## NOBODY SEEMS TO KNOW

# BROADWAY WIDENING DAYS OR YEARS AWAY

**HICKSVILLE** -- The complete lack of authoritative information regarding the status of major State road widening projects in this community, principally the North Broadway program, is the subject of grave concern among community leaders and property owners, it was learned this week. A substantial slice of property is scheduled to be taken by the State of New York on the east side of North Broadway from John St north to and beyond Mid Island Plaza.

Initially it was understood, on the basis of data available at the office of the State Dept. of Public Works at Babylon, that the project would get underway in February or March of this year. Surveyors or crews have been on the scene, the location of water main and other utility services under the highway have been marked out with yellow paint dabs, but official word on the plans of the State Dept. remains elusive.

### MONTHS OR YEARS?

A spokesman for the Chamber of Commerce told the **HERALD** that he has written to the State Engineer and State Public Works Commissioner without success. Property owners along the east side of North Broadway are unable to find out if the work will begin in a matter of months, or as one source indicates, a matter of years.

Almost as much concern has been expressed, over the years, regarding the State plans for the widening of Newbridge Road with a new loop cutting across the LIRR just west of the depot thru a por-

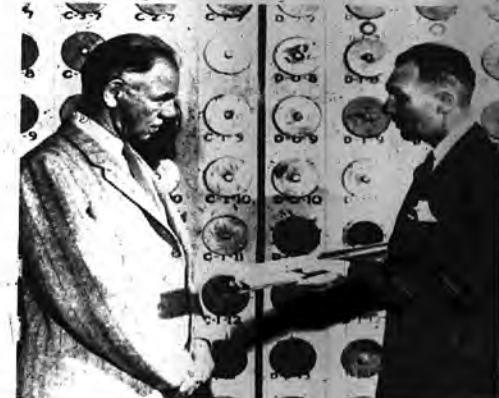

Another special election will have to be held for the two year term, none of the three candidates for the seat having received a majority of votes cast. Lorraine Carter received 282, Leon Lunden 502 and Richard Tilley 434.

The proposal on the acquisition of the Bloomingdale site was defeated 535 to 462.

## School Board Starts New Chapter Tuesday

**HICKSVILLE** -- Three new members will take their seats on the Board of Education at the annual

reorganization meeting in the high school faculty cafeteria next Tuesday night, July 2 at 8:30 PM. Robert Goodrich, Herbert Johnson and Jerry Zettler, who were elected at the annual election in May, will replace Joseph F. Cawley, Mabel R. Farley and Elwood S. Kent Sr.

Emil J. Szendy, concluding his first year as president of the Board, is expected to be re-elected to that position when the board meets. Also to be elected are a Vice President, currently Arthur L. Eirich, and a secretary, now Robert D. P. Eaton. Observers anticipate that neither Eirich nor Eaton will be able to muster enough votes for re-election as Board officers.

At the same session, the following positions for the new fiscal year will be filled: School Attorney, now Harry Goebel; School Auditor, currently Herbert Purick; District Clerk, now Fred J. Noeth and District Treasurer, currently Aurelio S. Gelardi.

Probably the last meeting for the present Board will take place tomorrow (Friday) night to act upon payment of miscellaneous bills.

"Lame Duck" members Kent and Cawley proposed at the meeting on Monday that the new High School be renamed the Mabel R. Farley High School. Kent made the motion and Cawley seconded the motion. The vote was: Kent, Cawley and Eaton, aye; Szendy, Carpenter and Eirich, no; Farley, abstained.

DURING WORLD WAR II, Hicksville and vicinity did itself proud in the operation of a local recreation centre for servicemen. The present Boslet store on Herzog Place, with the cooperation of everyone, was fixed up with comfortable furniture, dancing and snack facilities to provide a place of relaxation of a group of army men who were then stationed out in the "potato patch."

The Army had a top-secret radar installation on South Oyster Bay Road about opposite the present day location of the new Our Lady of Mercy R. C. Church. Up to 50 men were assigned there and they appreciated the servicemen's canteen established largely for their benefit altho all military personnel were welcome.

Today in the Jericho-Brookville area, the Army has a Niki Base. (The Army likes to call the location Hicksville for some reason). About 100 men are attached to this station of the artillery and they have little in the way of transportation or recreation. American Red Cross units in Hickville, Sea Cliff and Glen Cove are trying to ease this situation and last night they sponsored a dance for the men at the base.

The servicemen on duty on a wooded hill are now building a patio for dancing and would appreciate donations of building materials and furniture. Contributions of all useful articles are appreciated.

The Red Cross is also trying to provide the boys with coffee breaks featuring home made cake. Wednesday morning is Hicksville day at the Niki base and all church and fraternal organizations in our community who would like to donate cakes (as well as the other items for that patio) are asked to call Mrs Joseph J. Ulmer, Hicksville Red Cross branch chairman, at WE11s 1-0020 who will arrange for pickups and delivery to the base.

