Almost Million Dollars In Christmas Clubs

Nearly one million dollars in Christmas Club checks are going to 10,665 club members of local banks in time for Christmas shopping and other year end requirements.

Eight years ago in 1949, there were 3,603 members of Christmas Clubs in Hicksville banks who received \$298,680.

William E. Koutensky, president of the Long Island National Bank of Hicksville, reports that checks are going to 8,818 Christmas Club members. The checks will total \$760,458 and will be in the mail next week.

Charles E. Colthurst, vice president of the Meadow Brook National Bank, reports the Hicksville office has mailed a total of \$202,152.50 to 1,847 club members.

ENFORCE TIME LIMITS

POLICE ISSUE 750 PARKER WARNINGS

HICKSVILLE-- After issuing more than 750 warnings to motorists violating time limits in public parking fields of the community, police began issuing summons Friday of last week, in response to strong requests of the business people of the community. Residents of the Hicksville School District area were reminded today that they may obtain stickers for their cars for all day parking as commuters in fields set aside for their use.

Parking field stickers for 1957 are available at the Town Hall Annex at 32 Broadway, just north of the LIRR crossing. Applicants for the free permits must produce proof of residence in the area of Union Free School Dist. 17, Hicksville. The annex is open from 9 AM TO 4:45 PM, Monday thru Friday.

Hard-hit by the enforcement of the two-hour parking limits in fields of the Hicksville Park and Parking District set aside for shoppers and/or commuters are residents of Plainview and other surrounding areas.

The parking fields in Hicksville are financed by the taxpayers of the Hicksville Park and Parking District as a local tax charge.

Two fields have been set aside entirely for the use of all-day parkers who have stickers. They are both east of the LIRR. A portion of the field behind the Professional Building, with entrances from Barclay St. and North Bway, is also designed for all day use.

14 Fire Calls For Volunteers

HICKSVILLE - Fourteen fire and one ambulance call kept the Fire Dept. here, active during the period of Nov. 5 through Nov. 12. Seven calls were grass fires.

The first grass fire occurred on Nov. 6 at West Ave. and Cortland St. On Nov. 7 a washing machine in the home of Peter Antonelli, 33 Lehigh La., caught fire; and later the same day, the ramps were called to put out a garbage fire in a truck, on Hempstead Ave. near Boos Bros. Nursery. A chair in the home of George Risler, 11 Hicks Circle, caught fire on Nov. 8; and two grass fires on Nov. 9 were extinguished, one

at W. John St. and Kuhl Ave., and another on West Moreland Rd. A shack on W. Carl St. caught fire on Nov. 10; and Mrs. Walters, age 90, of 161 Jerusalem Ave., was taken by ambulance to Mid-Island Hospital the same day.

Two grass fires and a trailer truck fire called firemen out on Nov. 11. The first grass fire was on Mur-ray Rd. and the R.R., and the second at 73 Abbott La. The trailer or truck loaded with crated bath-tubs, caught fire in front of 41 Bethpage Rd. The left truck tire was burned, as were some of the crates on the truck.

On Nov. 12 there were two more grass fires, and an even fire. The grass blazed at Newbridge Rd. and Flower St., and the corner of Jerusalem Ave. and Old Country Rd.

The even fire occurred in the home of John Kean, 290 Plainview Rd., and left smoke damage to the residence.

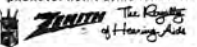

County Tax Rate Drops

MINEOLA--A tax rate decrease of 2.1 cents per \$100 assessed valuation is proposed in the Nassau County budget for 1958 by County Executive A. Holly Patterson. The rate for the ensuing year is recommended at \$1.533. The budget on which a public hearing has been called for Wednesday, Nov. 27, at 11 A.M. calls for \$58,868,755 in expenditures, a tax levy of \$38,052,888 brought about by increased revenues of \$16,539,313 or \$2 1/2 million above the current year.

A 22-page message accompanied the budget when filed with Edward J. Rock, clerk of the Board of Supervisors, at nine o'clock Friday morning. In it, County Executive Patterson gives in complete detail features of this, his fifth, county budget. There are no over-all wage increases included in the \$4,836,403 increase in expenditures, but \$300,000 for increases which may result from appeals pending with the Civil Service Commission.

The estimates proposes a total in salaries for all employees of \$38,981,989, an increase of \$2,766,144 broken down to \$29,833,933 for general County purposes, \$8,178,739 for police. The sum of \$2,886,270 is included in this year's budget for employees' retirement. Of this \$1,265,147 is for police. For the first time the County

is also obligated for \$500,000 as its share of Social Security for those employees who seek it.

Increases in expenditures, according to the message, have been caused by a 40-hour work week for patrolmen, salary adjustments brought about by Civil Service reclassification, greatly expanded Mental Health Services, increased reserve for school tax deficiencies, \$1,650,000 more for welfare and relief, following out State demands.

