HICKSVILLE--The Old Country Road School Parent-Teacher Assoc. and the Hicksville Citizens for Better Government in School Affairs, as separate organizations, this week individually urged the Board of Education to rescind its order of April 29 and permit the use of temporary-type classrooms "since expert testimony proves that no fire hazards exist which affect the lives of children occupying the facilities." The subject is on the agenda for the Board of Education meeting next Monday night, May 27, in the high school faculty cafeteria.

The P-TA resolution was adopted unanimously at its meeting on May 15 with about 400 members present. It noted that "overlapping time schedules, transfer of class locations and in particular class consolidations have subjected the children to a curtailment of non-classroom teaching practices as well as being unreasonably deprived of the use of the facilities voted by the residents of this district for their educational benefit."

### Authoritatively Approved

The Hicksville Citizens urged that the Board reopen the eight classrooms at Old Country and four at Lee Ave because "the use of these structures have been authoritatively approved. There is no danger or hazard to the children involved."

Early this week, Fire Dept. Chief B. Medard Offenloch and two deputy county fire inspectors checked all the temporary type classrooms in the district and declared them safe for student occupancy.

On Monday, students in the Dutch Lane and Burns Ave temporary type classes were placed in the main buildings. The heating systems in both temps were disconnected over the weekend to replace the flues by agreement between the School Architect and General Contractors at no expense to the district and "to avoid further controversy".

The work on the flues was not

completed by Monday morning and with the unseasonal temperature below 60 degrees, the children were moved out of the additions until the furnaces were reconnected. A spokesman for the School District said the work has been completed.

Board President Emil J. Szendy said that efforts to call a special meeting of the Board last Monday night to act upon the closed classes was unsuccessful since not enough Board members were agreeable to calling a special.

Sullivan is a resident of Hicksville. A member of veteran organizations, he was a combat crew member on an Air Force B-29 in the Pacific Area in World War II.

Since this is a Special Election, a MAJORITY vote is necessary for election, that is over 50% of all votes cast, it was emphasized.
