## 3-Day Focus on Our Growth

Four months of intensive effort on the part of the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce comes to a climax this weekend with the first observance of Greater Hicksville Festival Days, today, Friday, and Saturday.

The Festival Days are designed to focus public interest in Hicksville, its industrial, commercial and business growth.

The program opens at 8:30 this morning (Thursday) with the grand arrival of Aunt Jemima at the Hicksville RR station. During the day she will visit the schools, take part in

a motorcade at noon and tour the shopping centers from 2 to 5 PM. Tonight at 8 PM a fine band concert will be staged at Mid Island Plaza, rain or shine. There is no admission charge.

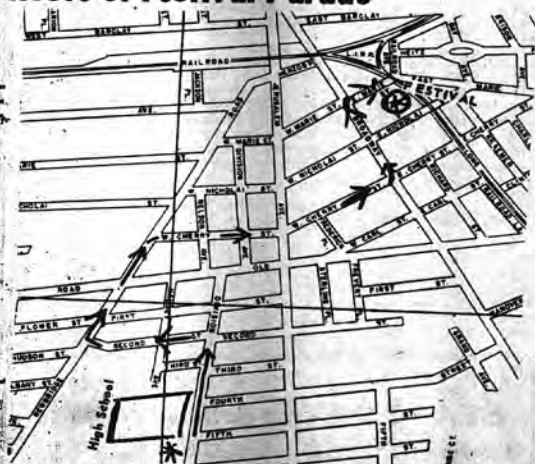
Friday is largely a youth program day with a number of interesting contests and events at the Festival Exposition center between E. Marie and E. Nicholas Streets between 4 and 6 PM. At 8 PM there will be a teen dance to the music of Paul Drake at the Festival Grounds. In case of inclement weather, the dance will be

indoors - probably at the high school.

Saturday is filled with special events from early morning until late at night. There is a dog show at 9 AM at the Mid Island Plaza the Kiwanis Pancake Breakfast from 11 AM to 8 PM at the Senior High School, a great parade at 1:30 PM. Saturday evening will start off with the presentation of Fire Prevention Week poster trophies at the Exposition by the Fire Dept. Then comes the presentation of prizes for the youngster contests held the day before and the selection of the Greater Hicksville Festival Couple.

### Route of Festival Parade

It will disburse at the Exposition grounds on E. Marie St.

## Legislators Pledge Effort on Crossings

Republican legislators representing Oyster Bay Township and Hicksville in Albany today pledged their continued efforts to bring the long-needed Rail Road

Crossing Elimination Program for Hicksville to a speedy and successful conclusion, following an on-the-scene inspection of the depot area, yesterday (Wednesday)

State Senator William Hults and Assemblyman Edwin Fehrenbach in the company of Town Attorney Michael J. Sullivan studied the area which the Town on behalf of Hicksville is seeking to obtain eventual development for commuter parking.

The Public Service Commission was scheduled to hold a hearing today (Thurs.) regarding a plea to have the State of New York acquire as part of the project, an area between the present LIRR property and E. Barclay St. for a temporary station plaza during the elimination and then make available for commuter parking when the crossing job is finished.

Town Attorney Sullivan told Senator Hults and Assemblyman Fehrenbach, yesterday on the site, that Oyster Bay Township thru the Hicksville Park and Parking District feels that the community and town have met their obligation by the ex-

## Court Fight Looms Over Wildfield Tract

Nassau Co Planning Commission has scheduled a public hearing for next Wednesday, Oct 15, at 9 AM at Mineola upon the subdivision map for Wildfield on the south side of Northern State Parkway and the east side of Cantiague Rock Road, Hicksville. The application is made by Opgal Inc.

The notice of hearing - set for 107 Mineola Blvd., Mineola - was seen in some quarters as the opening gun of a court battle by Opgal to force the Town to rescind its zoning of the former Press Wireless acreage as industrial property.

