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School Bells Ring For Most On Sept 9

Thousands of mid-Island boys and girls are returning to classrooms during the first or second week of September. While Jericho resumes sessions on Wednesday, September 4, the public and parochial schools in Hicksville and Bethpage officially start classes on Monday morning, September 9.

In Hicksville nearly 6,000 school bus passes will be in the mails the first week in September. School bus stops are substantially the same as last year.

Hicksville Public School teachers will hold orientation and workshops September 4 to 6, according to Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, superintendent.

Extension of Strong St. Firehouse on Ballot

HICKSVILLE -- Construction of a \$25,000 addition to the Strong St firehouse is among six separate questions before voters of the fire district at the annual budget vote set for Tuesday night, Sept 3, it was learned today.

The budget for the district for the coming year totals \$116,000. The propositions include \$1000 for parades and drills, \$2000 for inspections, \$12,000 for purchase and installation of new equipment for the alarm system, and \$15,000 for the purchase of lands necessary to permit the construction, reconstruction, alteration, repair or extension of buildings suitable for the preservation, protection and storing of vehicles, apparatus and equipment of the Fire District, plus the \$25,000 for expansion of Strong St. headquarters.

Voting will take place, according to Fire Commission Secretary Bernard C. Schuster, at the E. Marie St. Firehouse on Sept. 3 between 7 PM and 10 PM. The full notice appears as a legal advertisement in this issue.

Traffic Lights For Hicksville

MINEOLA --- A traffic light will be installed at the busy intersection of Bethpage and Woodbury Roads, Hicksville, as soon as the contract has been awarded. The installation has been recommended by County Executive A. Holly Patterson following study of traffic movement by the Nassau County Police Dept.

Traffic lights have also been ordered for the following intersections on South Oyster Bay Road on the Hicksville Plainview boundary; Proehlich Farm Road, Virginia Ave., Adelphi Rd and Jamaica Ave. Another signal is also directed to be installed on Old Country Rd at New South Road.

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**Code Provides
 Safe Chimneys**

Safe all purpose chimneys were assured residents of the Township of Oyster Bay when, at a public hearing, the Town Board deleted a proposal which would have permitted a Type "B" vent. The Type "B" vent was deleted from amendments to the Plumbing Code after testimony from Oil Heat Institute of Long Island President, Patrick F. Caputo, who termed the "B" flue "hazardous."

Caputo led the delegation that included nationally-known fuels consultant, Allen Johnson, in appearing before Town Supervisor Lewis Waters and the Board. In stating the OHII opposition to the amendment, Caputo maintained that the Type "B" flue would be suitable only for gas heat operating at a 550 degrees Fahrenheit temperature in the flue. Its adoption would have precluded central heating with oil, wood, bottled gas or coal.

Caputo, quoting from Fuel Oil Magazine, revealed that a builder would save only \$25.00 per home if the proposed code was adopted. In testifying, Mr. Caputo maintained that, "For \$25.00 a home must be red-tagged. This red tag, signifying danger, is too high a price to pay for a saving on only \$25.00."

After hearing the testimony of the OHII president, the Board unanimously adopted the entire code as proposed with the exception of Amendment XXIII, Section 23.1.7, the section which would have authorized the "potentially dangerous" flue.

Arbitration Committee Handles Check-Up Matters

Part of the agreement between our Civic Assoc. and Scoway and Schwartz, builders of Birchwood Park, which resulted in the house to house check-out which is now in progress, was the blueprinting of an Arbitration Committee to handle any complaints that might arise.
It was contemplated that the builder might not feel responsible for certain defects or complaints in an individual home, and hence refuse to fix them. The Civic Assoc. felt that the Builder should

not be the Court of Last Resort in these cases.
The plan called for the formation of a panel of competent representatives of both the Builder and the Civic Assoc. to review each disagreement and arrive at an equitable solution. This panel will meet every second Saturday in the Builders' offices. If your home has been checked out, and you are not satisfied with the work done, or feel that the Builder was not justified in leaving any item undone, please contact

any member of our panel and your case will be docketed for early hearing.
Civic Assoc. members of the Arbitration Board are: Norman Jacobson, 75 Maytime Dr., OV 1-0315, Chairman; Irving Brand and Don Katz.
Complaints to be submitted in writing only after final check out by builder.
Arbitration committee will investigate complaint and make physical inspection, thereafter attempting to adjust the dispute

between the builder and the home owner amicably.
Failing to dispose of the dispute, the matter will be set down for hearing on a particular Saturday morning and notice thereof will be given to the home owner. The builder will be notified of all complaints as expeditiously as possible in line with mutual efforts to avoid actual arbitration hearing.