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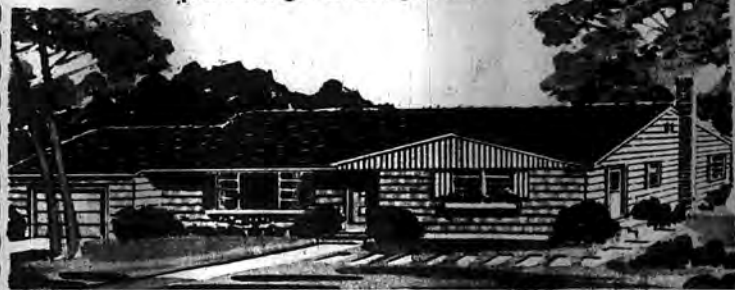

All residents must register on Nov. 16 between the hours of 2 to 8 p. m., or on Nov. 18 between the hours of 4 to 10 p. m. Voting takes place on Saturday, Nov. 23, between the hours of noon to 10 p. m. Only persons registered may vote.

Discuss Referendum

On Nov. 7 the Education Committee of the Birchwood Park at Jericho Civic Assoc., Sam Springer chairman, conducted a meeting at the Robert Seaman School on the question of the proposed Jericho High School. The VILLAGER is happy to report that this meeting started on time and in the course of 1 1/2 hours acquainted the residents of Birchwood Park with all sides of this issue.

Thanks to Sam Hecht, member of the Jericho School Board, facts and figures pertaining to the proposed high school were presented in a clear and factual manner. After hearing Mr. Hecht's report, residents were able to ask questions pertaining to the proposal and fully satisfactory answers were provided by Mr. Hecht, Dr. Lant, principal of schools in Jericho, as well as by several other members of the Jericho School Board and chairman Springer.

The VILLAGER elsewhere in this issue is listing pertinent information regarding the proposed high school. The VILLAGER is strongly in favor of this proposal. Education is democracy's most potent weapon and we the residents of Jericho must provide facilities for our youngsters which will qualify them to become responsible and capable men and women.

We can best assure our Nation's future by doing our full share on the local level in providing proper facilities for learning, thinking, and physical development of the young people of Jericho. We are fortunate to have men like Dr.

ARCHITECT'S VIEW of the proposed Jericho Senior High School which will be the subject of a referendum vote on Nov. 23. A public meeting to discuss the proposal is set for next Monday night, Nov. 18 at 8:30 PM at the Robert Seaman School Auditorium. Registration of voters will take place Nov. 16 and 18. The School Board reports to the community that the

need is urgent. The district has 52 elementary classrooms. The new high school will provide 40 additional classrooms, bringing to 92 the total number of classrooms in Jericho. A minimum of 90 classrooms will be needed by 1960 and school architects, Knapp & Johnson, report it will take about two years to build this structure.

Jericho High School Facts

The Jericho School District is made up of 1942 homes in a land area of 13 square miles. Our village comprises 27% of all homes in the Jericho School District. The area north of Jericho Turnpike contains 34% of the district's homes and the balance is made up of the developments of Oakwood, White Birch and Westbury Heath. Approximately 30% of homes in the Jericho School District are childless. This fact alone should make each and every resident of Birchwood at Jericho conscious that his vote is urgently needed to help assure passage of the proposed high school referendum on Nov. 23.

At present the High School students of Jericho are being "farmed out" to two neighboring high schools. These schools can not continue to provide needed facilities for Jericho students in the future.

At present, with the addition of the new Jackson School, all classes in the elementary school level (except kindergarten) are in single session. By 1959 most classes will be in double session and by 1960 all classes will have double sessions. That is one important reason for the "must completion" by February of 1960 of the proposed Jericho High School.

This High School will be able to accommodate 1200 students when completed. By 1960 there will be approximately 800 high school students and the Jericho High School can absorb 400 elementary school students, thus cutting out double sessions in elementary schools.

The proposed Jericho High School will be built on 53 acres already acquired, adjoining Cedar Swamp School. It will be incorporated into the present Cedar Swamp School plant. The architecture will be of colonial design as is the present school.

Total cost of the proposed high school will be \$3,500,000.00. The old wing plus additional new classrooms will house the 10th, 11th, and 12th grades. The new wing will house the 7th, 8th and 9th grades. There will be a total of 46 classrooms. The facilities separating these wings will

contain two cafeterias, kitchen, gymnasium, library and shops. These facilities are being built large enough to accommodate 1800 students eventually. It is possible to add to the classroom wings later on to increase the classroom capacity of this high school to 1800 students at a very reasonable cost. This is due to the fact that all center facilities are already in existence.

Jericho will add about 150 new homes yearly in the foreseeable future. The new high school has been planned with this expanded school population taken into account.

The new high school will increase the basic tax rate by 77 cents per \$100.00 of assessed valuation. The estimated school tax for 1960 will be \$3.55, for 1965 it will be \$3.75 and for 1968 it will amount to \$3.83. After this date it should level off to stay around \$3.75 per \$100.00 of assessed valuation.

