OYSTER BAY - The Town Board this week denied the petition of John Goetelmann and Harry Broadwin for a special permit use to erect and maintain garden apartments on the east side of Broadway approximately 120 feet north of Marvin Ave., Hicksville.

Ban Lawn Sprinkling As Mid-Island Melts

Cooperation of homeowners in their observation of lawn sprinkling rules during the current heat wave as local temperatures soaring up to nearly 100 degrees was urged by water works officials.

Bethpage has no restrictions on use of water "right now", but district officials urge residents to use common sense and caution.

Hicksville district prohibits all lawn sprinklers and irrigation daily from 11 AM to 7 PM. Residents south of Old Country Rd are permitted to sprinkle on odd numbered days of the month (such as Friday, June 21) and those north of Old Country Rd on even numbered days (ie. today, June 20). Officials urge that all lawn sprinklers be turned off when the fire signal is sounded to assure maximum pressure for fire fighting.

Jericho Water District issue the following notice effective immediately: "water may be used for sprinkling, irrigating and pools south of Jericho Tpke on even calendar days and north of Jericho Tpke on odd-calendar days between the hours of 12 midnight and 10 AM only."

Plainview Water District called this week for continued volunteer cooperation by residents by restricting all lawn sprinkling between the hours of 11 AM and 8 PM. Fire dept sound trucks have been riding the streets of the community advising residents of the existing water problems.

Lame Duck Trustees Push Policy Changes

HICKSVILLE -- Another special meeting of the Board of Education has been called for tomorrow (Fri) night to continue consideration of changes and additions to the teacher personnel policy being promoted largely by "lame duck" members of the Board whose official terms of office expire in 10 days.

A special meeting was called for last Monday night by four members, three of whom will be off the Board on the last day of this month. At the session the "employees relation committee" consisting of Mabel F. Farley as chairman with Joseph F. Cawley and Robert D. P. Eaton, pulled for enactment of (1) enlarged sick

and religious leave plan for teachers, (2) revised sabbatical leave policy, (3) veteran credit for teachers who gained their certificates after military service, (4) Social Security coverage retroactive six quarters, and (5) merit salary scale clearance for 25 teachers having normal school training.

The terms of Miss Farley, Cawley and Elwood S. Kent expire on June 30. Robert Goodrich, Herbert Johnson and Jerry Zettler, elected in May, take office on July 1. The Board is scheduled to reorganize the first Tuesday in July.

At Monday's meeting it was voted that all teachers who have served the school district 10 years or more "be exempt from limiting requirements of bachelor degree or hours beyond such degree, under the present pay scale, enabling them to advance with normal compliance with other merit requirements."

Eaton, Carpenter, Miss Farley and Emily Szendy voted aye, while Arthur L. Ehrlich, Cawley and Kent abstained.

An expanded sick leave policy was adopted at the same session with Eaton, Cawley, Farley and Carpenter voting aye; Ehrlich and Kent abstaining and Szendy, no.

Those Sirens Are Saving Lives

THE RECENT INSTALLATION of new and additional sirens about the community to give Hicksville notice of air raid alerts as well as incidental call for volunteer firemen in time of emergency has produced a curious reaction.

Instead of being pleased with the fact that every corner of the district will be fully warned in time of grave peril, the Board of Fire Commissioners are being plagued with complaints.

A recent survey by the Civil Defense disclosed that adequate warning of a CD red alert -- an impending air raid or other grave emergency -- was only audible to a small segment of the community. Readings were taken with devices which measure the volume of noise.

As a result, a share-cost program was worked out between the Fire Commissioners and CD to provide more sirens. In some cases, existing sirens were replaced with more powerful noise makers.

The CD alarm is set off in Hicksville automatically from county CD headquarters. It consists of a continuous series of short blasts or rising and falling wails of the siren.

Hicksville has an elaborate alarm system, one of the most detailed in the county. With a network of more than 100 alarm boxes in all sections of the district, coded signals can be sounded to give notice of the area of an alarm. This is important to volunteer firemen who frequently go directly from their homes directly to the scene when an alarm is received.

Unfortunately, false alarms contribute to the number of non-essential sounding of the sirens. It would appear to us that those who complain about the blast of the sirens might wonder what they might do to curb the number of false fire calls and thus eliminate some of the nuisance of the sirens.

Volunteer firemen and others concerned with emergencies hear the sounding of the alarms with dread and apprehension. As the sirens cry out, lives and property are probably in danger. Be glad we have the sirens and the firemen with their equipment --- and then hope and pray they never have to be used.

Noble-Davenport Nuptials

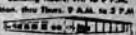

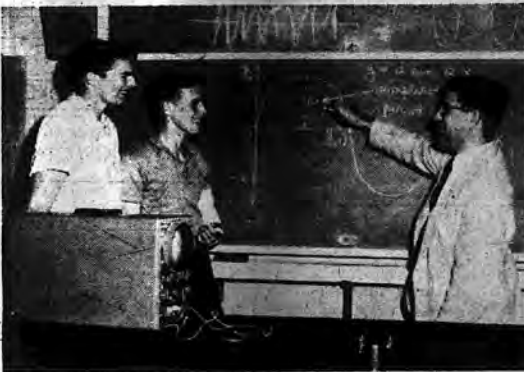

Water Supply Hazards Told

The health of the general public in Nassau could be threatened unless everyone obeys regulations of the local water districts relative to lawn sprinkling, Dr. Ealre G. Brown, health commissioner, warned.

Depletion of the water supply sets up possible health hazards through the creation of low pressure in the water systems, which could lead to serious pollution of the water, and through the lack of necessary water for drinking, bathing and toilet facilities, Dr. Brown points out.

"Surveys show that there is plenty of water in the underground supply but this does not help when the various systems are unable to draw the water fast enough to meet peak loads," said Dr. Brown. "Low pressure results when the public uses water faster than a system can pump it. This is when the danger begins."

Back-siphonage due to low pressure creates the most critical danger to public health, according to the health commissioner. This means that the water is depleted in the supply lines and a vacuum is produced. This can cause polluted water from sanitary facilities in homes and business places to be sucked into the public water lines and creates the possibility of impurities from industrial plants getting into the public mains.

Dr. Brown has sent a letter to each of the 48 public water supplies in Nassau County requesting that officials start chlorination of their water system when low pressure conditions arise. Because of the varying conditions in the 48 water districts Dr. Brown has requested officials of each district to determine themselves when low pressure exists and when chlorination should be started.
