## Burns Offers 'New Concept' PARK ADVISORY GROUP STARTS PROJECT STUDY

HICKSVILLE -- The Citizens' Advisory Park Group, appointed by Supervisor John J. Burns, began work this week on a study of a proposed 50-acre community park. Following a preliminary meeting last Saturday with Supervisor Burns at Oyster Bay Town Hall when the scope of the Group's effort was outlined, the members met Tuesday night and planned a second session for the coming weekend.

The Citizens' Group and Town Officials are anxious to conclude their examination of the proposal advanced by a petition of 1200 residents and homeowners. Spurring their efforts is the fact that the Nassau County Planning Commission on Tuesday of this week held a preliminary hearing at Mineola upon the proposed "Wildfield" development of Press Wireless acreage, a portion of which has been suggested as the possible park site.

Hicksville Board of Education was represented at the Planning Commission hearing since the School District may need a tract in this area for another school site, contingent to a certain degree upon the size of the development. As it stands now, almost 400 homes are planned for Wildfield.

The Planning Commission adjourned the hearing until next Wednesday.

Supervisor Burns announced a

"new concept" in park development which may become a first for the State of New York, Saturday. He said public announcement of details of the plan he suggested for study by the Citizens' Group would be withheld pending presentation of this "concept" to other municipal authorities involved in its eventual development.

Burns named Allen S. Carpenter of 11 Loretta Lane as chairman of the Citizens' Group. Other appointments were Joseph Geoghan, Stanford Weiss, Henry C. Brenzel, Leland Badler, John McFadden, Fred J. Noeth and Lawrence McCaffrey. Two additional appointments are anticipated.

He offered the full cooperation of his office and the Town Board to assist the work of the Group.

It is proposed to call a community meeting on the proposal prior to formal action on the Park Land Petition by the Town Board.

## Co-Pilots Polar Hop

SAN FRANCISCO -- Co-pilot on a TWA Jetstream Constellation that became the first airliner of any type to even be flown non-stop from Paris to San Francisco on Feb 8 was Capt Francis Manelski of Hicksville. Utilizing the polar route across the North Atlantic and over the southern tip of Greenland, the 76-ton airliner left Paris at 12:04 midnight with 28 passengers and arrived here at 11:51 PST in the flying time of 20 hours and 47 minutes. The distance flown was 5,740 miles at an average speed of 275 miles per hour.

## School Board Gives Up Fight On Goebel As 'Legally Futile'

HICKSVILLE -- The Board of Education has decided to give up a fight to prevent the district taxpayers from contributing to the retirement fund of former School Attorney Harry Goebel as being "futile". At a meeting in December the Board had voted to direct its present attorney, S. Arnold Witte, to pursue all possible efforts to recover the contributions.

The decision to drop the action was taken Friday night following a report by Witte to the Board. The motion to discontinue the effort included the comment that further litigation would "legally futile" and "entail additional expense for the district."

It was pointed out at the December meeting that the district, under the state retirement regulations,

Friday was an exceptionally happy day on Hicksville School Bus "S". The kids that rode "Frank's Bus" were extra happy that day, because Saturday was Frank's birthday. And as many scurried aboard many little and some not so little, hands thrust happy birthday cards into Frank's. All the kids loved Frank, and were only too glad to wish him well. Frank was the kind of driver who made the trip to and from school a pleasant experience to look forward to each time.

Like Christmas time, the children were encouraged to bring small decorations and hang them in the bus to give it the holiday atmosphere. Frank was the kind of driver who always had an extra minute to wait for some little sleepyhead who rushed to his bus stop a little late. In fact, kids who rode the bus tell that before they started the trip to school, he always passed the first stop again, just in case he missed someone the first time. And from what we've heard many of the kids knowing this knew where to go if they were late, and their friend Frank would pick them up.

Frank who always had a kind word for each kid or a little joke was often a subject at the dinner table in many homes. And so it happens, that at our home as in others, on Monday the kids were concerned enough to mention "Frank must have been sick this afternoon. He was OK this morning, but on the way home today he acted funny. Sorta sick like. Maybe he had a headache or something".

