ON CBS THIS SUNDAY Resident Produces Timely TV Program

NEW YORK CITY -- The amazing and timely story of a rocket plane that took man higher and faster than he has ever been will be presented this Sunday evening, Nov. 10, on CBS-TV in a network program produced by James B. Faichney of 36 Violet Ave., Hicksville. It will be viewed on the CBS network from 6:30 to 7:00 PM in the "Twentieth Century" series.

"Toward the Unexplored: The First of the X-2" is the title of the program, the first of four special half-hour broadcasts in the series devoted to the "Air Age". Faichney was former associate producer of CBS Television's 26-part "Air Power" Series.

FLEW 2,178 MPH

Photographed in California's Mojave Desert at Edwards Air Force Base, the Air Force's Flight Test Centre, the story of the Bell X-2 rocket airplane will dramatically depict how USAF Capt. Iven C. Kincheloe took the experimental aircraft to a record height of 126,000 feet at an incredible speed of 2,178 miles-an-hour on Sept. 7, 1956.

Mr. and Mrs. Faichney are well known in Hicksville. The TV producer has been a member of Education Advisory groups and Mrs. Faichney is active in the Burns Ave. P-TA.

As for the program this Sunday evening, it will also dramatically

depict the last and fatal flight of the X-2, with USAF test pilot Capt. Milburn Apt. on Sept. 27, 1956. Viewers will see special film showing preparations for that flight -- and the last few moments of a man's life.

The story of the X-2 is, in effect, the culmination of man's first breach of the sound barrier, which took place in 1947 with a (Continued on Page 3)

The solid north shore Republican vote, cut by the nation-wide swing to the Democrat column, helped substantially to keep Oyster Bay Township on the GOP side in Tuesday's election. Voting was as light, as had been anticipated, with about 70,000 going to the polls out of 112,367 registered.

While Republican candidates for 13 positions on the ballot in the town voting were all elected, the Democrats made sharp inroads in many of the newer sections of the Township where they had apparently concentrated their attack.

John J. Burns of Sea Cliff will succeed Lewis N. Waters of Syosset as chief executive of the Township on Jan. 1. Burns won by a plurality of about 7500, compared with the Waters victory over Arthur Snyder two years ago by 13,245.

Democrat majorities were recorded unofficially on Election Night for Plainview, North Massapequa and the South Syosset-Locust Grove-Jericho section. The 134th District (Birchwood Park) at Jericho ran up as high as 400 votes for Democrats compared to 95 or less for Republicans.

Hicksville stayed in the GOP column giving Burns 7,346 votes as against 5,531 for Snyder. Three Hicksville districts gave small majorities to Democratic candidates for Supervisor.

BURNS STATEMENT

Commenting upon the results of the Election, Burns said "I know I speak for the entire team of Republican town officials when I say we are grateful to the voters for their expression of confidence in us and what we have pledged to the people of our township during the election campaign.

"Our goals and objectives, presented in detail during recent weeks in our speaking appearances, is our blue print for the future ad-

More Shopper Parking Fields

OYSTER BAY -- More off street parking for shoppers in the Hicksville business section, in accordance with recommendations of the Chamber of Commerce, are in prospect. The Town Board will hold a public hearing on Nov. 26 at the Town Hall here, on the acquisition of land which will more than double the size of the parking field between Nicholas and Marie Sts opposite the firehouse. A hearing is set for Nov. 19 upon the appropriation of money for land acquisition and improvement.

The Town plans to take over the old Volgt barn and woodworking mill next to the Legion Hall in E. Nicholas St. as well as other small parcels to increase the parking space in that location by 100 cars.

Also scheduled is the enlargement of the field on W. Marie St. opposite Dilbert's (Big Ben) with another 60 car spaces and an entrance from Jerusalem Ave.

Councilman Henry McInnes told the HERALD that police have been issuing warnings to overtime parkers in the Hicksville parking fields and that effective today (Thurs.) tickets will be issued as the rigid enforcement of parking limits gets underway.

Investigate Kidnap Hoax

Nassau County Police are continuing to investigate a kidnapping hoax in the Northwest area of Hicksville which resulted in a police checkup on all young students absent from Burns Ave School on Wednesday morning, Oct. 23.

Shortly before 10 o'clock in the morning on Oct. 23, Mrs. John Specht of 43 Kansas St., Hicksville, received a phone call and a man told her he had her little daughter, Virginia, age 5, who is

a student in kindergarten. He said someone would call at her home in a short time with the child's clothing and that the mother should let this person in the house to discuss certain things.

Distraught Mrs. Specht went to a neighbor's home and the police were called. She had just shortly before walked Virginia most of the way to Burns Ave School.

School authorities were checked and it was verified that the child was in her kindergarten class. With the cooperation of the police, a check was then made by house to house visitations of all other small children reported absent that morning. All youngsters were accounted for.

