More Books, Equipment Big Budget Takes Shape

The increasing student enrollment, with more pupils entering the secondary level next term, is reflected in portions of the Hicksville School District Budget for 1958-59 which is expected to be completed this weekend. The School Board met last Saturday from 2PM to 11PM, with time out for supper, and tentatively adopted many of the individual codes. The District budget of \$6,216,307 for 1957-58 is expected to be exceeded.

Board President Emil J. Szendy left the meeting shortly before 8 o'clock following a vote, carried four to one, with Szendy voting no, on inclusion of \$53,685 in the budget for a year-round recreation program. Trustees Arthur L. Elrich and Robert Eaton were absent from the meeting. Voting for the recreation appropriation, after a presentation by Joseph Madden, consultant to the district, were Allen Carpenter, Herbert Johnsen, Jerry Zettler and Robert Goodrich.

Earlier in the day the Board met with representatives of the School Administrators Assoc (assistant principals and principals) regarding the salary scale.

ADDITIONAL STEP

By a vote of four to one, with Goodrich voting no, the Board added an additional \$10,000 step on the Assistant Principal's scale and an additional \$12,000 step on the Principal's scale.

A further motion to place Assistants and Principals "on step" on the salary scale by years of experience in the District was lost, four to one. However, the Board indicated it would like to have further details regarding the effect of such a procedure from the School Administration.

Trustee Johnsen asked Harold Robbins, spokesman for the School Administrators Assoc., how the principals and assistants felt about the merit step in their salary schedule. Robbins replied: "I think we can only point to one thing. That is that we supported the salary schedule in its design and we still believe that we should keep to our original ideas on this. We have not suggested that the merit step be removed."

"Well, then I can construe that to mean that you have some reasonable faith in the integrity of our administrators to administer the merit step with proper consideration", Johnsen commented.

In the area of Code 8-12, instruction equipment, the Board at a previous meeting has given approval to inclusion of \$4,374.45 for dental hygiene, including provision for dental chairs at East St

and Woodland Ave Schools, the only two district schools not so equipped at present.

Seek Extra Pay For Coaches

In a letter to the Board of Education, dated Apr. 14, and signed by their President, Frank Muller, the Booster Club of Hicksville High School is on record as favoring extra payment of school athletic coaches.

They claim that with the exception of Farmingdale, all the schools in Nassau pay coaches, and believe that "as a matter of law" payment of coaches is completely legal. It is their belief that the relative cost to the school system is negligible and that the services rendered more than commensurate for it; and that the contact of coach and player will be enhanced thereby, promoting good citizenship.

They stress that the school system constantly loses teachers who do coaching since they receive no compensation for their efforts, and that other schools in Nassau, having faced the same problem, found it necessary to pay their teachers in order to attract and retain such services.

Stating that they are vitally interested in maintaining the interest of the High School students in athletics, the Boosters feel that a well-integrated program requires a continuing coaching staff in the various sports since an ably coached team will be successful in competition thus becoming a source of pride to the student body as well as the community at large. With this in mind, they submitted along with their letter, a schedule estimating the number of hours of coaching needed in the various sports, and set a figure of \$2.50 per hour as payment, which they feel is less than the prevailing wage.

Plan Year Round Recreation

The sum of \$53,685 is provided in the 1958-59 School District budget for a year-round recreation program in Hicksville District. Last year the summer playground program cost \$28,000 and an additional \$20,000 was added to the budget, by a close vote, at the annual meeting for a district-operated recreation program.

The budget, as prepared by Joseph Madden who was engaged as a special consultant for the Board on recreation, indicates a summer season shortened from seven to six weeks.

As outlined by Madden, the summer program will begin early in July and end about the middle of August. It will include eight elementary playground programs, three teen centres, a series of family and special events.

The school year program, covering the ten months from Sept to June inclusive of holidays and Easter as well as Christmas recess, is scheduled to include three teen centres, seven elementary centres, athletic leagues, hobby and interest clubs, special and family events.