The same type remark made by Cathy DeGalciano of Spruce St., to her mother, as she came in from school, prompted Mrs. DeGalciano

to ask her husband to check if everything was alright when she saw bus "S" stopped on Spruce St., a little later that day. Mr. DeGalciano hopped aboard and found Frank collapsed over the wheel of the vehicle. Police were summoned, and he was removed to Meadowbrook Hospital, where early Tuesday morning he passed away at the age of 36.

Many red eyed students told us Tuesday, "He was the nicest driver we ever had," or "Now what will we do with out Frank?" or "Why, did it have to happen to Frank?" Of course, as adults this is one of those times when we grope for words to explain to the very young ones, and try to comfort the older children who understand.

Francis W. Horn lived at 25 Adams St., Hicksville, with his wife, Jane, and their three children, Jane, Frank and Mary. He is also survived by his father, William; a sister, Helen Huber, and two brothers, Edward and Richard.

He will repose at the Thomas F. Dalton Funeral Home until Friday morning, when a Solemn Requiem Mass will be offered at St. Ignatius Loyola R.C. Church at 10 AM. Burial will follow at L.I. National Cemetery.

Following their two-week study of the plant's operation, they issued a report describing the incinerator's performance as "exceptionally good and one of the finest in the country".

## Book On Disabled Veterans

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. — (ALNS)—Rehabilitation of disabled veterans is a basic community service. This is the theme of a new 22-page booklet just issued by The American Legion's National Rehabilitation Commission, entitled "Rehabilitation in Community Service."

The publication re-emphasizes that American Legion Posts should be a primary source of information, advice and assistance to all disabled war veterans and the dependents of deceased veterans.

Robert M. McCurdy, chairman of the National Rehabilitation Commission, quotes a resolution adopted at the Legion's 39th National Convention in Atlantic City, N.J., in September 1957 to prove his point:

"An important part of community service lies in care of the disabled war veteran who is your neighbor down the street. The 39th National Convention holds the belief that The American Legion Post should never cease to work for the disabled war veteran, whether his disability is physical, mental or economic."

The publication points out that in the year ending June 30, 1956, there will be 94,000 deaths among World War I veterans, 64,000 deaths among War II veterans and 8,000 among the younger Korean Conflict group.

These deaths will result in 127,000 claims being filed with the Veterans Administration, involving insurance and other benefits. It is a part of the rehabilitation goal of The American Legion to see that these surviving dependents have the expert guidance of Legion service officers in perfecting their claims.

Among the aspects of rehabilitation work discussed in the new publication are disability and death compensation, disability or death pension, dependency and indemnity compensation, war veterans' government insurance, education and training under the GI Bill, vocational rehabilitation and hospitalization of disabled veterans.

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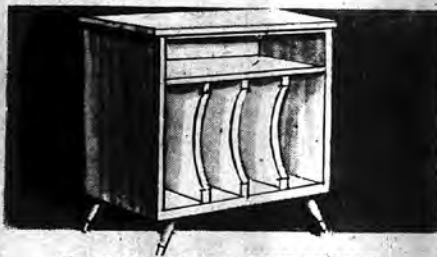
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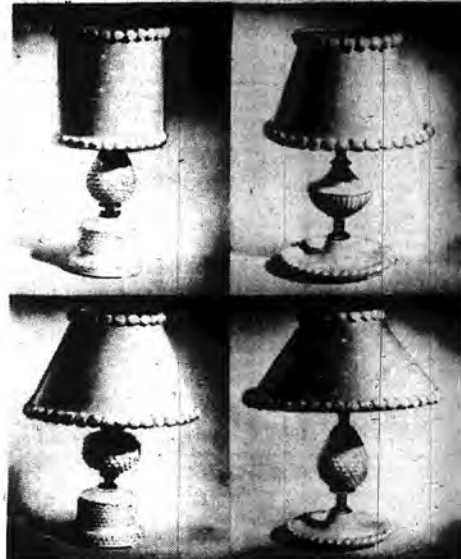
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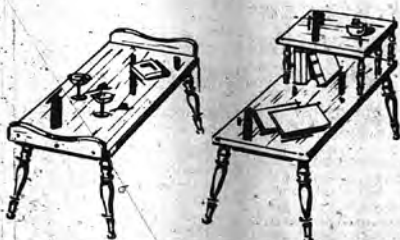

