EXPERT OPINION:

NATURAL AREA FOR INDUSTRY

OYSTER BAY -- The Hicksville area is "one of the few strategic sections of the township with industry-generating potential" according to an expert associated with Community Housing & Planning Associates, consultants retained by the Township who have developed the new zoning map after a full year of work. The expert is Glen Mathison who presented the recommendation adding 190 acres of industrial use area to the Hicksville map at a public hearing, here, Tuesday.

Opposition to the map came from the owners of the largest part of the proposed industrial tract who took the entire afternoon to introduce a series of exhibits and expert testimony. Also opposed were spokesmen for LI State Park Commission and a representative of Harlow Development Corp of Woodmere, builders of homes on the west side of Cantiague Rd.

HOMEOWNERS APPROVE
Strong support for the proposed down zoning was voiced by representatives of the Northwest Civic Assoc., a spokesman for Hicksville Chamber of Commerce and small property owners of Hicksville.

Aaron Roachman, vice president of the Chamber of Commerce, complimented the Town Board and Supervisor John J. Burns for taking the step of developing a new land-use zoning map. He did urge provision for a "buffer" of business use between industrial on the south side of John St. and residences on the north side.

Mrs. George Gros of 40 8th St., Hicksville, cited the rise in her school tax bill from \$66.02 to \$187.90 in nine years.

She urged the Town Board to down-zone Press Wireless acreage as an aid to homeowner taxpayers.

William Kress, president, and Ed Moss, past president of Northwest Civic Assoc stated the approval of their organization for down zoning; however, they pleaded for a protective belt or "strip" between homes on the west side of Kuhl Ave and the industrial region.

LESS BUSINESS AREA
Joseph P. Lebkuecher questioned the removal of some areas on the map from business zone, placing areas in residential use. He also recommended that both sides of Old Country Road from Newbridge Road west be zoned for business use and that parcels be zoned business for more than 100 foot depth to accommodate future road widening and larger structures.

Supervisor Burns announced that the Town Board will consider all letters, petitions and briefs filed either pro or con on this map if received within a week of Tuesday's hearing.

Robert Glasser, former Town Attorney, appeared on behalf of Ogpal (Gale-Oppenheimer) and Raymond Haas, owners of the former Press Wireless property and during the afternoon presented arguments against increased industrial zoning. He claimed, thru experts, that there is more than enough industrially zone land in Hicksville and the Township.

Frank Dougherty, counsel for LI State Park Commission, objected to the industrial zoning next to the Northern State Parkway. He stated that if the PW area were made industrial it would zone 1,000

Graduation for Thousands School Terms End Next Weekend

All Public Schools in Hicksville, Bethpage, Jericho and Plainview will close for Summer recess on Friday, June 20. Also closing that day are St. Ignatius Loyola and Trinity Lutheran Schools in Hicksville. Hundreds of boys and girls will continue in special classes in reading and other subjects during the vacation, however.

Commencement exercises will be held at Hicksville High School, on Sunday, June 22, at 5:30 p.m. Approximately 260 students will take part in the outdoor ceremony.

Graduation exercises for 220 students of Bethpage High School will be held Sunday, June 22, on the grounds of the Broadway School at 3 p.m. In case of inclement weather the program will be held in the Auditorium. Rev. Law will intone the invocation and Rev. Storz the Benediction. Ann Beth Waddell will deliver the valedictorian address and Sam Matusik the salutatorian.

Jericho School District has eliminated the graduation ceremony.

For the first time in its history Hicksville Jr. H.S., will hold graduation exercises.

Up until this year, "moving up" exercises were held, and then in the last few years because of students being housed in both the Jr. and Senior High buildings the ceremony was never held in union.

Because of the large number of graduates (570), the exercises are scheduled to be held on the grounds of the High School on Saturday morning, June 21, at 10 a.m. Also, because of the large number of graduates each student will be limited to invite only two members of his family.

In the event of inclement weather, the ceremony will be held in the Auditorium of the High School in two sessions. The program for those who's last name begin with A thru

O will be held at 10 a.m., and those P. to Z at 2 p.m.

Bernard Braun, Jr. High Principal, advises that if the weather seems unpredictable students should listen to radio station WHLI at 8 a.m. that morning, when an announcement will be made advising the students of the schedule decided upon for the day.

Trinity Lutheran School will hold the Kindergarten graduation Sunday, June 15, at 3:30 p.m. On the same day at 11:15 a.m. Baccalaureate Services will be held in the church for the 8th grade students, who will graduate on Thursday evening, June 19, at 8:15 p.m.

Ceremonies for the 120 graduates of St. Ignatius Loyola School will be held in St. Ignatius Loyola R.C. Church on Sunday, June 22 at 5 p.m. The Kindergarten graduation was held May 28.