In both programs, coordination and consultation activity is listed under which "the recreation dept will endeavor to coordinate and enhance recreation programs presented by other community groups aimed at bringing about an integrated pattern."

At School Board meetings, President Emil J. Szendy has insisted that the "year-round" phase of the program should be submitted as a separate question on a referendum following the annual meeting. His views have not been shared by the other Board members.

Salary Scale Upsets Teachers

The Hicksville Classroom Teachers Assoc. Board of Directors in an unsigned letter to the Board of Education, with a copy released to the HERALD, recorded official objection to the merit salary schedule passed by the Board last week.

The letter from the Assoc. reads as follows: "This schedule is basically the same as that for this year, and provides the lowest minimums and Bachelor's maximum in Nassau County."

"Since over 20% of the district's teachers left last year, and since 75% of the teachers could earn more elsewhere, we anticipate over 100 teachers leaving the district once again. Since other districts with higher salaries are experiencing difficulty getting teachers, replacement of personnel leaving with good teachers will be extremely difficult."

"In a district anticipating a \$400,000 increase in state aid, and considering a one million dollar park, few teachers' salaries are a contraction."

"Our association does not believe that the taxpayers of this district desire low teaching salaries, since in education, as with everything else, you get what you pay for."

Custodians Get Boost In Pay

The Board of Education has granted a \$100-a-cross the Board increase in most categories of the custodial salary schedule for the year starting July 1. The custodians will now start at \$3600 instead of \$3500 and progress by \$200 steps to a top of \$4600.

The salary of the Junior High head custodian has been raised to that of the Senior High head custodian level due to the increased size of the structure.

Also added at the Board meeting last Saturday was a provision that hereafter overtime will be paid at the rate of time and one-half for all work over 40 hours in one week.

Two False Alarms During Week

Two false alarms were among the nine fire calls answered by the Hicksville Fire Dept. during the period of Apr. 9 thru April 15, both of which were turned in during the predawn hours on Apr. 12.

On Apr. 9, they extinguished a grass fire on Miller Rd. near Fulton Ave.

The next day they received an emergency call to Old Country Rd. and Park Pl. to wash down gasoline in the roadway which had come from the tank of a Judy Ann Ice Cream truck that had been upset.

The first false alarm on Apr. 12 was from Fox Pl. and Mill Rd., and the second came a short while later from East Ave. and Genesee St.

On Apr. 13, there were three grass fires, one at Park Ave. and the RR, another at Kramer St. and the last at Miller and Vincent Rds. Also the same day, they put out a fire in a tractor storage shack at 284 No. B'way, owned by Tony Pignatarro.

A small fire in the garage on Kuhl Ave. near W. John St. called them out on Apr. 14; and later that same day, they put out a grass fire at New South Rd. and the RR. The Fire Dept. ambulance transported Mrs. Visconti, 47, of 29 Tudor Rd. to Nassau Hospital, Mineola, on Apr. 15.



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CURRENT COMMENT Little Heat This Election

EMIL J. SZENDY is not running for re-election as a member of the School Board, an announcement which has been received with mixed emotions.

The School Election contest in Hicksville this year, which in previous years has been quite slam-bang, has been slow in starting. We understand Walter Schreiber is a possible candidate and we find this cheering news. We believe that people who seek to serve on public bodies, such as the Board of Education should have some knowledge of the community. We find it especially desirable for them to have been active in community projects. Walter has been president of the Duffy Park Civic Assoc. and, thru the Civic Information Exchange, we had the opportunity to see his efforts in behalf of his neighborhood. He undertook his full share on the Ambulance Fund drive. He has continued his interest by heading area drives in the Boy Scout Fund Campaign. He is a member of the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce.

At the present time, there is a new group calling itself "Idea" which spells out as "Independents for Ditmars and Educational Advancement". Their offering is Earl Ditmars whom we have never met. As a matter of fact, we find few people seem to know him. The extent of his community activity has apparently been membership in Lee Ave P-TA.

We suspect there will be other aspirants before the deadline for the filing of petitions on Saturday, April 26.

