Demolishing Oldest Continuous Industrial Plant for Car Parking

The two-story frame building on E. Nicholas St of the Charles Voigt sash, door and blind factory which was founded in 1862 will soon be reduced to a pile of rubble to make room for added shopper parking facilities in Hicksville. Stelgas Construction Co of Rockville Centre, which has the contract for the project, began work on the site this week.

The Charles G. Voigt mill started almost a century ago as a sawmill. The power for the mill was supplied by a horse. As business increased, a woodworking business was added and steam power soon replaced the horse. Charles G. Voigt Sr. had arrived in Hicksville from Germany a few years before he began his mill.

The Voigts also conducted an undertaking business until 1919 when it was sold to H. Turnure and later by him to the late Archie Mowen. Upon the death of Charles Sr. the mill business passed to his son, and from him to his grandson who resides today on W. Marie St.

The Voigt mill has long been known as "the oldest continuous community industry". The Long Islander in 1925, discussing local businesses and industries, reported "Charles Voigt employs 12 to 15 hands in his planing, and sash and blind mill."

In 1946, the Nassau Review-Star, reported "The oldest continuous industry was started by Charles G. Voigt of Leipzig, Germany, who arrived in the village in 1857 and five years later started to make window sash and doors by hand in his small carpenter shop. The elder Voigt with two assistants, built the first German Lutheran Church in 1863 (on W. Nicholas St), used until the new church was built (across the street) in 1931."

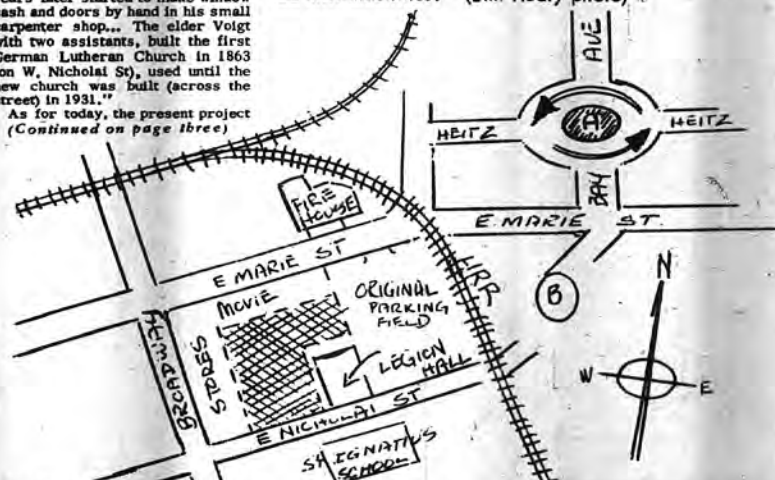

Exchange Club Hears Dr Needleman

Dr. Stanley Needleman, executive director of the Mid-Nassau Community Guidance Center, addressed the Exchange Club of Plainview-Bethpage at their weekly luncheon. Frank Corso, president of the Exchange Club, introduced Dr. Needleman, stating "the treatment and recognition of psycho-therapy and psycho-analysis for emotionally and mentally disturbed individuals is still in a comparatively early stage. Our society is today beginning to recognize the problem of an emotionally disturbed person."

Dr. Needleman advised the exchange club that the Mid-Nassau Community Guidance Center now occupying most of the second floor of the Professional Building at Hicksville, during 1957, as only one of

the ten or eleven other clinics in Nassau County, handled approximately 500 cases.

Most of the people, he further stated, were those of limited financial means, who could not possibly afford private psychiatric help.

He explained that the County of Nassau in setting up the community mental health services, is eligible for certain state funds. He also explained that the Mental Health Board of Nassau County enters into contracts with clinics such as his, throughout the county, and that the state of New York underwrites 50% of the budget of the clinic with the balance of the expenses coming from the nominal fees charged, and from county and community contributions.

HERALD HOMEMAKER'S CORNER

MAKE CUT FLOWERS LAST LONGER

Are you disappointed when flowers that look so gorgeous outdoors hang their heads the minute you bring them inside?

Could be they don't like the treatment they're getting, says Prof. Ernest Schaufel, floriculture specialist at the State College of Agriculture, Cornell. He gives a few tips on how to make flowers last longer.

First, start with a clean container. Use soap and water to remove bacteria from the vase. The bacteria multiply and clog the water-conducting tubes of the flower, causing it to wilt.

Cut the flower stem straight across or at a slant, but use a sharp knife or shears. A clean fresh cut enables the flower to absorb water freely. Remove any foliage that will be below the water.