Little Ironies In Cartoons

Sight and the ability to observe the world around us is Nature's gift to most humble humans. But, Birchwoodite Roy Fox's powers of observation approach the realm of extra-sensory perception. He must have always possessed a great sensitivity to the vagaries existent on our little mass of atoms, the world.

How else can one explain his razor-edged commentaries on life and its ironies? From the tender age of 18, his conception of people in everyday dilemmas have been expressed with mature insight through the medium of cartooning.

Born and bred in the citadel of our nation's liberty, Philadelphia, Roy, after completing his education at Temple University and the Art Students League in New York, joined the Army Air Force. Three and a half years in the Air Transport Command took him to such distant parts of the globe as Oldenawa, in the South Pacific and the Azores in the Atlantic. As the first contingent of Allied troops to land on those beautiful islands west of Portugal, M/Sgt. Fox's outfit was given a most unexpectedly wonderful reception.

Discharged from the army, Roy catapulted into his cartooning career by striking pay dirt on his second attempt at selling his drawings. The Saturday Evening Post, published an article on Roy, noted that he was one of the youngest artists ever to appear regularly in their magazine.

For the past several years, Roy L. Fox, (his speedball pen name), has been under contract to the Chicago Tribune - New York News Syndicate for a series entitled "Then & Now". His efforts are published in U.S. newspapers from coast-to-coast and in several foreign countries including Switzerland, France, Germany, Italy and Belgium along with such well-known standbys as Hedda Hopper, Ed Sullivan, Danton Walker, "Dick Tracy", "Terry and the Pirates" and others. Since the inception of his career Roy's cartoons have tickled the readers of many popular magazines such as The Post, Ladies Home Journal,

Look, Redbook and the now defunct Colliers. Every "Best Cartoons Of The Year" anthology since 1949 has included some of his work.

Now, let me say something about neighbor Fox's family. Besides his very pretty wife Rosalind, there's Lindsey 6 1/2, and Robin 4... girls and Jimmy 3 months... poodle. "Rosalind is a great help," Roy said, "she's a wonderful sounding board for all my gags."

However, one person very instrumental in shaping his life was Roy's older brother, Sig. Besides helping him through school, big brother played an integral part in launching him into cartooning. Here's how Roy put it in an article published in The Post's company newspaper in 1947:

"My brother is a frustrated writer turned pharmacist" he said, "and we work together a few hours a week on Saturdays. Around midnight, he thrusts himself into the nearest chair and sleepily hands me a collection of unpaid bills, crumpled prescription blanks and unused hair restorer labels - all with notations on them. These, together with my file of subway transfers, match cover and shirt cuffs serve as a starting point."

Together, the Fox boys ground out a continuous series of successful cartoons until Sig decided to make more of his pharmaceutical training. He has certainly accomplished his aim as today Roy's big brother is the head of a large Philadelphia drug store chain.

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Third Round Checkout Moves Into High Gear

According to Leonard Schwartz, of Sosnow & Schwartz, the 3rd round checkout started approximately two months ago, is now going forward steadily. As at Aug 5, a total of 320 homes had been checked out. Most of these homes are now fully completed, or lack one or two items for completion. The one bug that has cropped up so far is the replacement of defective parts or installations. These will be replaced as quickly as possible.

According to Mr. Schwartz, maximum pressure is being put on all suppliers concerned to get the needed replacements delivered and installed.

The builder has agreed to supply, regularly, a work schedule covering at least 3 weeks. Houses to be worked on will be listed by block and job number. The builder agrees to adhere to this schedule faithfully. Home owners can facilitate matters by being at home on dates indicated for their particular inspections.

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Analyst Looks at Psychoanalysis

In analytic practice it has been found that "the obvious" is often the most helpful "new insight" that the analyst could give his patients. Faced with writing this second in the series of articles by representatives of the various professional groups in Birchwood Park, what better precedent to follow than to write on "the obvious" Topic—What is Psychoanalysis?

Psychoanalysis is first of all a philosophy of personality development. It is also a theory of mental illness, and lastly at most know it, it is a method of psychotherapy based upon the other two. Psychoanalysis, the treatment, might be understood as a process where in the interaction of two people, the therapist and the patient, the patient can examine his relationship with people with the aim of change in the direction of more mature reality bound behavior. Psychoanalysts believe that all behavior is motivated. There is an explainable reason for everything we do, say, and feel.

All that we do, no matter how apparently bizarre, has been learned by the person sometime, earlier in life as a means of coping with life as it then existed for them. In practice then, what happens during psychoanalytic sessions is that the patient relates those events of his present life where he was uncomfortable or experienced anxiety. Often in the talking the patient might act the same way with the analyst as he did in the life situation. This is the "transference relationship" one hears so much about.

