CD Test Is Exception

FIRE OFFICIALS REDUCE SCREAMING OF SIRENS

HICKSVILLE -- The scream of sirens whenever a fire alarm is sounded will be cut almost in half, it was disclosed yesterday following a meeting of the Fire Commissioners acting upon the recommendation of the Chief's of the Fire Dept. The number of times around that the sirens go into action will be curtailed, experimentally. However, the community will get the full treatment of all sirens this Friday, July 12 when national Civil Defense alert takes place with public participation.

Public participation in the CD drill, this Friday will be limited to 15 minutes beginning at an undisclosed time early in the afternoon. All local sirens will be set into action by remote control from County CD headquarters in Mineola. For three minutes the "take cover" signal, rising and falling sound, will be heard. Thirteen minutes later the "alert signal" -- a three-minute steady blast -- will end the public take shelter period.

For CD volunteers the signal will start a 55 hour drill which concludes at 7 PM Sunday, July 14. Radio Station WHLI, Hempstead will broadcast a special program at 2 PM on Friday on its normal location of 11000 kilocycles, in an actual conelrad exercise, WHLI

would be heard at 1240 KC.

Fire officials stressed that they have no control over the alarms to be sounded for the CD drill. At all other times, however, the fire commissioners will try out the reduced sounding of sirens. If the shortened number of rounds for fire calls and other local emergencies fails to bring out the volunteers, the four-round system may have to be revived.

A spokesman for the fire district said yesterday that panic on the part of employees at the factory where a bad electrical fire was discovered at 2 o'clock Monday morning resulted in the repeated blowing of sirens. The alarm was pulled three times and finally had to be cut out manually.

Board Sets Meeting Every Friday

HICKSVILLE -- The School Board is holding regular meetings every Friday night at 8:30 in the high school faculty cafeteria and all proceedings are being tape recorded since the organizational meeting last week, when three new trustees took their seats. Only major change in the official "school family" was the designation of J. Arnold Witte as school attorney instead of Harry H. Goebel.

Witte Is New School Attorney

HICKSVILLE -- S. Arnold Witte of 7 Reiter Ave. is the new attorney of the school district succeeding Harry H. Goebel whose appointment expired with the start of the new 1957-58 school fiscal year.

Mr. and Mrs. Witte have been local residents for three years. Their daughter recently graduated from East St. School with a music medal and athletic commendation.

Mr. Witte is a graduate of Columbia College and Columbia Law School (1940). He was legislative analyst for the A. S. of Casualty and Surety Companies, a national organization; then assistant general counsel of U. S. Trucking Corp.

During the war he was in charge of regimental courts-martial section and investigations. After the war he was claims counsel and special assistant regional counsel to a government agency with headquarters in New York, after which he opened his own law office.

He is currently legislative and general counsel of Commerce and Industry A. S. of New York, the largest service chamber of commerce in the East and has held this position for almost six years.

Last winter he was made a member of the Industry and Labor Advisory Committee to the Joint State Legislative Committee on Revision of Corporation Laws. Senator Ed Speno of East Meadow is chairman of this advisory committee.

Mrs. Witte who won a prize for her painting at the Mineola Fair last year, recently exhibited some of her paintings at the Westbury gallery.

One of his first official acts for the school district was the closing

of title on the sale of the Wildwood Rd. School property to Holy Family RC Church, on Monday of this week, as authorized by the voters at the annual district meeting in May.

Emil J. Szendy was elected president, Allan Carpenter as vice president and new trustee Herbert H. Johnson as Board secretary.

Fred J. Noth was renamed as district clerk and Aurelio S. Gelardi was reappointed district treasurer. Action on the appointment of an auditor for the district has been deferred for the present.

Other formal action at the organizational meeting on July 2 included reappointment of Dr. Wallace E. Lamb as superintendent of schools at \$16,000, Donald Abt as assistant superintendent at \$11,840, Anthony Gorycyck as business administrator at \$9,000 and Richard H. Cairns as director of buildings and grounds at \$8,500. M. L. Chittenden was renamed as director of census and attendance at \$6,300.

Szendy, starting his sixth year on the Board of Education, was re-elected president of the Board with all trustees present voting yes, except Robert Eaton and Szendy who abstained. Arthur L. Ehrich had not arrived in time for this vote.

Eaton also abstained in the election of vice president and Board Secretary. The vote on district clerk was all in favor except Ehrich who voted no. All trustees voted yes on Gelardi's appointment.

The vote on a motion to reappoint Goebel as attorney at \$7,560 was Ehrich and Eaton, yes; Szendy and Goodrich, no; all others abstaining. The appointment of Witte was all in favor except Ehrich and Eaton who voted no and Johnson who abstained.

Factory Fire Sets Off Pre-Dawn Siren Binge

HICKSVILLE -- Probably the entire population of the community had a hot night's sleep interrupted shortly before 2 o'clock Monday morning when the community fire-CD sirens blasted 3-4-2-1, seven times around. Cause of the racket was the automatic alarm at the Plastic Material Co. plant at New South Rd. and Commercial St. which was set off by an electrical fire. The fire caused small damage to the plant but apparently triggered the repeat cycle on the alarm sirens until disconnected.

Several industrial plants in the community are connected to the alarm system with automatic devices which set off the sirens when water pressure in sprinklers drop below a certain point or where interior building pressures rise. At least one system includes a smoke detection device which also sounds the call.

Alarm signals in the district are coded and plants are on the four-cipher hookup. The alarms automatically repeat four times. Fire Dept. Chiefs and Commissioners were giving consideration this week to reducing the automatic rounds to two calls, particularly on long-number cycles.

12 GRASS FIRES

The week was an active one for volunteer firemen under Chief B. Medard Ofmeloch with 12 alarms for grass fires and other miscellaneous calls, including two out of town.

Sixty-seven local firemen and two pieces of apparatus responded to give a hand when Westbury firemen needed assistance on 4th

of July as a bowling alley on Irvin Ave. and other buildings were destroyed. The day before they helped Jericho combat a blazing hayfield and adjoining woods at Willet Ave. and West Moreland Rd.

Grass fires on July 2 were at Duffy Ave. and at Tile Lane and Newbridge Rd. July 5 called the firemen out four times for grass at Bethpage and Andrews Rd., Willet Ave. and West Moreland Rd. again, back to Andrews Rd.

Gas Heat Installation Gains

By September another 50,000 of LILCO's more than 300,000 gas customers will be converted to natural gas. The area being converted covers the South Central portion of Nassau.

"With gas heat there are other savings that make it your best heating value," Mr. Brezee stated. "These include the elimination of tanks or bins, annual service contracts on equipment and furnace cleaning. LILCO has a free service policy on equipment and makes no charge for this service; also, a budget billing plan is available on gas used."
