In 12 Communities:

GOP Margin Comes Thru

About 100,000 voted in Oyster Bay Township's 140 election districts, Tuesday, and sparked by the Nelson Rockefeller sweep to Republican victory and the State Mansion in Albany, all GOP candidates were carried. Assemblyman Edwin Fehrenbach made a substantial showing against William McCaffrey, more than doubling his plurality over the same opponent of one year ago.

Michael J. Sullivan of Hicksville, Town GOP Chairman and leader, commenting on the returns late election night said: "We rejoice with all Republicans in the fact that once again we will have a Republican governor in Albany. We are extremely gratified that the entire GOP slate has been elected in the Town of Oyster Bay."

Rockefeller carried every one of the 15 Republican executive areas in the Township except Plainview, Jericho-South Syosset and North Massapequa where the Ave Harriman margin was slight.

Townwide Rockefeller got 55,852 votes and Harriman 37,399.

Fehrenbach was re-elected for a full two-year term with 48,962 votes in the township against 41,065 for McCaffrey. Last year Fehrenbach got 36,544 in the Township and McCaffrey 32,930. It was the third time McCaffrey has been defeated in his bid for the Assembly seat on the Democrat-Liberal ticket. He first bowed to John J. Burns, now Town supervisor, in 1955.

The Bethpage Assemblyman carried the same 12 out of 15 executive community areas of the Township as Rockefeller.

In the 12 Districts of Glen Cove, which is also part of the Assembly District, Fehrenbach won 3990 to 3938 over McCaffrey. Last year McCaffrey took Glen Cove 3,945 to 3,717.

The Democrat-Liberal candidates for County Executive and Children's Court Judge cut sharply into Republican pluralities in the Township as they did in the County, but not enough to change the final decision.

A. Holly Patterson defeated Joseph Suozzi, Glen Cove mayor, in the

township with a margin of under 2,000 votes out of 100,000 ballots cast. Patterson was re-elected County Executive with about a 30,000 edge in the county-wide count of 704 Election Districts.

Beatrice Burstein, strongly supported by one of the county daily newspapers, was also turned back by Leslie Ekenberg for judge of the

Objections to Showing Old Chaplin Films In Public Library on Increase

Community reaction in opposition to the proposed showing at the Hicksville Public Library of four silent Charlie Chaplin comedies of the 1917-18 era burst forth this week in the form of letters and telephone calls received by Mid Island HERALD. No favorable comment of the Library Trustees' action was received.

Following are two letters on the proposed screening of the Chaplin flickers. In addition, several phone messages indicated various organizations are scheduling formal action which will be forwarded to the Board of Trustees.

The date of the Chaplin film showing has not been firmly set. However, the Library announced this week the start of the Adult Film program on Thursday, Nov. 13, with "Erosia", Beethoven's Life. The Library Trustees by a 4-1 vote last week decided to rent the Chaplin films with the showing expected to take place in December or January, depending upon the availability of the 75-minute film.

Charles E. Rogan of 23 Tip Top Lane, Hicksville, released to the Herald, a copy of his letter to the Library Trustees, protesting the proposed Chaplin showing "in our tax-supported library".

Rogan declared in his letter: "It has been said that regardless of this man's political views and repeated denunciation of our American way of

Thank You Tea This Sunday

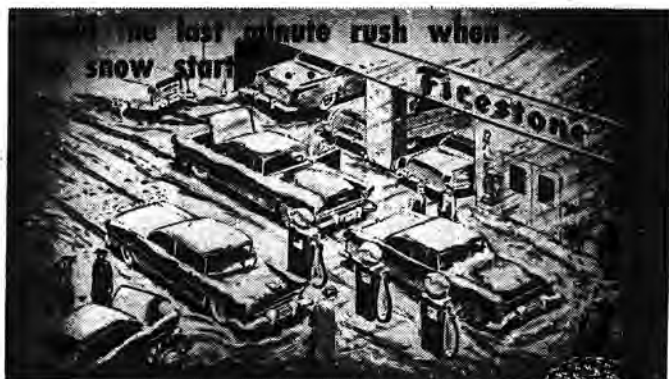

Efforts to Curb Speeding Here

On Oct. 16, a meeting of our Traffic and Public Safety Committee was held with the committee on Public Safety of the Town Board of Oyster Bay and a representative from the Town Attorney's office. Councilman Alsop, chairman of this committee; Councilman Ocker, and Edward Poulos from the Town Attorney's office discussed with us the measures that were within their province that could reduce the traffic hazard in and around our community.

The Town Board has the power to establish all types of stop signs, limit or control parking, outline proper cross-walks but can in no way change the speed limit. The speed

limit in Oyster Bay is fully under the control of the State Traffic Commission. Therefore, our committee concentrated on recommending to Mr. Alsop various stop signs on Birchwood Park Drive. At both ends of Maytime Drive, on Hazelwood Drive at Maytime Drive, on Birchwood Park Drive at Robbins Lane. The stop signs would be highly effective in slowing traffic on Birchwood Park Drive with three full stops along its length.

A police officer was requested for Broadway and Birchwood Park Drive between the hours of 7 A.M. and 8:30 A.M. to help reduce the hazards of entering the road at that point. A female traffic officer was requested to help control the traffic at the Jackson School. All these points were discussed in detail and answers were not given immediately but assurance was given us that some direct action will be taken to help us in our problem.

Mr. Alsop will make recommendations to the State Traffic Commission in Albany for traffic lights on Broadway at Birchwood Park Drive and on Jericho Turnpike at Merry Lane. This is a repeat request by us on this matter.