The patient is here able to become aware of specifically what he is doing in his relationship with others. The past life history of the person is explored to find out when

this pattern of behavior was necessary and once this is done with all the feelings of the time re-experienced, the patient is free to change. The analyst and he then explore alternative methods of handling life situations, alternatives that were perhaps not possible when the person first developed the particular personality pattern. For example a husband a wife might be fighting all the time; the husband starts treatment. In the course of treatment he starts expecting the analyst to give him all the answers, to change appointment times frequently, to extend credit. It soon becomes obvious that he expects too much to be given to him.

Other examples of this "insight" or "pattern" are explored in the analytic sessions. It soon becomes clearer that this is what happens with his wife and why they fight all the time. She can't please him but no one could. His needs it turns out were still the small child's needs to have the good mother take care of him. Exploration of his life history reveals a mother who in her over protection and over solicitousness with doing the everyday tasks of life, never really gave understanding, but taking the form he learned in childhood—love means doing for. After this was realized the patient could ideally grow to more mature behavior, one closer to the reality needs of the situation.

It has not been possible in this short article to in any way to justice to explaining as complex a field as psychoanalysis. It is important, however, to stress that it is a young science, but nevertheless a science. The method and the theory are logical and rational, there is no magic and no tricks. It is a matter of both analyst and patient being dedicated to finding

 out what really "is", why it is so, and what can be done about it.

Since the process of analysis can be seen as a learning process in many ways the readers of "The Villager" might be interested in some of the lessons learned.

These points, or others, could be further elaborated in future articles if the readers would want this. In summary two of the major problems facing patients are loneliness, and finding a set of personal values to live by. These are such universal human problems that it was felt that this article could best be closed by mentioning some of the conclusions patients and analyst have been making in these areas. Regarding loneliness - As Adults we will never again really have the closeness with many others that was typical of our adolescent gang days.

To look for it leads to frustration and disappointment. If we have one or two real intimates it might be par for the course. Regarding a set of values volumes can be written, but again it was found that the real satisfactions were not in status symbols, prestige etc., but were in closeness to family and friends, and creative utilization of personal potentials.

YOUR CLOTHING DOLLAR

Mrs. J. J. purchased a beautiful shorts and blouse set at \$2.95... After one laundering the shorts shrank to "miniature" proportions and the blouse started "bleeding", making this buy a case of money thrown out. Johnny's mother picked up what looked like a terrific buy in a boy's outerwear jacket, lined with a quilted fabric and labeled water-repellent. She did not know that the jacket was made of a light weight rayon gabardine, treated with resins to appear boardy, stiff and heavy, she did not know that the quilting consisted of a low construction lining fabric which after one dry cleaning opened up threads, shifted and let out the quilting material. The jacket bunched at the seams, shrank two sizes, softened and became limp, raggy and ill-fitting. The water-repellency was gone forever. Though priced at only \$3.95, the purchase proved a complete waste of money.

Mr. S. K. purchased a stylishly made red flannel shirt for fall and winter wear, his size is usually 15. He purchased the shirt in medium. The red color started bleeding even in the recommended hand washing process. The garment shrank to a 14. Great buy at \$1.95, but a complete waste of money. Miss C. B. purchased a bra marked down to only \$1.19 in all white broadcloth... what she did not know is that this braierie broadcloth is slightly heavier and stronger in weight than ordinary combed broadcloth such as used in better shirts and blouses. The \$1.19 "buy" was made of a cheap grade of carded low construction broadcloth, and after two days the strap tore right off the fabric. After one laundering no more firmness, no more uplift, another case of money thrown out... All these problems are more or less of the type that housewives run up against almost every day. Today's trend to cheap promotional merchandising takes the customer for a ride, since too few people know quality, workmanship, type of fabric etc., labels, of which there are many, are often misleading. Millions of consumer dollars are wasted, since it can not be expected that low priced sales help such as promotional chains employ, can be trusted to know anything about the garments which they sell. The age of fabric simplicity is gone forever. You now find cuplioni and cotton (just another Italian word for rayon and cotton) acetate and nylon (could be 95% acetate rayon and a gimmick nylon content) viscose, spun nylon, "miracle cotton", no iron cotton, rayon and acetate, worsted and dacron and innumerable other combinations which mean very little to the would be purchaser.

The garments carrying the most attractive and impressive labels will sell quicker than those without fancy tickets. I shall try in subsequent articles to deal with some of the important aspects of what to look for in buying clothes. I shall deal primarily with such items as

our wives buy at chains, low priced basements and popular priced departments of stores. We all know that if we buy nationally advertised brand names, that we will get (most of the time) our money's worth. While you pay twice as much or more than what you think you might get in a "sale" item of similar looks, you actually do get your money's worth when buying brand names.
