Festival Days to Include Gala Exposition, Community Parade

Plans for the Greater Hicksville Festival Days on Oct. 9, 10 and 11 were moving forward steadily today as the sponsoring Chamber of Commerce announced good response to its call for community cooperation by individuals and organizations. Notices went out this week for a parade as one of the big events for the concluding Saturday.

An exposition featuring the present day features and attractions of Hicksville, including its business and industrial life, will be staged in the parking field opposite the E. Marie St. firehouse under a huge tent.

The Chamber of Commerce office at 75 Broadway, Hicksville, reports enthusiastic response from local concerns in the rental of booths during the exposition.

Patrick J. Buffalino and Jack Ehmman are co-chairmen of arrangements for the parade to take place on Saturday, Oct. 11, starting at the Senior High School in Division Ave. at 1:30 P.M. The parade will travel, according to tentative plans, by way of Newbridge Rd., Cherry St. and Broadway to the exposition grounds. The route has been designed to avoid conflict with existing traffic and highway construction hazards.

Also on the program for the three-day days, according to Chamber President Patrick F. Caputo, are a band concert on Oct. 9, dancing to the music of Paul Drake and his orchestra on Oct. 10. An Aunt Jemima Pancake feed is scheduled at the high school on Oct. 11 starting at 11 A.M.

22 Years Ago in October Chamber Sponsored Eight-Day Celebration

Twenty-two years ago on almost the exact same October days as the Greater Hicksville Festival is scheduled, the Chamber of Commerce sponsored a seven-day centennial celebration. The year was 1936 and the celebration marked the arrival of the Long Island Rail Road with a single track line from Jamaica out to Hicksville a century before.

Stranger in the public memory... the Hicksville Tercentennial Celebration held in 1948, ten years ago, which marked the actual founding of the area with the purchase of the territory from the Indians by Robert Williams.

Several of the names which appear on the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce committee for this year's Greater Hicksville Festival were also on the list back in 1936. For example, Ernest Francke, William E. Koutensky and Henry G. Eisenmann are all named on the letterhead this time and were named on the committee twenty-two years ago.

BEGAN ON SUNDAY

The late Dr. Elwood A. Curtis, as president of the Chamber of Commerce, was the leader of the centennial celebration program which began on Oct. 11 with church services, a semi-pro football game and special exercises in the high school.

The Centennial week continued on Monday, Oct. 12, with opening of

"Exactly What We Make Them"

The late Dr. Elwood A. Curtis who during a long, active career of civic service was Hicksville Chamber of Commerce president, member of the Nassau County Non-Partisan Charter Revision Committee, member and president of Hicksville Board of Education, wrote the following during the 1936 Centennial Celebration in Hicksville:

"A community is good or bad, active or dormant, progressive or slow, according to the people who live in that community. Our schools, our churches, our industries, our homes and institutions are to a large extent exactly what we make them.

"Let us, therefore, on this 100th anniversary of our existence as a community rededicate ourselves to those principles of honesty, sincerity of purpose, brotherly love and faith in Almighty God, that is our heritage."

909 More Students

A gain of 909 students was noted in the Hicksville Public School enrollment on opening day, Sept. 3, it was disclosed this week when the figures were released by the office of Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, Supt. of Schools. The enrollment two weeks ago stood at 12,018 as compared with 11,109 on opening day a year ago.

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DR. LAMB EXPLAINS:

School On Lincoln's Birthday Part Of Overall Step-Up in Education

Dr. Wallace E. Lamb, Superintendent of Hicksville Schools, has had some inquiries concerning why classes have been scheduled on Lincoln's Birthday in the 1958-59 school calendar. His explanation is as follows:

"The answer in a nutshell is that it is a part of an overall plan to improve the quality of education so that our nation can emerge victorious in its present life and death struggle with the forces of communism. It is no secret that Russia is far ahead of us in the development of nuclear weapons and that the international situation is very critical. Both educators and statesmen have been loudly declaring that the survival of democracy in the world will depend largely upon the quality of education in the American schools. As you know Hicksville has been en-

deavoring to improve the quality of its education in many ways. Our present program particularly for the gifted children is one which is being used as a pattern in many other school systems. Our thorough curriculum study has also enabled us to provide a curriculum for all children which will enable each and everyone of them to develop to the extent of their capacity. It was also strongly felt that it was necessary to increase the number of days in classroom instruction in the school year in order to improve the quality of education.

"I believe the feeling is universal among educators that the present minimum state requirements regarding the length of the school year are not enough. These legal requirements are for 190 days including holidays. Both the Commissioner

of Education and the Regents feel that the time should be extended. On several occasions the Commissioner has strongly urged the school authorities of the state to maintain as many full school days as possible devoted exclusively to classroom instruction. The Nassau County Superintendents Assoc feel very strongly about this matter and went on record that there should be more days of actual classroom instruction.

