Where Can RR Commuters Park:

HICKSULLE—The problem of communer parking is not new to the community but with the growth of the surrounding areas of Plainview and Jericho as population centers, the problem has increased several fold.

Community leaders are seeking a solution to the problem of how to finance 'parking facilities for communers who are not resident supported by the park and parking districts, several alternates appear worthy of consideration: (1) merger of several of these park and parking districts into a "greater Hicksville" district to build additional communer fields open to taxpayers of

the merged district, particularly those which do not have rail facilities; (2) creating of com-muter/ fields at the quiskitts of Hicksyille with low-dost, rapid tashsi bus service to carry com-muters right to the door of the PB trainer.

Also involved in the question of parking facilities for those who have local burinesses but are not local residents. Outskirt all-day, parking, connected by frequent but service to the centre of the community, is also proposed for these.

Mrs. Johnson spoke of the many
factors involved in Reading Readiness, Both physical and emotional
qualities enter into this, Children
develop at their own individual
rate of speed and teachers must
classify them accordingly. She
showed the materials that the
teachers use in the building of a
reading vocabulary and stated.

Mr. Earle based his workshop
on the tricky "Speech Enemy"
words that are contained in the
English language and the confusion
that these can cause students since
many of these words pronounced
differently from the way they are
spelled, He recorded the voices of
the parents present and then' played
back the tape so that they could
hear for themselves just how the
Speecht eacher works with the children, picking up any bad speech
habits or mispronunciations.

At a public rally, set for 8 P.M., in the gymnasium of the Jamaica Ave. School, sponsors of the proposed Central Community Hospital will disclose plans for building the new medical facility that may eventually be expanded to 300 beds.

Sponsors will explain their plan and answer questions. Dr. G.A.W.
D'Andrea, Plainwiew and New York surgeon, will preside. He will be assisted by Dr. Emanuel V. Bizarro, general practitioner, Astoria; Dr. Eric Goss, radiologist, Phashing; Vincent D'Aquila, pharmacist, Whitestone, and Charles Ferlin, campaign director, Plainview. Ferlin also has arranged a program of entertainment, designed to please young and old.

Featured are George Gardino, widely known TV magician, and Elizabeth Ruh, European light opera star. Miss Ruh has sung starcles in Vienna, Salburg, Zurich and Lucerne, from which latter city she recently came to Old Westbury. Through the courtesy of the American Hospital, Assoc a sound film, "House of Mercy," will also be shown, Film takes viewers on a tour through the facilities of a modern hospital.

The econo-sic loss resulting from these acci-dents is estimated to be in excess of 256 million.




