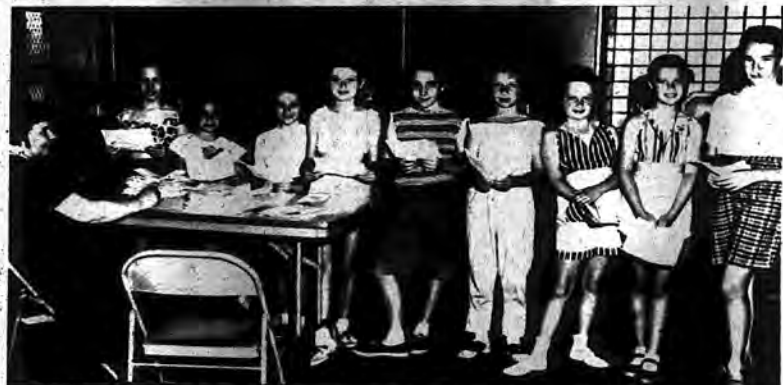

Carpenter Heads School Board

Hicksville Board of Education will hold its next meeting on Friday night, July 11, at 8:15 P. M. Allen S. Carpenter was elected President of the 7-man Board at the organizational meeting on Tuesday night. Other actions taken were:

Set meetings to start at 8:15 instead of 8:30 P.M., held every second and last Friday of the month instead of weekly.

Elected Herberth H. Johansen, formerly Board secretary, as vice president, and Jerome G. Zettler as Board Secretary.

Reappointed Fred J. Noth as district clerk, Aurelio S. Gelardi as district treasurer and Donald F. Abt as assistant superintendent of schools.

Took advantage of 30-day extension option in contract of S. Arnold Witte as school attorney and voted to receive applications for the position from interested

residents until July 11.

Voted to have Solomon Newborn make the audit of the district for the year 1957-58 and will receive applications for auditors to do the quarterly and/or annual audit in 1958-59 until Aug. 15.

Named Anthony Gorceycki as business administrator at \$9000 and extended his annual vacation from two to three weeks.

Reappointed M. L. Chitten as attendance supervisor and Sybella Caesar as transportation officer.

Voted to retain Board policies in effect the past year with two minor changes regarding agenda for meetings but indicated other

Board policies enacted last year may be individually reviewed and reconsidered. School Superintendent Wallace E. Lamb will prepare the agenda for meetings, instead of the Board president, at the suggestion of Carpenter.

The Board also appointed a committee of its members to look into the possibility of finding another place for meetings. For the

Another RR Underpass: NEWBRIDGE RD. TO SWING WEST THRU JACKSON

Another Public Service Commission hearing on the Hicksville Rail Road crossing elimination is scheduled for the July 22 as the engineering plans for the ten million-dollar project are refined. A proposal to create a 110 foot span over the new route of Newbridge Road, approximately along the present path of Jackson Pl. was heard by the PSC last Friday. No opposition was voiced.

Original plans provided for a single arch over Jackson Pl., carrying the presently dead-ended street thru to the north side of the RR tracks in the vicinity of the Station.

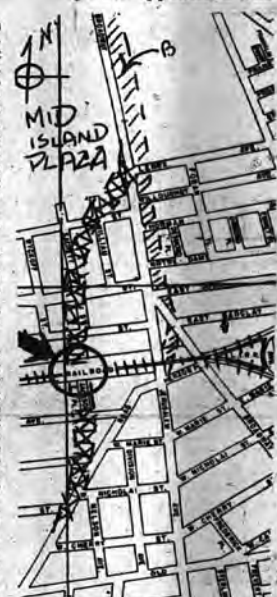
The State Dept. of Public Works requested the revision in plans in line with the projected new path for Newbridge Rd (which is a state route) swinging to the west from about Old Country Rd., cutting thru Jackson Pl., across into Sackett St and then bending east to come into Broadway at the corner of Mid Island Place (see shaded line on sketch map).

Newbridge Rd., it is proposed, will consist of two 30-foot lanes with a 20-foot centre mall. A span of 110 feet, carrying the RR over the new path of Newbridge (indicated within circled area on sketch map), is planned.

Increased costs in the RR grade crossing elimination as a result of the proposal will be absorbed by the State Dept of Public Works. It was indicated at the hearing before Examiner Olmstead in New York City, Friday, Michael J. Sullivan was present as attorney for the Town of Oyster Bay and Walter G. Stackler attended as the representative of Hicksville Chamber of Commerce.

A hearing is expected to be called for July 22 by the PSC on a proposal which has joint Oyster Bay Township and State Public Works Dept endorsement to move the station plaza area west of Jerusalem Ave to accommodate the temporary Depot during the progress of work and for future parking in the vicinity of the new elevated three-track station.

It was pointed out that the proposal to increase the span over Newbridge Rd will not effect plans for the bridging of Jerusalem Ave and Broadway and is not expected to delay the present schedule of work for the total elimination program, Sullivan stated following the hearing.

CHECK CLEARING BUREAU, unique activity of Nassau County Clearing House which began as an experiment five years ago and today is a going concern, processes an average of 100,000 checks a night. Prior to the Bureau, checks presented had to be sent to New York for clearance thru the Federal Reserve Bank or a city correspondent bank — a process taking an average of six days. Now, armored trucks pick up checks from member banks in Nassau and Suffolk at the close of each banking day and a crew of 45 people works thru the night sorting and tabulating checks (as shown here). The checks, sorted as to the banks upon which they are drawn, are then returned to respective banks the next day. The bureau is located in the Nassau Bankers Building in Freeport.

