Where Can RR Commuters Park?

HICKSVILLE--The problem of commuter parking is not new to the community but with the growth of the surrounding areas of Plainview and Jericho as population centers, the problem has increased several fold.

Community leaders are seeking a solution to the problem of how to finance parking facilities for commuters who are not resident

taxpayers of the Hicksville Park and Parking District which is currently footing the bills.

The acquisition of land and improvement of it is a charge against the property owners of the improvement districts, the same areas as the Hicksville School District. Residents and property owners of Jericho and Plainview have their own parking districts.

Several alternatives appear worthy of consideration: (1) merger of several of these park and parking districts into a "greater Hicksville" district to build additional commuter fields open to taxpayers of

the merged district, particularly those which do not have rail facilities; (2) creating of commuter fields at the outskirts of Hicksville with low-cost, rapid transit bus service to carry commuters right to the door of the RR station.

Also involved in the question of parking facilities for those who have local businesses but are not local residents. Outskirt all-day parking, connected by frequent bus service to the centre of the community, is also proposed for these.

Work Shops Feature Reading

Members of the Burns Ave P-T-A participated in Workshops covering various aspects of Reading in our school system on Nov. 14. These included groups led by Mrs. Rachel Johnson, Reading Supervisor for the District on "Beginning Reading"; James Earle, Speech and Hearing Consultant, on "Speech and Pronunciation"; Miss Barbara Gillis, Reading Consultant in Burns Ave School, on "Silent Reading"; James Burke, Reading Consultant at the Junior High School, on "Reading Interest in the Home and the School"; and Louis Penque, 6th grade teacher in Burns Ave, on "Reading Clinics".

Mrs. Johnson spoke of the many factors involved in Reading Readiness. Both physical and emotional qualities enter into this. Children develop at their own individual rate of speed and teachers must classify them accordingly. She showed the materials that the teachers use in the building of a reading vocabulary and stated:

Mr. Earle based his workshop on the tricky "Speech Enemy" words that are contained in the English language and the confusion that these can cause students since many of these words pronounced differently from the way they are spelled. He recorded the voices of the parents present and then played back the tape so that they could hear for themselves just how the Speech teacher works with the children, picking up any bad speech habits or mispronunciations.

Mrs. Gillis spoke of the necessity of gaining meaning from reading (instead of just regarding it as a jumble of sounds and symbols. She showed how study skills (comprehension) are developed by teaching various skills such as outlining the work first, then finding important facts in the story. Reading is a communication skill. A child should not learn to read for reading's sake alone but for the getting of an idea. This is why silent reading is used from the very beginning.

Mr. Penque who conducted the workshop on "Reading Clinics" made this comment on the entire meeting: "The workshops showed that parent's interest centered around Reading Readiness and on the means of maintaining reading interest both at home and in the school".

Many parents commented favorably on the extensive collection of books displayed in the School's general purpose room before and after the meeting. Mrs. Margaret Gregg, Vice-President of the P-T-A., reported that over \$500. was collected from this sale of books. As far as the P-T-A. was concerned, this Book Fair was strictly a non-profit making affair; the discounts granted our organization were all passed on to the parents.

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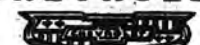

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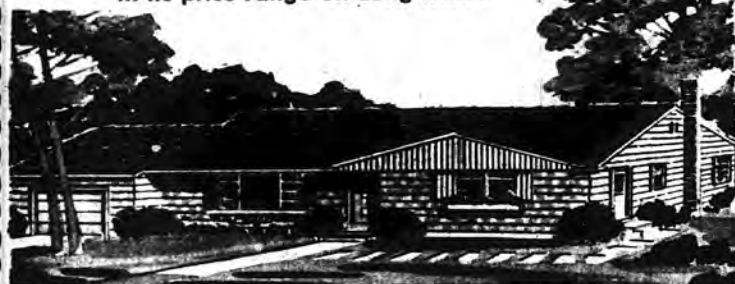

ENACTMENT OF ANTI-NOISE ORDINANCE
TAGE NOTICE that by resolution of the Town Board of Oyster Bay, New York, duly adopted by said Board and entered into full upon its minutes on the 12th day of November, 1957, following a public hearing held thereon after advertisement according to law, the following Ordinance was duly enacted:

ANTI-NOISE ORDINANCE

ARTICLE I. Declaration of Policy. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the Town Board to prevent any unreasonable loud disturbing and unnecessary noise. Noise of such character, intensity and duration as to be detrimental to the public welfare, is prohibited.

