# State Serves Notice der Stores

BABYLON -- Property owners and tenants along the east side of North Broadway, Hicksville, from John St up to Lenox Ave., have been served "40-days notice" and are, expected to vacate during the later part of April, it was learned today. The demolition of stores as part of the widening of the State Highway is

expected to get under way in a matter of weeks. Oyster Bay Town Board held a public hearing Tuesday upon re-zoning of a 200-foot wide strip along the cast side of North Broad-way from residential to business concerns along the present business rebuilt in the rear of the present locations.

Roman of 47 Notre Dame Ave., Hicksville, in a letter to Council-man Henry McInness, stated "while we do not disapprove re-zoning of 40 feet east of the pre-rent business area east of Broad-way to compensate the owners for the property they would lose as a result of widening (North) Broad-way, we do object to such rezon-ing to 200 feet as proposed. "If the Town Board approves the resolag of the mentioned 40-foot replacement, we ask for a stipula-

The project of widening Broad-way from Jericho Toke south to the LER is expected to take until the end of 1959 to complete. The road is being widened to a six-lane highway. Grading has been ad-vanced to the extreme north end past the new Jericho Firehouse and osouth to the Northerne State Park-way bridge to where a new traffic circle will be developed. 

THE ANNUAL SCHOOL meeting for Hicksville set for Tuesday night, May 6, may well become a historic occassion. It will probably be the last Annual School Meeting for the District.

Under recent revisions in the Education Law, where a School District has been divided into election voting districts for school purposes -- such as Hicksville has been for several years now -- the annual meeting is replaced by the process of just voting on the budget as submitted.

Levittown District is abolishing its annual meeting this year already. In its place, the Levittown School Board is holding a series of discussion meetings on the district budget prior to the decision at the polls.

There are those who feel that the Annual School Meeting has lost its significance in the communities which have grown from four thousand to forty thousand residents. Attendance has been small, as compared with the eligible number of district voters. Two or three hundred people have in some cases decided issues which deserved the approval or disapproval of the entire community.

Some years ago in Hicksville less than 200 people were present on the evening when a taxpayer suggested that bus transportation be eliminated from the budget. The motion was made and carried and a lot of unhappy residents heard the news the next morning. However, before the summer was over, the School Board was petitioned by hundreds and a special meeting was called which resulted in the bus transportation item being restored.

At that time many people "swore" they would never miss another annual school meeting. We wonder how many remembered their pledge in subsequent years.

The annual school meeting for Long Islanders has been the nearest thing to the old time Town Meeting of New England. The powers of the voting attendants at the annual meeting have been broad and years ago, when the district was smaller, the business of the School District could be transacted at a single public session.

Obviously those days for Hicksville are fading. When the gavel comes down on Tuesday night, May 6 closing the annual meeting for this year it will mark the passing of an era.

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

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


