SCHOOL BOARD CANDIDATES: 2 Weeks Until Deadline

With only two weeks remaining before the deadline for the filing of petitions in behalf of School Board candidates, names began to circulate. Saturday, April 26, is the last day for petition filing with District Clerks in Hicksville and Bethpage. Friday, April 25, is the last day for Jericho District.

Hicksville has a single vacancy on its seven-man Board this year. Emil J. Szendy, president for the past two years, is not a candidate after serving two three-year terms.

A group calling itself IDEA (Independents for Districts and Educational Advancement) has announced its backing of Earl E. Dittmars of 12 Picture Lane. A group of friends are circulating a petition in behalf of Walter Schreiber of 13 Suggs Lane, former president of the Duffy Park Civic Association, for a position on the ballot to succeed Szendy.

HOPE (Hicksville Organization for Public Education) has not announced whom it may support. The

Hicksville Citizens for Better Government in School Affairs has not announced its support of a candidate either.

In Bethpage the terms of Charles Campagne and Anthony LoFaso are expiring this year. Neither has filed for re-election as yet. The North Bethpage Civic Assoc. is holding a forum next Wednesday, April 16, and has invited the incumbents "and any one else who will be running for election" to speak at their Clubhouse on Stewart Ave. at Cherry Ave.

IDEA Candidate

Earl E. Dittmars of 12 Picture Lane, Hicksville, has accepted the backing of an independent committee to seek the District 17 School Board post which will be voted upon May 7. The committee, calling itself the "Independents for Dittmars and Educational Advancement", announced that it is sponsoring an

Write-In For Fire Chief Fails

HICKSVILLE -- B. Medard Ofenloch of 80 Benjamin Ave is starting his second term as chief of the fire dept. He was re-elected Thursday night, despite last-minute write-in campaign in behalf of First Assistant Chief Charles Saurer. Ofenloch, who was sworn in Monday night at the Dept meeting, received 118 ballots and Saurer got 31 write-ins for Chief.

Saurer also got 122 ballots one of the 156 votes cast for First Assistant Chief and was also re-elected to that office. Walter Wertheimer was re-elected Second Assistant Chief with 111 ballots and Walter Telender received 20 write-ins for that office. Telender was re-elected Third Assistant Chief with 135 votes. There were 23 blanks for third assistant.

Some Modifications

Board Keeps Merit Scale

The Board of Education has voted to retain the present schedule for Hicksville District, with merit features and some special modifications. At a special meeting of the Board on Saturday which lasted from 2 PM to almost 10 PM, allowing time out for a supper recess, the Board adopted a series of motions regarding teacher salaries including one which limits the pay raises for a teacher to \$1000 in any one year.

Voting to retain the merit schedule for another year were President Emil J. Szendy, Vice President Allen Carpenter, Herbert Johnson and Jerry Zettler. Voting no were Robert Goodrich and Robert Eaton. Trustee Arthur L. Elrich was not present.

GOING TO PUBLIC

A spokesman for the Classroom Teachers Assoc addressed the Board following the decision and said the CTA Board of Directors "plans to take their objections (to this schedule) to the public".

President Szendy replied: "It is my intention to answer some of the things the Teachers have been circulating which has misled a great many people in the District. I don't like to have to point to misrepresentation but there has been so much of it that it's a pity."

Nicholas P. Karamessinis, president of the Teachers Assoc, said he was not going to make the mistake of saying how many teachers were going to leave, but if 105 left last year he saw no reason why the number leaving should not be as large this year. He added: "The Teacher Assoc feels that one of the basic reasons for teachers leaving, regardless of what is stated in their resignations, was the question of salary schedule and its connection with merit."

Szendy replied that there was no argument about teachers salaries last year and yet teachers left. "Consequently, the implied re-

Merit rating of teachers was singled out for a blast from the CTA this week. "In addition to maintaining the same salary schedule, the Board voted to retain the Merit System providing increases above \$7700 only upon recommendation of a teacher's superiors. Over 90 per cent of the teachers oppose this Merit Rating", a CTA news release claimed.

