HICKSVILLE -- More than 360 elementary students attending Lee Ave and Old Country Rd Schools were abruptly 'turned out of their classrooms Tuesday morning of this week following a midnight decision on Monday by 5-2 vote of the Board of Education forbidding the further use of additions to both schools. Following an official inspection by the County Fire Marshal's office and Fire Chief B. Medard Offenloch at the request of Board members Emil J. Szendy and Allen S. Carpenter, there were indications that the pupils may resume their classes before the end of this week.

Despite the statements voiced at the meeting by prominent insurance brokers and Richard Cairns, school building and ground director, that the fire door matter had no bearing upon the safety of the children using the classrooms at the two buildings, the Board adopted the motion offered by Trustee Edward S. Kent and seconded by Joseph Cawley.

**KENT'S MOTION**  
Kent's motion was: "That in the temporary buildings equipped with fire doors of a lower than appropriate fire resistance as reflected in insurance surveys, that effective immediately school be suspended in these (Old Country Rd and Lee Ave) buildings until proper doors are installed and any other fire hazards removed and the pupils involved be accommodated in permanent buildings."

Charles Montana of Montana Realty and Insurance told the Board that "child safety is not involved" in the question of fire doors. Fire doors are held open at all times and only close by the release of fusible links when a fire occurs. They are required by the insurance underwriters to prevent the spread of destruction from one section of a building to another.

Armand Lowell of Lebkuecher & Lynch said the fire rating organization "is not concerned with lives, only in saving property." He also insisted that the fire doors have no bearing upon the safety of the students using the buildings.

**WORKED ALL NIGHT**  
Following adoption of the motion and conclusion of the meeting at 1 o'clock in the morning, the administrative staff worked until 5 in the morning to relocate students in the 8-room addition at Old Country and 4-room section of Lee Ave. All class furniture had to be moved into the gym and auditoriums of the permanent buildings and other classes were increased in size.

Following the inspection of the structures (see accompanying letter), a special meeting of the Board was called for last night (Wed).

Charges were voiced Monday. (Continued on page two)

Dear Dr. Lamb:

Upon a request for an inspection at two of the District Schools, an inspection was made by this office in cooperation with Chief Offenloch of the Hicksville Fire Department. Temporary additions to the Old Country Road School and the Lee Ave School were inspected to determine the presence of any fire hazards which might warrant discontinuing the use of these sections.

It was found that a question had arisen concerning the flue pipe at the Old Country Rd School addition, and the fire doors at both schools separating the temporary and permanent structures, and that these areas had been evacuated because of such conditions.

It was our opinion that a ventilated thimble should be installed around the flue pipe where it passes thru the combustible roof material. The fire doors at both schools are acceptable to this office.

In its present state, this office can offer no objection to the use and occupancy of the areas in question.

# Budget Discussion Takes Place Tonight

HICKSVILLE--The public will get an opportunity tonight (Thurs) at the High School on Division Ave to ask all the questions they wish about the record-breaking 1957-58 school budget of \$6,216,307.06 when the Board of Education holds a public discussion meeting on the Budget.

The estimated amount to be raised by taxation, including the library and less revenues and state aid, is \$3,963,283.48. The tax rate this year is \$4.03 per \$100. No official estimate of next year's rate has been made for next year, but depending upon the new assessment total, a gain of 85¢ to \$1.25 has been unofficially discussed.

Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, superintendent of schools, told the Board on Monday night that the entire budget has been the subject of three months work and represents the minimum amount necessary. The Board itself went over every individual code and category, concluding the final touches last Saturday.

## CUT CLERK DOWN

As a final touch, The Board on Monday night revised the appropriation for salary of District Clerk. Earlier in the month the amount had been increased from \$2000 to \$2800. It is now reduced to \$2160.

The recreation question will probably come up at the annual

meeting on Tuesday night, May 7, at the High School when the entire budget is voted upon. The sum of \$20,000 was voted into the budget, conditioned upon a referendum, at the annual meeting last year. It does not appear in the new budget.

Instructional services account for \$3,287,899.74 of the gross budget, more than 50 per cent. Codes on maintenance of grounds are also increased. Maintenance is up from \$30,000 to \$97,769.51 while debt service has zoomed from \$720,299 to \$1,072,267.60.

night that the order to shut the additions for an estimated two weeks while the type of fire doors were replaced had been timed to coincide with the school district elections of next Wednesday.

The Old Country Rd door situation was placed before the board almost two weeks ago and new doors are being fabricated. It is reported that the correct type doors were specified in the construction

contract and that doors at the other schools where temporary additions are established conform entirely with the fire insurance rating requirements.

All Board members voted aye to have the fire dept make an inspection of all school structures as soon as possible.

Voting to close the 12 classrooms housing 30 students each were Kent, Cawley, Mabel Farley, Robert Eaton and Arthur Ehrlich. Voting against the directive were Szendy and Carpenter who insisted that the safety of the children was not the issue and that unnecessary fear and concern was being generated.

