

Expect 20,000 Spectators Labor Day Welcome Visiting Firemen



Drive With Care... School Is Open Again Next Week

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More than 20,000 spectators are expected to be on hand on Labor Day to witness the 30th annual Firemen's Parade and Drill. Featured in the competition will be the best volunteer fire fighting units of the entire State, the winners of the New York State Drill at Amsterdam last week.

Two blasts on the Hicksville Fire Alarm at about 9 o'clock Monday morning will be the signal that the parade of thousands of firemen with their ladies auxiliaries will be stepping off to the music of more than 36 bands. The parade takes place, rain or shine.

The same team will get a "leg" on the giant five-foot Tircraft trophy (see photo below).

Larry Huttie is general chairman of the program and grand marshal of the parade. The divisional marshals and the units they lead are:

First -- Henry A. Gebhardt - Hicksville, East Meadow, West Hempstead, Floral Park, Point Lookout, Hempstead, Elmont and Jericho.

Second -- Romy Borley - Freeport, Stewart Manor, North Bellmore, Matdyale, NY; Inwood, Plainview, Hewlett, Westbury and North Merrick.

Third -- John Leckie - Levittown, Bayville, Farmingdale, Westagh, Carle Place, Uniondale, Baldwin, and North Massapequa.

Fourth -- Arnold Jeanson - Massapequa, South Hempstead, Massasset - Lakeville, Bethpage, St. James, New Hyde Park and Roosevelt.

Fifth -- Standof Weiss - Ocean-side, Albertson, Syosset, Oyster Bay, Great Neck, Mineola and Clausen Point.

Sixth -- George A. Kunz - Port Washington, Williston Park, Deven Hose Co., Conn Roslyn, Bellmore, Merrick and Point Pleasant, NY.

FREE PARKING

Contests take place at Mid Island Plaza, where the parade concludes, starting at 1 o'clock. No admission charge or parking charge will be made at the Plaza with parking for more than 8000 cars.

A study of records for tournaments over the past ten years shows that Oyster Bay Rough Riders and East Meadow Meadowlarks are the favored top contenders. East Meadow won at Amsterdam last week. They have been the victors at Hicksville on Labor Day in 1954, 1955 and 1956. The Rough Riders won point standings at Hicksville in 1948, 1949, 1953 and 1957.

More than 60 trophies will be awarded for the top winners during the afternoon as well as the best appearing units in the morning parade. Gertz is awarding a four-foot trophy for the top team of the day.

Contest for Water Board Tuesday

Officials of Oyster Bay and Hempstead townships will jointly supervise the election next Tuesday evening, Sept. 2, of a Hicksville Water Commissioner for a three-year term. Voting takes place at the District Courthouse on Heltz Pl with incumbent George A. Kunz and Charles W. Macfarland seeking the office.

Voting hours at the Courthouse are 7 to 9PM and no advance voter registration is required. Voters must be resident property owners. Kunz is concluding his first three-year term of office. He is a former chief of the fire dept and has been a member of the volunteer fire dept for 38 years.

During his term of office the facilities of the district have been increased to keep pace with the steady growth of the community. New wells and added storage facilities have been installed to assure adequate water supply for regular and emergency requirements.

Thousands Returning To Books Next Week

Thousands of boys and girls will return to classrooms in the Mid Island area next week. Hicksville Bethpage and Jericho public schools open on Wednesday, Sept. 3; Plainview-Old Bethpage Central District and St. Ignatius in Hicksville on Thursday, Sept. 4.

Approximately 100 new teachers in the Hicksville Public Schools this fall, including additional as well as replacement teachers, are this week concluding a busy two-week orientation program which has included a detailed study of the system, the community, local industries, etc. Next Tuesday, Sept. 2, the entire Hicksville faculty of over 500 teachers and supervisors will meet at the high school. 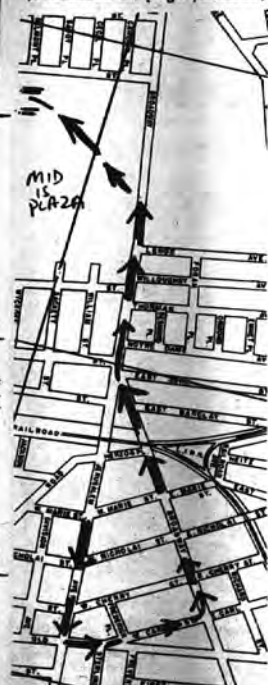

Fire Budget Vote Tuesday

A annual budget for the Hicksville Fire District of \$127,500 and five separate propositions including one for the purchase of two pieces of fire-fighting equipment at a cost of \$33,000, will be voted upon by qualified voters of the fire district at the E. Marie St. Firehouse next Tuesday night, Sept. 2, between 7 P.M. and 10 P.M.