The Board has under consideration salary increases requested by the custodians, School Administrators Assoc and the non-teaching personnel of the district (clerical etc).

"The point should be made", Carpenter declared at the meeting on Saturday, "If we satisfied more teacher we could get by on a lesser amount of money. We would hire new teachers with no experience or with one year of experience instead of being forced to hire teachers with experience. If we are not right in assuming that experienced teachers are better than inexperienced teachers, then our whole schedule of paying teachers with experience more money is wrong."

relationship between the two does not hold water any more than the letter that went out to the various P-T-A's. He had taken issue with Karamenis regarding a letter to P-T-A's from the Teachers Assoc which made certain claims regarding teachers who left the district.

11-MONTH YEAR

The Board also voted to put \$100,000 in the budget for next year for teacher salaries under the expanded school year program.

The starting salary for teachers with no experience will continue at \$4000, bachelor degree. Those with a Master degree will start at \$4300 and for a Doctorate, \$4600.

The Board moved the 30-hour step in the bachelor degree from the 5th step to the end of the 10th step with the exceptions made previously by the Board regarding teachers who have been in the system for 20 years or more.

Provision was also made for teachers who had received two increases in 1956-57 and, because of that, would not get a raise for 1958-59 under the new schedule. The Board voted to grant those teachers \$150 for 1958-59 and \$150 addition the following year to place them on step.

For most teachers of the District, the salary schedule provides a \$300 increase in pay for next year.

CURRENT COMMENT School Budgets Going Higher

MID ISLAND SCHOOL BOARDS are burning the midnight oil preparing record-breaking budgets for their respective school districts for 1958-59 which will be submitted to the voters at the annual district meetings on Tuesday night, May 6. Jericho District will elect two members of the School Board on May 6, while Hicksville and Bethpage will elect trustees on May 7.

Increasing student enrollment, salary increases and new school construction in all mid-island districts are raising the amount required to be raised by taxes upon local property. Budget increases in most areas are expected to exceed the increased state financial assistance provided this year by the Republican state legislature.

District proposed budgets, by law, must be available for public inspection seven days prior to the annual meeting (excluding Saturday and Sunday). Jericho District will hold a preliminary budget discussion on Tuesday night, Apr. 29, at 8 o'clock at the Robert Seaman School. Bethpage will hold a pre-budget session on Thursday night, May 1 at 8:30 PM in the Broadway School.

A preliminary hearing has been traditional in Hicksville but the date has not been fixed as yet.

Bethpage District has a number of special propositions for consideration of the voters at the annual meeting. One would increase the size of the Board; another would reduce it to five members. Also on the ballot will be the Bloomingdale Rd. School and site purchase which has been twice rejected by the voters.

Hicksville, Jericho and Bethpage districts will all be voting on the question of whether trustees shall serve three or five year.

Registration days for voters, not already on the books from last year, have been set as follows:

HICKSVILLE: At the seven elementary schools used in previous years, Saturday, Apr. 26 from 12 noon to 6 PM; Wednesday, April 30, 4 to 11 PM.

Election of trustee on Wednesday, May 7 from 12 noon to 11 PM.

JERICHO: Friday, Apr. 25 from 4 to 10 PM; Saturday, Apr. 26, 2 to 6 PM.

Election of trustees on Tuesday night, May 6.

BETHPAGE: Wednesday, Apr. 23, 12 noon to 10 PM; Saturday, Apr. 26, 12 noon to 10 PM.

For Hicksville, this will probably be the last annual meeting of its type under a change in the law. For Bethpage, which is considering dividing the area into election voting districts, it could also be the passing of the era of the annual meeting.

About Teacher Salaries

There appears to be far too much misunderstanding about the pay for teachers. Each school district is required by state law to pay teachers at least a minimum amount for their 10-month year. The law also specifies annual progression or increases over a given span of years. For all practical purposes every teacher gets a raise every year up to a maximum. Traditionally, the teacher association comes in each year and asks most school boards to set up a new, and higher schedule. In other words, the increase of a \$300 (average in many cases) is taken for granted. What the current exchange of headlines amounts to is a request for an increase ABOVE the existing scale.