Hicksville School District was considering the purchase of a 10-acre school site on Cantiague Rock Road for an elementary school until the Town rezoned the residential tract to industry. The Town Board

last month enacted a change in its building zone ordinance which eliminates the possible of small homes being erected on land that has been designated for future industrial development, according to Supervisor John J. Burns.

The Wildfield development, as originally proposed by Opgal, called for the erection of more than 300 homes on the 100-odd acres of the former Press Wireless land in the Northwest section of Hicksville.

penditure of in excess of a million dollars for parking field development for both shoppers and commuters.

The need for additional parking area to the west of Newbridge Rd. it was pointed out, arrives from the crossing elimination itself and the proposal for State acquisition is advanced in the interest of the public safety, Sullivan said.

Hults and Fehrenbach said jointly, following the conference, that "it has been our privilege to assist the progress of the crossing elimination project with the cooperation and valuable assistance of the Town of Oyster Bay and the community of Hicksville, notably the Chamber of Commerce and leading community leaders."

"We both strongly urge that the PSC give every consideration to this proposal in the interest of safety and the most effective development of the project."

The start of the actual elimination of the Hicksville crossings is anticipated in 1959. During the period when the tracks are being elevated above ground level, a temporary right of way will be constructed thru the present "station plaza" and the depot will have to be relocated.

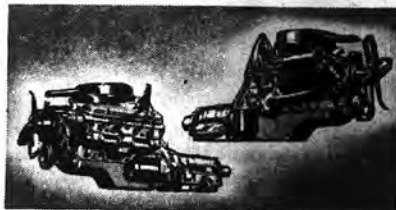

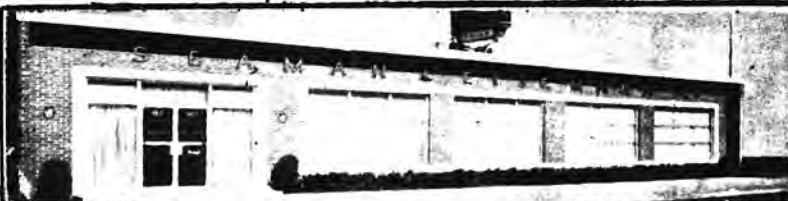

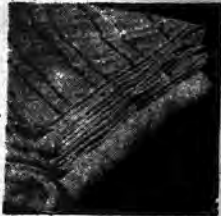

The attention of the public is directed to the following amendments to the Long Island State Park Ordinances, duly adopted as required by law (Section 775, Conservation Law, and Section 1630, Vehicle and Traffic Law):

ORDINANCE NUMBER ONE  
Section 1. (j) "Parkway" defined: The term "parkway" shall be deemed to include the paved roadways, access drives, shoulders, medial strips, mall areas, service areas and all other areas within the boundary lines of the parkway.

(i) "Park Drive, Park Road": shall be deemed to include all roads, drives and parking areas including entrances and exists thereto within a park excepting such roads which may be designated as parkways by the Commission.

ORDINANCE NUMBER FIVE

Section 10. (b) No person shall drive or operate within a park, parkway or park road any omnibus or other vehicle adapted for or with a seating capacity for more than eight passengers, excluding the driver, except under permit. Omnibuses known as outing buses will be permitted to operate by the shortest possible route from outside a park to discharge or pick up its passengers from a picnic or bathing area only if a permit to enter the park has been issued by the Long Island State Park Commission to the organization sponsoring the outing, picnic, etc. Buses must proceed over the route and to the parking field designated in the permit.

(d) Trucks or trailers will be permitted to operate south of Merrick Road over the Capree, Wantagh Meadowbrook, Loop and Ocean Parkways where it is necessary for them to do so to properly police and supply such areas or contiguous areas, except on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays after 11 A.M. during the period from May 15 to October 1 of each year. Any vehicle or equipment or combination thereof exceeding eight feet in width, thirteen feet in height, fifty feet in length or having a weight greater than 22,400 pounds on any one axle shall not be operated over the aforesaid parkways including bridges incidental thereto except under written permit issued by the Commission.

