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See Start of RR Grade Crossing Elimination Here Early Next Year

Start of the Hicksville RR grade crossing elimination project early next year was predicted in several quarters this week. Michael J. Sullivan, town attorney, predicted the breaking of ground for 1959 at the Chamber of Commerce dinner-dance, Saturday night. It was echoed by a State Public Works official in New York City, Tuesday.

Town Supervisor John J. Burns, installing officer at the Chamber's dinner-dance on Saturday, emphasized the progress on this program also. Seven RR crossings at grade are due to be replaced with an elevated structure to cost an estimated ten million dollars. The Public Service Commission held a hearing in New York City on Tuesday morning before Examiner H. M. Olmsted upon a request from Peter Triano for a revision in plans to include a RR siding into his property at Barclay St.

Town Attorney Sullivan was present, representing the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce, were Past President Al Schachner, Walter Stackler, and Paul Walker.

Testimony was given by Triano regarding the necessity for a RR siding as he saw it, claiming it is the "lifeline" of his trucking business. There was also testimony given by the Long Island Rail Road

and PSC. Involved in the hearing was the question of whether the \$100,000 estimated cost of the siding would be made part of the overall project cost.

Evidence indicated the plan for a siding would not hamper the elimination at Old Country Rd. as had been reported. It would not interfere with the movement of auto traffic on Railroad Lane, either.

E. J. Ramer, representing the State Dept. of Public Works, said at the opening of the PSC hearing that it was expected that work on the crossing elimination will begin in the Spring of 1959.

The initial PSC hearing on the matter was held on Aug. 18, 1954. A subsequent hearing was held Feb. 14, 1955.

Levitt Pools Open for Season

HICKSVILLE - The pools of the Joint Hempstead-Oyster Bay Town Pool and Hall District officially open this Saturday, May 24, and pool tags for the season may be secured from Levittown Hall on Beech La. off Levittown Pkwy., between the hours of 10 AM to 5 PM. When applying for the tags, residents must present a current electric or telephone bill.

Plan School Site Vote Late June

Action on a proposed special referendum for the Hicksville School District on a proposed 10-acre school site on Cantigue Rock Road and other questions was deferred until this Friday night, May 23. The Board meeting will start at 9:30 PM instead of the usual 8:30 PM so that Trustees may attend the School Concert at the high school.

There are 2,492 persons registered for the late June referendum.

These are the voters who enrolled for 1958-59 when they voted at the annual meeting or for school trustees, May 6 or 7. Another registration date will be set before a vote is held.

Some details regarding the proposed questions were missing last Friday night, necessitating the postponement of action. Besides the purchase of a school site, the questions may include a proposed addition to the Administration Bldg and a garage

to house vehicles owned by the District.

Board President Emil J. Szendy, as an individual, is trying to get enough signatures on a petition to bring the year-round recreation program, which was approved at the annual meeting, up for reconsideration at the special referendum. It is estimated more than 4,000 signatures would be required on this kind of a petition.

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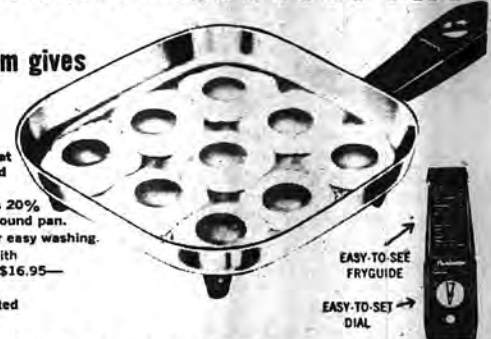
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CURRENT COMMENT

That Modern Chatterbox

EVERY COUGH, deep sigh or weighty pronouncement of the Hicksville Board of Education and the School District Administrators expressed at weekly meetings since July 2 of last year has been recorded on miles and miles of thin plastic recording tape.

Days, weeks and even years later the exact vocal inflection can be heard by those who wish to listen.

Almost two miles of tape are used at the weekly sessions of the School Board from the opening prayer right thru to the final motion -- usually the first hours of Saturday morning.

We understand the Board of Fire Commissioners is also making use of a tape recorder at their regular meetings.

The Hicksville Board is probably a pioneer in this form of "minutetaking" at regular school board meetings. Tape recording was begun in July of 1956 when Elmer Breschard was the district clerk. It continued thru the tenure of Walter Schlichting and then, by majority vote at the time, was discontinued in the middle of a session in January of 1957.

