# NOBODY SEEMS TO KNOW OADWAY WIDENING YS OR YEARS AW

HICKSVILLE -- The complete lack of authorative information regarding the status of major State road widening projects in this community, principally the North Broadway program, is the subject of grave concern among community leaders and property owners, it was learned this week. A substantial slice of property is scheduled to be taken by the State of New York on the east side of North Broadway from John St north to and beyond Mid Island Plaza.

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North Broadway from Jon Initially it was understood, on the basis of date svallable at the office of the State Dept, of Public Works at Babylon, that the project would get underway in February or March of this year. Surveyons' crewshave been on the scene, the location of water main and other utility services under the highway have been marked out with yellow paint darbs, but official word on the plans of the State Dept. re-mains ellusive.



DURING WORLD WAR II, Hicksville and vicinity did itself proud in the operation of a local recreation centre for servicemen. The present Boslet store on Herzog Place, with the cooperation of everyone, was fixed up with comfortable furniture, dancing and snack. facilities to provide a place of relaxation of a group of army men who were then stationed out in the "potato patch."

The Army had a top-secret radar installation on South Oyster Bay Road about opposite the present day location of the new Our Lady of Mercy R. C. Church. Up to 50 men were assigned there and they appreciated the servicemen's canteen established largely for their benefit altho all military personnel were welcome.

Today in the Jericho-Brookville area, the Army has a Niki Base. (The Army likes to call the location Hicksville for some reason). About 106 men are attached to this station of the artillery and they have little in the way of transportation or recreation. American Red Cross units in Hicksville, Sea Cliff and Glen Cove are trying to ease this situation and last night they sponsored a dance for the men at the base.

The servicemen on duty on a wooded hill are now building a patio for dancing and would appreciate donations of building materials and furniture. Contributions of all useful articles are appreciated.

The Red Cross is also trying to provide the boys with coffee breaks featuring home made cake. Wednesday morning is Hicksville day at the Niki base and all church and fraternal organizations in our community who would like to donate cakes (as well as the other items for that patio) are asked to call Mrs Joseph J. Ulmer, Hicksville Red Cross branch chairman, at WElls 1-0020 who will arrange for pickups and delivery to the base.

Many of those 100 men are fellows from all parts of our nation. We would like to see our home town boys made to feel welcome wherever they may be stationed across the world, so let's set a good example in our town.