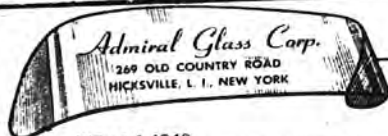

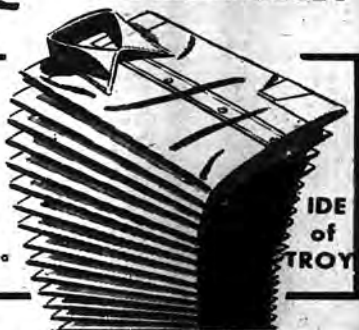

feet south of the Parkway should be retained in residential use. He admitted such a line would cut the proposed industrial tract in half.

SCHOOL
Harold Dubin speaking for Harlow Development Corp. objected because he feared the new industrial zone would hamper VA and FHA approval on mortgages for potential owners of the 174 homes he said Harlow is building on the west side of Cantigue Road.

This is probably the Imperial Gardens development on 46 acres.

He said home purchasers in the development were not promised a school on Cantigue Road but that the School District had dropped plans for a school there since the new zoning map became public.

"We did not mislead our customers," Dubin said, but now "there will be no school for the children of our customers" if the area is made industrial.

H. W. Underhill, member of Jericho School Board, spoke for the school board and Jericho Taxpayers Assoc. and urged the expansion of the industrial region on the north side of Northern State Parkway from Cantigue Road east to the proposed Long Island Expressway. This area is designated for residential on the new map.

NEAR FREIGHT YARD
The town's planning consultant in his presentation of the map noted "one of the contributing factors in this proposal is the proposed LIRR freight terminal north

of the RR and south of John St. The proposed zoning here (PW) would provide large industrial sites and provide opportunity for an industrial park." He added that areas marked for industry on the new map are either in industrial use, heavy business use or predominately vacant land.

He also advanced the following facts regarding Hicksville as an industrial-commercial center of importance. "The area's 182 acres of commercial use represents 21 per cent of the town's business acreage. The 554 acres in Hicksville already industrial consists of 34 per cent of the township total land so devoted. There are 2100 acres of industrialized land in the Township."

"A healthy economic base is essential to the town's future development and stability," the consultant firm noted. "Considered in the overall framework, the Hicksville area offers itself as the natural industrial-growth complex, its past and present high status as a manufacturing center, the character of its land use and distribution, its possession of a network of rail and road facilities and its excellent geographical location with respect to New York City and the island all contribute to the conclusion."

"Rezoning for industry, necessary for balance in the town's economic and physical composition, must consider the factors related to proper location, including express ways, existing character of development, railroad lines, and other aspects of desirable industrial placement."

The map under consideration, Tuesday, covered land sections 11 and 45 of the western half of Hicksville. A public hearing on rezoning in Plainview took place yesterday. In subsequent weeks a series of about 30 more maps, across the township, will be the subject of public hearings.

Supervisor Burns said this week "while the Town Board is fully aware there will always be various viewpoints on the difficult question of zoning, nevertheless we must continue to plan the orderly growth of all areas of our fast growing township in the best interests of our home-owner resident property owners."

Residents attending a special meeting of the Jericho School Board last week heard members of the school staff present reports on various phases of the educational program. The meeting, the first of a series of four to be held during the coming year, was designed to give the school board and the public better knowledge of the educational program in the Jericho Public Schools.

John Heller, Principal of Jr.-Sr. H.S., presented a report on developing the high school program. During this past school year the district has conducted classes on seventh through ninth grade levels and next year will expand to include the tenth grade. In order

to obtain a charter from the State Education Department for our High School, the curriculum must adhere rigidly to the State prescribed program. Heller said that several inspections have been made by State specialists and so far approval of our progress has been expressed. Heller emphasized that, especially since no public library exists in our area, it is important that the high school library be stocked as rapidly as possible in order to furnish our students with source material for reports and for outside reading.

The program for gifted children was discussed by Mrs. Barbara G. Rumrill, Director of Elementary Education. Rather than conducting separate classes, which are not feasible for as small a district as ours, the regular classroom program is adjusted to offer gifted children special opportunities. Among these are special reading projects, reports to the class and special art and writing projects. The importance of Kindergarten in preparing the child for his future schooling was stressed by John Bolles, Principal of Jackson School. He also described the program used by our schools in achieving this objective.

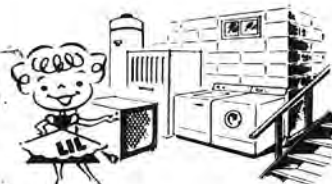
