## New Board Trustees Take Office July 1

HICKSVILLE---Three new trustees will take office as members of the Board of Education on July 1. Robert Goodrich, Herbert Johnsen and Jerry Zettler were elected with overwhelming majorities at the annual district election last week on Wednesday. They will succeed Joseph Cawley, Mabel R. Farley and Elwood S. Kent Sr whose terms expire on June 30. Cawley and Miss Farley were not candidates for re-election.

Voters also gave their approval to all propositions on the voting machines. The complete tally of votes by school election district is published in this issue of the HERALD on page two.

The official tally of votes indicated 100 more votes for both Goodrich and Zettler than the unofficial tally published in the HERALD last week as a bulletin.

The election was the third in the district in which candidates supported actively by the Hicksville Citizens for Better Government in School Affairs were successful. Three candidates backed by the Hicksville Citizens were victors a year ago in May, one out of two candidates won in a special election last August and three were victors last week.

Kent and Francis Hester had the open support of Trustees Cawley, Farley and Robert D. P. Eaton. Goodrich, Johnsen, and Zettler were publicly supported by Board President Emil J. Szendy and Trustee Allen S. Carpenter.

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## CURRENT COMMENT: Let's Reopen 12 Classrooms

THE FAILURE of the current majority of Hicksville Board of Education to act and reopen the so-called "temps" - eight classrooms at Old Country Road and four at Lee Ave School - is difficult to understand. By 5 to 2 decision on April 29, the 12 classrooms were closed to pupil occupancy because of an insurance question.

Immediately an official inspection of the structures was made by the County Fire Marshal's office and our local fire department. Both agencies stated flatly, the classrooms are safe for use and occupancy. Subsequently, Knapp and Johnson, the school architects, reviewed the issue point by point, and also insisted the structures are perfectly safe for use.

This week Don L. Essex, head of the State Education Dept division of Buildings and Grounds at Albany, stated flatly: "I wish to say that we consider your new movable classrooms adequate in relation to fire hazards. If we had not, we would not have issued the Commissioners' approval for the plans nor would we have reported on them favorably in the Bulletin to the Schools for January 1957."

Twelve classrooms housing about 360 students are standing empty. The pupils involved have been dispersed among other school buildings in the district. Bus schedules have been disrupted.

A proposal that the rooms be reopened was on the agenda of the Board meeting, Monday night. Four members absented themselves before the subject could be acted upon and the meeting adjourned for lack of a quorum. No special meeting is in immediate prospect and the next regular Board meeting is May 27, almost two weeks hence.

The action of the Board of Education in closing the "temps" was a factor in the election of three trustees last week. The vote, we believe, gave evidence of public temper on the subject. Three "lame duck" trustees will continue to sit on the Board until June 30. On July 1 the newly elected trustees take office.

No question of child safety is involved. Every temporary or movable classroom has its own individual exterior exit. These buildings can be emptied faster than the permanent buildings to which they are attached. The "fire doors" discussed in connection with this matter are the doors at the point where the permanent building and the temporary building are joined. These doors are not fire exits.

The fire rating people want doors which will hold back flames for three hours, while the doors now installed are rated for an hour and a half. As has been pointed out by practically every important insurance broker, these doors are important in the matter of protecting the insurable value of the structures -- not the safety of pupils. Closing the rooms to use has not reduced the fire rates. Neither has the posting of round-the-clock fire guards.

There is nothing on the record to warrant the continued closing of these 12 classrooms. On the other hand, there is official evidence from four authoritative sources in the hands of the Board of Education to demand prompt action in permitting the children to return to their normal routines and educational schedules.

## Cass Explains H.O.P.E. Aims

To the Editor:  
A recent editorial in a local paper (not the Herald-Editor) announced itself to be "a thinly veiled indictment of the Hicksville Organization for Public Education, which was founded for noble purposes, but which we believe has taken the nobility more seriously than the purpose."

Specifically, the editorial accuses H.O.P.E., as representative of "pro-education forces" in the community, of adopting, "a pose of near neutrality" in the recent school board election and of appearing "to take a certain pride in their ability to stay out of the battle." And it sums up its indictment: "non-partisan, yes; election wise, ineffective."

We welcome this interest in the improvement of Hicksville's schools and in H.O.P.E. as a representative though by no means the only one--of the "pro-education forces" in town. The editorial, however, displays some confusion concerning the organization and its stated purposes, which briefly are:

1. To obtain and publicize facts concerning the school district.
2. To encourage citizen participation in public school affairs.
3. To promote relevant studies of the educational process as it affects our children.

