Storm Cancels Vet Carnival

Last Monday's sudden rain, wind and hail storm has forced the cancellation of the fall carnival which Charles Wagner Post American Legion of Hicksville, had scheduled to open next week, Sept. 15 at the Mid Island Plaza show grounds.

The carnival, now playing at another Long Island Town, was badly mauled by the sudden gusty winds which ripped the canvas covered booths to ribbons and the heavy down pour of rain and hail caused short circuits burning out the equipment in several power trucks, a spokesman said.

Being late in the season, replacement equipment would not be brought north as the show will head south several weeks earlier than scheduled originally.

Student Enrollment Gain Slows

School openings this week in the Mid Island area again showed an increase in the student enrollments, but not the record increases noted five years ago this Sept.

The enrollment at Jericho schools is up 230. Last year's enrollment was 1400 compared with this year's 1630.

The Bethpage schools enrollment numbers 4731 students. Last year's figure was 4473.

At school's closing last June, Hicksville Public Schools had an enrollment of 11,147 as opposed to 11,109 were enrolled at opening time last Sept. At that time the Administration expressed the belief that the enrollment by the end of the month might jump to 11,565.

At this writing the total enrollment figure for the Hicksville Public Schools is not available, but is safe to assume that that figure will also show a leveling off as other schools in the area. Back in 1953 the enrollment in the Hicksville schools showed a gain of 1872 students with 992 children in the Kindergarten classes alone.

Central School Dist. 4, Plainview-Old Bethpage, had an enrollment of 6,061 last Oct. The approximate figure as of Sept. 5, this year, is 7,284.

Road Builders Level Buildings

Wave Crest Cleaners and Laundry, established in Hicksville 28 years ago and the first local cleaning concern to process dry cleaning in its own local plant 13 years ago, is temporarily moving to 11 W. Nicholas St., Hicksville, to make way for the widening of North Broadway. Wave Crest will be at its temporary location as of this Saturday. A new plant is being built by the concern at Old Country and Central Park Roads, Plainview.

This week saw further demolition on the east side of North Broadway with the removal of the Bonnie Lee Dress plant and other structures opposite the Post Office. The highway is being widened by the State Dept. of Public Works.

Sealed bids will be opened at Albany on Oct. 9 upon the construction of two more sections of the Long Island Expressway which will eventually pass between Hicksville and Jericho, just north of the State Parkway.

One project is for a 2.35-mile six-lane section of the Expressway and 5.3 miles of access and service roads, between Chert Woods Rd. and Post Ave., Westbury. The job estimate is \$6,120,000.

A second project is for 2.2 mile six-lane section of the same Expressway from Post Ave. to Jericho Tpke., just west of Jericho and 5.08 miles of access and service roads. This portion is estimated at \$6,055,000.

It is necessary for substitutes who do extensive teaching to meet full state teachers certification requirements; but those who have a BA or BS degree can teach up to five days per year without specific certification. At the moment the Administration is particularly concerned in obtaining substitute teachers for Sept. 15, 16 and 24.

Opening Bids For New School

The Bethpage Board of Education will receive bids for construction of the new 360-pupil Bloomington Road elementary school, tonight (Thurs.) at 8 p.m. in the auditorium of the Broadway School.

It is estimated that the new 13-classroom school, designed by architect Frederic P. Wiedersum Associates, will cost \$665,000 completely furnished and equipped ready to operate. The site will cost about \$135,000. Voters approved an \$800,000 bond issue last May for a new school to relieve over-crowding in the elementary system where enrollment is now 44% over capacity. The school has been carefully planned, according to Board of Education President Howard F. Grandjean to come within state cost allowance figures to insure maximum state aid on construction costs.

We Owe Thanks To Red Cross

ALL TOO OFTEN we take many excellent community services and facilities for granted because they are so efficient and dependable. Such is the case of the American Red Cross which, on Labor Day, again was ready willing and able to render assistance to all who required it.

The Red Cross had its trailer right on the racing course, manned by 12 volunteer first aiders. Arthur Isaksen of Arcadia Lane, Hicksville, who is a Red Cross first aid instructor as well as a member of our volunteer fire department, was in charge of the mobile station this year.

During the nine hours of competition and the preliminary time of the morning parade, there were 29 persons -- men, women and children -- who received assistance. Four of the victims were rushed to the hospital by our own Fire Dept ambulance and one Port Washington lady was taken home in the Port Washington fire dept station wagon.

Dr. Walter M. Stillger, who is surgeon of the fire department, was on hand during the day at the Red Cross station also and treated and prescribed for the more seriously injured.

Give it a thought the next time the Red Cross asks for your financial support. Volunteers trained by the Red Cross serve at many public functions, just as they did here at the Labor Day tournament. They are at the Mineola Fair this week, just as they have been for the past 35 years.

And speaking of the Labor Day tournament we should not neglect the excellent work of the 75 men assigned by the Second Precinct of Nassau County Police under Captain Looney who assisted at the racing course and in traffic control around the town. The smooth running of this event with its 20,000 spectators is due to the assistance and cooperation of our police.

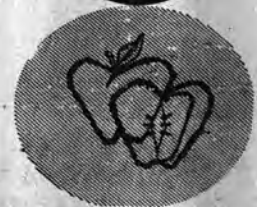

Fehrenbach Opens Campaign

State Assemblyman Edwin J. Fehrenbach officially opened his campaign for re-election to the Assembly Monday night at the regular monthly meeting of the Theodore Roosevelt Republican Club of Bethpage.

The meeting was held in the American Legion Hall in Bethpage, with about 150 persons in attendance. Also on the speakers' rostrum was Ernest F. Francke, county clerk, who praised Fehrenbach's work in the Assembly and called for his re-election.

fitted to the amount of \$401,000; Plainville, \$399,000; Farmingdale, \$264,000; Massapequa, \$249,000; and Hicksville, \$265,000. The remaining amount was distributed to other schools in the township of Oyster Bay, he said.

At one point in the meeting, Fehrenbach's two daughters, Regina, 10, and Diane, 15, paraded through the hall with signs reading: "My Daddy for State Assembly." The two girls plan to accompany Fehrenbach in his Plymouth Station wagon as he campaigns his way "through every housing development from Massapequa to Oyster Bay," Fehrenbach said, "I want to meet every voter, if I possibly can between now and November."