"Last year's school calendar for Hicksville provided for the state minimum of 190 days in all (182 days of instruction and 8 other days). This year's calendar provides for 193 days (186 days of instruction and 7 other days). I believe that in view of the critical world situation the school year

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CURRENT COMMENT: Ship Launching And Million \$

LAST WEEK turned out to be a memorable one for us. On Tuesday we were in Baltimore to witness for the first time the formal launching of a brand new ship. On Thursday we were in New York City and for about an hour carried around almost a million and a half dollars.

The ship launching (picture at right) took place at the Bethlehem Shipyards about 26 miles out of Baltimore. The steel concern and the Paragon Oil Co of Long Island City did it up brown, all around. A special 6-car train left from Penn station in New York. After breakfast enroute in the pleasant company of about 150 other special guests, we were chauffeured from the Baltimore station out to the shipyards where the band played and the bottle of champagne was neatly smashed over the prow of the SS Kings Point.

Thence back to Baltimore and the Hotel Belvedere for luncheon followed by a pleasant trip back to New York. All arrangements were perfectly coordinated and the entire program went off like a well-oiled machine.

The real surprising thing for us was the number of people we saw on the special train who eventually got off the LIRR with us at Hicksville that same night.

Now for the Million Dollars. As clerk of the School District, we took part in the signing of the last outstanding authorized bonds of the school district on Thursday. Board President Allen C. Carpenter and the Clerk signed the mountain of bonds at the Signature Co where they have a gadget that repeats the signature about 20 times in a single swirl. After everything was checked out, we were handed a certified check for \$1,441,000 which shortly after, was duly deposited at Bankers Trust to be credited to the School District accounts in the Hicksville banks.

The big Hick went back to the City.

Roosevelt Raceway - not with trotters, but the mighty 400-mile Vanderbilt auto races with entries from around the world. The ponies came some years later.

Tuesday, Oct. 13 was Veterans Day, featuring an address by County VFW Commander Paul S. Lawrence, Wednesday, Oct. 14, there were afternoon and evening symphonic concerts by the WPA (remember?) Symphonic Orchestra. Girl Scouts had a special demonstration and program at the high school.

Thursday, Oct. 15, was School Day with pageants in Hicksville's three public schools of that day: Junior-Senior High School, East St. and Nicholas.

Friday, Oct. 16, saw the Boy Scoutstare at the high school with an address by Scout Executive F.

Howard Covey. There were only two local Boy Scout troops in those days, 64 and 91.

Saturday, Oct. 17, was the big windup which included a March of Progress parade starting at 1:30 P.M. featuring ancient and modern vehicles and organizations on foot. There was also a pushmobile and scooter race, the first held since Nov. 1906, and the big community block dance on W. Marie St. between Broadway and Jerusalem Ave. the first to be held in 20 years.

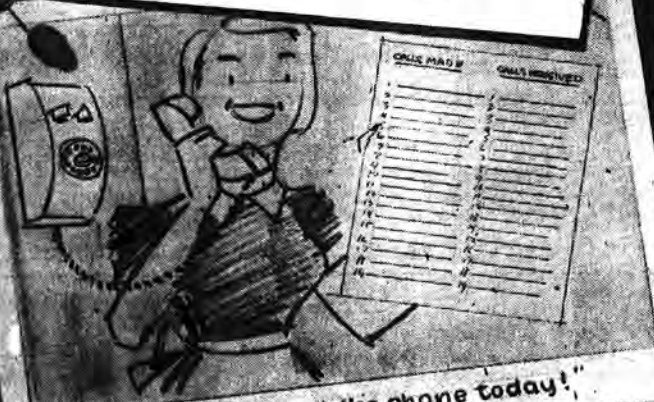

should even be longer. However we started classroom instruction this year on Sept 3rd which was unusually early and I doubt if we could have started earlier. Next June it would be impractical to have classes after the state exams are over. It would be

difficult to whittle down Christmas and Easter vacations more than we have already done. We cannot, without educational loss, cancel the teachers' conference days. We are prevented by law from having school on Columbus Day, Veterans Day, Thanksgiving and Memorial Day whether or not we wish to use such days. We could hold classes on Election Day but this would greatly impede the county election machinery. Whether New York State schools have classes on Washington's and Lincoln's Birthdays is left up to the individual district. There is no pattern of observance of these two holidays in the state — sometimes they are observed, sometimes not.

No disrespect to Lincoln is intended when classes are held on his birthday. He is one of the greatest Americans who ever lived and led the side of freedom in the great American struggle over slavery. Now we are engaged in a great world-wide civil war between liberty as we know it and communistic slavery. I feel sure that Lincoln himself would not object to using his birthday to improve the education of American boys and girls so that they will be better equipped to protect themselves and us from the communist menace. We are now continuing Lincoln's fight, but on a world level. In view of the very critical international situation (and so many of our national leaders feel that the struggle will be won or lost in the schools) I hope that you will reconsider your objection to classes on Lincoln's birthday. I would say that by all means we should celebrate Lincoln's birthday and I am most anxious that our schools should do so but I think that it could be done without sending the children home," Lamb concluded.

the State Lottery Control Law. Section 4.0 The entire net proceeds of any game shall be exclusively devoted to the lawful purposes of the organization permitted to conduct the same.

