## Ex-FBI Agent Takes On Purchasing

Chosen from among more than 200 applicants, Harold Hinckley, 31-year-old former special agent with the FBI and resident of Wantagh, will become Hicksville School District's first purchasing agent as of July 15. His salary will be \$7500. He was appointed at the Board of Education meeting, Friday night, after eleven candidates has been interviewed personally, including three Hicksville residents.

Hinckley, who has accepted the position is the father of two children, a graduate of the University of Michigan with a BA degree. He has done graduate work at Teachers College in the field of School Business Administration, since 1957 and up to the present time he has been employed as Assistant to the Secretary and Business Manager at the Rutherford School District in New Jersey. He was special agent in the Federal Bureau of Investigation dealing to a great extent with the handling of financial records during 1952 and 1956.

# 1700 at 44th Annual HS Commencement

Ideal weather favored the 44th annual Commencement Exercises for Hicksville High School's record-breaking 280 graduates held outdoors on the school campus, Sunday afternoon. More than 1700 attended to see 28 scholarships and other awards presented by Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, superintendent of schools.

Photographers were barred from shooting the ceremony, including a staff representative of the Mid Island HERALD.

Most outstanding scholarship award for the class was the National Merit won by the class valedictorian, Patricia Pearce. She had competed with more than 200,000 other Seniors nationally. It marked the first time that Hicksville has had a winner of this award, entitling her to full scholarship at any college of her choice. Miss Pearce also won a NY State Regents scholarship.

## Pledge \$518,110 for 24 Room School

The School Building Fund Campaign of Holy Family Church in Hicksville has reached its conclusion with \$518,110.00 raised in pledges.

Rev. Martin O'Dea, Pastor, in speaking to the 525 men of the parish who worked as solicitors on the campaign stated he was "overwhelmed with the spirit of loyalty and sacrifice on the part of so many parishioners."

Due to the tremendous success of the campaign, Most Rev. Walter P. Keelenberg, Bishop of Rockville Centre, increased the capacity of the proposed new school from 10 to 24 classrooms.

The minimum goal of \$300,000 was surpassed at the conclusion of the Memorial Gifts Phase, which had Tyler-Hicks as its chairman. The half-million dollar mark was surpassed two weeks later when the

General Phase workers visited the entire parish to afford them the opportunity to participate.

The campaign, which was directed by Community Counseling Service of New York, has Edward Collins as its General Chairman.

The new school will feature all necessary modern facilities for proper pupil and teacher efficiency. Plans call for 24 classrooms, medical room, meeting rooms and auditorium-gymnasium.

This auditorium will also provide space for additional Masses on Sunday.

In addition, a Convent with facilities for 16 Sisters will be constructed adjacent to the new school.

Construction of the new school and convent is expected to begin in the Spring of 1959. The parish was established in 1951 with Father O'Dea as founding pastor.

# CURRENT COMMENT:

## New Year For School Boards

BYSTATE LAW, mid-Island Boards of Education will meet next Tuesday, July 1, to organize (or re-organize) for the new fiscal year. In our area, this marks the assumption of office by new trustees elected at the annual School Elections of last May and the retirement of those who are being succeeded.

It will result in few, if any, drastic changes. Hicksville, for example, this year changes only one seat out of seven. Emil J. supermarket, bakery, kosher delicatessen, kosher butcher, dry cleaner, barber shop, Chinese laundry, beauty parlor, drug store, and bank. Section two will consist of a group of specialty shops, possibly similar to Manhasset's Miracle Mile. There will be parking facilities for approximately 2500 cars. One of the most important structures to us here in Birchwood is now being erected in the first shopping center section. It is the new Post Office. Mrs. Halloran, Postmaster of Jericho, announced that the 2500 square foot facility would be in full operation by the end of the year. This will provide Jericho with 200 Post Office boxes, Parcel Post and Special Delivery service, and, most important of all, regular house-to-house foot delivery of mail. Mr. Flanagan, a postal assistant, pointed out that the facilities provided to any post office by the Federal authorities are directly proportional to the volume of business the office handles. Therefore, we would all help our own service if we used the Jericho Office for our mail as much as possible.

In the business portion of the meeting, the treasurer, Charles Kraft, reported that the assets of the Civic Assoc. had risen from \$1077.20 on Feb. 7, to \$2997.62 on June 16, and Herb Shapiro, Chairman of the Board of Directors, read a brief summary of Committee Reports.

Jerome Abrams, President, announced that the Board of Directors had voted that this would be the last general meeting of the Civic Assoc. to which non-members would be admitted. The membership then approved the \$5. per year dues. It was suggested from the floor that a committee be formed to investigate the possibilities of chemically fogging Birchwood and report its findings to the Board of Directors at its next meeting. Such a committee was promptly formed.

The meeting was attended by a capacity audience, and was adjourned at 11:30 PM.

## Plan Shopping Centre Close By

In two to three years Birchwood will be a far different place in which to live than it is today. It will be a fully integrated community, with a Post Office and its own complete shopping facilities, situated between many modern parkways and highways.

This preview of the future of Birchwood was presented by several guest speakers at a general meeting of the Civic Assoc. held Monday, June 16, at the George A. Jackson School. After a short business meeting, descriptions of the new Broadway and the Long Island Expressway were given by Messrs. Toth, Shonyo, and Halbin, of the New York State Dept. of Public Works, the new Post Office and plans for foot delivery of mail were described by Mrs. Signe Halloran, Postmaster, and the new shopping center was discussed by Julius Yudel, of Yudel Realty.

Toth described the LI Expressway as being a limited access traffic artery extending from the Queens Midtown Tunnel east to Riverhead. It will have interchanges connecting it with all the major traffic routes in New York. It will carry all types of vehicles, i.e., automobiles, busses, trucks, etc. There will be no crossings at grade. It will run on a four 100 foot right-of-way, and consist initially of three twelve-foot concrete lanes in each direction, with provision for the future addition of a fourth lane each way. Opposing lanes will be separated by a 12 to 36 foot wide center mall, and outside lanes will be shouldered for disabled vehicles. There will be no illumination east of New York City, except under overpasses.

Full cloverleaf interchanges will be provided at the present intersection of Jericho Tpke. and Brush Hollow Road, at Broadway just south of the entrance to Birchwood, and at the present intersection of South Oyster Bay Road and Miller Road. The Broadway interchange will be approximately 22 miles from the Queens Midtown Tunnel. The Expressway will pass under Broadway, about 20 feet below grade, and run just south of, and parallel to Village Drive. The roadway will be at least 150 feet from the nearest home. The Dept. of Public Works hopes to start construction of the Expressway from Glen Cove to South Oyster Bay Road sometime this year.

Shonyo described the new Broadway State road as being a six lane concrete highway, with a center mall separating opposing lanes. A parking lane will be provided south of the Northern State Parkway. The section now under construction runs north from the Hicksville RR Station, past Mid-Inland Plaza, over the Northern State Parkway, and over Jericho Turnpike. There will be full cloverleaf interchanges at both of these overpasses, eliminating all left turns. The section of Broadway where the Expressway will come through will be paved with a temporary type of construction, to be replaced with the permanent roadbed at the time of the construction of the Expressway's cloverleaf. There will be an access provided through the center mall opposite the entrance to Birchwood Park.

Yudel explained that the Shopping Center on Broadway will consist of two sections. Section one, now under construction opposite the new
