Fire in Mail Box Destroys 1000 Pieces

HICKSVILLE—About 1,000 pieces of mail were largely destroyed by fire in the mail box in front of the Post Office on North Broadway, Sunday evening. A motorist who had mailed a letter in the smoking box, reported to police at the Booth. The police put out the fire with a supply of water from Talbot's Service Station, across the street, thoroughly dousing the contents. Postal officials were called and the job of identifying the remains began. A great deal of the contents were damaged beyond the point where identification could be made.

Where partial identification could be made, the charred remains were set out with an attached letter which said in part: "The enclosed mail was damaged by a fire in a letter box located within the delivery district of this office. This fire was not due to any negligence on the part of the Post Office Dept., but was caused by persons unknown. This matter has been referred to the Postal Inspection Service" and signed Harry C. Cotler, postmaster.

The box had been emptied about 3 o'clock in the afternoon. The fire was discovered about 9:30 at night.

Incumbents Win in Elections

Incumbents were re-elected Tuesday night in Hicksville and Jericho Fire Districts and Plainview Water Districts. N. William Bennett was re-elected Plainview Water Commissioner with 852 votes, defeating Mac Singer who received 232 ballots. In Hicksville, Harry Gleckler received 202 votes out of 211 ballots cast to start his fifth 5-year term as Fire Commissioner. In Jericho, Harry Stewart was re-elected Fire Commissioner, defeating Rene Maufroy by about two to one.

ISSUE FOR 3 YEARS

BOARD MAY APPOINT REC DIRECTOR SOON

HICKSVILLE --- The matter of community-wide recreation supervised, directed and financed in large part by the School District is fast reaching a new climax with the Board of Education expected to make a decision on the employment of a full-time director almost any week now. The School Board has held several informal sessions to interview prospective candidates for the \$9000 a year position of director, although all discussion of the matter has been in executive session in recent months.

The subject of a paid recreation director has been one of controversy, off and on, for about three years.

At the annual school meeting in May of 1954 a \$15,000 recreation proposal made on the floor of the meeting was defeated with the vote 52 no to 49 yes.

Less than a year later, in March of 1955, a proposal was presented to the district at a special referendum with other questions. The recreation question was "shall the sum of \$3500 be made available for the purpose of a recreation program based upon the Hutchinson Report". The vote was 1,620 no to 606 yes.

CLOSE VOTE

At the annual school meeting of last year (1956) the sum of \$20,000 was added to the district budget for recreation, subject to a referendum vote to be held later. The decision never took place.

At the annual district meeting on May 7 of this year, a proposal was offered on the floor of the meeting to add \$20,000 to the budget for recreation. The vote was extremely close with 87 yes and 85 no.

At the Aug. 2 meeting of the Board of Education this year, a motion was duly made and passed with five in favor and one opposed (one other member was absent), authorizing Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, school superintendent, to interview applicants for the position of recreation director "to coordinate and supervise existing school recreational activities and to prepare a year-round program for submission to the Board of Education; said position to be a 12-month job with salary not to exceed \$9,000."

Dr. Lamb considered about 30 applicants for the position and narrowed the field to five or six men. These have since been interviewed by the Board at informal sessions.

The matter has since been on the agenda of several meetings for consideration in executive session.

PROS AND CONS

Opponents contend that a recreational program should be developed before a director is engaged, and that the full cost of recreation for the current year would not be \$20,000 but in excess of \$50,000 since the 1957-58 budget also includes \$20,500 for a 10-week summer recreation program and such activity would come under the new district director.

Those favoring the employment of a recreation director, led by George Windsor who is chairman of a Citizens Advisory Committee on Recreation, contend that the employment of a full-time director (continued on page three)

Trustee Jerry Zettler, liaison member for the Board with the Advisory Committee on Recreation and a former member of that committee, is believed to be favorably inclined.

Trustee Robert Goodrich has not expressed himself positively as yet and Herbert Johnson is away on vacation for most of this month.

