NEXT THURSDAY, May 30, is Memorial Day and we believe the bulletin of the William M. Gouse Jr. VFW this week sums up the importance of our participation.

There are 525,600 minutes of 8,760 hours in a year. Lots of time to live. The honored dead of the Spanish American War, World War I, World War II and the Korean conflict loved living too,