Section 2. Prohibited Noise. The following acts, among others, are declared to be loud, disturbing and unnecessary noises in violation of this ordinance, but any enumeration herein shall not be deemed to be exclusive:

- The operation of any radio, phonograph or use of any musical instrument in such a manner or with such volume, particularly between eleven o'clock P.M. and seven o'clock A.M., as to annoy or disturb the quiet, comfort or repose of persons in any dwelling, hotel or other type of residence.
- The keeping of any animal or bird which by causing frequent or long continued noise shall disturb the comfort and repose of any person in the vicinity.
- The use of any automobile, motorcycle, street car or vehicle so out of repair, so loaded or in such manner as to create loud and unnecessary grinding, rattling or other noise.
- The blowing of any steam whistle attached to any station, any boiler except to give notice of the time to begin or stop work or as a warning of danger.
- The discharge into the open air of the exhaust of any steam engine, stationary internal combustion engine or motor vehicle engine except through a muffler or other device which will effectively prevent loud or explosive noises therefrom.
- The operation, including excavating, demolition, alteration or repair of any building other than between seven o'clock A.M. and eight o'clock P.M. on weekdays except in case of emergency.

gent necessity in the interest of public safety and then only with a permit from the Building Department, which permit may be renewed for a period of three days or less while the emergency continues.

g. The creation of any excessive noise on any street adjacent to any school institution of learning or court while the same is in session, or adjacent to any hospital, which unreasonably interferes with the workings of such institution, provided conspicuous signs are displayed in such streets indicating that the same is a school, hospital or court street.

h. The creation of a loud and excessive noise in connection with loading or unloading any vehicle or the opening and destruction of barrels, boxes, crates and containers.

- The shouting and crying of peddlers, hawkers and vendors which disturbs the peace and quiet of the neighborhood.
- The use of any drum, loud speakers or other instrument or device for the purpose of attracting attention to any sale or display of merchandise by the creation of noise.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. Legislative Declaration. It is hereby declared that the use or operation of any radio device or apparatus or any device or apparatus for the amplification of sounds from any radio, phonograph or other sound making or sound producing device or any device or apparatus for the reproduction or amplification of the human voice or other sounds in front of or outside of any building, place or premises or in or through any window, doorway or opening of such building, place or premises, abutting on or adjacent to any public street, park or place, or in or upon any vehicle operated standing or being in or upon any public street, park or place, where the sounds therefrom may be heard upon any public street, park or place or from any stand, platform or other structure, or from any airplane or other device used for flying, flying over the town or in any boat or on the waters within the jurisdiction of the Town, or anywhere on or in the public streets, parks or places for commercial or business advertising purposes, is detrimental to the health, welfare and safety of

the inhabitants of the Town, in that such use or operation diverts the attention of pedestrians and vehicle operators in the public streets, parks and places, thus increasing traffic hazards and causing injury to life and limb. It is hereby further declared that such use or operation disturbs the public peace and comfort and the peaceful enjoyment by the people of their right to use the public streets, parks, and places for street, park and other public purposes and disturbs the peace, quiet and comfort of the neighboring inhabitants. Therefore it is hereby declared that the prohibition of such use or operation for commercial or business advertising purposes is essential to protect and to secure the health, welfare, safety, comfort, convenience and peaceful enjoyment by the inhabitants of this Town of their rights to use the public streets, parks, and places for street, park and other public purposes and to secure the peace, quiet enjoyment and comfort of the Town inhabitants.

Section 2. Definitions. As used in this Article:

- The term "sound device or apparatus" shall mean any radio device or apparatus or any device or apparatus for the amplification of sounds from any radio, phonograph or other sound making or sound producing device or any device or apparatus for the reproduction or amplification of the human voice or other sounds.

b. The phrase "to use or operate any sound device or apparatus in, on, near or adjacent to any public street, park or place" shall mean to use or operate or cause to be used or operated any sound device or apparatus in front of or outside of any building, place or premises or in or through any window, doorway or opening of such building, place or premises, abutting on or adjacent to any public street, park or place, or in or upon any vehicle operated, standing or being in or upon any public street, park or place, where the sounds therefrom may be heard upon any public street, park or place or from any stand, platform or other structure, or from any airplane or other device used for flying, flying over the Town, or in any boat or on the waters within the jurisdiction of the Town or anywhere on or in the public streets, parks or places.