The election of School Board members is an important decision. An editorial in the March issue of the State School Board Journal notes: "The job of school boards is certainly getting no easier. The people who serve on these Boards carry tremendous responsibilities for the education of children and youth. The far-reaching and final authority with which local school boards are invested should give them the courage to study their own problems, seek consultation when needed and to make their own decisions."

It continues: "Strong and effective school boards are those which make decisions forthrightly as their considered judgments determine, without undue delay. They grow in strength and effectiveness as they fulfill their obligations. They recognize their authority and they act with the full assurance such authority gives."

The election of a person with a demonstrated interest in community affairs, experienced in leadership and responsive to the community interest and welfare is fundamental. We believe Walter Schreiber is such a person.

\$2400 was added to provide each elementary school of the district with a trampoline. An addition of \$3600 was made to Code 8-14, capital outlay, for band uniforms for a second band at the Junior High.

Equipment for the administration building, under Code 8-14, includes \$7000 for an addressograph machine with keyboard graphotype, \$650 for a collator machine, \$350 for a photostat, \$400 for air conditioning machines in the "Pentagon" and \$1500 for transfer files for storage of the bulging district records.

The sum of \$2000 is also provided under 8-14 for a change over

in the telephone system which will provide direct inter-system dialing, relieving the strain on the present dual switchboard.

The Board removed from the budget a proposal to spend \$1800 for a new Ford station wagon (to be bought under state contract price) for the use of the Administration.

RIFLES

At a previous meeting the Board has approved the inclusion of money in the budget for the installation of a rifle range in a basement of the High School. Last Saturday evening, \$850 was added for rifles, scopes and ammunition for a school rifle team.

Code 3-10, textbooks, proposes \$93,346.31, an increase of \$18,018 over the current year. This in-

NATIONAL PUBLICITY for Hicksville came again this week when the Apr. 14 issue of Newsweek magazine, under its department on education, published the above three pictures of local pupils in the foreign language program. The article said in part: "At Hicksville, N.Y., an imaginative first-grade teacher, Vera Villegas, converted the daily 'show and tell' period to Spanish instruction and launched what is now a full elementary-school language program, which she heads." The article in Newsweek

commented on the fact that "America is strapped today for people with a command of foreign languages". School Superintendent Wallace E. Lamb also reported that the school system will be featured on an hour-long program televised nationally and including interesting achievements of five other school systems. The tentative date is May 5 at 7:30 PM on Channel 7. Films for the program were shot at Lee Ave School during a 9-hour session last Saturday.

To the Editor,

As one of the 1,200 who have petitioned the Town of Oyster Bay for the acquisition of 50 acres of land for recreational purposes, I feel the letter from Mattie Kallinowski printed in this column last week should be answered.

As a "responsible citizen" I can only assure Mrs. Kallinowski, and those who share her views, that neither I nor, I am sure, the other petitioners wish to drive her out of Hicksville because of unburdened taxes. Let the gentlemen consider a few figures based on currently available information:

1. The Assessed Valuation in Hicksville for the latest fiscal year was \$80,045,324 on an equalized rate of 4.7%.

2. The cost of purchasing 50 acres of land and its full development for recreational purposes would not, under the most conservative circumstances exceed \$1,750,000.

3. The maximum annual cost for servicing a bond issue of \$1,750,000 at a rate of 4% and maturing in equal annual amortization payments for 30 years would amount to \$101,202. (The School District recently sold \$3.5 million bonds at a 3 1/2% rate.)

4. Maximum annual costs of operating and maintaining the facilities would not, I am sure, exceed \$50,000.

The appropriation for Code 3-11, instructional services, including schoolroom supplies and materials used in instruction, is up \$14,009 to a new high of \$124,792.76.

Under Code 3-93, substitute teachers salaries, the appropriation has been increased \$10,000 to a new total of \$70,000. The District is reimbursed for home teachers.