A front page article in the Mar. 13 issue of the HERALD stated that all teachers in Hicksville will receive automatic salary increments without formal action by the Board of Education. I believe this statement is inaccurate. Teachers under the merit system of the Hicksville salary schedule do not receive automatic salary increments. According to the latest figures released by the school administration 62 out of the 486 teachers in the district are on the merit part of the salary schedule. Many of these teachers on merit are the most experienced teachers in the district. Salary increments for these teachers must be approved by each teacher's principal. This is not at all the same as automatic increase. I believe it is worth pointing out that under the merit system a teachers performance is "measured" by such subjective criteria as "philosophy of life". What is a "good" philosophy of life? And should any one person be given the authority to decide this question?

Rules for Student Dances

HICKSVILLE-The Board of Education has adopted a set of regulations governing student dances in the district, upon recommendation of Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, superintendent.

The regulations follow:

"Any organization or groups sponsoring dances for pupils must conform with the following regulations if they are to use school facilities.

1. There must be at least four adults present in a supervisory capacity. No dances can begin until these four adults are in attendance. They must enforce all regulations.

2. There must be no drinking, smoking, cursing, blasphemy, or obscene language.

3. There must be no fighting, quarreling, pushing, or other disturbances of other persons in attendance.

4. Pupils are to be appropriately dressed, at least as well-dressed as during the normal school day. Specifically there shall be no dungarees. No shoes can be worn that would damage the floor.

5. Pupils are to be kept in the area assigned for the dance and are not to be allowed to wander around the building or go out and return.

6. There shall be no damage to school property.

7. All dances, except those conducted by student organizations in

accordance with our extra-classroom activities fund regulation, are to be non-profit. If it is found necessary to make an assessment on dances it shall be only to cover essential expenses. Any time such assessments are made a complete account, including the amounts of disbursements and names of people paid must be rendered to the principal of the school who will forward the report to the Business Administrator's office.

"Any group which fails to enforce conformity to the regulations outlined above may be denied continued use of school facilities by the Principal or the Superintendent. It should also be understood that, in addition to these regulations applying to the entire district, pupils must also conform to any special rules or codes of social conduct which are in effect in the particular school where the dance is being held."

Increase State Aid For Schools Here

Assemblyman Edwin Fehrenbach of Bethpage announces that as a result of the action of the Republican Legislature at the 1958 Session, School Districts in Nassau County will receive \$7,085,000.00 additional state aid for education in the coming school year.

The Republican lawmaker stated that this increase was made possible by cutting unnecessary new positions and expenditures from Governor Hariman's proposed budget and using these savings to provide a statewide increase equivalent to ten per cent of basic aid to school districts.

Assemblyman Fehrenbach said: "The additional money will help school districts to meet their budgets with lower property tax rates than would otherwise have been possible."

The Assemblyman pointed out the increase in State Aid was only part of the total Republican program for additional aid to Education. Other important Republican education measures include: an increase in the minimum salaries of teachers; an increase in the minimum pen-

sion of retired teachers; doubling the number of science and engineering scholarships; provision for educational television; revision of school building aid; aid for services to talented children; increased state aid to libraries; and initial approval of a proposed constitutional amendment designed to place state credit behind school district bonds and thus lower interest rates.

The local increases, by school districts, include: Plainedge, \$399,000; Plainview-Old Bethpage, \$401,000; Hicksville, \$265,000; Bethpage, \$145,000; Jericho, \$17,000.

Hi Fi Drums - Capitol T226 - Rated E.

To say this LP is exciting would be the understatement of the year. It cools, boils and explodes in brilliant hi-fi and is the finest release of its sort on the market. Buddy Rich, Louis Bellson, Stan Levey, Chuck Flores and Alvin Stoller are among the seven outstanding drummers performing. Of the seven selections, the ones you'll want to audition for your friends are "Hi Fi Drums" - Buddy Rich waiting with all he's got expertly backed by the Woody Herman Herd; "Sticks" - Louis Bellson takes off with his just bass, Al Stoller; "Gonna Tan Your Hide" - Duke Ellington and Dave Black in a memorable performance; and the fierce battle between Levey Stoller and Irv Cottler in "Tri-Fi Drums," Billy May accompanying. Don't miss this one.