Section 3. Use and operation of sound devices and apparatus for commercial or business advertising purposes prohibited. It shall be unlawful for any person to use or operate or cause to be used or operated any sound device or apparatus in, on, near or adjacent to any public street, park or place for commercial or business advertising purposes.

Section 4. Persons Guilty of Violation.

LEGAL NOTICE

a. Any person who employs, procures or induces another to operate, drive, lend, lease or donate any automobile, truck or other type of vehicle or procures or induces another to operate, operate, drive, lease or donate any airplane or other type of flying device, for commercial or business advertising by means of any sound device or apparatus in violation of this ordinance shall be guilty of a violation hereof.

b. The use of the name of any person or of any proprietor, vendor or exhibitor or the use of any trade, business or corporate name in connection with such commercial or business advertising shall be presumptive evidence that such advertising was conducted by reason of employment, procurement or induction on the part of said person, proprietor, vendor or exhibitor, or the person or persons represented by said trade, business or corporate name.

Section 5. Penalties. Any person or persons, association or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) or imprisonment for not more than sixty (60) days or both.

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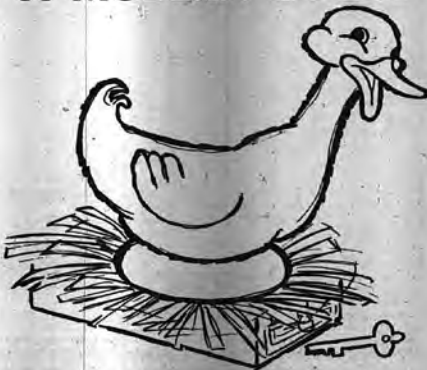

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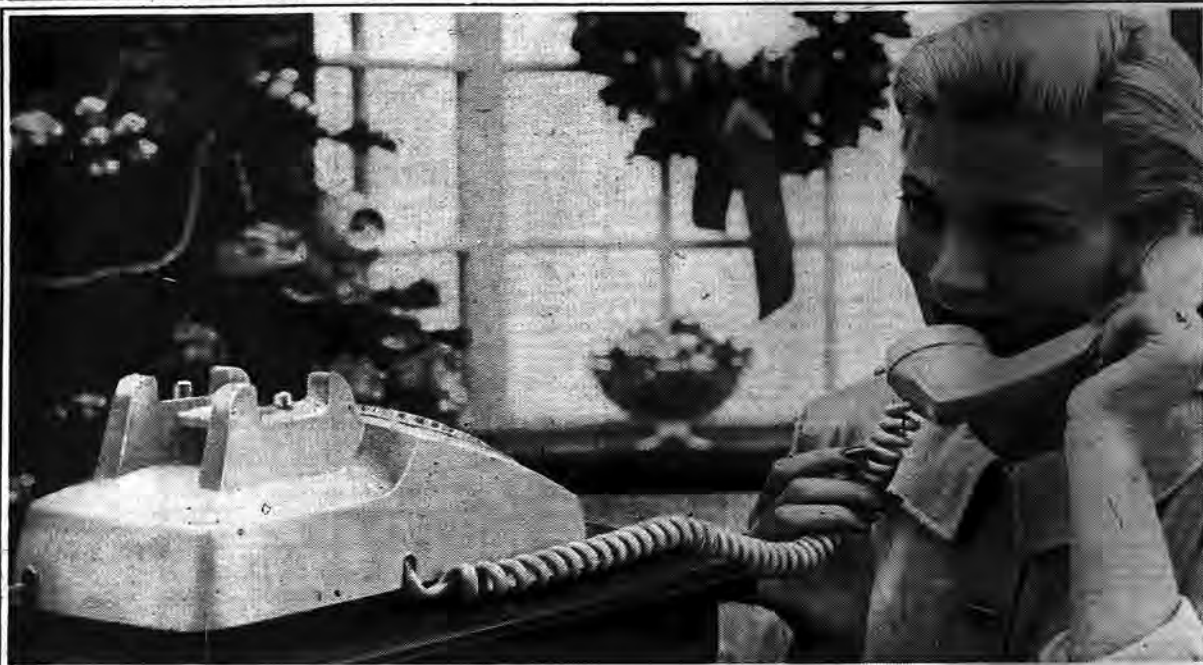

a plumbing permit.