LIBRARY BOOKS

The School District anticipates it will need about 40 additional teachers next term, in addition to the present staff, particularly on the secondary level as more pupils move from the elementary schools into Junior and Senior High School.

The 8-15, code new library books has been increased from \$18,650 to \$51,195, a gain of \$33,137. Of the total it is planned to spend \$24,000 for Senior High School library books and \$12,636 for the Junior High library.

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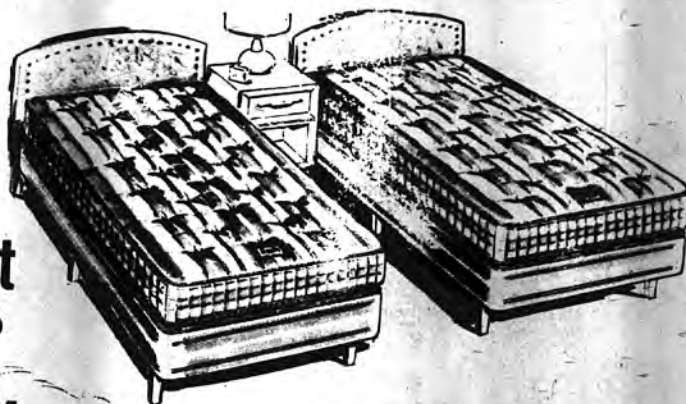

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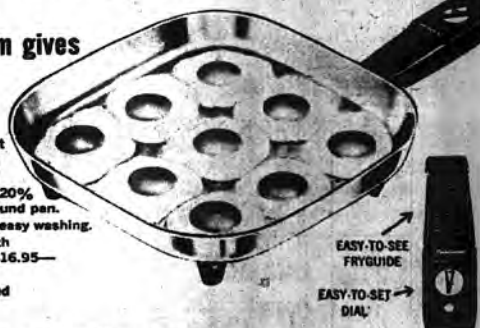

Civic Assoc Opposes Country Club

On Tuesday, April 8, a group of approximately 50 members of the Birchwood Civic Assoc. at Jericho appeared before the Town Board of the Township of Oyster Bay in a hearing on an application of the Jericho Country Club to lift the restrictions under which it operates.

Among those present were an attorney representing the residents of Birchwood whose homes are adjacent to the Country Club's grounds and a committee authorized by the

Board of Directors of the Civic Assoc. to voice the Association's opposition to the Club's application. The Board of Directors had voted unanimously to oppose the application at a special meeting held on April 1.

Last year the Country Club was granted a special use permit to operate by the Township of Oyster Bay. The permit carried with it several restrictions which were imposed by the Township at the request of the Civic Assoc. for the benefit of the whole community. Now the Country Club is petitioning the Township to lift the restrictions involving loud speakers, bus transportation for children, and night outdoor activities. At its special meeting, the Board of Directors voted to go on record, and to take any necessary steps, to oppose the lifting of any of the restrictions

Reader Opinion

To the Editor:

This letter is in regard to the recent objections by some Birchwood Park residents against the prospective acquisition of the Eldorado model home at the entrance to Birchwood Park by Temple Or Elohim.

Let us examine the points of argument. First, the traffic problem and the feared increase of "hazards" on Birchwood Park Drive. Our Temple has on three separate occasions informed the protesting group that Mr. Sosnow, the President of the building Corporation, has given us written permission to use the parking lot of the proposed new shopping center which will be only 150 feet from the Temple. This would mean no increase in through traffic because of the Temple and no parking on Birchwood Park Drive.

The second point of the protest is that the Temple is a semi-commercial establishment. This is a misrepresenting term for a synagogue. While we will be having meetings at the building, in no way is it possible to construe this as anything even relating to commercial.

The third point is that the Temple will disturb the privacy of those in the immediate area, either because the religious school children will destroy property or there will be excessive noise. We promised the protesters that we would erect a fence around the property which would prevent the children from drifting on to nearby lawns. Our classes have been sitting through-out the community this year with as many as 25 children in a home, and there has been neither damage nor noise; no neighbors have raised even the slightest complaint. The Eldorado has been used at various times for Temple and Community meetings and to my knowledge there have been no incidents. There are hundreds of churches and temples throughout the country that are located in residential areas. This is the natural place for them, near the homes of the congregants. The protesters must have low opinion of their neighbors and their neighbor's children to think that deliberate and malicious damage will be caused by them. The boys and girls in our community are a stripe or two above juvenile delinquents.