## Harriman Plan Shocks Salons

Governor Harriman's quoted  
statement before the State Council  
of Churches in Albany Monday that  
if there is to be an increase in  
educational spending, the money  
must come from higher local taxa-

Majority Leader Joseph P. Carlini  
and members of the Nassau County  
legislative delegation.

"The Governor says 'I will do  
everything in my power to promote  
an improvement in education,'" he  
declared Carlini, "and thoughtless-  
ly advises that the money be  
raised by higher local taxes. This  
is the kind of help you give a drown-  
ing man by throwing him a bucket  
of water."

"The State Educational Con-  
ference Board, the Board of Re-  
gents, everybody concerned agrees  
that increased State Aid is neces-  
sary to keep local taxation for edu-  
cational purposes from becoming al-  
most confiscatory. Yet, Governor  
Harriman offers, as his contribu-  
tion to the problem, more and higher  
local taxes. This is a suggestion  
which His Excellency may have  
cause to regret."

Carlini, who has previously ex-  
pressed the possibility of an in-  
crease in either or both the gaso-  
line and cigarette tax is certain that  
"the Legislature will find means of  
financing this program for increased  
State Aid so that home-owners will  
not be bowed down even further in

## POPULATION UP

The Interim U.S. Census taken in Nassau County's three towns last Spring to boost per capita tax returns from the State gave Nassau a total population of 1,178,075. The latest census figures, those compiled by the Nassau County Planning Commission from school district enumerations, gives Nassau's present population as 1,244,528 or 54,672 over a comparable count in the summer of 1956.

Submitted to County Executive A. Holly Patterson, the latest population tally shows Hempstead and Oyster Bay neck and neck with increases of 24,038 and 23,827 respectively. The school census for Hempstead is now, according to Planning Commission estimates, 712,115 and Oyster Bay, 276,893. North Hempstead's population increased from 204,934 to 211,741 for a total increase in school population census of 6,807.

U.S. Bureau of the Census, as of April 1st, gave the following counts: Hempstead, 684,889; North Hempstead, 206,054; Oyster Bay, 243,353; Glen Cove, 21,022; Long Beach, 22,757; Nassau County, 1,178,075 which was a 75 percent increase from the last Federal census of 672,765, taken in 1950.

would have to contribute approximately \$700 a year for the next five years to Goebel's retirement even though he is no longer the attorney for the district.

An initial motion that the action of the Dec 6 meeting be rescinded was lost 3 to 2. A second motion, spelling out the reference to further effort being "legally futile" was carried 4 to 1 with President Emil J. Szendy voting no.

Another matter concerning another former attorney for the school district, which has been pending for some time, almost was concluded at the same meeting. A Board committee consisting of Jerry Zettler and Robert Goodrich reported concerning a conference they had with former School Attorney Michael Sullivan regarding his outstanding bill for approximately \$9000.

After some discussion of the subject, it was decided to have certain supplemental material regarding the Sullivan bill and contract distributed to the Board members with the anticipation that a decision may be reached tomorrow (Fri) night.

The School Board is expected to get started on the 1958-59 annual district budget this Friday night.

Tentative copies of code 2 of the Budget (General Control) have been distributed to the Board members.

This code of the budget for 1957-58 represented an appropriation of \$148,530.

Also pending for Board action is a decision regarding the employment of a Purchasing Agent for the district for the balance of the current fiscal year.

The State Dept of Audit and Control at Albany announced yesterday that the state audit of the fiscal affairs of both Hicksville School District and Hicksville Free Public Library have been completed and copies of the reports have been submitted to the local authorities.
