To Reduce Crossing Snarls

EXTEND RR PLATFORM FOR LONGER TRAINS

HICKSVILLE - To accommodate longer morning commuter trains and not block the Jerusalem Ave. crossing, the LIRR is extending the west-bound platform by 470 feet and moving the freight yard switches to the west at the same time.

A. Allan Goldstein, civic affairs chairman of the Glenbrook Civic Assoc., was advised by Sanders Schwartz of the Public Service Commission this week that the LIRR has been working with the Town of Oyster Bay and County of Nassau "to overcome the traffic problem at the crossings, which became very bad after the opening of the mid-island shopping center."

A spokesman for the LIRR told the Herald yesterday that with the extension of the platform all "except a couple of the longer morning commuter trains" will clear Jerusalem Ave. crossing.

Schwartz also reported to Goldstein that the LIRR said "in spite of all the company has been able to do to control the crowd at Hicksville, they insist on loading at the head end and, therefore, the train (231) takes anywhere from three to eight minutes to load. A check of the last 186 operations shows that no train took over eight minutes and no train took less than five minutes."

The east bound platform has been lengthened slightly.

Moving the freight yard switches to the west is expected to provide additional auto parking space next to the depot with an entrance-exit for autos directly from John St. is also expected to help ease congestion at the Jerusalem Ave. crossing.

It is estimated in the legal notice in this issue that the annual cost and expenses of the district will not exceed \$40,000.

School Budget May Exceed Six Millions

HICKSVILLE -- A gross budget for the School District next fiscal year of over six million dollars was forecast at a recent meeting of the Board of Education although the entire budget has not been officially developed.

No Reason For Alarm

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CURRENT COMMENT: Nuclear Fuel Plant Grows

THE PEOPLE at Sylvania-Corning Nuclear Corp facility on Cantigue Road, Hicksville, are to be complimented upon their efforts to inform the community of their plans and activities.

Last Thursday, members of the North West Civic Assoc and other residents of the vicinity, were taken on a tour of the plant which has been the source of much speculation since it was put in operation in 1952 by Sylvania Electric Products.

Because of the kind of work done at the plant, the area was been and continues to be under heavy guard. It is surrounded by spotlights at night. There is a high fence topped with barbed wire. Visitors must sign in and out. They must be escorted about the premises.

In some ways, the visit to the plant last Thursday was a disappointment. There were no "atomic bombs". Actually it was like a visit to a very tidy, very efficient machine shop combined with chemical laboratories.

Dr Lee L Davenport, president of the new Sylvania-Corning Nuclear Corp, personally conducted the group of visitors and explained the operations. Fuel elements and other components for reactors used in research and electric power generation, described as the "heart" of peacetime atomic energy, are produced at the plant.

The Sylvania-Corning people, a new organization since April 1, now have about seven acres on Cantigue Road and are buying another three acres on which to put up an additional plant. It will be a one-story building in a landscape setting "similar to other light-industry installations for such purposes as the manufacture of electronic equipment."

The facility turns out what appear to be metal boxes about three foot long, a uranium-aluminum alloy. The design pattern is most important and when this box-like gadget is fitted into a reactor, heat energy is produced for the generation of electric, we were told.

These fuel elements are not mass-produced. The components must be subjected to all kinds of rigid tests and checks and the work done on them can only be described as highly skilled.

The proposed expansion of this facility will be a distinct advantage to our community.

The plant now utilizes 7 acres on Cantigue Rd. and will acquire 3 adjacent acres from George H. Hauser on which to build a 25,000 square ft. plant, employing about 125 persons. 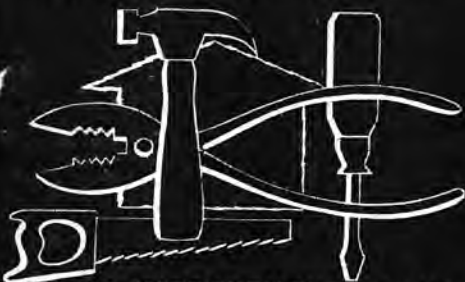

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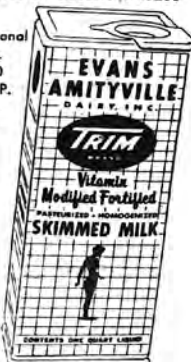
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PBC Honors Mother of Eight

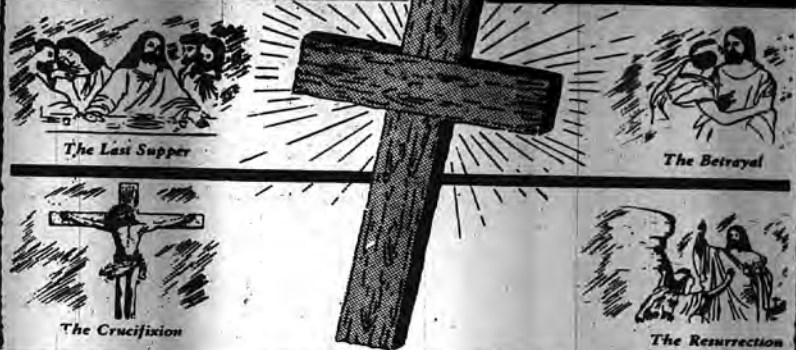

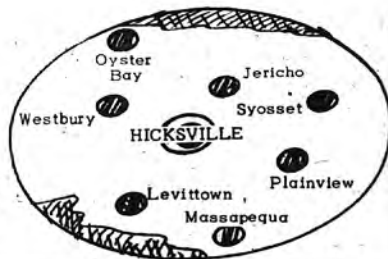
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
