George A. Kunz was re-elected for a three-year term as Hicksville Water Commissioner, Tuesday night, receiving 383 ballots out of 566 votes cast. His opponent, Charles W. Macfarland, received 148 votes. There were 30 blank ballots, 2 void and one missing. The election at Hicksville courthouse was conducted by Town Clerk Henry M. Curran and Councilmen Ed Ocker and Louis Sisia. Kunz said today he wished to thank all who had expressed their confidence in him by their support at the polls and pledged himself to be worthy of their endorsement.



Larger Adult Education Classes Enroll Sept 17, 18

Registration for all classes offered by the Hicksville Adult Education program will be Sept. 17 and 18, from 7:30 PM to 9 PM in the girls' gymnasium at the Senior High School.

The State has changed many of the Adult Education Laws making it difficult to maintain the program as in the past. We are forced to increase our registration fees. Classes will have to be larger with minimum enrollment of 16 persons per class and an average of 12 maintained during the length of

the courses," according to Francis Ganley, program director.

"These new regulations have not discouraged the program's constant growth. We have added more courses such as Electrical Wiring for the Home, Community Theatre Group and a Guidance Counselor who will be here to advise persons interested in completing high school education or continuing on to college."

The Greater Hicksville Festival days scheduled for Oct 9, 10 and 11 being sponsored by the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce began with a suggestion by Jules Mirel of the advertising agency which bears his name. Partick Caputo, chamber president, this week announced details of Festival Days in which a large number of people and organizations are being enthusiastically involved.

VIEW FROM THE ARCH as the Hicksville Labor Day Firemen's drill was about to get underway at Mid Island Plaza. Hundreds had just been asked to get off the north-side stands when the heat loosened anchor pins in the paving and the 15-tier structure began to slide. When emergency efforts to reinforce the section of bleachers were not successful, Chairman Latry Huttie urged

the occupants to step to the ticket booth for refunds. While 20,000 saw the morning parade, more than 10,000 stayed around for the afternoon contests. Suffolk Vamps Upset Favorites; Duplicate Trophy for Tied Teams

For the first time in over a decade a Suffolk County Volunteer firemen's racing team came within a whisker of winning top honors at the Hicksville Labor Day Firemen's tournament. St. James Wildcats tied Oyster Bay Rough Riders, 18 to 18, and each team will receive a duplicate of the three-foot Gertz point trophy for the day.

It was the first time in the 30 years running of the Labor Day competition that two teams tied for first place in total point standings. The four-foot Tirecraft trophy which must be won three times for permanent ownership will be shared - the first six months in St. James and the second six months in Oyster Bay.

Weather conditions were ideal this year and more than 1,000 spectators were still on hand when the final, thrilling contest was concluded in darkness at 9 o'clock. Point stand-

Voters Approve Fire Dist Budget

All propositions and the Hicksville Fire District budget for 1959 were approved by voters in a district vote, Tuesday night.

The \$127,500 budget was approved with 145 votes cast; 124 yes, 14 no and 7 blank. Vote on propositions was: No. 1 - funds for parades and drills; 115 yes, 25 no; No. 2 - funds for inspections, 112 yes, 28 no; No. 3 - \$12,000 for additional alarm equipment, 115 yes, 27 no; No. 4 - funds for street signs, 113 yes, 27 no; and No. 5 - \$32,000 for purchase of two new fire trucks, 118 yes and 24 no.

Jericho School Board Meets

At its last regular meeting on August 21, the Jericho School Board discussed a wide variety of topics ranging from a progress report on the future Jericho High School to the results of the latest school census.

The Board received the report on the progress of the High School from a representative of the general contractor. Construction is in its initial stages with topsoil stripping and cutting for the foundation under way at present. Dr. Lant, District Principal, stated that the gross total cost of constructing the high school building and developing the site was \$2,997,225 and that the figure was a low one for this type of construction. Due to the good fortune of the Board in obtaining so low a bid, much more money will be possible in equipping the building.

Several residents present at the meeting requested that the Board provide transportation for their children to St. Patrick's, a parochial school in Glen Cove. Board Chairman Martin Penn, and Dr. Lant pointed out that funds to provide such transportation had been turned down by the voters at the Annual District Meeting last May, and that they could not legally provide such transportation. At this point it was announced that, thru an appeal to the Commissioner of Education, parents of children attending Lady of

Mercy High School in Syosset and St. Mary's in Roslyn had succeeded in obtaining transportation by the School District. Funds for transportation to both those schools had also been disapproved by the voters last May. The parents were then advised that transportation may be provided only thru a successful appeal to Albany.