Second Precinct Detectives, led by Sgt. Fred Wendt are investigating the incident.

HICKSVILLE—August P. Deppisch of 111 W. Nicholas St., here, was honored Tuesday evening, Oct. 29, for 50 years of membership in the Masonic Fraternity. He was presented with a gold pin and certificate at an impressive ceremony at the Manetto Lodge F & AM to mark his half century of membership in the Masonic Order. He was also presented with an easy chair by the Lodge.

Beware of Blasting Caps

Blasting caps sometimes are lost or stolen and boys and girls find them. When children play with these caps, explosions frequently occur, and as a result hundreds have been hurt. Some lose fingers and hands, some are blinded for life.

Blasting caps are small copper or aluminum cylinders about as big around as a lead pencil and between 1½ inches and 5 inches long. They contain a highly sensitive explosive.

When a cap explodes, hundreds of small pieces of metal fly out in all directions—sometimes as much as 200 feet—and even at that distance could cause blindness.

Boys and girls should know what a blasting cap looks like, and what great damage it can do. If found, the Institute of Makers of Explosives warns that it should be left alone. Other boys and girls should be cautioned and a report made to a fireman, policeman, sheriff, or other law enforcement officer. He will dispose of it properly.

SUPERSONIC FLIGHT

This supersonic flight wrote an indelible page in man's conquest of the air. It marked the beginning of the sensational story of those technically trained test pilots who dared to venture into the unknown realm of space, at previously unheard-of speeds, exploring the aerodynamics of supersonic flight.

"Toward the Unexplored: The Flight of the X-2" will show how these men and their planes were prepared for their supreme tests.

It will show, for example, how the X-2, fastened to the belly of a B-50 bomber, is taken aloft to about 30,000 feet, its pilot ready and waiting inside his own tiny cockpit. At the proper moment, the X-2 rocket plane is cut loose from the "mother ship" and, on its own power, soars into the unknown regions of space.

"Toward the Unexplored: The Flight of the X-2" was written by associate producer Shelby Gordon. CBS News Correspondent Walter Cronkite is the narrator. Production manager is Gene Garry. The editor was Leo Zochling.

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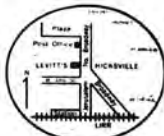

Villagers Reader Opinion

Letter to the Editor
of "The Villager"

The statement of the Board of Directors of the Civic Assoc. on the Sosnow gas station published in your last issue seems to be an extension of the kind of semi-hysterical outbursts that we received at the last Civic Assoc. meeting. It seems to me that your readers should know that this so-called "statement of facts" was presented to over 300 residents of our community at a meeting held at the Robert Seaman School on Tues. Oct. 22nd, and was overwhelmingly rejected. We are writing this letter in order to give you the opportunity to present in your columns another statement of facts, entirely substantiated which resulted in the almost unanimous decision of that meeting to instruct the leadership of the Civic Assoc. to refrain from its support of the gas station. Documents on this issue are available for examination by anyone at the Oyster Bay Town Hall, and testimony of witnesses are on file in the minutes of the Town Bd. and in the minutes of the Civic Assoc. itself.

The best way to understand the entire question of the gas station and its effect on the community is to follow its history.

1. The area on Market St. facing B'way, was originally zoned for general business use in Aug. of 1955. The purchasers of homes in Birchwood Pk. were so informed and accepted the fact, stated by the builder, that a shopping center would be built on that location. This did not at that time include a variance or modification for a gas station.

2. In Feb. of 1957, for the first time, a request for a variance to establish a gas station in the area zoned for shopping was made by Mr. Sosnow before the Town Bd. of Oyster Bay. The Board of Directors of the Civic Association, one month after their election to office, supported Mr. Sosnow's request by a telegram dated Feb. 19, 1957. The Jericho Civic Assoc. (representing a large portion of the rest of Jericho) a petition signed by approximately 275 residents of Birchwood Park itself, the Miller-Ridge Inn plus other community interests opposed this gas station application.

3. At no time was the community made aware of this situation or of the action taken by the Board of the Civic Assoc. There was no general meeting called to acquaint the community of this issue as was done with this case concerning the country club or even less important matters.

4. The Board now justifies its original support of the gas station on what appears to be a rather weak and lame basis.

a. Their statement that the construction of the gas station is "inevitable" and that the best "deal" that could be made with the builder should be accepted since nothing else could be done.

b. That this agreement with the builder would result in the construction of a Post Office and we quote other things" which still remain a mystery.

5. Are our relationships with the builder thru the Civic Assoc. so tenuous that we must support his gas station in order to get our homes in good condition? We residents of Birchwood paid for our homes and are protected by law and the F.H.A. and the V.A. and as such can insist that our homes be in good repair. A liaison committee between builder and resident does not have to acquiesce to all of the builders demands.