Many of those 100 men are fellows from all parts of our nation. We would like to see our home town boys made to feel welcome wherever they may be stationed across the world, so let's set a good example in our town.

# Plainedge School Budget Up for 3rd Time

To the Editor:  
We have often wondered what it takes to wake up the taxpayer these days. Recently Plainedge voted down its school budget for the second time. Since then silly propaganda has appeared in papers and has spread through the schools by even the teachers trying to frighten the children with the awful consequences as a result of their parents voting down the budget: a budget which contained several unnecessary items that could be eliminated until such time as our educational needs have caught up with the tremendous growth of school age children.

We refer to such items as Adult Education, Summer Recreation and one-half mile school radius transportation. Educate our children and get our schools to a leveling point first, then give consideration to adult education. Summer recreation is not absolutely necessary, or is it actually available to all children of all ages, either by choice or accessibility. Let those who intend to use these two items pay for them. And, waiving one half mile or its equivalent of 8 blocks, will hurt no one. Reading is the big problem of this school district. It is surprising the number of children who have reached the 8th grade and even higher who cannot read. At this point, we find in order to catch up, they must be sent to another school district at an additional cost to the taxpayer to get remedial reading, which should be taught in our own schools.

This seems to be as much a disgrace as being given the choice as to whether or not the present day student wants to take a Regents. A short while back, if a subject was a Regents subject, everyone took the Regents, regardless of future College attendance. The only choice came in whether or not to take the subject at all with regard to possible College attendance. This is evidently one way of getting around the bad publicity of last year when some 70 or 80 students couldn't pass a certain Regents. Now in order to keep this fact from the people and Albany, the doubtfuls receive notices to return, signed by the parent, advising that it is unnecessary for the child to take the Regents. Then when questioned the school is protected by producing the so-called slip signed by parent agreeing that Johnny Jones shall not have to take Regents.

Well - we'll see to it that our take them all as they come alone. If they fail, let Albany know. If everyone did this perhaps Albany could find the answers that we seem to be unable to. Perhaps these answers would reduce the inadequacies of our present day education in Plainedge and give our boys and girls a chance to graduate with at least a fair amount of knowledge behind that Diploma.

The fact that the budget was voted down twice, is proof that the people of our area are tired of being hood-winked into these unnecessary items year after year. We certainly hope that the majority will stick to their decision and not be scared into insensibility by the propaganda floating around these days. Remember, Education is Law and will be provided for accordingly. Now, because a handful of people have already become panicky and are stirred up by the teachers' pressure on their children, a petition has been circulated in order that the original budget be presented again for vote. There are still enough of us who will continue to vote down this PAIDED BUDGET until such time as these unnecessary items are removed so as to give us one which is truly for the education of our children and not for the entertainment of the parents.

## Sign Exchange With Plaza

NEW YORK CITY -- Closing of the exchange of properties between Mid Island Plaza and the Hicksville School District, authorized by the voters of the district in May, took place on June 18, here, in the office of School Attorney Harry H. Goebel.

Among the achievements for the school district as a result of the signing were the following:

Mid Island Shopping Plaza paid the School District \$16,000; Mid Island Plaza signed a declaration covenanting that York, Prose and Windsor Streets would be kept closed to vehicular traffic and the school district has the right of injunction for violation of this covenant.

Also, the Plaza signed a restrictive covenant prohibiting the

creation of maintenance of a public nuisance which would detrimentally affect the operation of Burns Ave. School. Further, the Plaza must erect a rustic-bound sapling fence six feet high along the northerly and easterly boundary of the property exchanged.

Goebel noted, in a report to the Board of Education this week, that "involved in the closing was the 'spreading' of the \$9,500,000 mortgage over Parcel 1. This does not directly affect the district since the 'spreading' was subsequent to our restrictive covenant."

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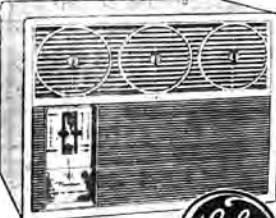

tion of Sackett St. and for the widening of South Broadway from Old Country Road down to Grumman's.

While correspondence from the State Dept. indicates a lack of funds for some of these projects, it is also noted that money seems to be available when and if the State decides to act. Cited as an example is the proposed highway rerouting in Manhattan's Miracle Mile area when the community is opposed to a state program but the state appears determined to go thru with its project.

In contrast, in this community where the demand is for action to relieve local traffic congestion the State appears to be reluctant to move.

As a property owner on North Broadway told the HERALD this week: "We know the widening is necessary and we are not opposed, but we want to know when it is going to happen and how can we find out? We can't make plans to remodel or relocate, as long as this agonizing indecision hangs over us"

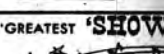