## the Herald Sportlight

The kindly attitude the New York Herald Tribune took Sunday morning in headlining that "Hicksville is Shaded by Garden City 14-12" made breakfast more enjoyable if not relaxing.

For it was too quick to put from the mind that curtain of gloom that clanked down on the Hicksville field, late Saturday afternoon, when the Trojans skipped free another time.

This is the one for which Hicksville had supposedly waited a year. The Orange was shunked out of the 1957 title by the Trojans but had recovered to win six straight and last Saturday morning was on the verge of being considered one of the top three powers in the County.

It was a little astounding to see the players get pushed around by the visitors. They did not have the fire or the intentness needed to prove themselves a number one unit.

And it was the players who lost it, despite the fact that many exerted individual efforts.

The Garden City single wing ripped off 252 yards on the ground and was an offense of variation and deception that confounded the Comet line and secondary.

Despite the fact that Bill Schrimpe was lost to the Hicksville attack early in the first period, Coach Bowers' crew notched 226 yards on the ground -- with a brilliant 65-yard scoring dash by Bob Cerone figured in. Hicksville had two other touchdowns in the endzone only to lose them when twenty-yards away a Hicksville player was caught for a clipping and then pushing infraction.

Those were pointless but game deciding factors.

In all Cerone was the only bright spot. He picked up 145 yards in 15 attempts.

Of course, a ball game was lost and not a season.

Hicksville can still win the NSAA Section I championship and the acclaim of the county. However, the players themselves must buck and remain on the ball at all times.

The Comets go to Great Neck this Saturday and play at the North High School.

Since the Garden City game wasn't taken seriously by the players we do not expect a hangover from the defeat.

The coaching staff which was let down last week for all the hard work that it has done won't be this.

Hicksville 19, Great Neck 6.

Garden City's continued ability to field a top notch team has many in these parts puzzled. Coach Warren King gets \$1,002.50 a year and his first assistant \$752.50. The Junior Varsity man rates \$532.50 and the payments for valuable time goes clear down to the elementary levels.

Now Hicksville has one of the most respected head coaches in the County and a laudable staff. But the point is that while payment to coaches won't alter conditions in a given year, the overall healthy Garden City system is bound to have a responsive effect each year.

Hicksville is still one of three out of 56 Nassau schools that does not pay for work done on overtime. The released time excuse is nothing but a student non-productive hour killing procedure.

A good football program is built from the ground up as is a sports program of any kind. Getting the best varsity staff in the world is not going to match a Garden City, Great Neck, Manhasset or many others consistently.

It is an oddity that while the injuries to Hicksville High football players are not severe this year that there has been a rash of twisted knees and ankles.

The School Board rejected the whirlpool bath for use in such cases as well as many other schoolroom occurrences.

Most of the schools the State requires Hicksville to compete with are completely equipped for their program. They have players recover quickly from such normal football mishaps.

We do not see why Hicksville lads have to slink to other areas for treatment when it should be here for both varsity sports and gym occurrences.

It is very hard to rationalize to anyone just how the Board can authorize a slush fund for hundreds of pictures of its pet projects, such as Plaza Productions, while the basic needs are considered too expensive.

A high pressure sports school is to be greatly feared but no pressure school is a blot for the community.

And incidentally, independence of thought is just about the best reward for writing our local views for almost 20 years. But to the few who may question it these are always our own thoughts. Long before any of the principals now on the scene were here we practiced that. WE STILL DO.

In an otherwise dismal week for Hicksville High, the demanding exertion and hard work required of the Cross Country Team paid off in opening meet victory.

With Bob Schall, Hicksville, running the course in 14:30, to decision Tom Ennis, Island Trees, by two seconds, for first place the Comets won 34, to Island Trees 36 and Bedpage's 50.

Henry Landau was third for the Orange and Black in 14:56. Other finishers for Hicksville in a contest in which every second counted were 7th, Joe Lofano, 11th John Neglia and 12th Bob McIsaac.

An 85-yard punt return and a 5-yard off tackle slant carried the Garden City Junior Varsity to a 13-0 win over Hicksville, Monday at the Trojan Stadium.