A fourth point made is that the presence of a temple building will destroy the beauty of the general area. Our Temple representatives have assured the group that no external changes (whatsoever) will be made. There will be a small sign out front, no different from those presently used by professional men throughout the community. No neon lights. Nothing gaudy in any way. The lawn will be cared for and, all in all, the Temple will be as beautiful as any of the other homes.

A fifth point is that the location, at the entrance to Birchwood Park is a poor one. In actuality it couldn't be better. We have no immediate neighbors on our side of the street, whereas if we purchased a house in another area, which we undoubtedly would do if we do not buy this, then we would have three immediate neighbors. This house is the most isolated one in the community and this fact is the most logical one for us to buy rather than to protest against our buying it.

For all the noise heard from the protesting group, there has not been a single scrap of evidence brought to support their arguments. They have been charged with emotion but

Jericho Country Club

The Jericho Country Club is in the News again. This just goes to prove that summer is around the corner. Swimming pools, tennis courts, sunbaths and other aspects of family life outdoors are part of the reasons why we have become homeowners here at Birchwood.

A Country Club must have dining and dancing facilities. We shall not stand in the way of progress. Evening activities with dining and dancing facilities would be good business for the Country Club and might attract many additional members who under present conditions will not join. The management has promised to build these facilities. We suggest they do so now.

little fact. To say that a House of Worship is "just another meeting place" which will be detrimental to the community shows a certain amount of narrowness of mind on the part of these men. No matter what the faith of the protesters, it is unpleasant to hear: "Go look elsewhere, we don't want you in our neighborhood." To prevent a peaceful group of neighbors from worshipping God in the manner they choose, a right guaranteed by the Constitution, is a restriction of the Freedom of Religion, no matter what the stated reasons are.

Truly, it is a sad commentary on the community of Birchwood Park that this letter had to be written.

That some members of the community should hinder a house of worship from establishing itself rather than help, is alarming. That some members of the community should compare their as yet untrampled rhododendrons with the preservation of the Bill of Rights is shocking. That some members of the community should sign a petition which represents such a highly unethical point of view is sad.

Temple Or Elohim will establish itself in Birchwood Park. It will be a wonderful and vital addition to our village for it will stand as a symbol to all men of courage that truth and right must prevail.

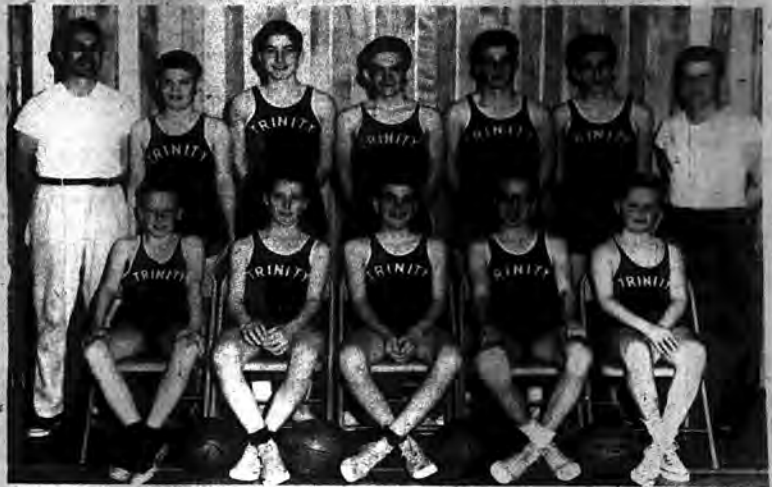
If there is a tie for top spot there will be a playoff and this could very easily happen, with six teams still in the struggle.