4. To cooperate, as an independent organization, with the school board and the school authorities in our mutual efforts for better education.

H.O.P.E. intends to work and fight for issues which will further the cause of good education. (Our by-laws place no restriction on action by the organization.) However, we believe that the first job to be done is to arouse the uninterested and stimulate study of issues by the ill-informed. H.O.P.E. tries to bring together people of varied points of view, to talk out their differences in friendly fashion. We don't expect to eliminate all differences of opinion, but among those who differ, to substitute respect for distrust, positive action for personal recrimination. Our aim is to take the discussion of school affairs out of the realm of "the good guys vs. the bad guys."

Since its inception last August, H.O.P.E. has worked toward the fulfillment of these purposes. It has sponsored a forum of four college presidents to discuss problems pertaining to high schools and admission to college. It has conducted a school system survey, to be published in the fall. It has presented a talk by Paul Wooding, distinguished writer and educator, and finally, before the election, it sponsored a public meeting in which all seven of the school board candidates presented their views and answered the questions of the audience.

Four organizations are not notable for promoting lurid headlines because it does not waste time "foray minus hipboon" this is true because we respect the intelligence of the people of Hicksville too much to believe that this is what they want in an organization devoted to good education. Rather we believe that after we have presented all the information necessary and relevant to an issue, as objectively as we know how, the people of our community will vote finally for the kind of school board and school system that they de-

serve, demand, and expect.

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## Place Stone Despite Rain

The cornerstone of the new church of Our Lady of Mercy parish was laid Saturday, in a simple ceremony, at which the Rev. Louis A. Schwebius, Pastor, officiated, assisted by the Rev. Charles F. McGowan. Despite the inclement weather, many of the parishioners were present for this historic step in the development of the young parish which presently serves more than 2500 Catholic families in Hicksville and Plainview.

As the choir sang Arcadelt's, "Ave Maria," Father Schwebius and Father McGowan led the parish children in solemn procession about the new church carrying the metal container of parish mementos, which was later sealed and encased in the cornerstone for posterity.

The chosen articles included a newspaper account of the first parish Mass which was offered on October 18, 1953 in the converted Pelkowski barn - the old church. Also included was a small amount of soil taken from the ground upon which the new church stands, a list of the families paying parish pledges, a Miraculous medal commemorating the Immaculate Conception of the Mother of God, and a crucifix taken from the Communion rail of the old church. In a brief address, Father Schwebius expressed his own joy, which he knew was shared by all the parishioners on this happy occasion, and paid special tribute to Mr. and Mrs. John Pelkowski, whose generosity and constant concern had given the parish its start, made possible its three years of growth and brought it to this happy day.

Following the recitation of a specially designed prayer, Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament brought the ceremony to a close. While there is still much construction work to be done, the new church structure is being used for Sunday Masses in addition to the regular Masses at the old church. 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WOODBURY GARDENS

A petition has been filed with the Town of Oyster Bay by the Jolou Operating Corp., for the erection of garden apartments on the Coris Farm on Woodbury Rd., a half mile east of South Oyster Bay Rd.

A year ago the builders contemplated a shopping center on the same property but residents in the area reacted unfavorably because: (a) the area is over-retailed, (b) two streets opening on Woodbury Rd extra-hazardous to school children, (c) traffic would include heavy trucking daily (d) shopping center is not in keeping with the general residential character of the area.

The property which is zoned "G"

Business District has some of the following permitted uses: two family dwellings, hotels, lodging and rooming houses, minor garages, restaurants, bowling alleys, theatres, printing plants, and others. In order to keep the goodwill of the residents the builders acceded to their wishes and withdrew the plans, a spokesman said.

In petitioning for the special permit use for garden apartments, the builders' attorney Edmund J. Blance, stated objections are overcome because only one road will open onto Woodbury Rd., there will be a minimum of traffic, the proposed buildings will be spaced attractively on sufficient acreage and will avoid the hazard of over

development.

Plans call for 86 apartments, 70 with one bedroom and 16 with two bedrooms. An interior plot will be set aside for a play area and park.

If the petition for garden apartments is denied, no new application for the same relief may be for a period of one year, so that the builders must put into effect their original plans for a shopping center, according to their attorney.