6. Since the post office is still an issue that concerns our residents it is important to examine the facts available.

a. There is no necessity for the Post Office to be in the immediate vicinity to insure house to house delivery. It can be erected on any suitable location in Jericho.

b. This type of delivery is based on the number of people in a community and sufficient receipts. This issue is separate and distinct from the gas station.

c. The Post Office Bldg. itself will be erected by negotiations between a builder, not necessarily Mr. Sosnow, and the government on the basis of the government's limits of rentals which according to the Press has just been raised. It is important to note in considering the good faith that lay behind this "deal" through which Mr. Sosnow got the approval of the Board of the Civic Assoc. in Feb. of 1957, and as of the present date, almost one year later, no suitable bid has been filed for the construction of a Post Office. Nor is there any guarantee that an acceptable bid will ever be filed. If the Board of Directors of the Civic Assoc. has anything in writing to that effect, it has kept it filed among the rest of the mysteries surrounding this "deal."

7. In April of 1957, two months following the support of the gas station by the Civic Assoc. Board, the variance Mr. Sosnow petitioned for was granted by the Town Bd. of Oyster Bay.

8. This would have ended the issue but fortunately for our community the new Hickville Rd. veered left and so Mr. Sosnow's original gas station ended in left field, too far from the future flow of traffic. He was now forced to ask for a new variance. This time he asked for a gas station double in size expecting no opposition from the community.

9. When the people directly effected on Hazelwood Dr. voiced opposition, Mr. Schwartz, and some of the members of the Civic Assoc. Board met with five of the families concerned. Their opposition was squelched for the moment.

ment when they were told it was useless to oppose this issue and that they had best accept a screen of trees. The rest of Hazlewood Dr. including their original representatives rejected this entirely two days later.

Despite this rejection and again without any knowledge of the community as a whole, the Board of Directors tacitly continued their support by not appearing in opposition at the Town Board Hearing in Oyster Bay, Oct. 15th. Again, a petition hurriedly gathered of over 150 signatures of residents of Birchwood Pk. was presented to the Town Bd. in opposition.

10. On Oct. 22nd a general meeting was finally held by the Civic Assoc. The question of the gas station was finally discussed before an open meeting. The meeting instructed the Bd. of Directors of the Civic Assoc. to oppose the construction of a gas station with every means at their disposal. They were specifically directed to rescind their previous support by letter and telegram to the Town Bd. of Oyster Bay. This letter and telegram were never sent. 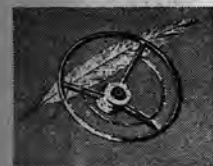

HERALD GREEN THUMB

These days I feel like saying with Edna St. Vincent Millay, "Lord, Thou hast made the world too beautiful this year!" Never has the autumn color been so brilliant. The dogwoods, when the sun shines through them, are a luminous ruby-red, and the sassafras is every shade of yellow and apricot and crimson. Maples are a burnished gold or a flaming scarlet, and the oaks are gorgeous in more somber tones of maroon, plum color, and atiny brown. Travelers tell us that no where else in the world do the trees put on such a show as they prepare for their winter's sleep. That's just one more reason to be thankful for living in this fortunate land.

This is a good time to decide on a tree for your home grounds. Once planted, you will be living with it for a long, long time. You may as well have one that is attractive all year around, and ends the growing season in a burst of glory.

Our garden is surrounded, on our own and neighbors' properties, by a complete circle of big black-jack oaks. They all grow under the same conditions, but they vary greatly in their color of turning and color of dropping their leaves. One tree, for no reason, keeps its leaves all the way down, and every afternoon the sun's rays are shining on the whole tree into

a mass of rich, ruddy gold.

The pin oaks all keep their leaves through the winter, turning gradually from red to warm brown. When the wind blows through them on a snowy morning they seem to play a frosty little tune.

The dogwood is on all counts the number one favorite among trees. Its brilliant autumn color is but one of its many charms. It is beautiful in spring bloom, its leaves remain attractive all summer, and after its bright red fruits and lovely autumn color are gone, the lines of its bare branches are interesting all winter.

The sassafras tree seems to be considered a "weed tree" in this area, probably because it grows so abundantly, but it makes a very satisfactory addition to your garden. It grows into a symmetrical, rounded form with bright green bark, and the leaves, of three different shapes on the same tree, are about the first to turn color and the last to fall.

Another tree with striking autumn color is the sorrell or sourwood, whose bright, glossy leaves turn to flaming, fire-engine red. The scarlet berries of the hawthorn and crabapples add to our fall color, too. Washington thorn has the most decorative ones. These are the trees you see all along Northern State Parkway, and, along with the dogwoods, they are particularly beautiful this year.