Beethoven - Symphony No. 3 in E Flat (Eroica) - RCA Camden Cal 404 - Rated E.

Serge Koussevitzky conducts the Boston Symphony Orchestra in the Beethoven masterpiece. His interpretation is a moving achievement here. The cellos perfectly start the first theme rolling in the opening movement leading eventually into a majestic orchestral eruption. The funeral march of the second movement as performed on this LP presents a violin section in an elegant fashion that almost defies description. A superb buy at \$1.98.

Monique Van Vooren - Mink in Hi Fi RCA Victor LPM 1553 - Rated G.

Skitch Henderson backs Miss Van Vooren in this entertaining album. On hearing the LP, you'll discover how fine a chanteuse she can be. Her French singing voice is always delightful. Unfortunately, she is limited in English (e.g., "Bed" - a tune that lacks appeal because of bad phrasing). In "Le Reflet," "Le Chanson de rues," and "My Man," Monique displays her talents to an enjoyable advantage. Her voice becomes a pleasant experi-

ence and those who enjoy the French touch put to pop music should like this LP.

Xiomara Alfaro - Siboney - RCA Victor LPM 1533 - Rated V.
Miss Alfaro appears with the orchestras of Ernesto Duarte and Calico Ofarrill in her album debut. When you hear her voice you may recognize it as the one that filled in for Silvana Mangano in "Mambo." She possesses a range that is truly dynamic and has the makings of an important addition to today's music mart. The bolero "Mirame Asi," the well handled "Siboney," "Bail" and "Malaguena" and the tender "Amor" are highlights. A Latin set made to order. Orchestral backing is perfect throughout.

Emile Henry Quartet - Seven Standards and a Blues - Riverside RLP 12-248 - Rated E.
Wynton Kelly, Wilbur Ware and Philly Joe Jones assist Henry in this, one of his last LP's before his untimely death. Lyrically speaking, this LP is the highlight of Henry's all too short career. Standards such as "I Get A Kick Out Of You" (dig the nice opening and closing Latin statements), "World On A String" (some real funky Kelly and moving Ware here), "Sweet Lorraine," (Henry makes his horn actually sing), "Soon" (some excellent Henry 4 bar exchanges with Jones) and the Henry original "Specific Gravity," that spots Henry as a dead ringer for Bird in the funky delight, are important highlights. Highly recommended.

Society Dance - Milt Shaw & His Orchestra at The St. Regis - Urania 9010 - Rated V plus.
This is by far one of the best society LP's I have ever heard. Though not reported as the St. Regis, it gives you a perfect example of the treat you're in for should you go dining at the noted establishment. 36 VERY danceable melodies consisting of fox trot and waltzes are capably paraded before you. All tunes, both old and new, are extremely popular favorites on the dance floor. The Shaw band is one of the best society groups in the country and URANIA does it justice by releasing this fine LP - one featuring the "business man's bounce" with a pleasing beat.

AMENDMENTS TO THE BUILDING ZONE ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY

U. S. Homes Pass 50 Million Mark

Number of households and occupied homes in the U. S. passed the 50 million mark late in 1957, according to the Housing and Home Finance Agency.

This is quadruple the number in 1890, and twice the figure in 1920. However, warns the West Coast Lumbermen's Association, the nation must build 1.25 million homes a year for the next decade just to keep even with the burgeoning population, and at least 1.6 million for the decade starting with 1965.

New families are forming at a rate close to 800,000 a year, the lumbermen pointed out, but an expanding and changing economic pattern in our cities to make way for highways, parking lots and super markets is leveling tens of thousands of homes. In addition, thousands more homes are destroyed annually by fire, flood and storm, or become uninhabitable as they fall into slum category.

In contrast, our population is climbing at a phenomenal rate, the lumber experts point out, and our housing needs with it.

1. Getting street lights for the unlighted sections of Birchwood?
