## Budget Climbs Million Dollars; Instructional Services \$4,087,087

The Hicksville Board of Education completed the budget of the school district for the year 1958-59, Saturday afternoon, and announced a preliminary discussion for Friday night, May 2, at the Jerusalem Ave Jr High School auditorium. The gross budget is indicated at \$7,200,000, an increase of one million dollars over the current year.

The Board has acted upon the various codes of the Budget individually. The largest single increase is in Code 3, Instructional Services, which is described as relating "directly to the education of the children in the classroom. It includes salaries for the administrators, supervisors, teachers and clerical help and moneys needed for office supplies, textbooks, instructional supplies and staff travel. Code 3 is proposed at \$4,087,087 or more than half the entire gross budget. It is \$800,188 higher than 1956-57 of which more than \$700,000 is in the area of teachers' salaries, providing for salary increases and additional teachers needed next term.

The sum of \$1,983,850 is provided for teachers' salaries, kindergarten thru sixth grade; and \$1,350,850 for teachers' salaries 7th thru 12th grades.

### INSURANCE DOWN

The increase in the gross budget is also reflected in fixed charges--including state retirement for teachers, custodial and clerical help; Social Security and insurance. The appropriation on insurance of buildings and contents has been reduced by \$16,647 which is more than half the expenditure in 1956-57.

State retirement contribution of the School District to teachers is \$370,000 and the allowance of \$60,000 toward Social Security is a new item.

Operation of the plant (Code 4) is up \$36,424 which includes an increase of \$27,300 in wages of the custodial and operating staff.

Capital outlay (Code 5) is up \$10,129 while in this code the improvement of grounds item is down by \$27,416.

Estimates of tax rate for the coming year have not been officially released although it is anticipated the rate will go above \$5 per \$100 compared with \$4.81 this year. The proposed library budget for

1958-59 indicates an increase in the rate for this service from 11¢ per \$100 to 12¢ or 13¢.

Estimated state aid for next year is expected to increase due to revision of the formula and because of the increased student enrollment. The assessed valuation of the School District, which is a factor unknown until Aug. 1 when the official tax rate is set, is not expected to increase at the same ratio as it has in recent years.

## 2 Seeking Szendy Seat

Voter registration takes place in Mid-Island school districts requiring personal registration this Saturday at local schools. Where voters registered at the time of the annual meeting and election last May, they need not register again. Tomorrow (Fri) is the last day for candidate petition filing in Jericho and Saturday is the last day for such filing in Hicksville and Bethpage. In each case petitions are filed with the District Clerk.

Carl E. Ditmars of 12 Picture Lane and Walter W. Schreiber of Suggs Lane, Hicksville, have both filed petitions for the single vacancy on the Hicksville Board. Emil J. Szendy of 5 Walnut Lane, concluding his second three-year term on the Board, has announced he will not seek a third term.

John E. Hansen of 86 Bobwhite Lane has filed a petition for re-election as a Hicksville Library Trustee for a five-year term succeeding himself.

### BETHPAGE RACE

A contest looms in Bethpage where incumbents Charles Campagne and Anthony LoFaso have announced their intention to seek re-election. Ronald Kops of 18

Caffrey Ave has announced his intention to seek the seat now held by Campagne.

The five-year term of Louis A. Sista as a library trustee expires this year in Bethpage.

There are two vacancies to be filled in Jericho School Board where the terms of Martin Penn and H. Willets Underhill expire. It is reported that both are candidates for re-election.

In Jericho, in addition to those who registered at the annual meeting in 1957, those who registered in connection with a special referendum on a High School last November are also eligible to vote without further registration.

## Ditmars Opens Campaign

A bid for the support of all qualified voters "who firmly believe that the policy and action of the School Board must be guided and gauged by standards of the highest value for the educational fulfillment of the children of Hicksville," was made this week by Earl Ditmars, candidate for the School Board post which will be voted on May 7.

Calling for a "positive approach" to education problems, Ditmars, an American Airlines economist and former university teacher, declared that he had great confidence in the ability of adults in the community to "poll their best efforts to reach a level of education which would permit the next generation of adults to develop their minds and talents to a high degree."

"As a result of conversations with many residents, attendance at Board meetings and a close attention to our school problems, from questions of teacher morale to the physical environment in which our children study, I have concluded that there is a deep interest in a forward approach to education problems in our community."

"I am convinced that people want a Board which will fulfill its function of establishing broad general

## Better Govt Backs Schreiber

The election of Walter W. Schreiber of 13 Suggs Lane as a member of the Board of Education to fill a vacancy in the May 7 Hicksville District Election has the recommendation of the Hicksville Citizens for Better Government in School Affairs executive committee.

He was the temporary organizational president of the Duffy Park Civic Assoc. and served as president of the Civic Assoc. for two years. He was a member of the Civic Assoc. executive committee for two more years.

Schreiber has been a member of the Citizens Advisory Committee on Education appointed by the School Board and worked on sub-committee
