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New Zoning Map Cancels School Vote

Plans for a proposed Hicksville School District vote on a 10-acre school site on Cantigue Rock Road at a cost of \$175,000 were dropped abruptly, Friday night, when the Board of Education was informed that the entire former Press Wireless property is scheduled for industrial use zoning by Oyster Bay Town Board. A public hearing on the proposed new zoning map for the western half of Hicksville is set for Tuesday morning, June 10, at Oyster Bay Town Hall. A copy of the map may be studied at the office of the MID-ISLAND HERALD.

The referendum planned for the end of June had been scheduled to include the vote on the proposed land purchase, a proposed \$135,000 addition to the School Administration Bldg on Newbridge Rd., and a \$40,000 vehicle storage garage on Second St next to the Junior High School.

A copy of the proposed rezoning map was presented at the meeting by the District Clerk. The motion was made by Allen Carpenter, seconded by Jerry Zettler, that the Board withdraw its designation of a site on Cantigue Road as filed with County Clerk Ernest F. Francke. The motion was carried with Carpenter, Zettler, Robert Goodrich, Robert Eaton and Emil J. Szendy voting in favor. Herbert Johnson was delayed in arriving at the meeting and Arthur L. Elrich was absent.

The new map is the result of a year of study by a Advisory Zoning Committee headed by Henry G. Eisenman and a private consulting firm, Community Housing and Planning Associates. Hicksville will acquire about 190 acres of industrial-use property. The proposal is based, according to Supervisor John J. Burns, on a proposal to confine "industrial development to logical, well-planned areas, screened and isolated from neighboring residential areas."

The question of a referendum on school-year recreation which has been the personal campaign of Board President Szendy might have developed had the June vote of the community been affirmed up. As it was, the question of a contract with Joseph Madden as recreation director at an annual salary of \$9000 participated some discussion on the subject.

Another Hearing On RR Crossings

The Public Service Commission has set a further hearing on Hicksville's Rail Road Crossing Elimination program for Friday morning, June 27, at 199 Church St., New York City. The purpose is limited to considering proposed amendments on the plan regarding the Newbridge Rd. crossing. The notice of the hearing states the Superintendent of Public Works (of the state) has requested a "determination as to the practicability of the construction of Newbridge Rd. across the tracks of the LIRR."

The Board on motion by Carpenter, seconded by Johnson, voted to have the Board Vice President sign the agreement with Madden and all present voted in favor.

Szendy moved to have the 60-page recreation program report prepared by Madden "compressed into not over four pages and a copy sent by the children to every parent." Substantial excerpts from the report were the subject of a full-page report in the HERALD on May 15.

This motion was defeated with all opposed except Szendy. Eaton then moved to have 50 copies of the report placed at each public school where they may be picked up by interested parents. This was seconded by Carpenter and approved by all Board members. Because of the size of the report, the copies will not be available for some time.

The meeting on Friday night, called for 9:30 PM because of the "music concert by the students, did not get underway until 10:37 PM and ended at a few minutes to one in the morning.

Hicksville's annual Memorial Day Parade will start from the Parking Field which adjoins The American Legion clubhouse on East Nicholas St. tomorrow (Fri) morning, May 30, at 10 A.M.

The route of the parade from the Parking Field will be west on Marie St. to Broadway; then north on Broadway to Herzog Pl; west on Herzog to Jerusalem Ave. and then south on Jerusalem to the Memorial

Mall on the grounds of the Jerusalem Ave. Junior High School.

Park Buffer Is Essential

THE PROPOSAL to designate the entire former Press Wireless area as industrial zoning is good news to many who have been concerned about the future of this last, big open tract in the Hicksville School District.

Among one of the earliest agreements reached in the Citizens Park Advisory Committee was the fact that the zoning of this property for industrial use would be a distinct advantage to the community. The approval was conveyed to Supervisor John J. Burns. It also stressed that such rezoning should include provisions for a buffer area.

The proposal to have a 50-acre community park (which should be larger if we could afford it) in the Northwest area is coupled with this rezoning of the Press Wireless property, in our opinion. The fact that the Town Board is undertaking this action on its own motion, rather than upon the petition of the property owners, demonstrates for us the real essence of planning.

A portion of the area is already in industrial zoning. This includes about 30 acres at the corner of John St. and Cantiague Road and an adjacent 10 acres or so which is the site of the new Sylvania-Corning Nuclear Fuel plant.

About 90 to 100 acres have been acquired by a group planning to sub-divide and sell off portions of the map to home builders. This would produce about 300 to 400 more homes and have far-reaching effect upon all our community plans for the education of the children. At present, the system is delicately balanced to accommodate the graduates of the elementary schools in the junior and senior high schools, including the use of overlapping sessions etc for a peak period. The addition of children from another three hundred or more homes in the district would upset the entire projection. It could cost Hicksville another three or four million dollars or more in bonded debt for another junior high and possibly a second senior high school.

The fact that the referendum, tentatively set for late June, has been suspended does not close the door on the construction of another elementary school on the north side. However, it would be folly to slice a school site out of an industrial tract and to build a school in the midst of acres of manufacturing plants. We can anticipate some thoughtful further consideration of the so-called Willet Ave site.

Rezoning Press Wireless property to industrial use is fine. However, let's be sure to stake out the community park area as a realistic buffer between the homes along Kuhl Ave and vicinity and the future occupants of this vast industrial sector.

