

### Moulded Many Lives

Yes, I am happy to play a part in honoring the one person who has been outstanding in moulding the lives of thousands of boys and girls of our community and one to whom we owe an immeasurable debt of gratitude. When Mabel Farley sits in her rocking chair and reflects back thinking of those boys and girls who have gone out into the world, she should enjoy a feeling of satisfaction privileged to one who has done a magnificent job. A feeling of satisfaction that only she--and God--can fully understand. I say to you good people--I know of no one who may more honestly reflect on such outstanding accomplishments to the benefit of our community than Mabel Farley. She always adhered to the cardinal principle that education is intended to teach men how to think, not what to think.

So, now you have retired. You have joined the vast army representing a new era in our economic life. It is now universally recognized that in order to give the boy on the bottom the opportunity to become the man on the top, compulsory retirement is the answer. Compulsory retirement is just one more rung in the ladder of our social gains, a step forward that will never be retraced.

Webster refers to 'retirement' as a 'withdrawing inc seclusion.' I would rather refer to retirement as the present fruits flowing from past performance, and in your instance, Miss Farley, performance so well carried out that you have fully earned the opportunity for leisure and relaxation. I would rather look upon retirement as an opportunity to pursue the many long promised and intriguing visions that certainly each of us promises to ourselves as we approach the age when no longer need we fear an alarm clock.

Mabel Farley, as you enjoy to the fullest your richly deserved retirement, all of us here tonight and those unable to attend, want you to carry with you the knowledge that your greatness to our community is recognized and we are all deeply appreciative. If we could all follow your example of being nice to people, our community would become a model for all the world to emulate.

They say 'be nice to people, there is only one of you' but there are so many of them. Because Miss Farley, you have done just that these many years, there are so many of us here tonight to shake your hand and wish you well, for many, many more years to come.

# Response By Mabel R. Farley

The following is the text of remarks by Miss Mabel R. Farley, guest of honor at a testimonial dinner-dance, held Jan. 24 at Garden City Hotel:

Mr. Toastmaster, Pastor Stammel, distinguished guests, friends, and boys and girls of Hicksville High School. With all of Mr. Eisemann's, Mr. Francke's and Mr. Rochmann's talent for soft-peddling the weaknesses of the friends and magnifying their virtues, I hardly supposed that they could so beautifully embroider the facts. This incident reminds me somewhat of that hackneyed old tale of the Irish widow who upon listening to the flowery eulogy of the officiating clergyman, insisted upon taking one more look into the casket to see if 'it was really Pat about whom he was talking.'

As a matter of fact when I first learned that this great favor was in store for me, it fairly took my breath away. Even now after months of anticipation, I have not altogether recovered. You have honored me in the past for which I have been duly appreciative and so, in accepting such an evidence on your personal regard, I can only express my sense of unworthiness and my deep appreciation and hearty thanks for your charitable blindness of all my faults.

The night of Jan. 24, 1957 will long be remembered by me. I am deeply touched by the fact that busy people will take time from their busy day to plan for this splendid 'get-together' of friends and people interested in the education of youth.

If I can think of all the work put forth for this affair as a combined effort to 'honor the teachers who have taught in Hicksville High

School', and the thousands of graduates of Hicksville High School who have been living successful lives, it will justify the time and energy spent for this splendid affair tonight. For without the help and splendid cooperation of students and faculty, we would not have maintained the good name and excellent record of which we have been justly proud. If in my small way, I have influenced teachers and pupils to do their best, then my work has not been in vain.

If through your school life in Hicksville High you acquired the skills and knowledges needed to meet life's daily problems, if you developed the ability to think clearly, basing your thinking on facts, and looking at your problems from all sides; if you learned to get along with other people and have them like you, if you learned to play the game squarely, not because of prestige to do so but because of your love for fair play; if you learned to find happiness in the walk of life you chose to follow, even though it has seemed to be relatively unimportant to the world's work; if you learned to put into your work and play all the energy of a healthy, well-developed body, if you have done these things, you are on your way to the better things we call 'success'.

(At this point Miss Farley read a poem: "The Man in the Glass")

### Doing Your Best

When graduates have returned to school, invariably their statement would be 'I wish I had done better in high school'. Perhaps they did not realize the importance of having done their best, when the opportunity existed. However, I

do believe that most of our graduates are making their contributions in their particular chosen field.

It appears to me, that at a 'get-together' as we have tonight, it is appropriate that we recall a few incidents that may be of interest to all of us. It has seemed that only a short time ago that all of the high school students and all of the 8th grade pupils were seated in one class room in Nicholas St. Building. The village had only one school building. Prior to 1915 was offered in Hicksville. The first class to graduate from high school in 1915, had five in it. There were 15 teachers in the district and 459 pupils.

There are now 520 administrators and teachers and nearly 11,000 pupils from kindergarten to high school inclusive. We now have 10 buildings and thousands of high school graduates who have entered more than 55 leading colleges and universities. We have five college graduates who earned Phi Beta Kappa rank.

We had boys graduate from Annapolis and at present have three boys at West Point and three at King Point. Sixteen of our graduates are doctors or are preparing to be doctors. I trusted my life to one of our boys who is an orthopedic surgeon.

We have outstanding bankers, real estate men, insurance men, business men, ministers, priests, teachers, principals, lawyers, dentists, chemists, engineers, judges, majors, pilots, nurses, college professors, farmers, florists, and many good citizens among our graduates. Many of our students have been on the Dean's list of their respective institutions.

single-handedly, overrule duly constituted local school boards, according to the article.

It was inspired by the ruling of James E. Allen, State Commissioner of Education, that ex-Communist teachers are not required to name fellow-workers known to them as members of the conspiracy.

"Times' Editorial in Evidence  
"The mischief in giving such broad discretion under the law," the letter said, "to a single individual, particularly one whose main qualification for appointment is a background in the field of administering the education law, is pointed up by that portion of the commissioner's decision which cites the editorial of March 17, 1956, of the New York 'Times' in support of his conclusion.

"The administration of justice would be in a sorry state if judicial officers were to draw from newspaper editorials, in deciding cases in our courts. This would be particularly true where the editorials were from the pages of newspapers as ill-informed on the subject under consideration as is the New York 'Times' with respect to the nature and scope of the Communist conspiracy.

"Regardless of the validity of the conclusion reached, the commissioner's reasoning to that conclusion is not of a kind to inspire confidence in the administration of the educational system of the State of New York. Perhaps the fault lies more with the system than with Commissioner Allen. Here we have a man who appears to lack the experience and judicial skill required for a determination and yet he is charged by law with making that determination."

It would be well to restudy the system, Mr. Krummenacker said, and give the responsibility for determinations in these matters to an agency or group more qualified for the interpretation of the Constitution and the applicable statutes. "The accused

would have ample protection if he were remitted to the right of reviewing the determination of the local board of education by appeal to the courts. I respectfully submit that the courts of the State of New York are far more competent to determine such matters in the first instance than the Commissioner of Education.

"This letter is addressed to you and to the others indicated below with the request that you consider an appropriate amendment to the statutes so that the unfortunate ruling of Commissioner Allen may not be repeated."

The letter was prepared by the Catholic-Action committee, with the assistance of attorney Francis J. Donovan, a member of the council.

But let's get down to our own Post level and let's look around for well known names out of neck of the woods. We have Henry G. Eisenmann, member of the Board of Directors of L. L. Lighting; Allen Carpenter, past commander, now a member of the School board, very active in Boy Scout circles; we have Henry C. Brengel, past commander, active in so many