Sixth Season of Fun With Music

A unique program in music education for youngsters called "Fun With Music" is being set up for the sixth consecutive summer at the Nassau School of Music in Hicksville.

Organization of the course was evolved by the directors of the school, guided by Vivienne Hochman, author and lecturer, who is presently doing experimental work in young childhood education for the New York City Board of Education, as well as teaching at the Bank Street College of Education.

The basic belief in setting up "Fun With Music" is that music, through rhythm, song, movement and dramatization, has great

meaning and significance for the child. All children are musical, and with guidance can find in music a perfect means of expression and understanding. Realizing how important music is to children by creative experience, complete participation, increased understanding, as well as growth in knowledge of the materials and methods of music, the child is led to fully explore his musicality.

Among the activities found in "Fun With Music" is eurythmics. Here the child is helped to use his entire body in response to music, where the important thing is not learning set movements, but effecting a union of body and musical flow. Another activity is rhythm band, playing instruments such as drum, triangle, cymbal, and tone block. From just playing along for the younger child to reading separate parts for the more advanced, the child is given insight into the problems and pleasures of actual music making.

Get Permits

AMENDMENTS TO THE PLUMBING CODE OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY
BE IT ORDERED BY THE Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, County of Nassau, State of New York, that the Plumbing Code of the Town of Oyster Bay, adopted December 18, 1956 be amended in the following form:

Amend Article IV, Section 4.2.1 by changing the semi-colon after the word "application" to a period and deleting therefrom all those words that appear after said semi-colon.
Amend Article IV by adding a new Section 4.2.6 to read as follows: "4.2.6. RECIPROCAL AGREEMENTS: The Examining Board of Plumbers of the Town of Oyster Bay may, after determining that a municipality maintains a standard of licensing plumbers equivalent to that maintained in the Town of Oyster Bay, enter into a written reciprocal agreement with such municipality wherein each party shall waive examination of plumbers holding a license and Certificate of Competency from the other party, but such agreement shall not have any effect on any fees charged by the Examining Board of Plumbers of the Town of Oyster Bay."

When any applicant for a Town of Oyster Bay Plumbing License maintains either his residence or principal place of business in a municipality by which he is licensed and certified competent, and such municipality has entered into a reciprocal agreement with the Examining Board of Plumbers of the Town of Oyster Bay, then the examination required in Section 4.2.1 hereof, shall be waived. Such applicants shall furnish a photostatic copy of their Certificate of Competency together with a letter of "Good Standing" issued by such municipality, setting forth the fact that such applicant does maintain either his principal place of business or residence within such municipality.

Such applicants shall receive a card of registration only. Residents of the Town of Oyster Bay having their principal place of business in the Town of Oyster Bay, who hold a Master Plumber's License from a Municipality, which shall have entered into a reciprocal agreement with the Examining Board of Plumbers of the Town of Oyster Bay, may be licensed with the examination waived but the fee paid shall be the same as for those requiring examination by the Examining Board of Plumbers. No certificate of competency shall be issued to any applicant unless he has been examined by the Examining Board of Plumbers of the Town of Oyster Bay.

Amend Article IV, Section 4.6.1 by deleting the words "before beginning operations under his license" and substituting therefor the words "before receiving his license"

Amend Article V by deleting the present Section 5.2.4 and substituting therefor a new Section 5.2.4 to read as follows:

"5.2.4 Each plumbing permit issued in connection with a building permit shall automatically expire or be renewed at the same time as the building permit and without fee. Any other building permit on which work is not started within one year shall automatically expire."

Amend Article V, Section 5.3.3 by inserting a period after \$10.00 and deleting therefrom all those words following \$10.00.

Amend Article IX, Section 9.4.2 by changing the comma after the word "stacks" to a period and deleting the words "and short quarter bands" may be used in soil and waste lines where the change in direction of flows is from the horizontal to the vertical"

Amend Article XV, Section 15.1.1 by adding a new sentence to read as follows:

"15.1.1 No tank shall be installed except under permit issued by the Building Department."

Amend Article XV, Section 15.2.1 by adding two new sentences to read as follows:

"15.2.1 The fee for each outside tank installed and for each replacement of an existing tank or the addition of each supplemental tank shall be Three Dollars (\$3.00)
The fee for each supplemental

burner or replacement burner installed shall be Five Dollars (\$5.00), and the fee shall cover any inside tank installation made at the same time.

Amend Article XIX, by deleting the present Section 19.4.1 and substituting therefor a new Section 19.4.1 to read as follows:

"19.4.1 BALL COCKS: All ball cocks shall be equipped with an approved vacuum breaker located not less than one half inch above the overflow outlet of the flush tank."

Amend Article XXIII by a new Section 23.2.1 to read as follows: "23.2.1 Plastic Pipe: The use of flexible plastic pipe is prohibited except beyond a check valve and vacuum breaker for use in underground sprinkler systems and piping between an outside swimming pool and its appurtenances. All such pipe shall carry an identifying symbol or descriptive lettering assuring the user stating that the pipe conforms to the requirements of the National Sanitation Foundation testing laboratory or other approved agency that inspects and controls the quality of production. No such pipe shall be used unless it will carry a minimum pressure of 75 P.S.I., and shall be so identified by suitable marking."
