## Board to Meet Every Saturday

The Hicksville Board of Education will be meeting Saturday afternoons until the 1958-59 proposed District Budget is completed. The Board met last Saturday from 3 PM to almost 10 PM without interruption in place of its regular Friday night session which was cancelled due to the heavy snow storm.

The Board hopes to finish its regular Friday night business between 8:30 PM and 12 midnight and then meet on Saturday afternoons at 2 o'clock in the regular meeting place, the faculty cafeteria of Hicksville High School.

Over the vigorous objections of Emil J. Szendy, the Board last Saturday voted to include the appropriation for recreation and the summer playground program in the proposed budget which will be voted upon at the annual meeting on May 6. Szendy insisted that the question of an appropriation for recreation should be the subject of a special or separate referendum.

The Board on Saturday also received the proposal of the custodians seeking an increase in the salary schedule.

## Discuss Library Budget on Apr 2

A special meeting will be held at the Hicksville Free Public Library on Wednesday, Apr. 2, at 8 pm for public discussion of the Library Budget for 1958-59, according to Kenneth Barnes, Library director.

Voters of Hicksville School District will decide at the annual meeting on May 6 whether the terms of office of School Board Trustees will be for three or five years.

# Order Stores To Get Out

**BABYLON** -- Property owners and tenants along the east side of North Broadway, Hicksville, from John St up to Lenox Ave., have been served "40-days notice" and are, expected to vacate during the later part of April, it was learned today. The demolition of stores as part of the widening of the State Highway is expected to get under way in a matter of weeks.

Oyster Bay Town Board held a public hearing Tuesday upon rezoning of a 200-foot wide strip, along the east side of North Broadway from residential to business use. Many of the present business concerns along the street plan to rebuild in the rear of the present locations.

Opposing the zone change request at the Public Hearing was a petition signed by 123 residents asking for a denial. Lawrence A. Roman of 47 Notre Dame Ave., Hicksville, in a letter to Councilman Henry McInnes, stated "while we do not disapprove rezoning of 40 feet east of the present business area east of Broadway to compensate the owners for the property they would lose as a result of widening (North) Broadway, we do object to such rezoning to 200 feet as proposed."

If the Town Board approves the rezoning of the mentioned 40-foot replacement, we ask for a stipulation that no business be permitted on Notre Dame, Thorman, Willoughby and Lenox Avenues."

The project of widening Broadway from Jericho Turnpike south to the LIRR is expected to take until the end of 1959 to complete. The road is being widened to a six-lane highway. Grading has been advanced to the extreme north end past the new Jericho Firehouse and south to the Northern State Parkway bridge to where a new traffic circle will be developed.

The approaches to the bridge will be raised seven feet to eliminate the present hump in the center of the span.

A spokesman for the State Dept. of Public Works, here, said that the demolition contract is part of the total project which will cost more than two million dollars. While two buildings have already been demolished in the part of the widened state highway, the exact date for the removal of the other buildings is up to the contractor.

The area bounded by Broadway, Jerusalem and the LIRR which will be entirely cleared and layout as a traffic exchange will probably be the last portion of the overall job. William Manfilla who owns about 80 per cent of the area said he has not been served with notice to evacuate as yet.

Among the North Broadway buildings scheduled to come down is the office of Charles Montana Realty & Insurance at 113 No. Bway. The firm plans to build a new structure in the rear of its present location.

Where 40-day notices have been served, service was made upon both the landlords, and the respective tenants.

Jim's Delicatessen near the corner of John St., has closed some weeks ago and the diner near the intersection has already been moved back more than 50 feet. Ferrara's Sunoco Station at the triangle has closed and the gasoline pumps have been removed. Andy Ferrara has since opened at a new station on W. John St.

## LI National Gets Bond Issue

The Long Island National Bank of Hicksville was the successful bidder for a Hicksville School District bond issue of \$3,026,500. Immediately following the opening of six bids at the School Administration Bldg on Wednesday, Mar. 19, the Board of Education made the award to the LI National Bank.

The coupon rate of all bidders was 3.5 per cent with the premium ranging from a high of \$23,273.79 offered by LI National Bank, to a low of \$7,870 by Solomon Bros and Hutzler & Associates.

# Annual School Meeting Passes

THE ANNUAL SCHOOL meeting for Hicksville set for Tuesday night, May 6, may well become a historic occasion. It will probably be the last Annual School Meeting for the District.

Under recent revisions in the Education Law, where a School District has been divided into election voting districts for school purposes -- such as Hicksville has been for several years now -- the annual meeting is replaced by the process of just voting on the budget as submitted.

Levittown District is abolishing its annual meeting this year already. In its place, the Levittown School Board is holding a series of discussion meetings on the district budget prior to the decision at the polls.

There are those who feel that the Annual School Meeting has lost its significance in the communities which have grown from four thousand to forty thousand residents. Attendance has been small, as compared with the eligible number of district voters. Two or three hundred people have in some cases decided issues which deserved the approval or disapproval of the entire community.

Some years ago in Hicksville less than 200 people were present on the evening when a taxpayer suggested that bus transportation be eliminated from the budget. The motion was made and carried and a lot of unhappy residents heard the news the next morning. However, before the summer was over, the School Board was petitioned by hundreds and a special meeting was called which resulted in the bus transportation item being restored.

At that time many people "swore" they would never miss another annual school meeting. We wonder how many remembered their pledge in subsequent years.

The annual school meeting for Long Islanders has been the nearest thing to the old time Town Meeting of New England. The powers of the voting attendants at the annual meeting have been broad and years ago, when the district was smaller, the business of the School District could be transacted at a single public session.

Obviously those days for Hicksville are fading. When the gavel comes down on Tuesday night, May 6 closing the annual meeting for this year it will mark the passing of an era.

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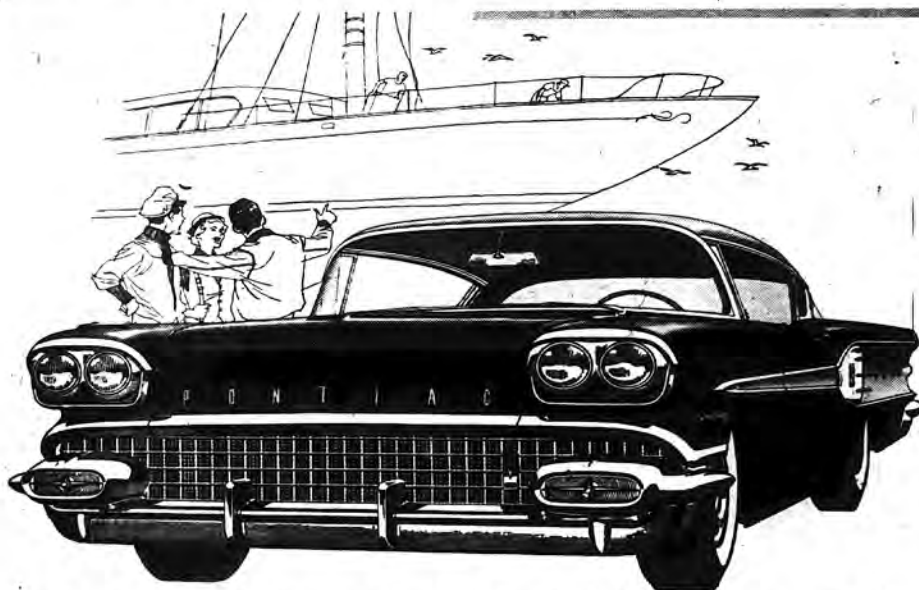
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
