Suspend 16 Teachers In HS Strike

BETHPAGE—Sixteen teachers of the high school have been suspended without pay "until further notice" and substitutes have been hired by the Board of Education as the result of the strike on Wednesday, May 29, when about 800 students left their classes and declined to return that date.

The School Board in a special meeting, Friday, officially declared the incident a "strike" and so notified the Commissioner of Education.

The Board reviewed the matter with Walter Crewson, associate commissioner, on Sunday and

Crewson held a meeting with the faculty, Monday night.

Classes resumed on Monday morning and have continued since. There was a slight incident at noon, Monday, when a group of students took up a position across the street and set up a chant.

A special assembly of grades 9 thru 12 was held Monday addressed

by Thomas Strahan and Robert Olson, president and vice president of the student council; Supervising Principal Victor L. Miller, HS Principal Fiedler; Board Vice President William Benintendi and Ann Kelly, HS P-TA president. About 900 were at the assembly.

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PLANNING COMMISSION FINDS Traffic Congestion Is Our No. 1 Problem

MINEOLA -- Traffic congestion in the central business district of Hicksville is "the one serious problem" confronting the community, according to a new study of land use, the growth and future development of Hicksville just released by the Nassau County Planning Commission. The study comments upon the fortunate position of the community by having a "balance in the ratio" of industrial to residential land use.

Among the other findings of the Planning Commission are these: As many people moved into Hicksville in the past 10 years as were located in the entire town of Oyster Bay in 1938. A total of 34,300 persons moved into Hicksville to occupy 9,798 new residences since 1946.

The population grew from 10,405 in 1950 to 40,167 in 1955, an increase of 286 percent. During the same period, the Township increased 174.8 per cent and Nassau County, 59.3 percent.

"Hicksville has the largest and most diversified industrial area of any district in Nassau."

Also Hicksville today has the highest total assessed valuation in the Township with Massapequa second and Farmingdale third.

1500 MORE HOMES

The study also finds there are 591 acres of land in Hicksville which is still vacant of which 157 acres are industrial and 84 business. The Planning Commission reports that a total of 1,510 additional homes can be built in the community of which 500 would be built on parcels that have already been subdivided.

out that some, for one reason or another, will never be built upon. These 1,500 new dwellings, if completed, would increase the population by some 5,300 people.

The possible development of Press Wireless acreage into home sites comes in for considerable attention from the Planning Commission. It has been estimated that nearly 700 homes could be erected in the North West area.

Discussing Hicksville's no. 1 problem, the Commission reports: "While its street system was satisfactory for the horse and buggy and adequate for autos even as late as 1945, development during the past decade has made its street pattern obsolete.

"An overall study of the area should be considered with care given to the following: Careful selection of additional parking fields along with a complete rezoning study; possible relocation of the RR station, larger commuter parking fields, and, finally, the elimination of certain grade crossings."

One of the 16 suspended teachers released the following statement to the HERALD, Tuesday:

"After meeting with a Assoc. Commissioner of Education, Walter Grewson, the teachers who were suspended by the Board of Education, have offered their services to conduct review classes with their students on weekends as a gesture of good faith to the community. These teachers are willing to cooperate with the board and civic associations to effect this program."

The episode began last week on Wednesday morning when it was learned that two teachers would not be recommended for tenure status by District Superintendent John Childs. Rumblings were heard about the building and at about noon 16 students walked out and 16 teachers, since suspended, "vacated their posts."

Grewson has declined to comment for the press regarding his meetings with the teachers and school board pending his formal report to State Commissioner Allen at Albany.

Extra Sirens To Give Warnings

HICKSVILLE - The Board of Fire Commission announced today the adoption of a recommendation made by the County Office of Civil Defense, relating to the installation of additional sirens in the area.

The recommendations were made following the completion of a CD study indicating the "inadequacy" of siren coverage in many local communities. The study upon which the report was predicated

showed that Hicksville, among others, enjoyed but ten percent of the siren coverage considered necessary to give adequate warning of fire or pending attack.

The recommendations which have been adopted call for the installation of additional or stronger sirens at the following points: Fire Headquarters, East Marie St.; New Fire House at Briggs Ave. near Woodbury Road; South Oyster Bay Road between Tudor Ave. and

E. L. R. R.; Jerusalem Ave. and Park Place; Duffy Ave. and Combs St.; Water Works Property on Newbridge Road and located between Ball Park Lane and Hempstead Ave.

It is estimated that the total cost of the project will be approximately \$9,000 for which the Fire District will receive from the CD reimbursement of approximately \$4,500.

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28 More Votes on Proposition Than Ballots for Candidates

HICKSVILLE --- A summary of votes cast in the annual school district election confirmed a trend indicated in the HERALD last week. The voters cast more ballots on Proposition no. 2, the sale of property to Holy Family Church, than for any single group of candidates. Last week's issue indicated the voting in Old Country Rd district.

There were a total of 4,191 votes cast on proposition no. 2, or 28 more than the 4,163 cast in the Kent-Zettler contest which aroused the most interest. There were 4,140 votes in the three-way Zimmerman-DeShaw-Goodrich race and 4,097 in the Hester-Johnsen contest.

Votes cast on the other propositions were: No. 1, 934; No. 3, 3,795; No. 4, 3,795; and No. 5, 3,709. Proposition no. 2 was approved, with 3,641 yes and 730 no. Zettler, Goodrich and Johnsen were the successful candidates for the Board and will take office on July 1 for three-year terms each.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Education adopted May 14th, 1957, a special district meeting of the qualified voters of Union Free School District No. 21 of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, will be held in the auditorium of the Broadway School, Bethpage, Town of Oyster Bay, New York, in said school district on June 22nd, 1957, at 10:00 o'clock a.m. (DST) for the purpose of voting upon the proposition set forth below, and for the election of members to the office of member of the Board of Education. The voting will be by ballot on The voting machines as prescribed by the Education Law and the polls will remain open until 9:00 o'clock p.m. (DST) and as much longer as may be necessary to enable the voters then present to cast their ballots.

PROPOSITION

(a) That the Board of Education of Union Free School District No. 21 of the Town of Oyster Bay in the County of Nassau, New York, is hereby authorized to acquire by purchase or condemnation a site of a new elementary school, a certain piece or parcel of land containing 5.5 acres more or less, situated on the west side of Bloomingdale Road, approximately 1100 feet southerly from the corner formed by the intersection of Broadway and Bloomingdale Road, Bethpage, in said District, described on the Land and Tax Map of the County of Nassau as Lot 442, Section 46, Block 8, heretofore designated as the site of such elementary school pursuant to resolution adopted by the Board of Education on April 8th, 1957, at an estimated maximum cost of \$135,000, including preliminary costs of surveys, maps, plans, estimates and hearings, and costs incidental thereto and the financing thereof;

(b) That a tax is hereby voted for the foregoing specific object or purpose in the amount of not exceeding \$135,000 to be levied and collected in installments in such years and in such amounts as may be determined by the Board of Education;
