Thousands Search For Missing Child

Hundreds of Nassau County police and volunteer firemen, assisted by an estimated 5,000 other adult volunteers, took part in one of the biggest organized searches in the mid-Island area during a three-hour period, Friday evening. The object of the vast hunt involving fire trucks, police cars, public address systems and a door-by-door canvass was 7-year-old Elizabeth Ann Callihan of 37 Boulder Lane, Hicksville, who was found in Wantagh, about seven miles from her home.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Callihan was taken to see the Memorial Day parade by her father, Friday morning. He then left the youngster, according to police, and returned home to watch the family's four other children. Elizabeth Ann apparently became lost enroute home.

Police were looking for the girl starting at 1:30 PM. At about 7:30 PM the police called for the assistance of the volunteer firemen and fire alarm. Using the same pattern as the recent firemen's house to house welfare fund canvass, Ofenloch dispatched his men and their vehicles to every corner of the six-square mile fire district.

Meanwhile, hundreds of police were operating from a base headquarters at the W John St. and Bway booth and Second Precinct Hqs. on Hicksville-Jericho Road. At 8:23 PM, Fire Chief Ofenloch called his men and reorganized the search which included looking into every garage, carport and backyard. Sound trucks toured the streets broadcasting the youngster's description and urging Elizabeth Ann, if she heard the announcement, to come to the street and flag a passing fireman or policeman.

Upon reorganization of the search, Chief Ofenloch called upon the fire departments of Bethpage, Plainview, Jericho, East Meadow, and Levittown. They all sounded their alarms and called out additional hundreds of volunteers to widen the hunt. The sounding of the fire sirens brought out hundreds of adults who joined in the search.

The fire chief also went into the Hicksville Theatre and with the cooperation of Manager Gardner Pinkham the show was halted while the house was lighted and a row by row search was made about 8 PM.

Chief Ofenloch asked the HERALD to express his thanks and appreciation to all who volunteered and assisted in what was described as the biggest search of its kind in this area.

Just as the search was about to be widened, the little girl was found at about 9:30 PM wandering along Wantagh Ave., Wantagh, crying and asking for help to find her home.

Mr. and Mrs. William Roulette of 37 Swing Lane, Levittown, took the child to the police.

After the fact that the child had been located was verified, Chief Ofenloch sounded the recall signal at 9:45 PM and again 10 minutes later, to notify the many volunteers the search was over. Sound trucks stay out until 11 at night, announcing the child had been found safe and sound.

Open Bids For 2 Parking Lots

The Oyster Bay Town Board opened bids on Tuesday for the construction of two new parking fields in Hicksville, one of which will be designated as Field #9, on the east side of Jerusalem Ave. between Marie St. and Herzog Pl., and the other to be designated as Field #11 on the north side of E. Nicholas St., east of Broadway and next to the Legion Hall.

There were five bids received on each field, and low bids were: Field #9 - \$33,534; Field #11 - \$44,644, both submitted by the Stel-Gas Construction Co. These bids have been referred to the Town Engineering and Purchasing Depts. for study prior to the awarding of contracts.

CIVICS WANT BUFFER

PW Owners To Fight Map

Principal objection to the proposed rezoning of Press Wireless acreage in the northwest section of Hicksville to light industrial use is expected to come from Gale-Oppenheimer, owners of a major portion of the area. A public hearing on the new zoning map for the western half of Hicksville will be held next Tuesday morning, June 10, at Oyster Bay Town Hall.

Northwest Civic Assoc. has previously gone on record as favoring the industrial use of the area, provided the homes are protected by a buffer park. Supervisor John J. Burns, speaking recently at a meeting of the Northwest Civics, gave the members assurance that a park of some kind is in the town plans; however, he indicated the tract may not run as large as the 30-acre sector requested by a petition of 1200 Hicksville residents filed with the Town Board in January of this year.

The Civic group met on Tuesday night of this week and did not change its view regarding the future use of the Press Wireless acreage. It was indicated the Civic Assoc. would be represented at the public hearing.

Hicksville School Board last Friday night directed School Attorney S. Arnold Witte to see that the School District is represented at the hearing to protect the best interests of the District.

Board President Emil J. Szendy advised the Board that he had been informed by an unnamed source that Gale-Oppenheimer plans to oppose the rezoning of their property.

Paul Gale, who had represented Gale-Oppenheimer at School Board meetings when negotiations for a 10-acre site were being made, came to the HERALD office this week to obtain copies of the legal notice on the hearing. The School District was interested in a proposed school site as long as residential units were contemplated for the area.

With the announcement of a proposed rezoning to industrial land use, the School Board has withdrawn its interest in a possible school site in that sector.

Newest promotion being developed at Mid Island Plaza will be "bids for kids". Plastic tokens will be issued for the value of purchases with weekly bidding by children for valuable merchandise using the tokens.

Town Rejects Business Zone

The Oyster Bay Town Board on Wednesday morning, June 4, denied the application of Dr. Alwyn Rand and Joseph A. Le Penser for a change in zoning on Jerusalem Ave., Hicksville, for a professional building.

The Town Board found that the area, Jerusalem Ave. and Fifth St., is residential in nature and that this proposed change would not be in accordance with the comprehensive plan.

The Board of Education had opposed the application on the grounds that it would be adverse to the interest of the school district, in that it would create a traffic hazard for pupils attending two schools in the immediate vicinity.

It was also opposed by Attorneys Julius Schwartz and John P. McGinn, representing property owners in the area.

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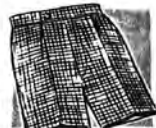

AMENDMENTS TO THE BUILDING ZONE ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, County of Nassau, State of New York, that the Building Zone Ordinance of the Town of Oyster Bay, as amended and revised, be amended in the following form:

Add new Section H-12, to Article X - "H" Industrial District (Light Industry):

Section H-12. Screening and Set-Back. In any case where "H" Industrial District property, along any of its rear or side line, shall be contiguous to and abut upon any residential district, a ten foot planting strip of evergreen growth at least eight feet in height shall be planted on such "H" Industrial District property along said rear line and/or side line wherever it is contiguous to any residential district before a Certificate of Occupancy shall be issued for any industrial structure on said property and said planting strip shall be maintained in such manner as to protect the contiguous residential district from directed light beams as long as an industrial use shall be maintained on said "H" Industrial property.

No such screening shall, however, be required or permitted within twenty feet of a front property line.

In the event that the width of any "H" Industrial District property shall exceed three hundred feet at the building line, and it should be adjacent and contiguous to any residential district, no industrial structure shall be erected thereon within sixty feet of any residential district line. So much of said set-back, however, which is not required for the above-described ten foot planting strip may be used for parking area, road, drive or loading area.
