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School Board Hires Two Land Appraisers

HICKSVILLE -- The Board of Education has engaged two local men as appraisers as a preliminary to a referendum in March upon transfer of school district property and exchange with Stackler and Frank. Acting upon the recommendations of the special committee on Buildings and Grounds, the Board authorized appraisals by William M. Heberer of 11 E Marie St and Charles L. Montana of 115 North Broadway.

Six members were present for the special meeting, Monday night. Joseph Cawley was absent due to illness. Under the new by-laws, the Board will hold a "regular" meeting next Monday evening, Feb. 11, at the High School Faculty Cafeteria.

Heberer and Montana have been asked to prepare individual appraisals of (a) a piece of property just under two acres along James

St. near Burns Ave School, and (b) a like-sized parcel, also near Burns Ave School, owned by Stackler and Frank of Mid Island Shopping Plaza.

A transfer or exchange of the two parcels is scheduled for voter consideration at a referendum tentatively set for Mar. 16.

A Time for Decision

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36 Classrooms Ready Monday

HICKSVILLE --- Thirty-six additional classrooms will be ready to receive students next Monday morning, Feb. 11, making it possible for all except kindergarten classes to attend a full-day's schooling. The additional classes were voted, upon and constructed in less than seven months. The question was approved by the voter on Aug. 18.

Using pre-fabricated materials, four classrooms have been added to Fork Lane; eight to Burns Ave; eight to Old Country Rd; six to Dutch Lane; four to East St and six to Woodland Ave School for a total of 36 rooms.

The Board of Education voted, Monday night, to permit the switch of pupils who have been attending morning classes to afternoon sessions, effective Feb. 11.

The changes in schedule will provide some new problems for the transportation dept of the school system. A total of 5,392 children are being transported now

within the district. When single sessions go into effect, a total of 4,340 will be transported between the hours of 7:30 and 9:30 in the morning.

With 17 buses now in use, the Board was given a recommendation that three additional buses be put into service. However, following an hour-long executive session on transportation problems, no further action on the suggestion was taken.

It was pointed out, prior to the executive conference, that traffic in the north side of the district in vicinity of Mid Island Plaza is now delaying the on-time arrival of school buses.

ADOPT BUS LAWS

Upon recommendation of the school administrators, the School Board adopted the following six rules and regulations which will be distributed to parents of transported pupils.

1. Children shall at all time be courteous to one another and the bus operators while waiting for, or while riding on buses.
2. Children shall pay attention to and follow the driver's instructions.
3. Children must neither push, quarrel nor fight with or otherwise disturb other passengers, or the driver.
4. Children shall not use obscene words.
5. Children found to be unruly, disobedient or not following these regulations, shall be suspended from transportation privileges. The period of suspension shall be at the discretion of the principal or superintendent.
6. In a proper case, complete revocation of the privilege of transportation may be revoked and restored by the Superintendent of Schools.