Holiday Hazards

Be Careful in Placing, Decorating, Christmas Trees

It is the night before Christmas. . . . But not everyone sleeps.

In fire stations there's an air of uneasy tension.

Fires at Christmas time are particularly tragic at this the happiest holiday of the year. On this most sentimental day thousands of homes and apartments are carelessly and unwittingly converted into dangerous fire traps—regardless of warnings by fire department officials and safety authorities.

Two years ago fires on Christmas eve killed 23 persons, most of them children, and in the four-day week-end last year took the lives of 54.

This year, for instance, the nation's fire losses may well be over a billion dollars, the death toll close to 10,800, according to the National Board of Fire Underwriters. Over 300,000 fires, the National Board declares, were in the home.

Among fire victims at Christmas time a year ago were a mother and four children in Meriden, Conn.; three brothers in Allagash Plantation, Me.; three sleeping children in Great Falls, Mont.; two small children in Phenix City, Ala.; a sleeping mother and five children in Ironwood, Mich.

You can save your life and you can prevent fires by observing the following suggestions offered at this time by the National Board:

- The Christmas tree is a potential fire hazard and caution should be taken in its selection, placement in the home, and maintenance.
- Play safe by choosing a small one. There will be 30 million on the market.
- Keep the tree outdoors until ready to set it up. While it's outdoors, occasionally throw water over it. This will keep it moist, fresh.
- When you bring the tree inside, cut the butt slantwise to open the pores, then stand it in a tub of water or moist earth.
- Be cautious of chemicals or other substances sold for "fire-proofing" trees. In some cases this process is ineffective.
- In placing the tree, it's best to avoid "hot spots" such as those near the fireplace, stove, television set, radiator, or electric bulbs.
- Never use untreated paper ornaments or untreated cotton bunting or gauze for decoration. Cotton and gauze can be made flame-resistant by dipping in a gallon of water mixed with nine ounces of borax and four ounces of boric acid.
- Use only electric lights, never candles. Be sure, too, that wires are in good condition and bear the UL mark denoting Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc., which shows they have been tested for safety. Frayed electric cords are a fire hazard.
- The switch for turning on the tree lights should be placed some distance from the tree. Never use an outlet or plug under the tree or run electric trains around the base.
- If decorations are used about the house, do not permit them around or near chairs and other places where people may smoke. It is preferable to have them near the ceiling, well above the head of anyone standing up.
- Keep plenty of ash trays handy during the holiday season, as always.
- If lights are desired in windows, never use candles. Keep curtains and other flammable material pulled back at least six inches from any electric light.
- Use non-flammable decorations of glass or metal, and "fire-proof" snow in decorating your tree for Christmas.
- After you have opened your Christmas presents, remove all the gift wrappings and packing materials from your living room and dispose of them.

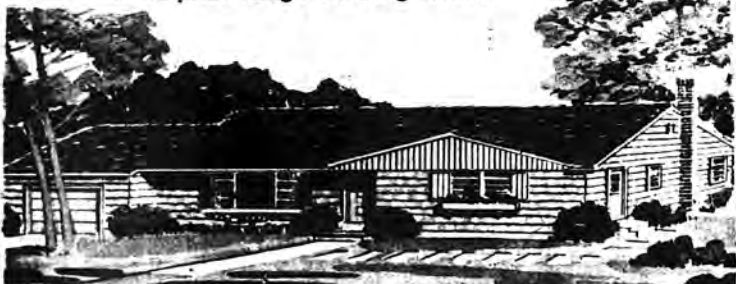

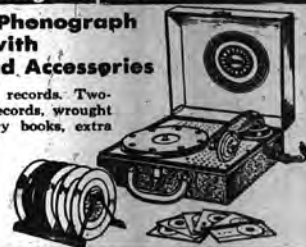

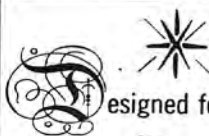