Section 5.0 No single prize shall exceed the sum or value of two hundred fifty dollars.

Section 6.0 No series of prizes on any one occasion shall aggregate more than one thousand dollars.

Section 7.0 No person except a bona fide member of any such organization shall participate in the management or operation of such game.

Section 8.0 No person shall receive any remuneration for participating in the management or operation of any such game.

Section 9.0 The Town Clerk is hereby delegated all of the authority granted to the Town Board by the Bingo Licensing Law in relation to the issuance, amendment and cancellation of licenses, the conduct of investigations and hearing, the supervision of the operation of the games, and the collection and transmission of fees.

Section 10.0 The unauthorized conduct of a bingo game and any willful violation of any provision of this ordinance shall constitute and be punishable as a misdemeanor.

Section 11.0 This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as "The Bingo Ordinance of the Town of Oyster Bay".

Section 12.0 This Ordinance shall become operative and effective when it shall have been approved by a majority of the qualified electors of the Town of Oyster Bay, voting on a proposition therefor, submitted at a general or special election held within the Town of Oyster Bay.

Street Lights By Christmas

The L.L. Lighting Co. has assured this reporter that street lighting will be blazing before Christmas of this year in Sections 7 and 8 of our community.

The Town of Oyster Bay has approved and appropriated the necessary funds for the installation of street lights in Sec. 7 and 8. At the present time the L.L. CO. is making preparations for the actual installation of these lights. They are most anxious for an early installation, because from a business standpoint they will not receive any income until the lights are in operation. They feel certain that the latest date that they will commence installation of the lights will be the first or second week in December. The lights normally take approximately two to three weeks to complete.

There will be 66 lights installed in Sections 7 and 8. The L.L. CO. has stated that they are doing their utmost to advance this date of installation.

The wiring for installation is from the poles now located in the rear yards of our homes. From the rear yard the wire will be laid in the ground and under the present sidewalk. The light will be installed between the curve and the sidewalk.

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Syosset Education Unit Reports

by HORACE BERNSTEIN

At the monthly meeting of the Board of Education, Central School District #2, it was reported that the 7th graders who are now attending the Woodbury school on split session as well as the other students from the other schools, will resume full session on Monday, Oct. 27. This definite date is based on the fact that the school district had applied for State Aid for the students who were attending school for only three hours a day instead of the required 4 hours. A special case was made for this district by the State provided that the split session ends by Nov. 1st and returns to full session. On this basis, the District has received a definite commitment from the contractor that all additions to the schools will be ready.

Dr. Phillips, superintendent of schools, looking into the future reported that at the present time there are 6,715 students enrolled in school; 4,762 attend Kindergarten-6th grade and 1,953 7th through 12th grade. With the 1,953 students representing full capacity of the H.S., it would mean that in 6 years when the 4,762 students go into the High School, the school will be overcrowded by over 2,500 students. Simple arithmetic provides the answer.

Under State Law, the Board of

Education is required to transport students who attend schools out of the district and are not further than 8 miles from home. This would apply to students who attend private schools such as Yeshivas and parochial schools. Parents who contemplate sending their children to such schools are requested to inform our civic assoc. SCHOOL COMMITTEE AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. This must be done, so that we can inform the Board of Education how many children are involved and to what schools so that they can make arrangements for bus transportation next term.

For the benefit of new members of our community living in the Syosset school section, may we inform them that there is such a thing as a School Committee of the Birchwood Civic Assoc whose duty it is to keep themselves and thus the public what is occurring in the School District. Any complaints or suggestions should be brought to their attention. This School Committee is also always on the look out for new members. All residents of the Syosset Section are eligible providing they are members of the Civic Association, to join this Committee. Rules of Road Apply to Bikes

With the coming of the fall season, our children are using their bikes for transportation to and from school, religious school, Boy Scout and Cub Scout meetings, etc. When Daylight Saving Time ends, a great deal of this traveling will be done in the dusk and the dark. To insure our children's safety while traveling, parents should check their children's bicycles to see that they are in good running condition and are adequately equipped for such use.

The Nassau County Police Dept. has informed "THE VILLAGER" that the new New York State Motor Vehicle Law has specific provisions for bicycles. Among these are: The Rules of the Road apply to bicycles; The rider must sit properly on the seat of the bicycle with both feet on the pedals, and must carry no additional riders; On the roadway, bicycles must stay to the RIGHT, and may not ride more than two abreast; Bicycles used between 1/2 hour after sunset and 1/2 hour before sunrise, must be equipped with a white light visible 500 feet in front, and a red reflector visible in the upper beams 50 to 300 feet in the rear; Bicycles may not have sirens, but must be equipped with some other signal that can be heard 100 feet away; The brake must be able to make the wheel skid on level clear dry pavement; and, last but not least, parents shall not permit a violation.

So please, for our children's sake, check the bikes, and explain the rule about bike riding. We, as drivers, must be extremely careful of bike riders. After all, our children's safety is up to us.