The entire planned high school area will retain its present unlined appearance. A football field will be built with stands for spectators. Other outdoor sports facilities are to be included. A basketball indoor court will have seating facilities for 1200.

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Giant-Sized Family Man

By AL ROSS

There's a pleasant, soft-spoken gentleman in these parts who is a dedicated family man. Jericho's District Principal, Kenneth A. Lant, supervises a "family" of approximately 1700 children, teachers, supervisors, principals and office personnel. All are his concern, but his major efforts are extended towards the betterment of the educational facilities and opportunities for our children in Jericho.

When we asked him if he had any particularly favorite methods of instruction, he answered, "Teachers must be well trained to teach so that children will learn. Teachers should use the best methods available to teach their subjects, so that they impart that portion of their knowledge of a subject which the pupils in their individual classes are ready to accept according to the age group and the school curriculum. Homework, he continued, 'should be given whenever necessary, but not indiscriminately.'"

Considering the extent of his present-day responsibilities and activities, we were not greatly surprised to discover that Dr. Lant began his teaching career at the very early age of 21, with his appointment as teacher of the 6th, 7th and 8th grades at McCutchanville, Indiana, in 1934. His home town, Evansville, was located nearby, so that he was able to continue living with his family on the farm where he was born. He grew up helping with the numerous chores before and after school, like all mid-western farm boys. After his father's death, he and one of his brothers converted the farm into a prosperous, modern dairy farm, selling milk directly to consumers. But working at the dairy didn't interfere with his teaching career. In 1935 Kenneth was appointed principal-teacher at McCutchanville, where he remained until 1939, at which time he accepted the position of Elementary Supervisor of Center Township, Indiana. Constantly extending his scope in the field of

education, he went on to become the principal of the elementary school at Harwood, Indiana. All this time he was still operating the farm.

Dr. Lant's belief in the value of education led him to pursue higher education. He worked diligently to earn his degree to make him a more competent educator. He received his B.S. in his home town in Evansville College in 1938, and his M.A. at Columbia University. Later, he attained his doctorate at Teachers College, Columbia University.

World War II and the drafting of the farm workers called a sudden halt to the dairy farm program. In 1941, while studying at Columbia University, he was educational consultant on training-films for the Civil Aeronautics Administration, and 1942 found Lieut. Lant in the army. Following his military career, Dr. Lant was principal in Scotch Plains, New Jersey, until he came to Jericho in 1946 as District Principal.

At this point, we must all agree that Dr. Kenneth A. Lant's background of experience and education, and his abundant vitality, eminently qualify him for the position he holds in our community.

However, his interest in children and their education is not confined to schools alone. For the past five years he has served as Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Nassau County 4H Clubs, as well as Secretary of the Extension Service Assoc. of Nassau County. In addition to club activities for the children of Nassau, the group also operates a camp at Riverhead. Dr. Lant is also a member of the Nassau County Vocational Education and Extension Board, which operates the school for the Volunteer Firemen and a shared-services program for the county's children needing special service, including handicapped children.

In addition to his giant-sized family, Dr. Lant has a charming wife, Melba, who shares his interest in education and teaches in the Munsey Park School in Man-

hasset. His daughter, Kathryn, is in the 7th grade at the Robert Seaman School. They have a sympathetic understanding of the constant demands upon one so dedicated to education. Dr. Lant must sometimes think of his boyhood on the Indiana farm, which is still owned by the Lant family, but we are sure that his opportunities for quiet reminiscence are very few.

AN EDITORIAL

Tumult and Shouting Dies

Now that the frayed tempers, violent passions, and harsh words of the past week have spent themselves, it is time for a calm and dispassionate appraisal of recent events. "THE VILLAGER" does not wish at this time to express its opinion on the gas station issue, but we feel it is our duty to point out to the community at large that there is a greater, more basic problem involved here. The question is: What criteria shall govern the actions of the Civic Assoc. when there is a conflict of interest among the residents of the community? Shall the policy of the Civic Assoc. be determined on the basis of what constitutes the greatest good for the greatest number?

Or, on the other hand, should the Association strive to protect the individual home-owner against encroachments of any kind, under any circumstances, on the theory that what is harmful to one resident is harmful to the whole community? Or should each issue be resolved on its own merits? Last week we argued this question in relation to the gas station; tomorrow we may argue it again in another framework.

In an effort to find an authority on the question we consulted that all-important document, the Constitution of the Civic Assoc. And, in Article I Section 2 we found this statement: "The purpose of this Assoc. shall be to exercise, promote, and protect the privileges and interests of the residents of the community known as the Village of Birchwood Park at Jericho. . . ." This is, at best, a vague and ambiguous statement, and can easily be interpreted to substantiate either of the points of view outlined above. Therefore, it is of the utmost importance for the community as a whole to determine precisely what it expects from its Civic Assoc.

"THE VILLAGER" urges a clarification of this question in the immediate future, lest we remain endlessly embroiled in the same controversy.

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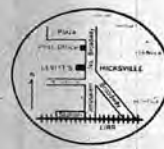
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