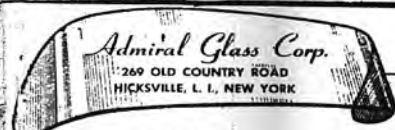
Knights Elect New Officials

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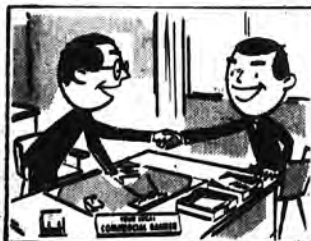

AN EDITORIAL Act Humanely, By Driving Sanely Face of Jericho

Our community has many problems. One of the worst and potentially most dangerous ones is the lack of a speed limit at Birchwood Park at Jericho. Merry Lane, Maytime Drive and particularly Birchwood Park Drive have become speedways for cars and trucks passing through our community. Pity the poor child who may inadvertently run after a ball or try to cross one of these arteries by bike or on foot. Cars speeding down Birchwood Park Drive at 40, 50 and 60 MPH are a common sight. It will only be a matter of time until a serious accident occurs.

Until such time as we can clear the various governmental hurdles to get a reasonable speed limit here, we the residents must set an example by driving at a safe and reasonable rate of speed, between 20 and 25 MPH. Too many of us are guilty of stepping on the gas, without giving thought to children or adults who might step into the street, hidden from our immediate view perhaps by parked vehicles.

We need parks, we need streetlights in many streets, we need traffic lights at Broadway and Jericho Turnpike entrances. This and many more problems need to be solved to make this community a more perfect place in which to live in. But firstly, let us take care that all of us stay alive to be able to enjoy the blessings of suburbia.

Approves Psychologist

At the last meeting of the Jericho School Board, approval was voted for the hiring of a school psychologist for our public schools. This move had been strongly urged and is supported by our Civic Assoc., Education Committee, by all P.A.'s and similar organizations in our school district.

Martin Penn, chairman of the Board, emphasized that, in implementing this decision, a person with full training and proper experience should be sought. It was felt that it would be worthwhile to pay a higher salary in order to get a qualified person for the job.

The main purpose of the school psychologist is, as is the purpose of all other school personnel, to help each child reach the fullest development possible, intellectually, academically, and as a person. Toward this end, the school psychologist functions in many ways.

As supervisor of the district group testing program, the psychologist helps teachers better understand the instructional needs of individual children in their class and is able to discover children who are having difficulty in working up to the level expected of them in terms of their ability. In addition, analysis of the achievement test results can point up if and where instruction in the district needs more emphasis. Scrutiny of the intelligent test results by the psychologist is a first step toward identifying the gifted and retarded children in our schools, so that these

children may be provided with educational opportunities to develop to the fullest possible extent.

A large portion of the psychologist's time is devoted to individual case studies. That is to say, examining individual children who pose various types of school problems, from a child who is slow in reading, to a severely emotionally disturbed child who may be extremely disruptive in the classroom. The purpose of the investigation is to help the teacher understand the causes--to answer the question "why?" After the "why" has been discovered, in a majority of situations, the "how to deal with this" is determined in conferences by the psychologist, teacher, principal and where indicated, the parent.

While referral of children for an individual child study examination is made by the classroom teachers, some parents may feel that their child is having difficulties that need further understanding and warrants study. The psychologist can meet with a parent to discuss a child's problem, a solution at times being formed without examination of the child. Psychologist-teacher conferences are also held in those instances where the "why" is known but help in "what to do about it" is needed.

Your Education Committee is gratified to see one of its objectives in improving our schools accomplished, and, with your support, hopes to continue its work toward a better school system for Jericho.

Board Plans Information Meeting

Plans to hold a special meeting to examine and discuss education in the Jericho Public Schools were announced at the regular May meeting of the School Board. At this meeting, to be held on June 5 at the Robert Seaman School at 8:30 P.M., Dr. Kenneth Lant, District Principal, will answer questions from the Board members concerning all phases of the district's educational program. Although no questions or discussion will be allowed from the residents attending, it is planned that at a future, similar meeting the residents will be allowed to participate.

Also approved at the regular Board meeting was a motion by Board Member Sam Hecht to hire a school psychologist. (See Education Committee Column). Martin Penn, William Mayhew and Sam Hecht voted in favor; Willets Underhill was opposed; Irving Brand was not present.

The Board also discussed the question of police protection at the Jackson School. Dr. Lant re-

ported that, in a recent survey made by the Nassau County Police Dept., it was found that too few children were walking to school to warrant assigning a police guard to the street intersections. Since so many parents drive their children to and from school it was felt that the main problem was one of controlling automobile traffic during the peak hours.

A six weeks self-sustaining summer recreation program to run from July 7 to Aug. 15 was approved. A \$10.00 registration fee and a \$10.00 transportation fee were set.

Also discussed were the application for transportation of pupils to two parochial schools and the feasibility of conducting a business management survey of the district.

Pending construction of the new section to the Junior High School at Syosset High, the School Board announced the formation of plans

The Groups will switch schools for the second six months of the year, thus assuring an equitable arrangement for all of the children.

Robin's Lane School graduating students have been assigned to attend Baylis School for the first six months and in accordance with the above plan will attend Syosset Junior High for the latter six months of the year. Relocations will be made in toto by class, including faculty as well as children. A series of indoctrination visits are planned for June of this year, during which time the sixth graders will be taken through the Syosset Junior High School and will meet with grade advisors and the principal of the school to be shown the new school and in August the parents will be invited to the H.S.