Place the flower in water that

is bath-temperature, about 110 degrees F. and let the water cool naturally. The hot water moves quickly and easily up the flower stem. Because most of the water goes up through the base of the stem, it isn't necessary to have the water very deep.

Now wrap paper around the flowers. The paper prevents rapid air movement and cuts down on water loss. You can arrange the flowers within two to six hours. If any flower wilts, repeat the hot water treatment.

When arranging the flowers, it's a good idea to add a commercial flower food. It helps prevent growth of fungus and bacteria and makes flowers last longer. A final word of advice—keep flowers cold when not in use, and keep them away from radiators or drafts.

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Town Planners Aim at Strip, Spot Zoning

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"STOP ONCE AND YOU'LL STOP OFTEN"

The Oyster Bay Town Board today introduced another phase of its new comprehensive Zoning Plan with the announcement that the plan has as one of its objectives the elimination of "strip zoning" and "spot zoning."

Supervisor John J. Burns pointed out that it is all part of the Town Board's plan to promote "better and higher living standards" throughout the Town in keeping with the asserted aspirations of the Townspeople.

"This is another new concept in the Town Board's blueprint for the future in the preparation of the new zoning map and steps have already been taken toward the accomplishment of this objective," Burns stated.

For example - in Massapequa the new map clearly reflects the efforts of the Town Board to eliminate "strip zoning" or what is sometimes called "string development."

Here, a long strip of land extending north from the Long Island Railroad tracks to Hicksville Road on Broadway, formerly zoned for business (F) use, has been returned to residential use which is the predominant character of the area.

This section is mostly vacant land. The new plan promotes the erection of "cluster type" shopping areas which will supply the community's needs and wants while at the same time preventing over-commercial-

ization and economic deterioration of existing business and residential sections if a long string of uncoordinated business uses were allowed to develop, authorities said.

A study of the area changed by the Board's approach to the problem of over-commercialization shows that only ten per cent of the total available acreage, formerly set aside for commercial development, has been utilized. The Town Board's new plan is designed to eliminate, as far as possible, this type of strip zoning where it already exists while at the same time establishing an orderly pattern for future growth.

In striving to promote a set of standards that will discourage petitions that could be construed to be spot zoning, the Board's concept of keeping "all classifications in their proper places" sets the stage for the approach to the difficult question of what is for what is not spot zoning. In this connection the Board has already taken action in its new comprehensive plan by returning various areas in the Town to their predominant land use, thus preserving the character of the section involved whether it be residential, business or industry, Burns added.

In the Woodbury-Plainview section there existed a vacant area zoned for business in the heart of a residential community. Here the Board, to preserve the residential character and beauty of the area has re-zoned the parcel to "Residence." Both cases are typical of

the Town Board's efforts in this phase of the new comprehensive plan to eliminate strip and spot zoning, it was declared.

New Phone Book Ready

The rambling red-brick-and-shingle home of Theodore Roosevelt at Oyster Bay is a special mecca for visitors this year, the 100th anniversary of the birth of the 26th President of the United States. The latest recognition of the celebration is the 1958-59 Nassau alphabetical telephone directory out today which features an artist's drawing of the home, Sagamore Hill, on the cover.

Some 395,000 copies of the white-paged book are currently being distributed together with a like number of its partner in information - the classified directory. More than 350 deliverymen will take up to 10 days to complete distribution of the two directories.

St. Ignatius Loyola R. C. Church of Hicksville, will hold its annual Bazaar on the School grounds on E. Nicholas St., Aug. 8, 9, 10, and Aug. 15, 16 and 17.

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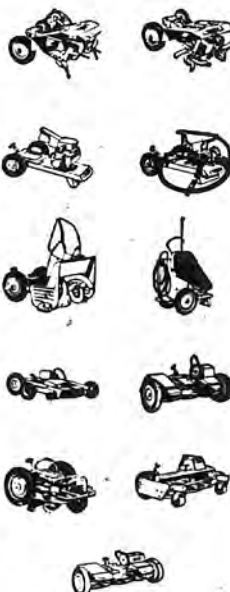

In addition, to this vital information, Block Captains will also be informed as to the current problems and activities of our Civic Assoc. 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CURRENT COMMENT: The Old BMA Did It's Share

WILLIAM E. KOUTENSKY, president of Long Island National Bank of Hicksville, touched lightly upon the past efforts of various trade and civic organizations in the community when the Chamber of Commerce membership voted to employ a paid executive secretary, two weeks ago.