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# Szendy Views Candidates

HICKSVILLE--Emil J. Szendy of 8 Walnut Lane, member of the Board of Education and its president, today urged the election of Jerry Zetler, Robert Goodrich and Herb Johnson to the Board of Education on May 8th.

Discussing the candidates, Szendy pointed out:

## Peck's Bad Boy

"Rotund Sol Zimmerman played Peck's Bad Boy at the polling places, Saturday. As taxpayers registered for the school and library elections on May 7th and 8th, Zimmerman, a candidate for the School Board, was his usual belligerent and non-conformist self, publicizing his candidacy at and within the polling places instead of following the accepted rule of no electioneering within 100 feet thereof.

"Mr. Zimmerman's leaflet distributors flanked the doorways; Mr. Zimmerman himself invaded the hallways; Mr. Zimmerman sat with the registrars. Mr. Zimmerman was itching and hoping for trouble, he begged to be arrested. After all, what better publicity for a candidate, especially Mr. Zimmerman?

"To Mr. Zimmerman, some publicly accepted rules mean nothing. Can you imagine Mr. Zimmerman on the School Board?

## Running Mates

"Zimmerman and Kent are running mates. They are teamed together on leaflets distributed by one of those organizations having neither identifiable members, nor officers, nor by-laws which appeared overnight and are sponsoring Kent and Zimmerman for the School Board. Mr. Zimmerman,

either by accident or design, has not been critical of Mr. Kent in recent months. But back in January he had this to say, with considerable justification:

"Trustee Kent, without Board approval or authorization, ordered the School Transportation Officer, Mrs. Caesar, to issue a bus pass to a non-resident of this District. This is ward heel politicking, reminiscent of Tammany Hall at its worst."

"We would suggest that Mr. Kent come from behind the skirt of the East Meadow school girl. The skirt is not big enough to hide, simultaneously, the inaptitude and callous indifference of the East Meadow School Board and Trustee Kent's malfeasance!"

"About this matter, Mr. Kent had the following to say:

## Bus Incident

"Regarding a further statement that Mrs. Caesar had been directed to provide unauthorized transportation on a crowded bus by Trustee Kent, such is not the true truth. Mr. Szendy did not see fit to ask an 'elected public official' about the matter and accepted the word of a salaried employee. This action is unwarranted; in fact, action similar to this had so aroused the ire of the five trustees, that they requested information from the State Education Dept. at Albany whether the President could be removed from office."

"Mr. Kent thereby served notice on all salaried employees of the School District, on all cleaners, custodians, teachers, principals, directors and administrators, that he, Kent, an 'elected public official', was a superior being, and

his veracity, when matched against the veracity of any salaried employee, could not and should not be questioned.

"On any matter, Mr. Kent was right and told the truth; all others were, at least, mistaken."

"The ruling majority of the School Board, Messrs. Kent, Eaton,

This is an unusually quiet election, probably because there has been a general lack of the kind of controversy which raged in the press a year ago. However, the decisions made by the voters next Wednesday, May 8th, are just as important even though they may appear on the surface to lack the strong issues and open conflict.

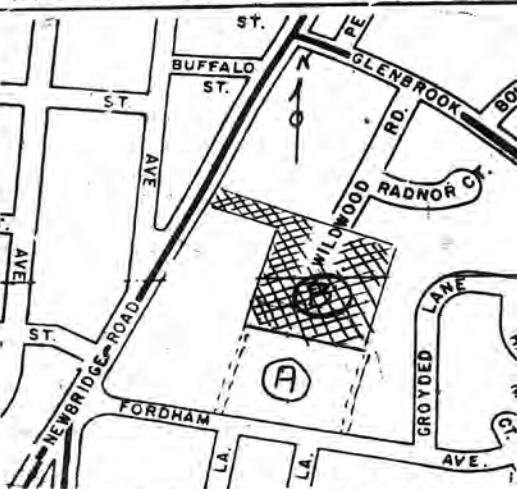
The Mid Island HERALD finds the comment of Trustee Allen S. Carpenter, in a recent letter, fits the situation: "Our school board (and district) would benefit by the services of Robert Goodrich, Jerome Zettler and Herbert Johnsen. We believe that these men would work for a reasonable balance between our vision and desire for the best in education and our community's ability and willingness to pay. We feel that a calm and more reasonable educational atmosphere, more conducive to the educational process, would be maintained with their help."

We have urged the election of Mr Goodrich and Mr Zettler in previous elections. We are proud to add Mr Johnsen to the list of people we feel can do the kind of job on the School Board that the community wants and needs.

The antics of the other candidates, with the exception of Mr Hester who is a total unknown and has never previously shown any interest in the affairs of the school district, are too well-known to require amplification at this time.

Regarding the business this week of shuffling around hundreds of students without apparent reasonable justification, it might be said: People who panic have no place on our Board of Education.

Vote for Mr Johnsen, Mr Goodrich and Mr Zettler.

Only by such relationship can a District run smoothly and efficiently.