Mrs. Feldshon, representing the Jackson School P.T.A., questioned the Board with regard to police protection at the Jackson School. Dr. Lant stated that, while past efforts had not succeeded, he would continue to work on the problem. He felt that possibly appeals by individual parents to the Police Department might be more fruitful.

Board member Sam Hecht introduced the subject of improving the landscaping around the district schools. After a brief discussion it was decided that the buildings would be relandscaped starting this Fall.

Dr. Lant announced the unofficial results of the school census. Of the 7,018 residents in the Jericho School District, 4,080 are adults over 18 years and 2,984 are under 18. The District contains 1,727 houses.

The Board also conducted the following business: approved the hiring of a sixth grade and a secondary English teacher, discussed financing the new High School construction, passed a resolution dedicating a water main to the Jericho Water District.

Work Progresses on Jericho High School

Jericho's Junior-Senior High School is now a reality. Ground was broken on Aug. 6 and the foundation is expected to be poured in September.

The school is being built on the Cedar Swamp site and includes an area of 53 acres. The structure will consist of two wings, one to be occupied by the Junior High students and the other by the Senior High Students. These wings will be separated by a central core consisting of the administrative offices, the auditorium, two cafeterias with a central kitchen, gymnasium and locker rooms, shops, homemaking, art library, and music rooms. There will be separate entrances and driveway approaches for the students for both groups.

The existing Cedar Swamp School will be absorbed into the new building with appropriate alterations. The new structure will be built to blend with the old Colonial charm of the present Cedar Swamp School. Although the Junior-Senior High School will be built for 1200 students, it will be expandable through additional construction to accommodate 1800 students. The auditorium will be centrally located in the building and will have a capacity of 800 persons. The core facilities will be built at this time for a school capacity of 1800 students with the plan in mind that ultimately the school will be enlarged to have additional classrooms to accommodate 1800 students.

The site development includes the preservation of all trees when possible, construction of roads, and walls, parking areas for approximately 400 cars, construction of baseball and softball diamonds, tennis courts, football field, and a running track with accommodations for running broad jump, running high jump, pole vault, shot-put circle, discus circle, and javelin throw. The building has been designed in such manner as to permit the future construction of indoor swimming pool.

On November 23, 1957, the voters of the district authorized the construction of the Junior-Senior High School at a cost including construction, site development, equipment and furnishings not to exceed \$3,600,000. On July 23rd, the sealed bids for the construction were received. The successful bid totaled a cost of about \$3,450,000. This is

\$150,000 less than the authorized expenditure of \$3,600,000.

The architects who prepared the school plans and who are supervising the construction are Knappe and Johnson. The general contractor is Castagna and Sons, Inc.

Although the school is scheduled for completion in Feb. 1960, every effort will be made to complete it by Sept. 1959.

Unique Mutual Investment

The Jericho Community Blood Bank is a unique mutual investment fund. It ignores the rise and fall of stock markets and deals in the kind of security one can't purchase easily over the counter. The investment is tiny--one pint of blood. The dividends -- when called for -- are of incalculable value to the shareholder.

Community projects seldom inspire the immediate support and enthusiasm of the entire populace. The Jericho Community Blood Bank, however, provides such a reservoir of civic and individual security that controversy is all but eliminated from the project. Unending Work For Civic Directors

Between 9 PM on Tuesday, Aug 19 and 1:30 AM on Wednesday, Aug 20, this reporter had his first opportunity to attend and report on a meeting of the board of the Civic Assoc. Space limitations prevent a verbatim report on the quantity of business details undertaken that evening.

It must be said, however, that the volume of work assumed by the board on behalf of the community is overwhelming; the volume of work still to be considered is unending. The following is a report of some of the business highlights an untrained ear was able to record.