The tape record since July has been continuous.

The tape recordings are stored in the custody of the District Clerk and by ruling of the State Education Dept may not be destroyed or erased.

The use of magnetic recording tape is a comparatively new development. The process has taken remarkable strides in the past decade.

We had our first experience with this kind of recording during the Hicksville Tercentennial Celebration when Gertrude Wetterauer, who was general chairman of the celebration, recorded commentary for films taken of the High School pageant.

In September 1953, when Town Supervisor Charles Ransom held a public hearing on the Hicksville incorporation petition in the Courthouse on Heitz Pl and Bay Ave., Lewis N. Waters (then a Councilman) had his tape recorder on the desk to preserve every comment expressed.

About that time tape recording at Town Board meetings and hearings was also a common occurrence, although the record was taken more for the information of the Town Board and did not constitute part of the "official record".

We use tape recordings for our regular Sunday afternoon radio program on WHLI, "Oral Notes from Your Home Town Editor's Desk". The programs are taped on Fridays, sometimes two or three weeks in advance.

There is now a firm in East Meadow which offers a monthly billing service using tape recordings. They will pick up your tape, type out your bills, stamp and mail them, at \$18 per hundred, including postage.

Tape recordings are becoming so common place that it fails to surprise us when they pop up in the most unexpected places. A recent article in Reader's Digest called it a "modern chatter box".

A tape recorder was on the seat of the fire truck driven by Sam Weiss on Sunday, urging homeowners to give their support to the firemen soliciting for their welfare fund. The 1958-59 school district budget includes funds to buy a portable recorder to be carted around by Richard Cairns, superintendent of buildings and grounds, for note taking right on the scene.

As Reader's Digest pointed out: "The next voice you hear may well be recorded on tape".

Spray Now For Unsightly, Harmful Tent Caterpillars



Tent caterpillars start hatching from their dark brown eggs masses on tree twigs about the time wild cherry trees start to show new leaves.

The best time to control these pests is before they become firmly established in one of their unsightly silk tents which are familiar sights in the crotches of trees. This is the time to spray, using 1 pound of 50% DDT wettable powder in 50 gallons of water (2 tablespoonfuls per 1 gallon water) or 1 quart 25% DDT emulsifiable solution to 50 gallons

water (4 teaspoonfuls per 1 gallon water).

Tent caterpillars feed preferably on wild cherry but also like apple, peach and plum foliage and will attack many other varieties if necessary to obtain food. They can quickly and seriously defoliate a tree under attack. Small nests can be quickly destroyed by simply wiping out their nests by hand, using paper or gloves or they may be burned out with the use of an improvised kerosene torch. This method, however, offers some injury to the tree and should not be used on valuable specimens.

Section 1.0 All trades/manufacturers, or mechanical employments upon the 30th day of May, known as Memorial Day, are hereby prohibited, except that when the same are works of necessity, they may be performed on that day in their usual and orderly manner, so as not to interfere with the observance of said day.

Section 2.0 All manner of public selling or offering for sale of any property upon the 30th day of May, known as Memorial Day, is prohibited, except as follows:

a. Articles of food may be sold, served, supplied, and delivered at any time before ten o'clock in the morning.
b. Meals may be sold to be eaten on the premises where sold at any time of the day.
c. Caterers may serve meals to their patrons at any time of the day.
d. Prepared tobacco, bread, milk, eggs, ice, soda water, fruit, flowers, confectionary, souveniers, newspapers, gasoline, oil, tires, drugs, medicines and surgical instruments may be sold and may be delivered at any time of the day.

e. Grocers, delicatessen dealers, and bakeries may sell, supply, serve and deliver cooked and prepared foods, and roadside stands selling fresh vegetables and other farm produce, and fishing tackle, and bait stores may sell, supply, serve, and deliver merchandise usually sold by them at any time of the day.

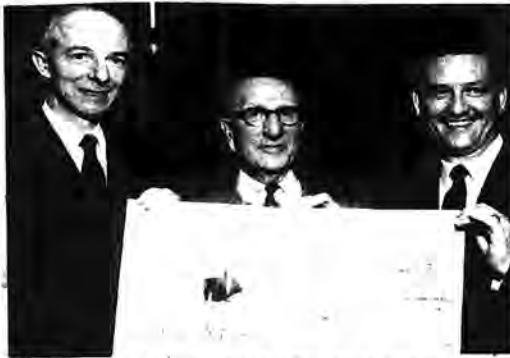