Along the five separate questions will be added \$48,000 to the estimated budget for a total of \$175,500, including \$12,000 for the purchase and installation of new equipment for

the alarm system and \$1000 more for the annual program of purchasing street signs.

A spokesman for the Board of Fire Commissioners told the HERALD that the Board plans, if the voters approve, to purchase a new pumper and a complete rescue-floodlight equipment vehicle under proposition No. 5.

All resident taxpayers who have lived in the district since Aug. 2 are qualified to vote on the budget and five propositions. No advance voter registration is required.

PARADE ROUTE on Labor Day for volunteer firemen, rain or shine starting at 9 o'clock in the morning. Bands will start on Jerusalem Ave., swing over to Broadway and head north to Mid Island Plaza. State Public Works Dept. has promised that traffic on North Bay at John St will be possible, Monday.

Set Hearing On Bingo Town Law

Oyster Bay Town Board this week set a public hearing for Tuesday morning, Sept. 9, at the Town Hall upon a proposed Bingo Ordinance for the Township. The proposed law appears in this issue of the HERALD as a legal notice. The ordinance will become operative only if approved by a majority of the election of the Town voting for it at a general or special election. The question, depending upon the outcome of the public hearing, will probably appear on the voting machines at the November general election as a special proposition.

LABOR DAY kind of brings the vacation-summer season to a close. It's been a fine summer for most of us stick-at-homes this year. It's been hot, but we also have had enough rain to keep things green. For the first time in many summers we have not had to conserve water.

Labor Day brings our big annual firemen's tournament and who can resist those gleaming fire trucks, the handsome marching firemen with their lovely ladies?

Hicks Return from Amsterdam Tournery

All 96 firemen, wives and their offsprings returned to Hicksville this week from the State Firemen's Drill and Parade at Amsterdam, N.Y., where the Hicks won two trophies in motor hose competition. The famous nautical division aboard the Good Ship Comfort gurgled into its berth at Cold Spring Harbor at four o'clock Tuesday morning.

There were 48 men from Hicksville Fire Dept. at Amsterdam to set an all time record for local attendance at state tournament, according to Chief Medard Ofenloch who had arranged to house many of the visitors by taking over an entire hotel which was renamed "Hicksville Inn".

Capt. Bill Danda of Fred's Inn and his noble mate, George Engel, made the round trip to Amsterdam by boat despite all kinds of hardships, mutiny, navigational hazards and whatnot. The crew had little time for loafing on the deck of the Comfort, enroute: every man jack was busy manning the pumps. At one point, on the way back down the Hudson, there was more water in the boat than there was in the River.

The Comfort Station lacking radar, locked into some rocks and had to be beached while Danda patched the bottom with the liner from a pack of Marlboros.

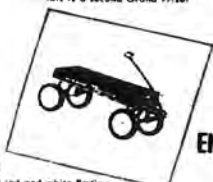

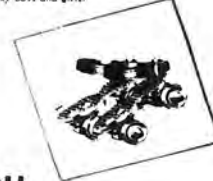

Section 1.0 As used in this ordinance, the terms "Control Commission", "Bingo", "game", "authorized organization" and "license" shall have the meanings designated by the Bingo Licensing Law.

Section 2.0 No person, firm, association, corporation or organization, other than an authorized organization licensed under the provisions of the Bingo Licensing Law, shall be permitted to conduct bingo games within the territorial limits of the Town of Oyster Bay.

Section 3.0 It shall be lawful for any authorized organization upon obtaining a license therefor as provided in the Bingo Licensing Law to conduct the game of bingo within the territorial limits of the Town of Oyster Bay, subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, the provisions of the Bingo Licensing Law and the provisions of the State Lottery Control Law.

Section 4.0 The entire net proceeds of any game shall be exclusively devoted to the lawful purposes of the organization permitted to conduct the same.

Section 5.0 No single prize shall exceed the sum or value of two hundred fifty dollars.

Section 6.0 No series of prizes on any one occasion shall aggregate more than one thousand dollars.

Section 7.0 No person except a bona fide member of any such organization shall participate in the management or operation of such game.

Section 8.0 No person shall receive any remuneration for participating in the management or operation of any such game.

Section 9.0 The town clerk is hereby delegated all of the authority granted to the town board by the Bingo Licensing Law in relation to the issuance, amendment and cancellation of licenses, the conduct of investigations and hearings, the supervision of the operation of the games and the collection and transmission of fees.

Section 10.0 The unauthorized conduct of a bingo game and any willful violation of any provision of this ordinance shall constitute and be punishable as a misdemeanor.

Section 11.0 This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as "The Bingo Ordinance of the Town of Oyster Bay."

Section 12.0 This Ordinance shall become operative and effective when it shall have been approved by a majority of the qualified electors of the Town of Oyster Bay, voting on a proposition therefor, submitted at a general or special election held within the Town of Oyster Bay.