(1) The board was petitioned by several families living on Merry Lane to oppose the location of a gasoline station at Merry Lane and Jericho Turnpike. Allegedly, Max Hoffman, owner of the station currently located at Broadway and Jericho Turnpike, is preparing to relocate because of expressway construction through his present site. The board voted to ask Mr. Hoffman and his attorney to submit to them his proposed application and architectural plans. A letter will be sent to the families who petitioned the board advising them of the board's action and assuring them of the board's intention to take every necessary step to protect their rights.

(2) David Brown, block captain, of 7 Favorite Lane, reported on behalf of his neighbors their concern about the location of the Las Vegas Music Box night club on the perimeter of their properties. The board agreed that while bright lights, music during late hours, and heavy traffic are objectionable nuisances, they are not illegal if the night club is duly licensed, as it presumably is. Because of the night club's zoning, which required no previous application, the board had no prior knowledge of its construction and so couldn't oppose it. The board appointed a committee to seek from the club's owner a voluntary effort to reduce as much as possible the nuisances that his club provokes upon Birchwood Park residents. Further investigation of additional remedies will be pursued by the board.

(3) The board received letters of resignation, sent respectfully under the press of personal need, from Jack Berger, 27 Merit Lane and Murray Iskos, 31 Merit Lane. The board members nominated 4 residents as replacements, and the two new members, selected by vote, are Harold Leland, 47 Forsythia Lane and Sam Richter, 64 Merry Lane.

(4) The Dramatic Groups next

production will be "The Happy Time". A resident professional, John Brighter, 8 Leisure St., has volunteered his services as director. The group asked for a \$100 fund, which was appropriated by the board.

(5) The Civic Association has set up a committee to work for the formation of a Civic Art League. When all pertinent facts are gathered, a full report will be made to the board. Aside from the initial appropriation the board may make, it is contemplated that the League will be self-supporting.

(6) The board, implementing a decision made previously voted to plant a group of four trees in the Town Recreation Area adjoining the Jackson School. This is the first group of trees to be purchased by the civic association for planting in various locations in our community. The purchase was handled by Edith Moss for the board and was made from the Robinson Nurseries.

(7) Horace Bernstein, 38 Forsythia Lane, reported that for those who wish to contribute blood to the blood bank established in the memory of Abe Margolies, a blood-mobility will be stationed at the Jackson School on Sept. 11. A loudspeaker truck, manned by 6 resident volunteers, will tour the community on Sept. 9 and 10. Joseph Schwartz, 52 Hedgerow Lane, will contribute a poster on behalf of the civic association to advertise this blood drive.

(8) George Frankel, financial secretary, 26 Fountain Lane, reported that the civic assoc has 446 members. Mr. Frankel and Mr. Ralph Diamond are the creators of a scaled replica map of our community which reproduces our Village street by street, house by house. It was this map that was an essential instrument in the creation of our block captain system. A motion was made and passed to make several copies of this map available for use, at no charge, by the civic, religious, and philanthropic organizations of our community. The board gave Mr. Frankel an unanimous accolade for his untiring efforts on behalf of this community.

(9) The entertainment committee as of yet, has made no plans for the current season. Joe Schwartz, chairman, requested suggestions from the board on which he could act. He, with aid from other board members, will follow up all good ideas and report back to the board.

(10) The board discussed the fact that the Youth Program has been inadequately prepared and supervised. It was suggested and agreed upon that a committee of board members supervise more closely and cooperate with the current chairman, Al Lerner, 19 Middle Lane, in an effort to get a good program as soon as possible. The committee will consist of the following board members -- Horace Bernstein, Joe Schwartz, Jerry Gold, Ralph Diamond, and Jerry Abrams. Harold Leland was appointed to work with Al Lerner as co-chairman of the Youth Committee.

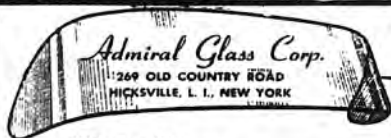

LI Leads Way In New Housing

Theodore Ornstein, President of Central Federal Savings and Loan of Nassau County, commenting on the three day session of the U.S. Savings and Loan League which took place last week in Chicago, said: "I found the addresses at the session most instructive. For example: Leon T. Kendall, the League staff economist, told the approximately 500 savings and loan officials at the session that there will be a 'boom in the demand for rental housing.'"