Mr. Koutensky was among those who together with Curt Unverhau, Charles Beatty and others worked many thankless hours in behalf of local community good and welfare. For example, as a guiding factor in the Hicksville Business Men's Assoc (known as the BMA), it was Mr. Koutensky and others who obtained the traffic lights which hang over the intersections of Old Country Rd with Newbridge Rd and Jerusalem Ave.

This may seem of small moment today when we have dozens of traffic control signals (and could use more) but at that time you could count on one hand the number of intersections where stop and go electric signals were in operation. And we seem to recall that at the time there was some dispute with the authorities as to whether or not the signals were needed and if the volume of traffic warranted them.

The Hicksville BMA was chartered by the State of New York in 1934 and the certificate of incorporation has been hanging in our office since it was turned over by Mr. Unverhau, long time unpaid secretary.

As we got older we are inclined to get peevish and petty. We were irritated, for example, by recent comments in public that the "old BMA" was unable to do this or that. Actually, we feel that much of what we have today and what we hope to achieve in the future is due to what has been done or attempted in the past.

We don't wish to take anything away from today's Chamber of Commerce. We wish it well and we promote its activities when word trickles thru. We feel the employment of a person to be the executive secretary is a move in the right direction. However, we hope that no one makes the error of assuming that because a person is paid to do a job he does it better. So very many things in today's grown-up Hicksville with its 40-odd thousand population are not done nearly as well as they were when people did things out of a sense of dedication, not counting the cost or the size of a pay envelop.

If fact, is it one of our sincerest regrets that today in Hicksville we find so few present day individuals of the kind who ten or 20 years ago were willing to make the rounds of business concerns or home owners to raise funds or promote a sale.

One of the noteworthy activities of the BMA, in our opinion, was a survey of shoppers' opinions in the Hicksville area undertaken in cooperation with the New York State Dept of Commerce in 1953.

A highlight of that report was "Hicksville merchants are losing more business to competitive communities than other LI communities surveyed. Customers, participating in this habit survey, have spelled out reasons why they are shopping elsewhere".

We happen to know that some of the shops which located in Mid Island Plaza took the recommendations of that 1953 report into consideration when they made their plans for Hicksville.

The community's geographic location, among other things, weighs heavily in favor of its increasing importance in Island affairs today and tomorrow. For a smile, if nothing else, here's what we wrote Feb 3, 1939:

"The aims of the Hicksville (Chamber of Commerce) at the present time seeks this elusive something called progress. You can't see it, you can't sell it and you can't buy it for cold cash -- you have to work for it. Those willing to roll up their sleeves and pitch in will find it. It's a challenge".

A CALL FOR LACROSSE

A high school within a three mile radius of Hicksville is seriously bent upon abolishing Track as a major team sport to concentrate on introducing Lacrosse in 1959.

The old guard may recoil but we are in full agreement that the old rugged Indian game merits a more important place on the varsity level than Track.

Already a fixture in most of the major high schools on the Island, Lacrosse requires demanding physical endurance and skill with the brain as well as the body. The activity provides a true team effort for thirty or forty boys on a club.

Scholastic Track has ebbed in the last two decades to a point where overall drabness is only rarely enlightened by a performance of the individually gifted.

So many in number are schools today that quarter-finals, semi-finals and finals are needed on different days to establish divisional championships. The division winners then are required to repeat a similar round for a league title. This course is followed in County and Sectional meets.

Starting back at the divisional runnings the great majority are left behind with the season not half over. The best go on -- the rest lose interest.

We do not belittle the efforts of the track athletes who extend themselves as well as the rest but at schools where both sports are conducted Lacrosse receives the greater outright participation and considerably more student body attention.

Circumstances may block a school from engaging in both sports. Disposition of respective School Boards to make funds available, lack of enough ground, and teaching loads of the coaching staff all enter into the picture.

Our neighbor school for one reason or another apparently cannot carry both sports on the varsity level and has made an unprecedented but understandable choice.

We have not suggested to anyone at Hicksville High that track should be replaced by Lacrosse or the latter added to the existing program.

However, the sport is growing fast in the North and is greatly aided by those College all-star tilts held under the lights of Jones Beach Stadium every Wednesday and Sunday nights.

There is a need for the sport in Hicksville and we are sure enough support for it would be generated if an attempt was made to put it on the slate.

We realize that the Rifle team proposal was voted out at the annual meeting. We cannot believe that the same wave of revolting reasoning that some employed to panic the voters on that subject could be applied in this case.

On the forward page of the annual North-Shore College All-Star game the Lacrosse is referred to as the "Sport that makes the man."

It belongs in Hicksville.