We planned to have a personal representative present our petition to the State Traffic Commission in Albany in hopes of getting prompt action on traffic lights as well as reduction of speed limit of 30 MPH.

30 MPH Town Speed Limit Soon

Supervisor John J. Burns said today he was hopeful that a uniform highway speed code for the Town of Oyster Bay would be established by the State Traffic Commission within "three or four weeks."

Burns made his announcement at the conclusion of a two-day conference with Edward Burke of the State Traffic Commission; John Avery of Nassau County Dept. of Public Works; Inspector Louis Schneider, Chief Safety Division, Nassau County Police; Thomas R. Pynchon, Town Superintendent of Highways; and Councilmen Peter B. Allsopp and Edmund A. Ocker, members of the Town Board's committee on safety.

Supervisor Burns pointed out that the anticipated establishment of the new uniform speed regulations for the Town culminates a two-year effort on the part of Town officials, together with the State Traffic Commission and other Nassau County official agencies to set up reduced speed limits throughout the Town of Oyster Bay.

"At the conclusion of the two-day conference held Oct. 30 and 31, State Traffic Commission authorities assured me they would establish a Town-wide 30-mile-per-hour speed limit within the next three to four weeks," Supervisor Burns said.

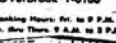

Scouts Offer New Youth Program

This fall the Boy Scouts of America launch a new Exploring program. It was announced by Gerald S. Kessler, chairman of the Public Relations Committee of the Nassau County Council, last week.

"Exploring is intended for all high-school age boys regardless of former affiliation with the Boy Scouts," said Kessler. "It has received more attention in its developmental stage than any other program released by the Boy Scouts," he added.

It will be a vastly improved program, building on the good features of the program now being discontinued and includes many new features.

Exploring has proved itself one of America's most attractive programs for young men. It gives them a society in which they can put into action their desire to mix with young men of their own age to carry out democratic methods of electing officers, to participate in outdoor activities, particularly sports skills that can be used in adult life.

Explorers learn to be participating citizens through the "Citizens Now" conferences that are held in all sections of the country and to participate in community service on a level that appeals to them.

Kessler said that there are now 2829 Explorers in 80 units in the Nassau County Council, BSA, which is responsible for administering the program in Nassau.

Kessler said he was impressed with the special Exploring meeting

conducted last May in Chicago at the 48th Annual Meeting of the National Council. He said that Norton Clapp of Medina, Wash., a vice-president of the National Council and chairman of its Committee on Exploring told of the movement's desire to better serve boys in the teen-age range.

"Today our nation seems to be particularly concerned with the activities of our teen-age youth," said Clapp who became a Boy Scout in 1918, and has been active in the movement ever since.

"We can drive some pride and satisfaction," he said, "from the fact that for a long time we have engaged in the business of aiding teen-age boys through this difficult period of growth and social adjustment so that they might develop into citizens of substance and character."

"For many years we have had a general Exploring program, plus specialized programs in Sea Exploring and in Air Exploring. These have been reasonably successful in holding boys in the total program of the Boy Scouts of America."

"The National Executive Board recognized the obligation of the Boy Scout movement to create and operate a program that will not only provide continuing interest for the boy now in Scouting, but one which will attract a good portion of the four-and-one-half million boys in this teen-age range that we are not serving today."

The Hicksville High football team has the difficult task this Saturday of casting aside the tremendous disappointment over its 20-13 loss to unbeaten Freeport. A triumph at Mineola over the Marons could bring it the North Shore Section I championship.

Farmingdale tied Garden City last week and the Trojans face the fast improving Port Washington club in the league finale. Port upended Farmingdale after its hard fought 7-6 loss to Hicksville and there is a chance that the Trojans could be dumped.

In the event Hicksville would be acclaimed the champion with 10 points to 9 if dangerous Mineola is disposed of.

We know the Homecoming Day crowd will understand when we say no matter how bitter the hangover from the Freeport loss, the team will be in there fighting.

Its ability to come back was proven when the Red Devils scored 13 points in the first four minutes and had to hang on for their lives thereafter.

Hicksville outgained the winners 150 to 120 yards on the ground and had 12 first downs to 8.

Joe Naso held the Hicksville club together and directed the unrelenting slants of Bill Schrimpe and Bob Cerone.

The Orange came ripping back in the second quarter 30-yards and had a marker on Cerone's score for a 13-7 count.

great American artists. True, there are people who separate a person's political leanings from his field of endeavor. I am not one of that group. I am proud to relate. To me, there can be no deviation on the road of Americanism. There are no slight detours on this road; either you are pronounced in American views or you are not.

"In closing", Rogan wrote, "I might add that if any particular group of groups of people in our District feel the necessity of having a showing of Chaplin's pictures, or Picasso's painting, or any other un-Americans (not to be misconstrued to mean all artists of foreign citizenship), I feel they themselves should undertake the expense and have the showing in their homes or any other place they desire."

"I strongly protest the use of my money to gratify the needs and wishes of a select few. Were policies of this nature to continue, I would find it necessary to charge the Board with wanton misuse of the taxpayers' money."

Another letter to the HERALD, with the name of the author withheld by request, commented: "It is a long time since any news item shocked me as much as the one on the 'Library to Show Old Chaplin Films'."

"In the old days when we were called Hicks and Hicksville only had a very small movie house, with the only entertainment being the first Charlie Chaplin films and similar horse and buggy shows, I guess we old timers had to be contented with them or produce our much better Minstrel Shows. There was no place else to go, very few people had cars, and roads were very bad. Very few had radios and no television; so, I like the rest of us, saw every pic-