Kendall pointed out that 60 million 'war babies' will be starting to come of age in the early 1960's. These youngsters at the outset, "most likely will find apartment living more in keeping with their needs... for the first few years of marriage," however "a terrific upsurge in demand for new single-family houses... which they shall need to shelter their growing families will take place as we move into the 1970's. This, plus replacement demand, 'may push the level of dwelling starts to as high as 1.5 million units annually, a new peak in United States history.'"

Ornstein went on to say: "I feel that this nation-wide increase in housing demand may very well make itself felt on Long Island at a much earlier date than the ones cited by Mr. Kendall."

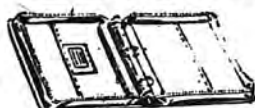

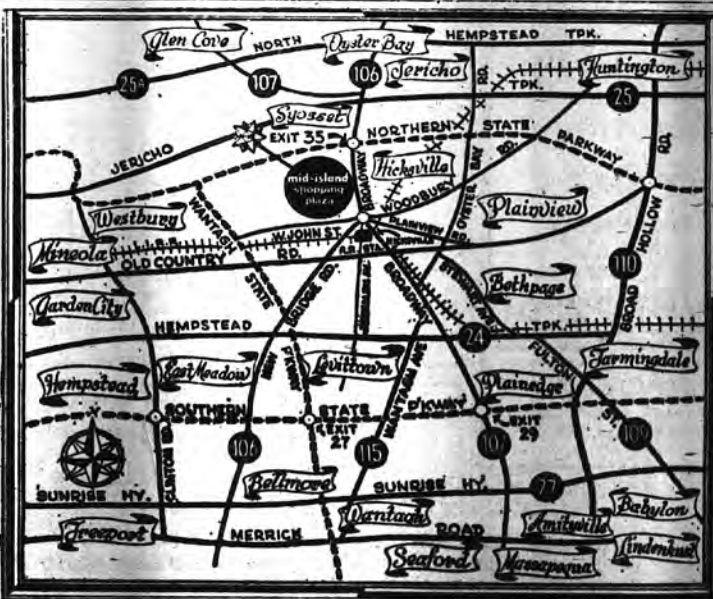

This Big Hick Went to City

WE WERE SO stimulated by the picture of the lower New York City skyline on this page last week, that we played hookey Saturday and did something we have been postponing for many a year. While we have lived within the shadow of the Big City all our life (with the initial seven years in Brooklyn), we had never experienced the world-famous five-cent Staten Island ferry ride. Saturday we did.

It helps in the overall appreciation of such an adventure to be accompanied by a 12-year-old, junior high-bound son (or daughter).

The subway takes you to South Ferry and from that point it's a hop and skip (between the taxi cabs) to the sleek, modern ferry terminal where an escalator zips you up a flight to a battery of turnstiles. These turnstiles may some day wind up in a museum. They are the only ones we know of which will still operate for that almost vanished coin - the Buffalo nickel.

The ferries plow back and forth on fast schedules and we had no wait. In minutes we were plowing out of the ferry slip and into New York Harbor. During the next half hour we steamed across the water, drinking in the view of the Statue of Liberty, giant ocean-going ships, fast little tugs and even got a good look at that oil tanker which sank a few weeks back being towed to Jersey as well as an impressive sight of the naval ships in mothballs.

At Staten Island we walked off quickly, took a right turn where the sign flashed "loading," and boarded another boat for the half hour trip back.

The return ride, for which we were not charged, is even more impressive as you come up the Harbor and get a thrilling view of the lower New York skyline. All right, so we're a Hick.

We also took in the trip out to the State of Liberty (boat fare 75 cents for adults). Little Circle Line ships take about 500 out there every half hour and we got in conversation on the way with a gentleman with a foreign accent who didn't know the Statue was the gift of the people of France to the United States. But then we didn't know how old the Statue was until we read the plaque at its base.

The crowd in the Statue was so great that we didn't get above the pedestal. The spiral ladder to the top was jammed during the hour we waited and folks didn't seem to move up or down.

To finish off the day we did the rounds at Radio City (with a guide) and found that a disappointment. Maybe because we took this trip twice before. However, a visit to WHLL studios at Hempstead is much more interesting than Rockefeller Centre and it won't cost you 90 cents either. We looked into three empty studios and got a running build up on the station's TV programs. The television programs are staged in theatres around New York and we were there the wrong day for passes.

But that ferry ride, be a real Hick. Go enjoy it.
